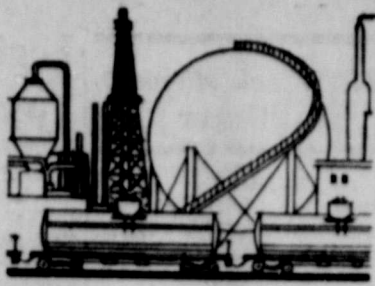

TERMITE infestation is due to be severe this year says Ralph Veal of Modern Pest Control, Ranger.

He urges home owners to be on the lookout for signs of termite attack:

1. Wood that looks sound on the outside but is actually only a shell. Prodding wood near the ground with a sharp pointed tool will often tell you if that piece of wood is being attacked.

2. When the termite has to cross an open space - or concrete - to reach wood, it builds pencil size earthen tunnels. Look for them on the inside and outside of foundation walls.

3. Find the termite workers themselves. This is pretty difficult because termites live in the earth and travel underground to reach the house.

The most common method of spotting the insects is to look for swarming termites during the early part of spring Veal says.

By the time you see swarmers, though, it's often too late to prevent damage," he adds. "This means a termite colony has already gotten a toe hold on your property."

IN DISTRICT COURT

\$33,000 In Damages Asked Of Collins Construction Co.

Collins Construction Co. of Austin, contractors for the re-paving of Highway 80 between Eastland and Ranger in 1962, are being sued for a combined total of \$33,000 in 91st District Court, and juries are to hear the cases beginning Monday morning.

The company re-lapped the multi-lane route and are being sued for damages which allegedly resulted from rock-crushing operations in connection with the work.

A. O. Tindall is asking \$15,000 in damages and Leone O'Donnell is seeking \$18,000 for damage said done by dust and rock from the crushing operation.

The 50-venue panel called originally to hear the Gorman school tax suit, will report Monday morning and a jury will be picked. It was reported that the two damage

suits against Collins may possibly be combined.

The Gorman school tax matter has been re-set for May 4th, with Judge E. H. Griffin of Graham to preside in that case. A pre-trial hearing in the Gorman case will be held in Breckenridge before Judge Griffin this week, it was reported.

Mr. Tindall is represented by Virgil T. Seaberry Jr. of the Eastland law firm of Turner and Seaberry, and Mrs. O'Donnell is represented by L. R. Pearson of Ranger in the Collins damage case.

Collins firm is represented by King, Willoughby, Vietes and Dickerson of Abilene.

Judge Griffin will preside in the Gorman case in which residents of that city are asking the school to make adjustments in taxes and evaluations.

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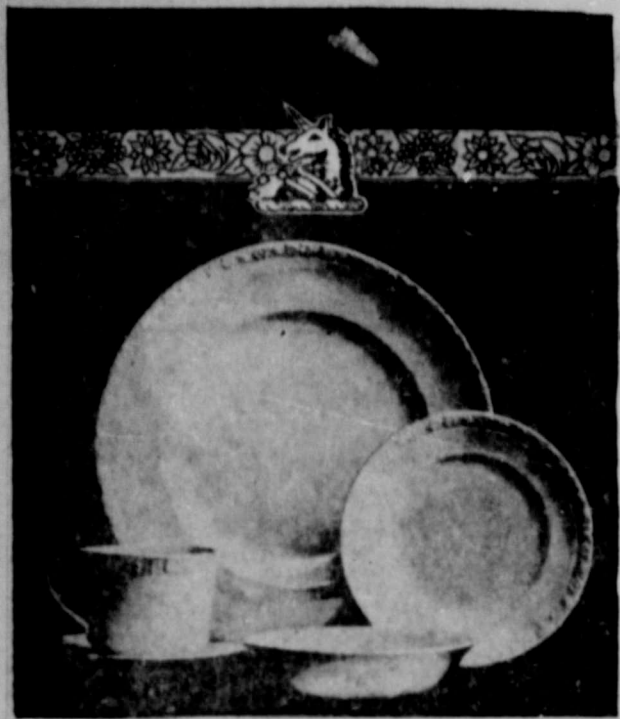

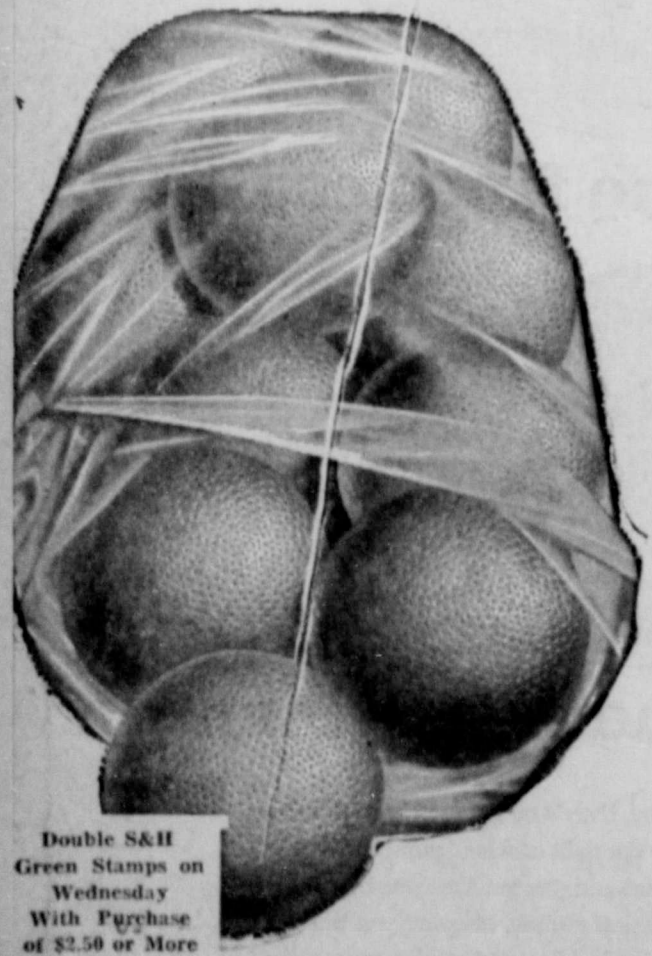

All canned foods are not identical in quality, and you may save money by studying the various grades. You will want to learn about the different grades, than study grades which are best for specific purposes.

Some processed foods have been inspected by the U. S. Department of Agriculture and will bear an inspection shield. Virtually all canned vegetables are put up in three grades: Fancy, or Grade A, which denotes highest quality and flavor, uniform size and color, and special care in handling; extra standard, or Grade B, which is slightly below the requirements for the fancy grade; standard, or Grade C, usually about the average run of the crop, somewhat irregular as to size, color and ripeness.

Canned vegetables labeled "substandard", "below standard", or "below Grade C" are wholesome and nutritious, but are so labeled because they do not meet all the requirements for the standard grade. These vegetables may be used in soups, mixed dishes and similar products where a perfect shape or size is not necessary. Grade A or fancy canned vegetables should be chosen for those dishes where shape, size and color of the products are important. Grade B can be used in similar situations where not such a fancy appearance is needed. Standard or Grade C canned

products are excellent choices for everyday meals.

Various companies have some identifying means of labeling their canned goods so grades may be recognized. This is accomplished by a different color label for different grades within the same brand or in the name given to the particular grade within the brand.

Fruits are also canned by grade. The main difference in grades of most of the small fruits is in the amount of sugar used in preparing the syrup. The syrup is described as extra heavy, heavy, medium or light, according to the percentage of sugar.

Water-packed fruits, such as pie fruits and berries, are packed without sugar. Choice of fruit to be purchased should be determined by the use to be made of it.

The selection of good frozen vegetables often is dependent on the dealer. There is a line on the inner side of most frozen food cabinets above which foods should not be stacked. So select packages from clean cabinets in which foods are stacked no higher than the proper fill level.

Frozen food packages should be clean and firm. If food has warmed up to a point where much of it has softened, it has already lost quality. The packaging materials should not be torn, crushed or juice stained. Frozen food that is exposed or poorly pack-

JOHN B. CONNALLY EARNS 2nd TERM AS GOVERNOR OF TEXAS

(An Editorial)

Few Texans will disagree with a statement that John Bowden Connally has done an outstanding job as Governor of this state since he took office a little over a year ago.

Unusual success in securing the enactment of his program in the Legislature, able leadership of the state government and a good job of presenting Texas to outsiders marked the first year of his administration. Mr. Connally gave personal leadership to a new industrialization program that has paid rich dividends as many new payroll industries began operations in Texas during the past year.

The strong emphasis that Mr. Connally has placed in the value of progress in all fields of education — from grade school to graduate level — has won much applause. Gratifying indeed is the apparent success of his program in this field of ever-increasing importance.

This aggressive, ambitious and energetic man was born Feb. 27, 1917, on a stock farm at Floresville. He worked his way through the University of Texas to earn a law degree. Incidentally, his political career began when he successfully ran for president of the student body at the UofT. Also, he served as president of his law class and chairman of the publication board. Moreover, he met and married the University of Texas' 1938 Sweetheart — the former Idanell Brill, a native of Austin.

After graduation, Mr. Connally spent a year as secretary to Congressman Lyndon B. Johnson, now President of the United States. He volunteered for duty in the U. S. Navy after Pearl Harbor and served with distinction in both the Pacific and Atlantic theaters.

Since the war, Mr. Connally has practiced law and has served as Secretary of the Navy on the staff of John F. Kennedy. He resigned from his position in 1961 to return home to Texas for the purpose of making his first race for public office. He won election over a large field of well known opponents.

Through the years, Mr. Connally has served in several capacities for Lyndon B. Johnson, including managing campaigns. His distinguished service in Washington along with his fine work as Governor of Texas gives Mr. Connally an effective stature for the office he holds. He is capable of opening more doors throughout the country than most Texans — certainly more than all of his opponents combined.

On the basis of his administration to date, his devotion to duty and his dedication to his native state, Texans certainly should return John Connally to the Governor's office with a large vote of confidence next May 3rd. He has won a "well done" expression from us all.

aged dries out and develops off flavors quickly. Food should be carried in an insulated bag or double paper bag during the trip home from the grocery store to prevent defrosting.

Vets Questions And Answers

Q — I have just had a son and as a Korean Conflict veteran with a 50 percent service-connected disability, I believe I'm now entitled to additional compensation. I have not yet reported the birth to the VA. Will the date of my son's birth be the effective date of the increased payment?

A — The effective date will be the day the VA receives the evidence you will submit to establish your entitlement to the additional money.

Q — My son, determined by the VA to be helpless, is being furnished training under the War Orphans program. This is the first month he has attended school and we have received checks both for the schooling and the regular \$77 a month compensation. Shouldn't one of these checks be returned to the VA?

A — No. In the case of a helpless child both the Dependency Indemnity Compensation and the War Orphans Act benefits are paid simultaneously.

Q — My husband is quite in debt. I am afraid that in the event of his death his creditors may seize his GI insurance policy which I am depending on. Can they do this?

A — No. Proceeds of a GI insurance policy are exempted by law from the claims of creditors. The proceeds may not be seized or attached to pay your husband's debts.

Q — My term insurance is getting too expensive and will be worse as time goes on. At this time I cannot afford to convert all of it to a permanent insurance plan. Can I convert part now and the rest later?

A — Yes. You may convert as little as \$1,000 or more in multiples of \$500 after the first thousand.

Two Oil Projects Announced For Area Northeast of Cisco

Two oil projects of considerable interest were announced Friday for the Eastland County area some six miles north of Cisco. One was a wildcat Mississippian test, and the other was a Cambrian sand test.

The wildcat was the Charles Cobb IV of Marshall No. 1 W. H. Groves Estate, located on the old Groves property near the north shore of Lake Cisco. Location was given as 1,650 feet from the south and 750 feet from the west lines of Section 473, SP Survey.

The drilling permit showed that the hole will go to 4,000 feet to test the Mississippian. The project is on a 160-acre lease between two oil test holes that were sunk a good many years ago. Both went to the Lake Sand and one was a gas producer for a number of years, it was reported.

The Cambrian test was announced by Low Drilling Co. of Cisco and W. M. Jarrell of Houston as their No. 1 T. E. Davis, seven miles northwest of Cisco near Mississippian lime production on the Gordon Woods Ranch.

This is a re-entry project to deepen a hole that was sunk to 5,432 feet by T. E. Newman in November, 1962. Location was given as 2,250 feet from the north line and 900 feet from the east lines of Section 54, Block 4, H&TC Survey, on a 113-acre lease.

The decision to deepen the hole was based on a study of the log of an old cable tool hole dug nearby years ago, it was reported. The log showed a good Cambrian sand oil show at about 5,600 feet. The permit calls for a total depth of 5,700 feet, which is expected to top the granite

Write your congressman today and tell him you favor the Texas aged care program (Kerr-Mills). Encourage him to oppose the King-Anderson Bill (H.R. 3920) which would provide a compulsory federal program for the aged, financed through higher Social Security taxes.

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
