## Rivalry Continues As The Bulldogs Meet Mavs Friday

In a rivalry that dates back over 25 years, the Ranger Bulldogs will meet the Eastland Mavericks at Bulldog stadium Friday night for the final home game of the season.

In the many years of rivalry between these two clubs, Ranger, although being defeated in last year's encounter, holds the edge on our neighbors to the West.

The Ranger team, following a good performance against a tough team last week may find the going a bit rough against a fired up Eastland team if there is the slightest bit of let down on their part. Eastland, losing to Albany 40 to 0 came back to defeat Cross Plains by a score of 48 to 0.

## Show Up Well On Defense Locals Helpless On Offense

The above headline was a sub-head taken from the Ranger Times of this same week in 1933.

The reference was to the Ranger Junior College Texas Rangers as they defeated the Simmons University 7 to 0 without so much as taking a first down.

The only score in that ball game of 30 years ago, came on an intercepted pass and rambank of 50 yards by John Bray of RJC.

This dusting of the file may have a familiar ring, although the Rangers of today have been able to do a little better than that offensively as first downs have not necessarily been their problem.

Accessibility to the goal line has proven a problem though as the Rangers have yet to find the spark that would light an offensive fire. There have been some shining moments when the machinery seemed

to move without trouble, only to be hit by unforeseen malfunction that would, without warning, mesh the tiring defensive gears.

As the Rangers meet Wharton in their homecoming game Saturday night, they will be coming up against one of the major powers of the ball teams, according to the polls.

Ranking no 3 in the nation, Wharton has yet to lose a game and has downed the Rangers on a previous encounter, scoring heavily in the first quarter with only 60 yards total rushing. The Rangers almost completely contained them in the second quarter as they scored six while allowing Wharton eight.

The game Saturday night will be the last home game of the 1963-64 Rangers as they finish the race out of town, meeting Navarro in Corsicana on Thursday November 14.

O. C. Cox, 68, of Weatherford, former resident of Eastland, died at 2 p. m. Saturday, November 2, in Weatherford of a heart attack.

Funeral services were held Monday, November 4, at 10 a. m. in the Gal-Braith and Pinkard Funeral Chapel in Weatherford with the Rev. Frost, pastor of the Pleasant Baptist Church officiating. Graveside rites were held at 3 p. m. in the Eastland Cemetery.

Born January 9, 1895 in Wood County, Texas, Mr. Cox moved to Carbon as a small boy. He was married to Sally Hagan of the Kokomo Community in 1914.

Mr. Cox worked for a number of years for the Magnolia Petroleum Company in Olden. He was the father-in-law of Rev. W. E. Hallenbeck, former pastor of the Church of God in Eastland.

Survivors are his wife, five daughters, Mrs. O. L. Jumpier of Ranger, Mrs. W. E. Hallenbeck of Flagstaff, Arizona, Mrs. Lynn Lemmons of Dallas, Mrs. W. L. ## County To Ballot On Four State And Two Local Matters

A comparatively light turnout of voters has been forecast Saturday as Eastland County take part in a statewide constitutional amendment election and expresses opinions in two county referendum propositions. Polls open at 8 a. m. and close at 7 p. m. with regular election laws prevailing.

Voting will be at the Courthouse in Eastland, the City Hall in Cisco, and also at the City Hall in Ranger as well as boxing elsewhere in the county.

And it's one of those "for" and "against" ballots which can frequently be nightmares for both voters and vote counters.

The constitutional amendments will become "official" if carried but the two county issues are merely "samplers" or straw votes to find out how the county residents feel about two issues — both concerning wildlife.

Two large delegations, one representing the county live-

stock raising industry and another one made up of residents interested in the present and future wildlife control measures in the county have been active in seeking support in the election Saturday.

The livestock raisers are asking that the trapper be retained to assist in the control of predatory animals which are destructive to the livestock industry, and the other group is asking that the unlimited issuance of doe permits in the county be stopped because, they explain, that there is not sufficient evidence to show that there is a surplus of doe in the county.

The first constitutional amendment proposition concerns the poll tax as a requirement for voting. When this point was on last November's general election ballot as a "straw vote" itself, it carried in Eastland County.

The other three amendment propositions deal with welfare conditions, as is more fully shown on the sample ballot on this page.

Voters will be asked to mark through the proposition for which they do want to vote.

certifying the vote. Anyone with a pecan crop of any size is eligible to enter the show.

According to the county agent, J. M. Cooper, the Eastland County pecan crop is spotted with some areas producing large quantities of high grade pecans while other areas have not fared so well. There are various reasons for the light production in some areas but the primary cause is the lack of rain.

C. E. Smith of Rising Star, president of the association has reports that he is harvesting more than 1000 pounds of nuts per day.

Mr. Cooper reports that a killing frost along with high winds would stimulate the harvest.

Amused spectators later became alarmed, summoned the law. Constable Ralph Veal arrived promptly and made the arrest at the Little Gem Hotel in the colored section of Ranger.



SURE THE DOE POPULATION NEEDS TO BE CONTROLLED WHEN THERE IS A SURPLUS . . .

The Texas Wildlife Commission has repeatedly demonstrated that the best way to control the total deer population for any given area is to control the doe population, through legalized doe-hunting. But in Eastland County there is currently no way of knowing just exactly what the doe, or deer, population is. In one area of the county it appears to be heavily populated with doe, but just a few miles away the opposite is true. Scientific surveys are the only means for determining what the deer conditions are, and what measures need to be taken to correct any deficiencies. Few, if any, object to the legal kill of doe, provided a surplus is proved — but the unlimited killing of doe could very easily prove the end of deer in our county. Those persons who are concerned with wildlife, urge that you vote against the unlimited issuance of doe permits. (To do this, you must mark through the proposition which reads "FOR continuance of unlimited doe permits, and leave the "AGAINST" continuance of unlimited doe permits" unmarked).

Range control of both livestock and wildlife has become a highly scientific specialty resulting from years of research and study, and today, specialists in this field can determine such things as "how many deer an area will support", "how many deer need to be removed for the safety of the herd," etc. These are answers which are important to good control. BALANCE is the keyword. Balance of doe to buck population; balance of deer to cattle in a given area. Each of these phases is important and requires the skilled technology of specialists. The unlimited issuance of permits to kill doe in Eastland County is far from a reasonable approach to wildlife control. This year, 800 doe permits will be issued. Guesses are that there may be 1,100 doe (no one knows for sure, of course). But assuming this ratio to be correct, and further assuming that every permit accounts for a killed doe this year — what will be the deer population in a few years? Fortunately, everyone who gets a doe permit now does not exercise its use, and merely "takes it out of circulation."

Millions of dollars pour into the Hill Country economy every year as the result of deer hunting. Just in the past few years has the nation-wide sport begun to gain prominence in Eastland County. It's the type of attraction that benefits many — service station owner, cafe operator, retail stores of all kinds, and last, but by no means, least, the landowners. With an increased deer population, not decreased because of a lack of doe, land owners will reap thousands of additional dollars for deer leases. And its all PLUS money with no investment, except the small investment of your interest to demand good wildlife control through scientific handling. Help insure that the hunting will be good in Eastland County, by voting against unlimited doe permit issuance, at the polls Saturday.


