Coming up from the depths of misques and fumbleitis, the Bulldogs have scored decisive victories in their last two games.

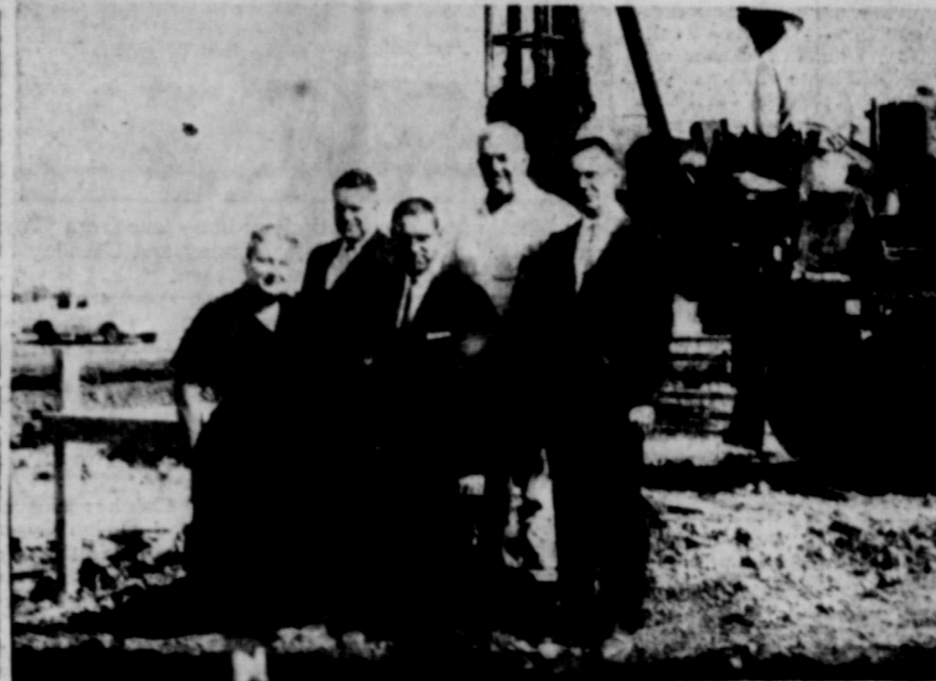
The game with Dublin was the turning point in the Bulldogs' performance. Although losing the game, it could easily have gone the other way.

## RJC To Host Junior College Athletic Conference Meet

Official word from the Texas Junior College Athletic Conference president, William C. Weir, dean at Schreiner University, has been received here by Ranger Junior College president, Dr. Theodore Nicksick, Jr., that RJC's invitation has been accepted to hold the 1964 meeting at the college.

This will make the third successive year that RJC and the Ranger Chamber of Commerce have been hosts to the meeting.

The 1964 meeting is scheduled for April 27-28 and will include the Spring Track, Tennis and Golf Meet as well as a meeting of the Texas Junior College Athletic Conference.

Head Coach Gerald Williams said Ranger Junior College is well equipped to accommodate the Conference Meet and "Ranger will do a good job," he said.

"Our facilities are adequate and the stadium will be ready by that time. The excellent Red Dog Track at our college is ideal for this meet, which will see several hundred athletes competing from all parts of Texas."

The golf matches will be played on Lone Cedar Country Club's course, about 5 miles south of Ranger, on the north shore of Lake Leon.

Last year's tennis matches occupied the Ranger courts and those in the City Park in Eastland.

Richard Henderson, president of the Chamber of Commerce said the city of Ranger was more than pleased to have the meeting held here again.

## RJC Building Construction Site Work Well Under Way

The Ranger Junior College science department made an inspection this week of the site of the new science building, under construction along with three more buildings, which will fulfill the \$281,163.00 construction program at the college.

Dr. Theodore Nicksick, Jr., President, and Richard Henderson, chairman of the Board of Regents made the inspection with David Allsup, chairman of the biology department, David Flinn, chairman of the chemistry department and Mrs. Kenneth Alford, instructor in biology.

The site is located southwest of the RJC campus on land

deeded to the college by the City of Ranger.

Other buildings to be constructed are an administration building, a classroom building, which together with the science will form a complex, connected by covered walkways. The gymnasium site is to the northeast of the three-building complex.

All four of the buildings are now under construction with the foundation drilling rig (shown in background of picture) at work preparing for steel and concrete supports.

The work is scheduled to take 200 working days and is due completion the first week in August, 1964.

## F. P. Curry Dies Five Days After Nathan's Acquittal

Eighteen-year old Nathan Curry of Cisco was acquitted of the murder of Mrs. Florence Hussey by an all male jury at 8:05 p. m. Saturday, Oct. 19, after four and one-half hours deliberation.

Immediately after the reading of the verdict by the district clerk, the courtroom became a scene of turmoil and uncontrolled emotion. Nathan Curry wept first in the arms of his attorney, John Watts of Odessa, who had backed his belief that young Curry was incapable of committing such a violent crime with the testimony of eminent doctors in the field of psychiatry, psychology, and neurology.

Cheers and handclapping also followed the verdict, and Judge W. J. Oxford, banging his gavel, said, "I can appreciate your feelings, but the court must have order. This is the first time in my 12 years on the bench that I have ever had to use my gavel to get order."

At 3:05 p. m. the jury retired behind locked doors with the pleas of all three attorneys—for justice to be done—ringing in their ears. They weighed the evidence and found Nathan Curry not guilty by reason of not having committed the crime with which he had been charged.

For the first time in over 27 months, 18 year old Nathan Curry was acknowledged by the law of the land to be innocent.

Mr. Watts said that a church denomination had offered to pay Nathan Curry's way through the seminary in preparation for his becoming a minister.

On the final day of testimony in the trial, the defense rested its case early Saturday morning after re-calling Wendell Sowell, from the Fort Worth crime lab, to the stand. When asked if he knew that footprints of Nathan Curry were taken after his arrest, and if he (Sowell) asked for footprints to be taken, he replied, "No sir," to both questions.

The witness also admitted that dog hair was found in Mrs. Hussey's home, but that he did not attempt to find out where it came from, and that he did not know why the matter was not pursued.

Monday, Mrs. Curry and her daughter, Linda Townzen, attributed the victory to prayer. A group of both strangers and friends of the family had formed a prayer chain in the halls during jury deliberation. "John Watts could not have done it without the help of God," they District Attorney Earl Conner addressed the jury in the first half of the state's closing argument, recalling to them the testimony of Dee Wheeler and the details of the confession.

A spellbound courtroom listened to a dramatic plea for justice by the defense attorney, John Watts, during which time he described the "tangled web" of lies that had been woven around an "innocent boy."

"Truth is just like a football," Mr. Watts declared. "You can take it out in the morning and kick it around all day, and when you bring it in at night, it's still just as smooth and unscratched as it was before it was kicked around."

Assistant prosecuting attorney Sam Cleveland re-enacted the details of the crime and how it was committed, recalling to the jury the "cries of the beaten and stabbed woman as contained in the alleged confession — "Don't, Nathan, don't."

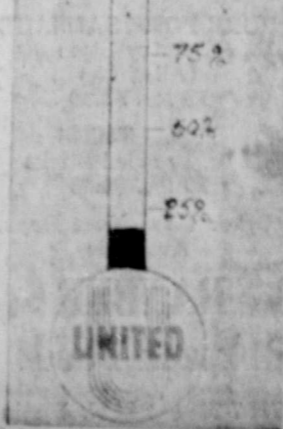

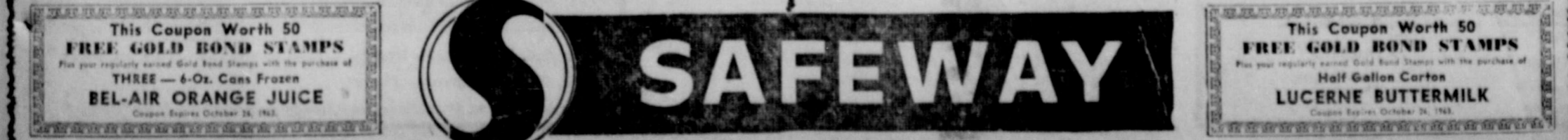

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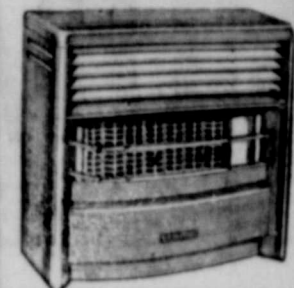

He finally took me to a room. I may as well say up as I didn't sleep. I wish I had the continuity to finish this story in order to acquaint you with what I have encountered while endeavoring to pioneer my stay in good-old Ranger, and at the same time try to attain longevity.

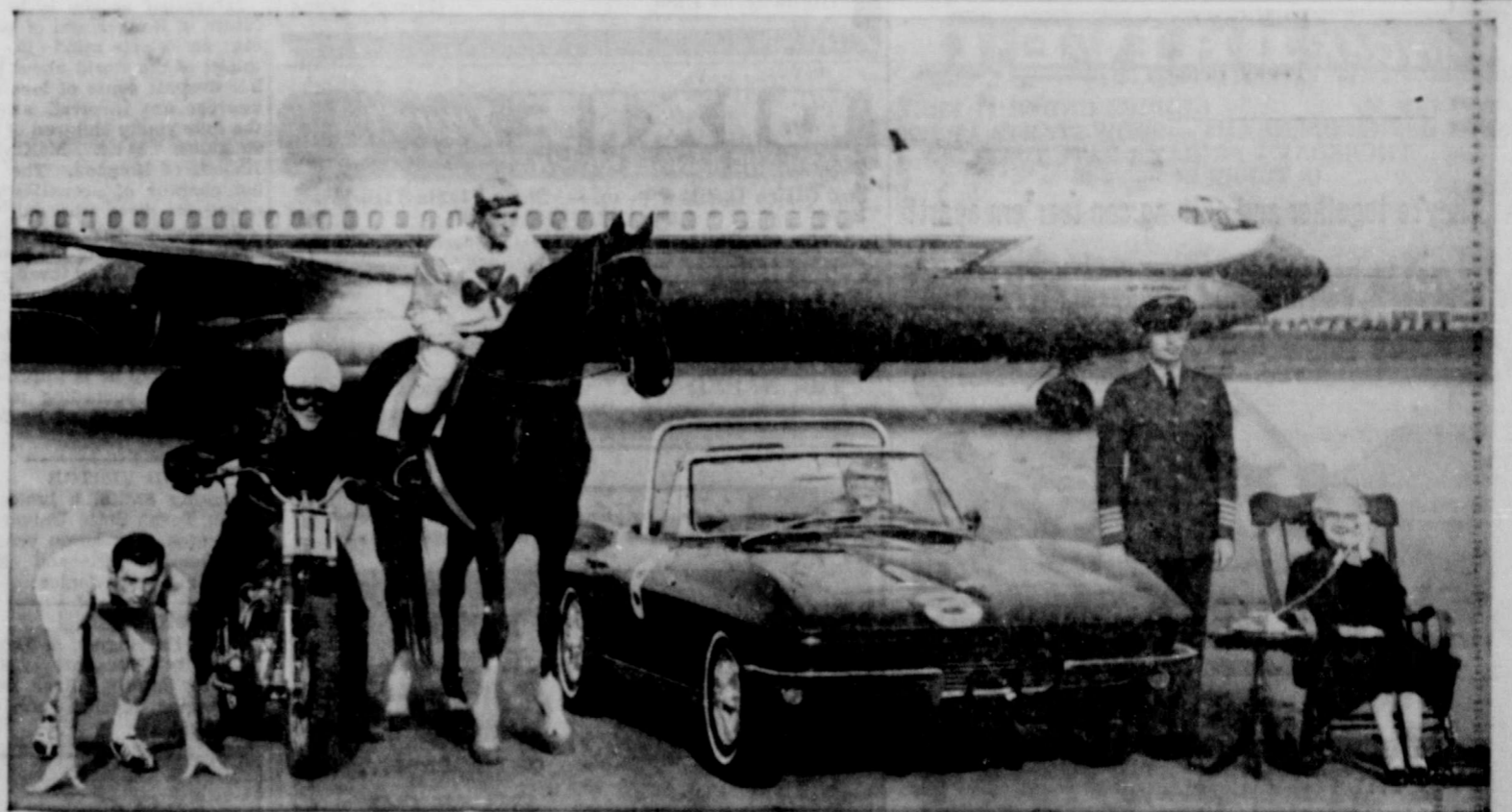

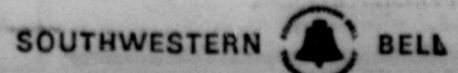

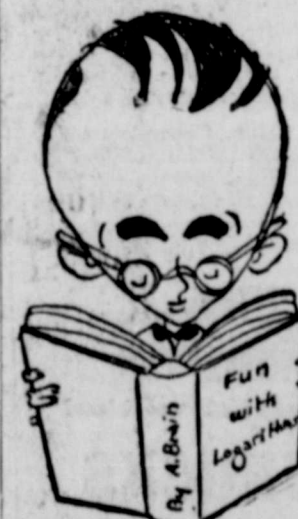
