Honor For Gibbens . . .

Area Legislator Is Named On Re-District Study Group

AUSTIN — Representative Wayne Gibbens of Breckenridge considers his latest assignment "not easy, but essential." He is one of seven members of the Texas Legislature named to guide the Legislative Council staff in its emergency study of Congressional re-districting.

Appointment of the committee was requested by Governor John Connally. The selections were announced by Lt. Gov. Preston Smith, as chairman of the Legislative Council. Speaker of the House Byron Tunnell is vice chairman. Re-districting is a difficult job, because there are always many different ideas as

to how it should be done, Rep. Gibbens commented.

"However, in view of Supreme Court decisions, we have no other choice," he added. "Our 23 Congressional districts will have to be reshaped to meet the Court's interpretation of 'equal representation.'"

Last session the Texas House passed a Congressional re-districting bill that the Senate amended to an extent that the House would not accept the amended version.

Rep. Gibbens said that if Texas' population was divided equally among its 23 Congressional districts, each district would have about 416,500 people. These are 1960 census figures, which must be used until another census has been taken.

At present, 11 districts are at least 50,000 below that average figure, and eight are at least 50,000 above it. Only three are within 50,000 of the "ideal." The 23rd Congressman must run statewide until a district is created for him.

Other members of the legislative committee on re-districting are: Senators George Moffett of Chillicothe, chairman, and Abraham Kazen, Laredo; and Reps. Paul Floyd of Houston, Tommy Shannon of Fort Worth, Richard Slack of Pecos and Gus Mutscher of Brenham.

Rep. Gibbens is also serving as chairman of the Council's finance committee and a member of special interim committees on preservation of state records, conflict-of-interest policy and a legislative internship program in which college graduate students are encouraged to train for future assignments in government.

He has announced for his second term as Representative of District 83, which consists of Callahan, Eastland, Palo Pinto, Shackelford and Stephens Counties. He served one previous term from the old 75th District, before the House was re-districted in 1961.

SUBSTITUTE FOR SUNLIGHT



A stand like this equipped with built-in fluorescent lamps to substitute for sunlight makes sprouting and growing seeds possible in any part of the house. Note sturdy growth here.

Remember when a sunny window sill was an absolute "must" for the gardener who wanted to start seeds indoors of his favorite varieties of flowers and vegetables? Now, fluorescent lamps, specially designed for aiding plant growth, take the place of sun.

This means that the darkest corner of your basement can become your seed starting area when proper lamps have been installed. The lamps you need have a special phosphor coating which, activated by electricity, gives off light rays high in the red and blue wave lengths absorbed by plants during growth.

Your equipment can be as simple as chains hung from the ceiling to suspend the lamps over a table below. Or it can be as elaborate as a stand with fluorescent fixtures built in, like the one pictured.

Many different types of such "plant growers" are available. Your favorite garden supply dealer, or perhaps your favorite seed catalog, may offer several.

Starting seedlings under fluorescent lamps is not much different from starting them on that sunny window sill. The chief difference is that you can regulate the amount of light, the length of "daylight" and the distance of the seedlings from the light source.

Seeds sprout rapidly under fluorescent lamps. Because you can keep the seedlings fairly close to the lamps when they are small, they will not become spindly trying to reach towards the light. The distance from the lights can be increased as the seedlings grow.

Lamps designed for growing plants will not burn seedlings with their heat, for they are "cool" lamps.

Even almost perfect growing conditions, so far as light is concerned, will not, however, relieve you of watering and otherwise caring for your seedlings. Absolutely nothing can be substituted for personal attention.

Put sweet potatoes into your winter meals for a colorful hot dish with high nutritive value. Sweet potatoes are good providers of vitamins A, B, and C and minerals, in addition to their energy value.

Try both kinds of sweetpotatoes and see which you like best in various recipes — the dry, mealy, rather light-colored ones — or the deeper yellow, moist, sugary "yams." You can soon learn to identify these by their shape and skin color.

But remember, sweetpotatoes don't keep long in today's warm kitchen. So buy them in small lots and use them within a few days.

For a real down-South accompaniment to roast pork, ham, or chicken — try glazed sweetpotatoes with orange. Here's the way to make them:

Sweet Potatoes With Orange Glaze

Place alternate layers of cooked sweet potatoes and sliced, peeled oranges in a greased baking dish. You will need about 2 oranges to 6 medium-sized sweet potatoes. Make a sirup by combining—

- 1/2 cup orange juice
- 1 tablespoon grated orange rind
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 2 teaspoons cornstarch

2 tablespoons melted table fat

Pour sirup over sweetpotatoes. Bake at 300° F. (slow oven) about one hour. Baste with the sirup several times during baking. Serves six.

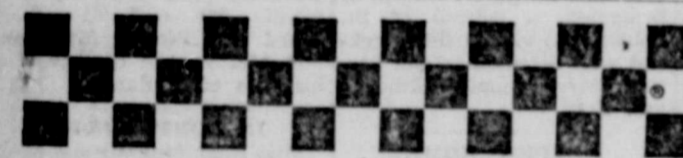
