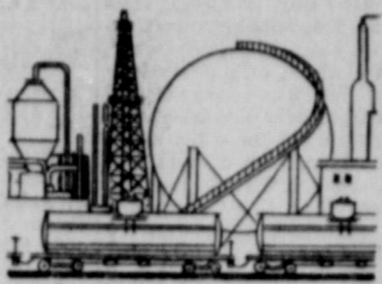

COUNTY JUDGE Scott Bailey of Eastland addressed the Olden High School student body Thursday afternoon. His topic was the privileges and duties of "Your Government and Mine". Judge Bailey placed special emphasis on county and local government and how its functions affect students of High School age. This was the second such address made by the Eastland County official. Judge Bailey spoke to the Olden student body on a similar topic in 1962.

Judge Bailey also spoke to the Pleasant Hill Home Demonstration Club ladies in the home of Mrs. Lena Hagaman in Cisco on Friday at 3:00 p. m. His subject for this address was the county government.

Agricultural and livestock production, vitally important to the economy of Ranger and surrounding area, will be a major factor in the future progress and prosperity of this community and its environs.

As Future Farmer of America Week comes to a close and after having proved that our American system of agriculture can outproduce any other on earth, it is fitting that we honor those who will be our farmers and ranchmen of tomorrow.

Future Farmers of Texas make a big business out of their laboratory experiences in vocational agriculture. Last year 39,000 members in Texas cleared over 4½ million dollars from 46,700 head of livestock, 45,000 acres of crops and nearly a million head of poultry.

Final Rites L. B. Cozart Saturday

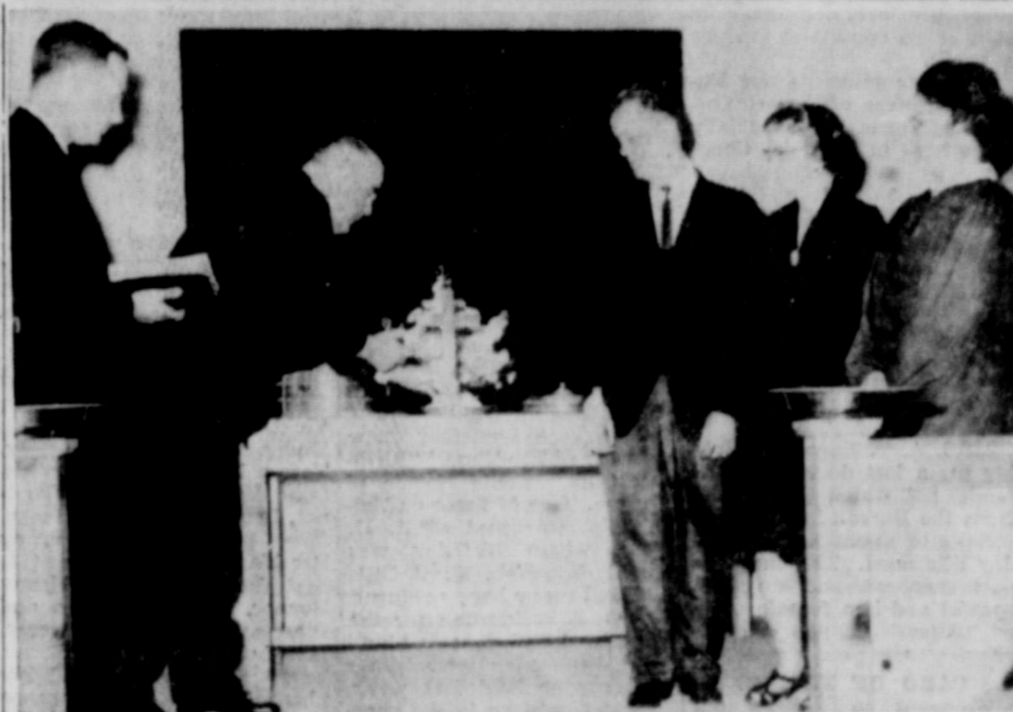

Ranger Church Pays Off Debt; Note Is Burned

During special rites during the morning worship services at First Christian Church in Ranger Sunday, the congregation solemnly but gratefully received word of completion of a three-year program of remodeling the church edifice, located at 404 West Main.

Following issuance of the final check written to pay the debt incurred by the improvement program, Emery Ford Sr., chairman of the congregation, burned the note to dramatically symbolize payment of the indebtedness.

The sanctuary, fellowship hall, kitchen and classrooms were all remodeled in the three-year program which required a total expenditure of in excess of \$16,000.

Ranger's First Christian Church is a participating congregation in the brotherhood of the Christian Churches (Disciples of Christ) and as such are a part of state and district work.

Membership of the Ranger church totals 129.

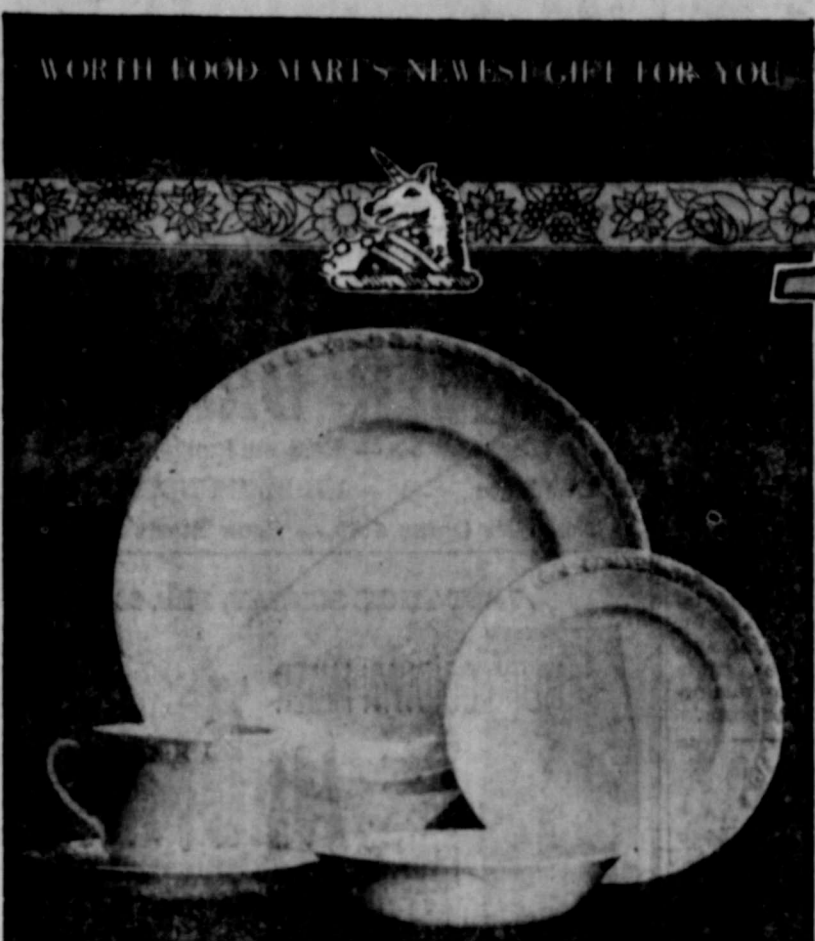

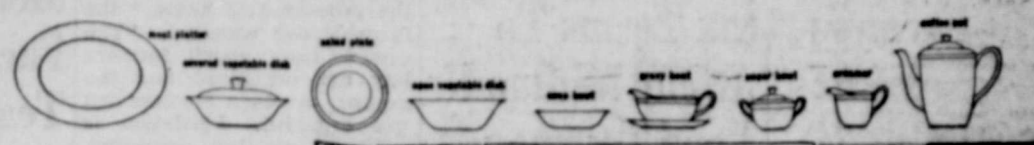

Farmers and ranchers in Eastland County are vitally affected by legislative actions in both Austin and Washington, according to Jack Cozart, president of the local county Farm Bureau.

"And since Farm Bureau is the 'voice of agriculture' in both the State Capital and in Congress," Cozart said, "it is important that farmers and ranchers join together in Farm Bureau to support their own interests in state and national affairs."

The local farm leader announced the Eastland County Farm Bureau is launching its drive for new members March 2 through March 9 and invited all non-members to join with the 616 members in the county.

"Today only the voice of the organized is heard," the farm leader asserted. "The groups from which farmers buy are organized and the groups to which farmers sell are organized. Legislation is influenced by the organized. Therefore, it is essential that agriculture, which now represents less than 10 percent of the total population, be strongly organized."

He explained that Farm Bureau is the only farm organization which maintains a full-time year-round legislative office in Austin and is organized nationally in all states except Alaska. Three out of four organized farmers and ranchers belong to the Farm Bureau, he added.

"We make every effort to develop our policies on a 'grass roots' basis," the president said. "And we need all farmers and ranchers in Eastland County to join and add their thinking to our policy development process."

"Membership in Farm Bureau doesn't cost," Mr. Cozart reminded the farmers and ranchers in this county, "it pays."

The original word in these passages does not mean what our word "debate" means. It means rather "strife" and the identical word is so translated in Rom. 13:3; I Cor. 3:3; Phil. 1:15 and I Tim. 6:4. A public debate is not necessarily strife even though it can become such; but then so can any kind of a discussion if the disputants or the people involved do not behave themselves as gentlemen.

The kind of a discussion that this will be is authorized by what Jude says Jude v. 3. "Beloved, while I was giving all diligence to write unto you of our common salvation, I was constrained to write unto you exhorting you to contend earnestly for the faith which was once for all delivered unto the saints." (ASV). The word "contend" literally means a VERBAL DEFENSE.

WHAT WE HOPE TO ACCOMPLISH BY A DEBATE: First of all we believe that when truth is laid alongside error people can see the difference. We also hope to generate some desire on the part of the people in this city to STUDY God's Word. We commend the people of the United Pentecostal Church because they are willing to defend that which they believe. We wish that others would do the same for even some members of the Lord's church seem to be afraid to defend that which they say God's Word authorizes.
