## Burleson Asks Limitations On Importing Meat

Congressman Omar Burleson has introduced a bill to impose import limitations on meat imports, setting the limit at an average figure for the five years from 1953 through 1963.

Burleson stated, "We have got to protect our own interests first. Such action might even strengthen our international position by winning the respect of other nations. That seems to be the way they approach us and, as a matter of fact, a firmer position on all imports could be of help to us in the forthcoming Tariff and Trade negotiations at Geneva. If we took a self-interest attitude the same as other trading nations and the European Common Market, a stepped subsidizing their industry and agriculture, we might be able to negotiate from a position of strength."

Burleson went on to say that "we have in our hands the best possible bargaining tools with Australia, the principal importer of meats to the United States. Sugar, which is more important to Australia as an export than meat, could, in my opinion, be a key to our trade relations. She is fourth largest producer of sugar in the world and furnished this country with 217 million tons of sugar at World prices, which generally were considerably lower than that of our domestic price. We could give Australia a 200 million ton allotment as a bargaining proposition."

The cattle area Congressmen do not believe that an import limit, driving beef prices up, might encourage consumers and the large city meat packers. He explained the housewife pays twice as much for beef now as she did in 1954 when imports were only 2 per cent of domestic production. Ranchers then got 65 cents of every beef dollar the consumer spent, while now they get only 54 cents.

## Social Security Number Is Seen As Valuable Key

How many keys do you have? R. R. Tuley, Jr., Abilene district manager for the Social Security Administration, points out that you have one besides the car key, the house key, the office or store key, boat trailer key, lock box key, etc., that may have slipped your mind.

"The key I'm talking about may well be the most valuable key in your possession," says Tuley.

"Although it doesn't have the shape of most keys, that little card showing your name and nine numbers — your social security card — is really a key," he added, with the following basis for that remark.

Your social security card is the key that identifies your earnings record on which money will be due for retirement pay to you and your family, or for disability payments to you and your family, or for survivors payments of your family at your death.

Failure to show your card to each new employer you have, or writing it incorrectly on your self-employment tax return is taking a chance on reducing or even losing the income protection you are paying for.

Indifference as to what is being credited to your social security earnings record is also a danger to you or your family's collecting the right amount at the right time at some future date.

"If you've lost your card, ask your social security office for a replacement; if you haven't checked on your social security record in the last year or so, ask your social security office for the special post card for that purpose," Tuley urged.

# State Capital NEWS

**AUSTIN** - For the first time in history, Texas Republicans will have an opportunity to express their preferences for the GOP presidential nomination in a statewide straw poll.

Republican Executive Committee voted to hold the presidential referendum on the May 2 primary ballot. The opinion poll has no binding effect. Principal purpose is to boost the stock of Barry Goldwater and to lure restless conservative Democrats into the GOP primary.

Democratic Executive Committee offered no special voter bonus to keep their own partisans in the fold.

Leaders of both parties, in simultaneous meetings in Austin, declined to submit requested referendums on sale of liquor by the drink and curtailment of Mexican nationals' commuting to jobs in Texas.

Names of Goldwater, Nelson Rockefeller, Margaret Chase Smith and Harold Stassen will appear on the GOP ballot. Originally the names of Richard Nixon, William Scranton, George Romney and Henry Cabot Lodge were included, but they were asked to be omitted. Rockefeller wanted off. He was told he had to stay since he already had announced.

Democrats responded warmly to Gov. John Connally's call for all-out support of President Johnson in party conventions. But they squabbled at length before accepting Dallas as the site of their September 15th state convention. Dallas finally won, 33-18 over Corpus Christi.

Connally made clear in a ringing speech urging Johnson support that as governor he plans to keep control of the state party.

"It is important...to choose people (as convention delegates) who will be as strong for Connally in September as they are for Johnson in June," the Governor stated.

Without dissent the Democrats agreed on Houston as the site of their June 16 state convention to pick national presidential nominating convention delegates. The state party platform will be written and a new SDEC selected at the September meeting.

Republicans will hold their June convention in Dallas and their September convention in Austin.

SDEC Chairman Eugene M. Locke of Dallas resigned at the Democratic meeting and was replaced by Frank Erwin Jr. of Austin. He had served as secretary.

Republicans adopted a resolution calling for a special legislative session on congressional redistricting, and decided to admit registered voters who did not pay their poll taxes (under new federal constitutional authority) to party conventions.

Both committees also got around to their required business: certifying state-wide candidates for the primary ballot and selection of a place (Austin) for their May 12 meeting to canvass May 2 election returns.

Texas salaries aren't good enough to keep top doctors on the job at state hospitals, Dr. James Schless, director of tuberculosis hospitals, told the hospital board at a recent meeting here.

He cited resignations of doctors at Harlingen State Hospital, East Texas Tuberculosis Hospital, and San Antonio State Hospital and possibility of the McKnight State Hospital clinical director's taking a job in another state.

Key medical jobs in the state institutions pay \$14,000 to \$15,000 a year, plus housing. Schless said the next Legislature will be asked to raise that to \$19,500.

Executive Director Raymond W. Vowell offered the Board for Hospitals and Special Schools a more cheering note: with completion of new facilities for the mentally retarded for the mentally retarded (which now house 9,813), the present waiting list of 1,800 may be trimmed to 500 by fall.

Schless also had an encouraging report: average hospitalization period of tuberculosis patients is shorter, and fewer are leaving the hospitals against medical advice. New and improved drugs are offering better hope of quick cure.

No fatalities were reported during the month of February in Eastland County, but there were four personal injury accidents and 13 property damage accidents, according to statistics released by the Texas Department of Public Safety. Five persons were injured and property damage totaled \$7,895 for the month.

Comparing statistics for the first two months of his year with the same period last year, there have been two fatal accidents this year while there were none last year. Seven personal injury accidents and 26 property damage accidents have been reported so far, while there were seven personal injury accidents and 16 property damage accidents during the same period last year.

## Accent on Health

A weekly public service feature from the Texas State Department of Health

"Just as the twig is bent, the tree is inclined," said Alexander Pope, the English poet.

That's one way of reminding parents of their responsibility for their children's health. During the years children attend school, the school supplements but does not take over the responsibility of the child's health.

What are some of the responsibilities parents have for their children during these important formative years?

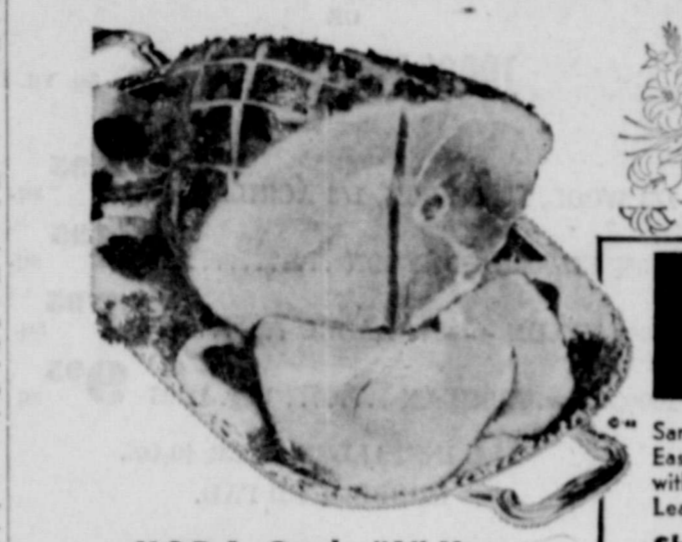
A basic responsibility is to utilize available medical help. Children should have a complete physical examination prior to entering school and once a year thereafter to detect and correct conditions which may be minor at the time but may eventually lead to illness or poor health. A growing list of diseases may be prevented by simple immunization.

Accidents rank first as a cause of death among children ages 5 through 14. The most frequently occurring types of accidental deaths are from motor vehicles, drowning, burns, firearms and falls. Parents and school personnel share responsibility for seeing that children learn to recognize hazards and take ordinary precautions to protect themselves from accidental injury.

Regular visits to the dentist are a must. Permanent teeth begin to appear when the child is about six years of age and are completed around twelve to fourteen. These teeth must last a lifetime.

Vision and hearing may be vulnerable points for your child. Many changes may take place as he grows and develops. Have his vision and hearing screened between age 3 and 5 to detect problems that may exist. Prompt attention can often prevent serious trouble from developing.

And don't overlook a child's eating habits. A good school lunch supplies a child with about one-third of what he needs. Therefore, it is important that he begin the day with a simple, nutritious breakfast consisting of fruit, milk, cereal, or whole grain bread and an egg several times a week. The evening meal contains the rest of the child's requirements for the day; meat, fish or poultry, vegetables, fruit and milk.
