NEW MAIL schedule recently posted by Ranger post office. Eastbound mail deadlines 12:30 noon, 5:30 and 6:30 p. m. Westbound deadlines 12 noon and 6:30 p. m. Final dispatch of the day is 6:30 p. m. All mail deposited after that hour will be postmarked following morning. Recent visitor to Ranger was Ed Syers, Fort Worth Star-Telegram columnist who authors the widely read col'm titled "Off the Beaten Trail." He spent a day here gathering info about Ranger and its history and we'll probably be reading some notes about R-town shortly. As a novelist, William Edward Syers in 1960 authored "Seven-Navy Sub-chaser" which was acclaimed by over 100 critics. In 1959 the Star-Telegram columnist moved to Ingram near Kerrville in the hill country. Friends say Syers may be a throwback to oldtime Texans. JAMES W. RATLIFF IS NEW MEMBER BOARD REGENTS RANGER JUNIOR COLLEGE

James W. Ratliff, Ranger feed and seed dealer and civic leader, has been appointed to the Board of Regents of Ranger Jr. College.

The appointment was made to fill a vacancy created by the resignation of David D. Pickrell.

Pickrell had served on the Board approximately 11 years including three years as president of the board. He was president when the expansion project was instituted, which culminated in erection of five new buildings, a new stadium and renovation of several existing buildings.

The building program is now in final stages with the gym and stadium to be ready for use this summer.

New buildings under construction are Administration-Science-Classroom Complex, gymnasium and the stadium. The 106 student capacity dormitory for boys was completed in 1963.

The new RJC regent is a native of Ranger and is the son of Mrs. Myrtle Ratliff and the late A. J. Ratliff, who passed away in 1949. His son has been operating the business since that time.

Ratliff graduated from Ranger High School in 1940 and attended John Tarleton College, Stephenville, prior to entering the U. S. armed forces in Oct., 1942. He served with the Army in the South Pacific and was discharged in Oct., 1945.

He and his wife, the former Miss Jean Jones, daughter of Mrs. Leaa Jones and the late Theibert Jones, Route 3, Ranger, were wed on Nov. 22, 1946. The couple has two children — Jimmy, a Ranger High sophomore, and Annabell, a junior high student.

Ratliff, who served as president of Texas Turkey Federation in 1962, is a widely known civic leader.

He is active in Ranger Chamber of Commerce and formerly was a trustee of the Ranger Independent School District and a member of the Ranger City Commission. He is a member of the Ranger Masonic Lodge and attends First Methodist Church. He is a member of the official board of the church and is a steward.

Final Rites For Weaver Sunday at 2

Funeral services for William Elvis Weaver, 52-year-old former Ranger resident, will be held Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock at Killingsworth Funeral Chapel in Ranger.

Rev. B. L. McCord, pastor of First Methodist Church, will officiate during the rites. Interment will be in Evergreen Cemetery.

Weaver was dead on arrival at Arlington Memorial Hospital Friday morning following a single car accident about 7 a. m. within Fort Worth's city limits.

He was killed when his car apparently went out of control and struck a bridge abutment on Pipeline Road at State Highway 157. A passenger, John Burton, 59, of Irving, suffered head injuries and was listed in fair condition in Arlington Memorial Hospital.

At the time of his death, Weaver was a truck driver for D and B Trucking Company of Dallas. He was living in Euless.

Mr. Weaver was born Dec. 25, 1911, in Ranger, where he had lived until seven years ago, when he moved to Fort Worth and later to Euless. He worked for the City of Ranger prior to moving from the city. Pallbearers at the funeral will be Charles Isabell, R. E. (Bobby) Johnson, F. C. Weaver, Max Orr, A. F. Stevens and Earl Blackwell.

Survivors include his wife of Euless; two brothers, J. D. Weaver of Fort Worth and J. Charlie Weaver, Snyder; Jess Weaver, an uncle, and Mrs. E. H. Mills, an aunt, both of Ranger.

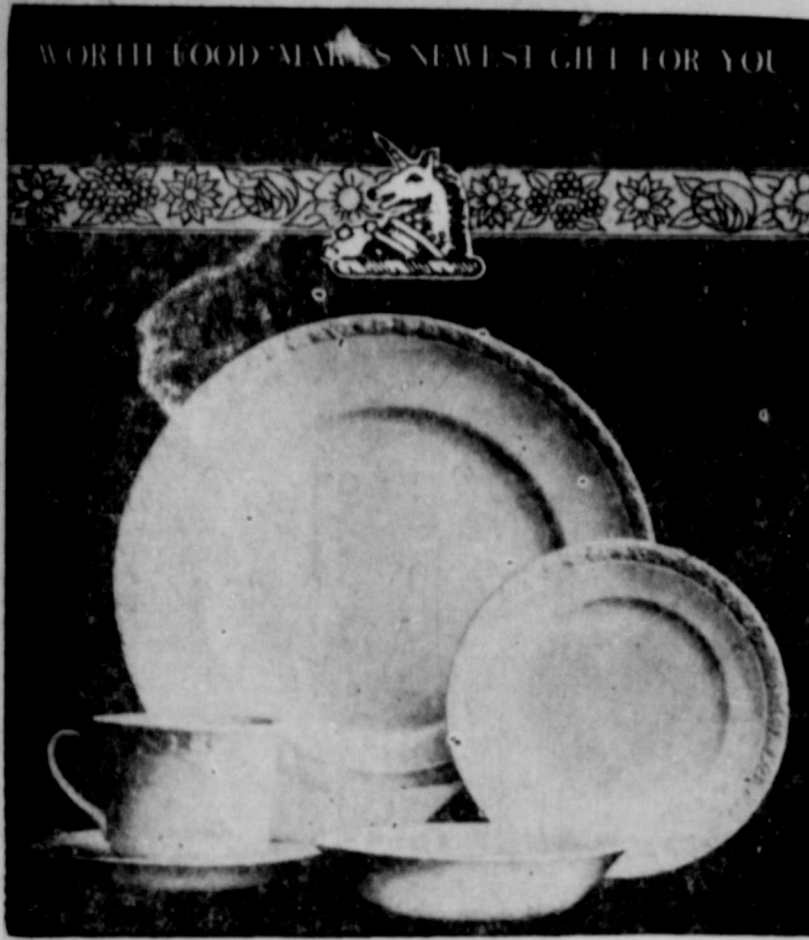

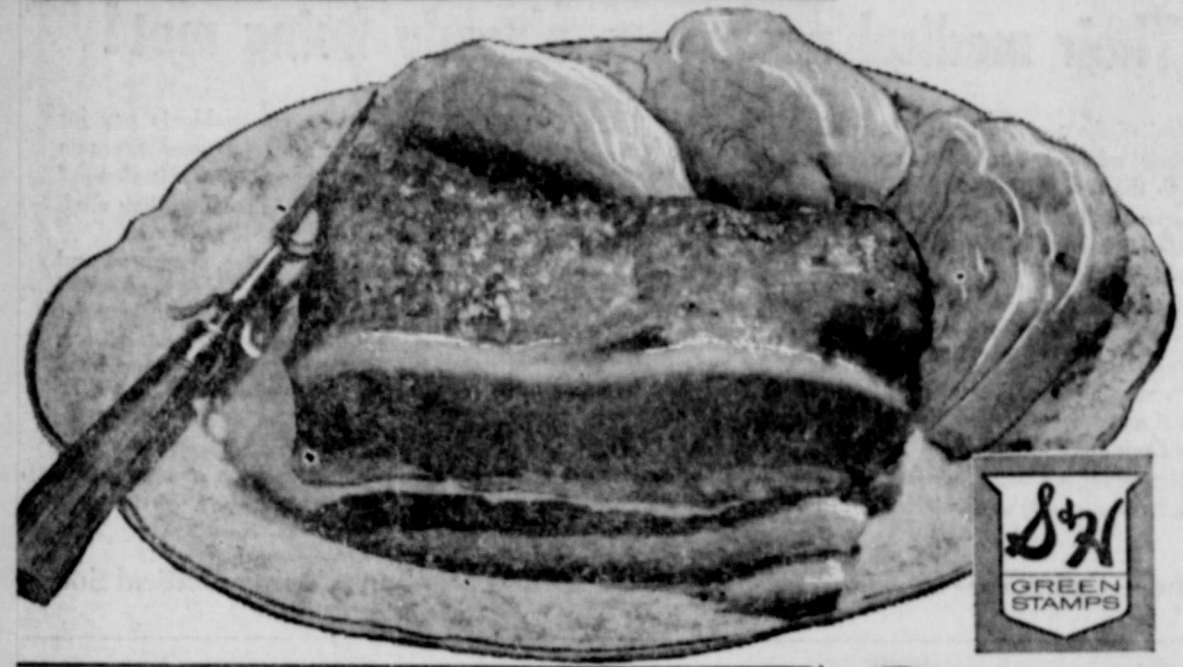

A ten million dollar libel suit has been filed by the Curry family against Dell Publishing Company of New York City in behalf of Nathan Curry, 18-year old Ciscoan, who was acquitted last October on charge of murdering Mrs. Florence E. Hussey here in 1961.

This information was confirmed Saturday by a spokesman for John Watts, Odessa attorney, who has represented the family for some 18 months.

Papers in the suit were served on a Midland magazine distributor, a representative of Dell publications, last week. It was understood that the suit was filed in Ector County District Court at Odessa.

Mrs. Hussey was found murdered at her home in June, 1961. A few days later, Nathan Curry was charged with the murder. A story of the murder with pictures appeared in Detective on news stands soon after the youth's arrest. He was acquitted in a trial at Palo Pinto after the case was moved from this county.

Mrs. F. P. Curry and her son, Nathan, are presently living in Lubbock. Nathan is employed by a road contractor in that area, it was reported here.

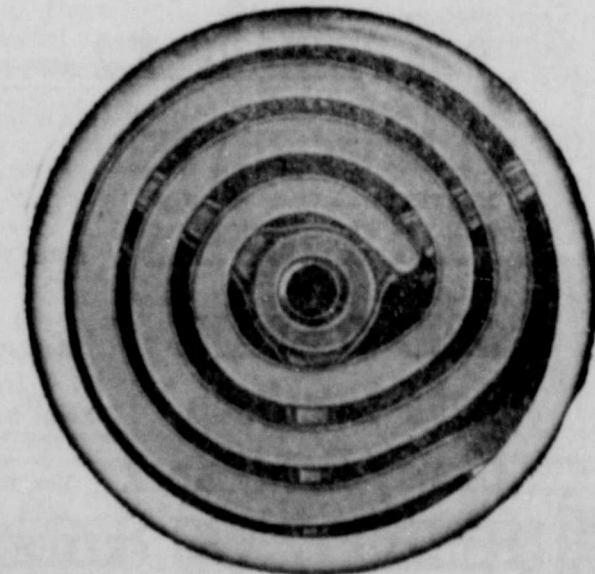

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Cooper Library Gets New Books To Lure Readers

Many new books have been added to the shelves of Cooper Library, according to Dorothy Linn, college librarian. Among them five outstanding books of fiction should make topnotch reading.

The reader has a choice of the terse dialogue of Ernest Hemingway in "To Have Or To Have Not" or the deeply moving narrative of John Steinbeck in "The Red Pony" or the terse adventure of Joseph Conrad in "Lord Jim." Hemingway's "To Have Or To Have Not" is about Harry Morgan, a run runner between Cuba and Florida, who is remarkable in both life and death. It is a novel by a master of heroic and realistic character and "tense violence."

In "The Red Pony" Steinbeck writes of a young boy, Jody, and a pony. In caring for the pony, Jody grows up, finding both joy and sorrow.

Conrad's "Lord Jim" is the story of a "heroic man victimized by his integrity." This novel, perhaps, is one of his most popular and one of the best adventure stories ever written.

For the reader who likes exciting and varied short stories there are "The Faded Banners," a collection of Civil War fiction featuring such writers as Stephen Crane and Ambrose Bierce and "The Deep Treasure" by J. C. Williamson, who writes about his adventures in the oil fields.

"The Faded Banners," edited by Eric Solomon, contains fictional pieces about the Civil War which have only recently come to light. It covers the War in a chronological order and in depth. Only stories that "capture the excitement and emotional impact of the struggle" have been selected.

"The Deep Treasure" concerns the strangely accented people that Williamson knew — the drillers, the geologists, the bankers, and the field hands — and the life they led in search of oil.

The choice among new non-fiction books is wide. For people who would like to know more about the Bible there is "Who's Who In The Bible" by Reverend Albert E. Sims. There is also a biblical biography by Frank Slaughter entitled "David, Warrior And King." "The Holy Grail" by Arthur Waite is a religious history of the search for the grail.

For students of the Civil War period there are many interesting books, a few of which are "The United States During The Civil War" by Auguste Laugel, "The Road To Harper's Ferry" by J. C. Furnas, and "Stormy Ben Butler" by Robert S. Holzman.

People Readers interested in government will be attracted by these volumes: "The Kennedy Administration" by Stan Opatowsky, "The Russian Intelligence" by Stuart Tompkins, and "The New Class," an analysis of the Communist system by Milovan Djelas.

Two of the many biographies available are "Thomas Jefferson" by Marguerite Wilbur and "Nehru, The Years Of Power" by Vincent Sheean. Among the many books of miscellaneous nature the following stand out: "The Real Jazz" by Huguess Panassie, "Clara Schumann and Brahms" by Marguerite and Jean Alby, "The Sword and The Flame" by Heinrich Heine, and "The Challenge of Modern Art" by Allan Leppa.

Cooper Library is open to the people of Ranger at any time, and the public is invited to use the facilities of the library.
