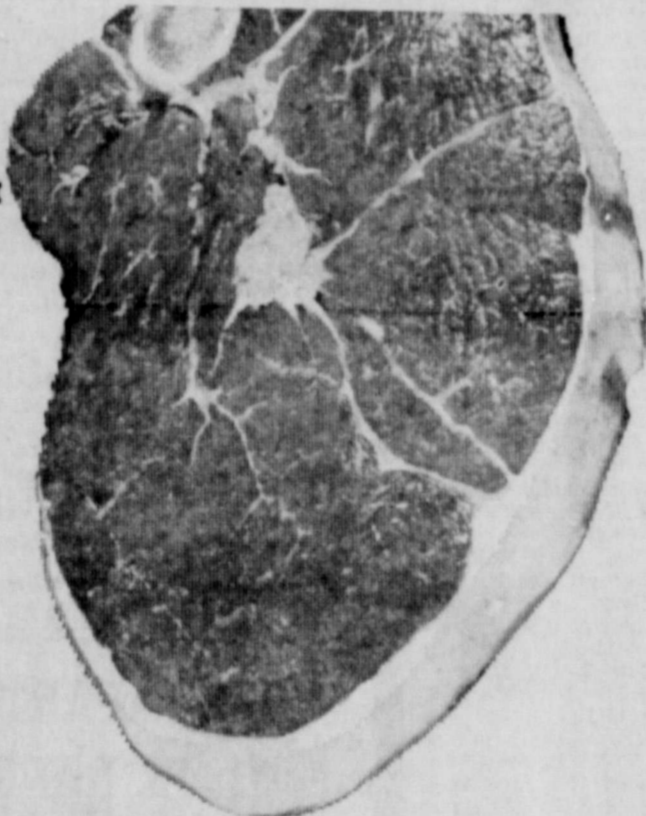

DRAFT BOARDS INSTRUCTED TO CLASSIFY 18-YEAR-OLDS

AUSTIN — Texas draft boards have received official instructions to begin classifying males immediately after they register at age 18, Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, said Wednesday.

The program will begin with the young men registering in January 1964 and those who have not yet been classified initially will have their classification expedited up until this group is complete, Colonel Schwartz said.

Under past policy, most men have been classified initially somewhere between the ages of 18½ and 20, the state draft director said.

These older men who have not yet been classified initially will have their classification expedited up until this group is complete, Colonel Schwartz said.

examined are going into the Army immediately. Under present regulations and demands for military manpower, the acceptable 18-year-old could not be drafted," he said.

"In the end, the man who is going to be affected, apparently, is the 18-year-old man who cannot pass the pre-induction examination," Colonel Schwartz said. "He, apparently, will be offered the advantage of some kind of job training or remedy for his defects, if possible; but we have no information on that at this time."

The state draft director said that, in his opinion, it is going to become even more important that draft boards are advised when a young man becomes a college student.

"Otherwise, in the near future," he said, "the young man may be called out of class by his local board to take an examination because the board didn't know he was in school."

Colleges which report registration of all draft-age males as students would not have their students disturbed under such a program, Colonel Schwartz said.

The decision to begin classifying 18-year-olds immediately is the result of President Johnson's action of January 3, announcing that he was directing the Director of Selective Service and the Secretary of Defense to examine all newly registered men who are out of school and otherwise available for service.

Colonel Schwartz emphasized that no 18-year-olds would be sent for armed forces pre-induction examinations except volunteers and delinquents.

"We anticipate receiving instructions to send 18-year-olds for these examinations if they are not in school and are not married," Colonel Schwartz said, "but we have been directed to do nothing until further instructions are issued."

REJECTIONS HIGH

4 Men Inducted In January; 8 Are Due To Go In February

Eight young men have been ordered for induction into the Army in February, and four were inducted in January, the Selective Service Board office in Eastland reported this week.

Ordered for February induction are Ralph W. Clary, Richard L. Rogers, Joe D. Walton and Frank W. Weiss, all of Cisco; Kenneth R. Welch and Wallace R. Preston, both of Gorman; Jackie R. Nelson of Okra; and Clarence H. Williams of Breckenridge.

Sent in January were Jimmy F. Flemmings of Rising Star, Jerry A. Clower of Eastland, William M. Patton of Ranger and Roger G. Broyles of Cisco.

A total of 75 percent of the number sent for pre-induction physicals in January were rejected for physical, mental or moral reasons, the board reported.

The average county rejection percentage is 50 percent, and last October, there was 100 percent rejection, it is reported.

In line with the new national policy, the local board will begin classifying 18-year-olds in February.

The state draft quota for February calls for 517 men,

compared to 812 for January. The state quota of 517 for February is the Texas share of a national call for 12,000 men, all for the Army.

More than 6,000 men over the state will be called up for pre-induction physical and mental examinations in February, also, the state director of Selective Service said.

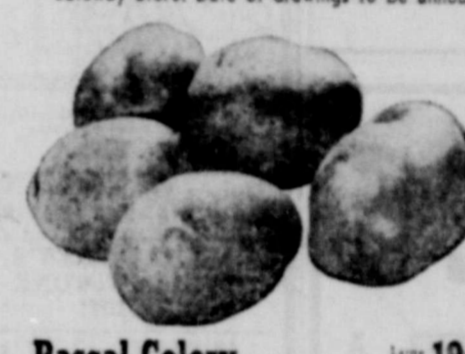
