Youth Held For Holdup Gas Station

The unsolved case of the \$155.11 holdup of Blackwell Gulf Service Station, Highway 80 west, Ranger — which occurred at 2:30 a.m. on Monday, Jan. 6 — was unraveled Tuesday by Constable Ralph Veal.

The holdup artist, described in newspaper reports as a "phantom youth" who "disappeared into the darkness" after scooping up the cash from the station register backed by the authority of a .22 caliber bolt action rifle, may have been a Breckenridge youth, Tuesday afternoon Constable Veal and Thomas Hicklin of Ranger, night service station attendant and victim of the young hijacker, went to Breckenridge following a tip received by the Ranger officer.

After a brief conference with Sheriff Chase Booth, Constable Veal and a Stephens County deputy went to pick up a 16-year-old Breckenridge youth.

The suspect turned out to be 5 feet 6 inches tall, weighing about 150 pounds, muscularly built, brown-haired, blue-eyed.

The youth's mother invited Constable Veal to inspect several .22 caliber rifles on the premises. After being brought before the Ranger service station attendant, Hicklin made a positive identification.

The Breckenridge youth is free on \$2,500 bond — set by Ranger Justice of Peace M. D. Underwood — pending a hearing in his court in Ranger next Monday morning, Jan. 20.

The alleged hijacker has a previous offense, Constable Veal said, and at the time of his arrest he was under probation as a minor.

Reports On Two Area Oil Tests Given Tuesday

Progress on two area oil tests was reported Tuesday. Over in adjoining Palo Pinto County, Staley Oil Company, Wichita Falls, has set 4 1/2-inch casing at 3,628 feet, total depth, for tests through perforations in No. 3 Doll T&P survey, 1,867 feet northeast of No. 2 Watson, a lone producer and four miles northwest of Posideon in Palo Pinto County.

A core at 3,692 to 3,617 feet recovered 16 feet of conglomerate with a show of oil and gas.

And in Eastland County, Lone Star Producing Company drilled to 4,040 feet and set 4 1/2-inch casing at 3,661 feet for tests in No. 1 Odessa S. Childers, section 67, block 4, H&C survey, a Mississippian wildcat five miles northeast southwest of Mississippian production in the Eastland County regular pool. No other details were available.

Only announced candidate is Tony Bordignon. Other members of Strawn City Council, in addition to Mayor Pruitt, are J. R. Hunt, an officer of First Strawn National Bank; Wilson Unkart, veteran bakery salesman; and Tommy Million, well known rancher.

Demo Leader Cites Dates

The final deadline for candidates filing to have names placed on the ballot for the Democratic primary election — Monday, May 2 — is only two weeks away, A. E. Crawley of Ranger, chairman of the Eastland County Democratic party executive committee, reminded today.

On that same date, Chairman Crawley said, every candidate subject to assessment by the county executive committee shall pay the County Chairman at the time of filing his application a deposit of \$50.00. This is in compliance with Article 13.07a, election statutes of the State of Texas.

Three days later — on Feb. 6 — the County Chairman will file with the County Clerk a list of all candidates who were filed before the deadline. (Art. 13.12 (3)).

On Feb. 10, the second Monday in February, the Eastland County Democratic party Executive Committee will meet at Eastland to apportion the cost of the primary among candidates. (Art. 13.08)

On the following day, Feb. 11, the County Chairman will mail to each candidate a statement of his assessment with request that he pay same to the County Chairman before the 13th Monday in February, Feb. 17. (Art. 13.08)

And on or before Feb. 15 candidates are to pay assessments to the County Chairman. (Art. 13.08)

Band Accepts Bid To Appear In Fort Worth

Ranger Junior College's 65-piece marching band has accepted an invitation to appear for the opening of the Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show in Fort Worth on Friday, Jan. 4.

Roger C. Martin, director of the RJC band, said Monday the unit will participate in the colorful parade scheduled to begin moving through downtown Fort Worth at 2 p. m. on that date.

The Purple and White musical aggregation, which doubled in number of members during the current school year, was organized by Martin in August, 1962. He led them on a spring tour last year, playing 17 concerts in one month in towns within a 150-mile radius of Ranger, and plans already are being made for similar trips this spring.

Woman Jailed At Eastland On Check Charge

A 50-year-old former Ranger police character, a woman with a long record of arrests, is in the Eastland County jail, pending trial in county court on a charge of swindling with a worthless check.

The woman autographed a \$40.00 check, drawn on Commercial State Bank, Ranger, at a local store following a small merchandise purchase and received the difference in cash.

A short time later, she and a male companion attempted to cash another check at a liquor store. The suspicious owner contacted Constable Ralph Veal.

The officer checked, learned about the \$40.00 transaction and contacted a bank in Stephenville where the woman, now a resident of that city, claimed she had an account. But the answer was negative.

The woman then suggested changing the check to another bank in the Erath County capital.

But Constable Veal declined, suggested that she accompany him to a cell in the Ranger city jail. A short time later she was charged in the court of Justice of Peace M. D. Underwood and transferred to the county jail at Eastland, pending trial.

Residents of Strawn and surrounding area can receive the oral dosages of the vaccine in the basement of Strawn Methodist Church. Dr. Paul C. Pedigo and trained nurses will be on hand to administer the vaccine.

Residents of Gordon and vicinity may receive the vaccine Sunday afternoon from 2 until 4 p. m. at the American Legion hall in that community. Mrs. C. B. Long is chairman of the Gordon immunization campaign.

New Fire Phone System Shown At RVFD Meet

Demonstration of a new fire phone system to increase efficiency of the Ranger Volunteer Fire Dept. highlighted a meeting of the organization Tuesday night at City Hall.

A representative of Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. explained operation of the unit which includes a recorder on which locations of fires may be recorded and then the message is automatically relayed to all incoming callers.

This will make it possible for volunteer firemen to phone and receive instructions via recording after an alarm is sounded.

A hotter-than-hot Decatur Baptist College roundball crew — invading the Oil City with a torrid 14-2 record — were stunned but rallied in the second half to edge RJC's Rangers, 84-73, in a Texas Junior College Conference hassle here Monday night at Recreation Bldg. gym.

The victory left the visitors 16 points shy of their usual 100 points per game — plus average. However their win was the fourth against no athletes in league play for the Baptists while the defeat left the RJC cagersmen with a 1-1 mark.

Travis McCain led the winners with 26 points while mates Doug Reedy, Tommy Walker and Ben Finley tossed in 18, 12 and 11 respectively.

For the Rangers, Gary Watson was high with 24 points. Freddie Marshall racked up 14. Grant Davis and Kent Haas 10.

The tilt provided thrills for on-looking fans. The Rangers held a 42-40 lead at halftime.

The RJC crew cashed 21 of 29 free throws. Rebounding was good.

The Rangers traveled to Fort Worth Saturday to become victims of Texas Wesleyan College Rams, 70-57, in the TWC gym.

The Purple & Whites' rebounding was good, but they just couldn't hit the circular target from the floor.

Out-manned and over-powered by the superior Rams, the RJCers were able to bucket only 24 points in the first half.

Setting the scoring pace for the losing Rangers was Jerry Chamberlain, who hit the target for 14. TWC's Geisler, however, sharp-shooted 32.

THE INSPIRED WORD OF GOD: HOW TO DIVIDE IT.

"Study to show thyself approved unto God a workman that needeth not to be ashamed rightly dividing (handling aright) the word of God" (II Tim. 2:15). Many people who study the word of God take no consideration for handling it aright. Particularly, there are those people who make no distinction between the two covenants that God has made. The first covenant being with the Jews the New Covenant being with those who are in Christ Jesus. I have already shown in a previous study that the Word, the whole word of God is inspired—it came directly from God. No one is trying to discredit the Old Covenant (Testament) but in handling aright God's word we must recognize that the Old Law was nailed to the cross (Col. 2:14). Not that it isn't the word of God but that its laws, priesthood, sacrifices, worship and lawgiver (Moses) have been taken out of the way in order that we might have a better covenant (Heb. 8:6-7); that through Jesus Christ the second covenant could be established and the forgiveness of sins be procured for its subjects.

There are a number of people who say that we are still bound by the Old Law. The scriptures do not teach this, in fact the word of God teaches the very opposite. "Blotting out the handwriting of ordinances that was against us, which was contrary to us, and took it out of the way, nailing it to his cross" (Col. 2:14). The "handwriting of ordinances" can refer only to the Old Law. Someone might object and say that the "handwriting of ordinances" refers to the sacrificial law, and other aspects of the Law but not the "Ten Commandment Law."

As you read this article get your New Testaments and turn with me to Rom. 6:14: "For sin shall not have dominion over you: for ye are not under the law, but under grace." But what law is he talking about? Keep reading! Are you to the seventh chapter of Romans? Notice v. 6: "But now we are delivered from the law, that being dead wherein we were held; that we should serve in newness of spirit, and not in the oldness of the letter."

Does this prove which law it is? If not notice v. 7 "What shall we say then? Is the law sin? God forbid. Nay, I had not known sin, but by the law: for I had not known lust, except the law had said, THOU SHALT NOT COVET." Now answer this honestly, which law said "Thou shalt not covet"? The law that said "Thou shalt not covet" is the one from which we have been delivered.

This is the basis of "handling aright" the word of God. Unless we understand this we will never be able to understand what God's will for us is.

There will be more to follow on this subject. If you disagree with what has been said or what will be said in the future then refute it and expose it as error, if you can. If you can't refute it then accept it and believe it as truth.

4th MAN ARRESTED IN AREA FORGERY CASE; ALL IN JAIL

The arrest late Saturday of Jimmy Don Poe, 19-year old Eastland youth, completed the case of forgery that claimed victims in Ranger and Cisco last Thursday, according to reports from officers Tuesday.

Like the other three young men in the case, Poe was charged with forgery in Justice of the Peace W. L. Lewis' court in Cisco and sent to the county jail in lieu of \$1,500 bond. All four young men were still in jail at Eastland Tuesday.

The other three were John L. Eute, 24, and Alvin E. Eute, 22, brothers of California, and Robert B. Sheets, 25, of Baltimore, Md.

Police Chief S. E. Parkinson of Cisco reported that the four bought a case of beer in Ranger and gave a \$32 check with the name of an Eastland physician forged on it. Later, they cashed a similar check at a Cisco grocery store.

Attendants at the store became suspicious after one of them dropped a gun near their car outside the store. They called police. It was determined that the checks were forged, and Cisco police soon spotted the youths and moved in for the arrest. Poe got away and the other three were picked up.

Sheriff Lee Horn and Deputy Lefty Sublett arrested Poe at Carbon late Saturday. Two guns that the young man had stolen from a pickup in Eastland were recovered.

One of the men told officers that they had "cashed" a store in May and two in East-

land for burglary jobs Thursday night.

Officers said that Sheets had served prison time in Maryland and that the Eute brothers had police records on the west coast.

Theft of the guns, officers said, would result in filing felony charges in addition to the forgery count.

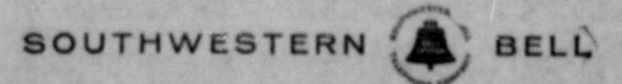
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
