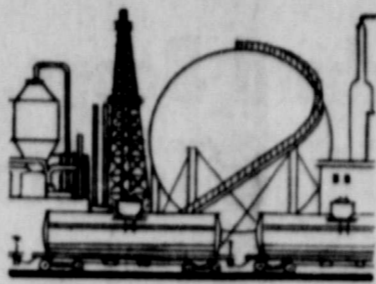

WHO'S CHASING WHO?

Proposed Telephone Rate Hike Clearing Hurdles in Three Towns

Southwestern Bell Telephone Co., through its district manager, Bill Boothe of Cisco, got a few steps closer to its proposed rate increase for Eastland, Ranger and Cisco — but it's been "round and round the mulberry bush" with city

commissioners in the three towns.

The Eastland city commission gave the rate increase proposal its second reading Monday during a regular session Monday evening, but agreed not to sign the final agreement until after similar agreements had been signed by Cisco and Ranger commissioners.

Manager Boothe told the Eastland commission that Cisco commissioners had given the proposal its first reading Monday at 8:15 a. m. in a special session. Ranger last week gave it its first reading. Eastland had been the first of the three to give the measure the first of two required readings.

Ranger was expected to give it a second reading Thursday evening, and Cisco will probably make the second reading next Tuesday night, Boothe said.

Boothe proposed a date (first billing in May) for the increase to go into effect in the three towns. Frank Deaton pointed out that the Eastland commission's original agreement was that this commission would give it its first reading and then the increase was to go into effect in the three towns at the same time.

"I wouldn't want us to be the one to set a date," Mr. Deaton said.

Commissioner Dale Troutt said, "We were first to read the proposal, therefore I think we should be last with the final reading."

During a bit of by-play the commissioners "kidded" Mr.

Boothe by pointing out that Commissioner Virgil T. Seaberry would abstain from voting (which he did) because he owns A.T.&T. Stock, and Mayor Don Pierson, who is also going off, would vote only in case of a tie. (Troutt and Deaton were the only other commissioners present).

However, on a motion by Troutt, seconded by Deaton, it was agreed to give the proposal its second reading, but not sign the measure until after the other two towns have signed.

RANGERS, UNDEFEATED IN THREE STARTS, GUNNING TO NOTCH WINS OVER TCU, SMU

Ranger Junior College baseball team will be in Fort Worth Thursday, Mar. 19, and in Dallas Friday, Mar. 20, where they will play Texas Southern Methodist University freshmen nines.

Four members of the team are from Fort Worth; Grant Davis from Brewer High, James Davis from Brewer High, Carl Haddock from Carter-Riverside and Van Jennings from Haltom High.

Seven members are from Dallas; Gary Haston from Samuel High, Wayne Barham, South Oak Cliff, Joe Ed Dooley, Bryan Adams, Parke Davidson, Adamson and Richard Hooper, Adamson. Also Glenn Patterson, Crozier Tech, and Ken Haas, South Oak Cliff.

Other team members are Gene Bolton of Crockett, and Tommy Comacho of Andrews. The Rangers are undefeated in their first three games of the season — two wins over Cisco Junior College and another victory over Goodfellow Air Force Base, San Angelo.

Some night baseball will be played on the home field, this season in response to requests of baseball fans in this area, according to Coach Larry (Ace) Parker, RJC diamond mentor.

Trailing 3 to 2 in the bottom of the sixth inning, Ranger's Tommy Camacho singled, Glenn Patterson walked, moving Camacho to second, Ken Haas, attempting to sacrifice, bunted a blooper fly to the pitcher, Parke Davidson singled, but Patterson overran second and was tagged out, and Joe Ed Dooley was hit by a pitched ball — and the sacks were full.

Pitcher Carl Haddock then stepped up to the plate and lofted a high fly ball out to left center. CJC's Rufus Hayes had what appeared to be a cinch catch. But he missed it and Camacho, Haas and Davidson scored before the stunned Ciscoans could recover from the fielding misdeed.

Camacho homered earlier in the 7-inning contest for another Ranger run.

Cisco's Delbert Schaefer led his mates in the hitting department, banging out a pair of doubles.

Reed, who relieved Cisco's starting moundsman, Chaney, was charged with the loss. Carl Haddock, the Ranger's victorious chunker, limited the visitors to four scattered hits. Ranger scored five runs off six hits.

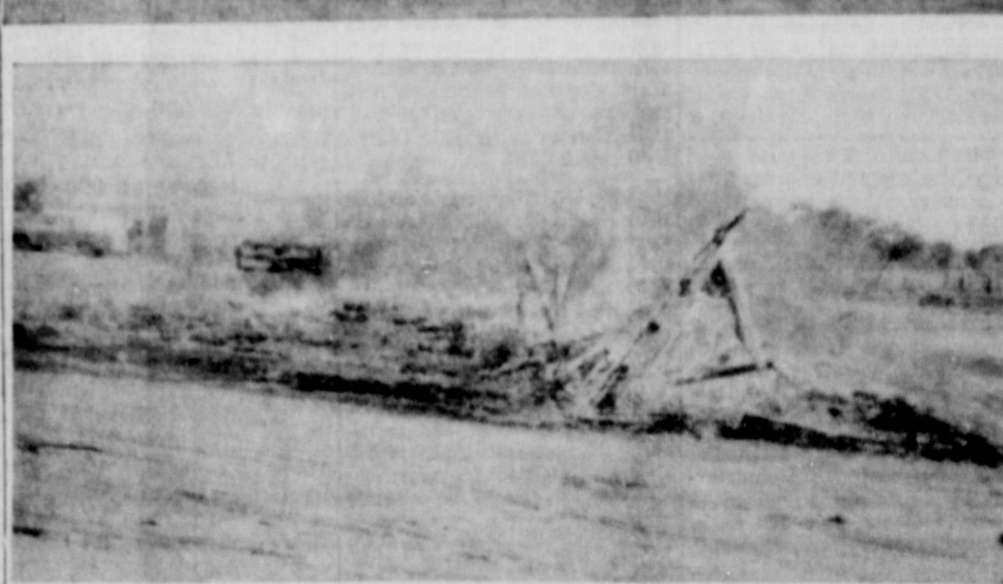

Judging of the open and junior beef breeding cattle, low in numbers but high in quality, closed out the 1964 Eastland County Livestock Show Saturday afternoon.

Larry Terrell showed a senior Hereford heifer to the overall championship of the female classes and Vicki Frosard showed her junior Hereford heifer to the overall reserve championship.

Robert Jo Jackson of Ranger had the reserve champion bull in both divisions. The champion Angus bull of both shows was exhibited by Jerry Williamson of Ranger and reserve champion Angus bull of both classes belonged to Larry Pilgrum of Ranger. Pilgrum also had the champion Angus female of both divisions and Jerry Nelson of Carbon exhibited the reserve champion Angus female of both shows.

All beef cattle classes were judged by Heston McBride, manager of the Granite Hills Hereford Ranch at Llano and partner in the Hereford breeding business with his brother, Justin, at Blanket.

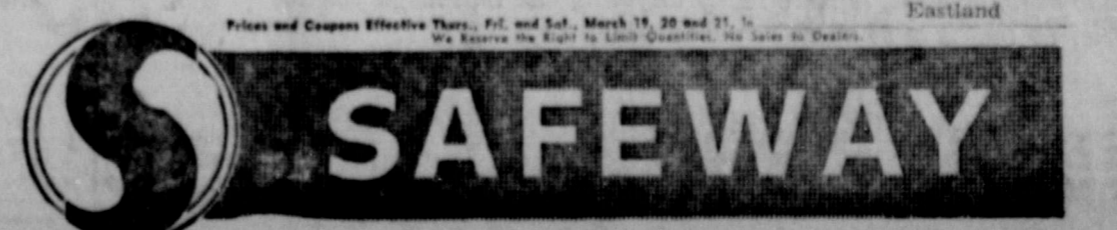

Texas Motorists Are Killed At High Rate In Past Year

AUSTIN — Texas motorists, barreling along the streets and highways at a clip of 99,000 miles each minute, killed themselves at the rate of one person every three hours and 12 minutes to rack up the worst year in history for traffic tragedy in 1963.

Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, reported today that DPC Statistical Services officially closed the traffic death book for 1963 at noon Sunday, recording an all-time record of 2,729 motor-cides.

"This tragic toll of lives was 888 or 13% higher than in 1962, and 129 or five per cent higher than the previous all-time high of 2,611 in 1956," Garrison said.

New Scholarships Announced By HPC

BROWNWOOD. — A new scholarship award was announced by Academic Dean Forrest Agee of Howard Payne College.

Beginning next fall, any entering freshman who scores 92 or above on the ACT tests or 550 or above on the College entrance Board tests will be eligible to receive a \$100 per semester scholarship, Agee said.

This is in addition to scholarships awarded to valedictorians and salutatorians of the various high schools, he said.

"Even though many more miles were traveled in Texas last year than in previous years, the fatality rate per 100 million miles traveled increased from 4.9 deaths in 1962 to 5.2 deaths in 1963.

"We are shocked and saddened by this terrible loss of human life in our state, which was accompanied by untold suffering among an estimated 161,000 persons who were injured, and a staggering economic loss of \$432,715,000."

In order to point up the magnitude of the traffic situation in an effort to bring about public awareness of its seriousness, Garrison listed these facts:

— The 311 motorcides in December 1963 was the highest number for any month on record. Second high was 303 in December 1950.

— Only one day during 1963, Tuesday, September 3, was motorcide free. It followed Labor Day when 22 persons were killed in traffic.

— On both Sunday, May 5 and Friday, December 20 there were 25 persons killed in 17 accidents.

— During 1963 there were 21 days with 15 or more motorcides. There were only 19 in 1962, 14 in 1961 and 13 in 1960.

— The worst accident in 1963 occurred on September 2 in Liberty County where 10 persons were killed in a head-on collision near Dayton. The last previous 10-death accident occurred on February 15, 1959 in Hidalgo County under similar circumstances.

— The estimated economic loss from motor vehicle traffic accidents in 1963 was \$13.72 per second.

The Public Safety Director pointed out that the 13 per cent statewide increase in traffic deaths in 1963 was reflected almost equally in rural and urban areas. The rural traffic death increase was 13 per cent, while the urban increase was 12 per cent. He added:

"The fact that this upsurge in traffic fatalities appears to be part of a current national trend — and I might add that many other states had their worst traffic year in 1963 — does not alter the seriousness of our situation here in our home state.

"Certainly, with these facts

before them, the people of Texas are challenged to do everything in their power to halt this trend which, incidentally, seems to be continuing into the new year.

"The records consistently reflect that two things stand out in general as the leading causes for serious traffic

accidents — carelessness and willful or unwitting disregard for the laws of safety.

"Therefore, we wish to issue an urgent appeal to all Texans to charge themselves with the responsibility of doing a better and safer job of alert driving and thus bring down this terrible toll of lives

and suffering and economic loss in our state."

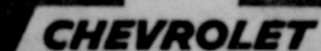
