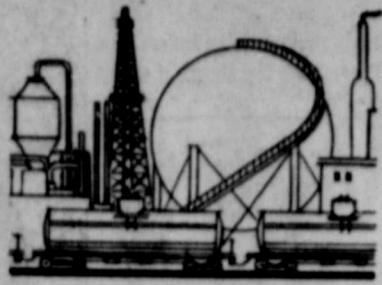

RANGERS BOMB AIR FORCE NINE, 15-6; RJC SLUGGERS HIT PITCHERS WITH POWER

The hard-slugging Ranger Jr. College Rangers clobbered a Goodfellow Air Force Base nine 15 to 6 in a 9-inning diamond duel at Pony League park here Tuesday afternoon.

Winning pitcher was RJC's highly promising freshman hurler, Van Jennings, who went the route, yielding 7 hits,

striking out seven batters and giving up only two bases on balls. In addition, Jennings helped his mates in the timber welding department with two hits out of four trips to the plate. The chunker singled and slammed out a double.

The visiting Air Force Base nine used three hurlers — Ward who went for five frames, Hutchinson who relieved in the sixth and Crabtree who went to work in the eighth. But they just couldn't handle Ranger's fire power.

The AFB moundsmen issued 11 walks and hit two Ranger batters to worsen the situation.

After a scoreless first inning, the Rangers tallied a run in the bottom of the second. Then in the top of the fourth the Air Forcers scored three runs to move into a 3 to 1 lead. RJC swept back in the bottom of the fifth, however, and jammed across three runs. From then on they continued to roll and in the bottom of the seventh exploded for eight victory-clinching runs.

Three Ranger hitters homered — Gary Watson with one mate aboard, Oarke Davidson also with a man aboard, and Gene Bolton, utility man.

Watson had a perfect afternoon at the plate — four for four.

Tuesday afternoon's triumph was the Rangers' fourth victory. They are undefeated and open conference play (North Zone of Texas Jr. College Athletic Conference) here against Navarro on Tuesday, April 7.

Prior to opening their North Zone conference campaign on Apr. 7, Coach Larry (Ace) Parker, enthusiastic and optimistic over prospects, will pilot his RJC charges in three more exhibition duels.

On Saturday, Apr. 4, the Rangers will host Cameron Jr. College, Lawton, Okla., for a double-header. Then on Monday, Apr. 6, the Purple & Whites will go to Fort Worth for a skirmish with the TCU freshmen.

The North Zone circuit is composed of Ranger, Navarro Jr. College, Panola County Jr. College and Cisco Jr. College.

The winner of the North Zone will go into a playoff with the South Zone titlist for the state junior college diamond title.

South Zone members include Wharton Jr. College, Allen Academy, Blinn, Schreiner Institute and San Jacinto Jr. College.

The Rangers wind up their North Zone combat against Navarro at Corsicana on April 24.

Two Men Hurt In Highway 80 Crash Friday

W. O. McMillan, 81-year-old Ranger resident, was seriously injured in a two-car collision which occurred at Prairie Crossing and U. S. Highway 80 west about 3:15 p. m. Friday.

Involved in the mishap was McMillan, traveling north, and Dannie K. McKelvin, 21-year-old Eastland resident, driving south.

Following the impact of the collision, McKelvin's car careened into a Premier Service Station. Damage to the establishment was estimated at between \$450 and \$500.

McMillan and McKelvin were rushed to Ranger General Hospital.

The Eastland man was released following treatment for minor injuries. Late Friday night a hospital attendant said McMillan was "resting well" and "was not critical."

His injuries, however, had not been fully determined at that time.

Both automobiles were reported as total losses.

No Fatalities In County Accidents During February

No fatalities were reported during the month of February in Eastland County, but there were four personal injury accidents and 13 property damage accidents, according to statistics released by the Texas Department of Public Safety. Five persons were injured and property damage totaled \$7,895 for the month.

Comparing statistics for the first two months of his year with the same period last year, there have been two fatal accidents this year while there were none last year. Seven personal injury accidents and 26 property damage accidents have been reported so far, while there were seven personal injury accidents and 16 property damage accidents during the same period last year.



MRS. R. L. HAMRICK Honored with "Clubwoman of the Year" Title

MRS. R. L. HAMRICK, REGION 'CLUBWOMAN OF YEAR' IS STATE AWARD NOMINEE

Mrs. R. L. Hamrick, chairman of the department of humanities, at Ranger Junior College, was chosen "Clubwoman of the Year" at the Heart of Texas convention held in Brownwood recently.

The Ranger 1920 Club had elected Mrs. Hamrick as their candidate for the honor. She has been a member of the club for the past nine years, served a three-year term as president several years ago and is the newly elected president for the 1964-65 club year.

She now is a nominee for the same title for the state of Texas. The Texas Federation of Women's Clubs will choose their 1964 "Clubwoman of the Year" during the state convention to be held in May.

Mrs. Hamrick is an honor graduate of Texas Woman's University, where she earned both the B. A. and the M. A. degrees. She has done graduate work at TWU and at the University of Texas toward a degree of Doctor in Education.

In the summer of 1963, she attended a seminar for journalism instructors at the University of Texas, on a scholarship from the Newspaper Fund, Inc. In addition, she attended as a student and also taught at the Texas State College for Women's School of Journalism in Saltillo, Mexico.

During her many years as a teacher in both high school and college, Mrs. Hamrick has been a leader in work among the young people of Ranger and Ranger Junior College.

She has sponsored the Sub-Delta of Ranger High School since 1936 and is also sponsor of the college DEBS. At RJC she is co-sponsor of the Baptist Student Union. For the past twelve years she served as superintendent of Sunday School for the Ranger Baptist Mission for Mexicans, and served as a teacher in the Summer Bible School for the Mission.

Mrs. Hamrick was the first president of the Ranger Garden Club when it was organized several years ago, and is currently serving as its president. She is vice-president and a past president of the Ranger Branch of the American Association of University Women.

Seemingly, there would be no time for hobbies, but Mrs. Hamrick finds time for reading, bridge and cooking. The students who belong to clubs which she sponsors, sing praises long and loud of the Mexican delicacies she prepares for their parties.

A native of Ranger, Mrs.

Hamrick, a banker's widow, is daughter of the late F. E. Langston and Mrs. Langston. She has two children, R. L. Hamrick, Jr., line and track coach at Robstown, Texas High School, and Mrs. George Riosado, a teacher in the public schools of Arriba, Colorado.

In Ranger Junior College Mrs. Hamrick teaches English, journalism and Spanish.

The nominating statement, signed by the 1920 Club President, Mrs. Bill Collins and Mrs. W. M. Brown, secretary, follows:

"The 1920 Club of Ranger submits the name of Mrs. Mamie Ruth Hamrick as their nominee in the Federation Outstanding Clubwoman of the year contest. Mrs. Hamrick is a native of Ranger, Texas, and daughter of the late F. E. Langston and Mrs. Langston, pioneer residents. She was married to the late Robert L. Hamrick, Gorman, Texas, in 1926 and has two children. She holds the Bachelor of Arts degree and the Master of Arts degree from Texas Woman's University. She has received special training in Spanish in Saltillo, Coahuila, Mexico. She was awarded a scholarship by the Newspaper Fund Inc., New York, this past summer, and attended a three week seminar for teachers of journalism at the University of Texas. She has been associated with Ranger Junior College since 1937 and is Chairman of the Division of Humanities. She is a charter member of the Ranger Branch of the American Association of University Women and a past president of said organization. She is a charter member of the Ranger Garden Club, served as its first president in 1956 and is now serving again in that capacity. Tindalls Given \$3,691; O'Donnell Claim Is Settled

Mr. and Mrs. A. O. Tindall of Eastland were awarded \$3,691 in 91st District Court Wednesday for damages to their house and furniture which they claim resulted from blasting and dirt coming from a nearby rock crusher.

The judgement was rendered against Collins Construction Co. The Tindalls had sued for \$15,000.

Trial of the suit, which opened Monday morning, went to a jury at 3:30 p. m. and it returned a verdict after 2 1/2 hours of deliberation.

Mrs. Leone O'Donnell filed a similar suit for \$18,000. Both cases were tried at the same time but Mrs. O'Donnell settled before her case went to jury. The amount involved in the settlement was not announced.

The jury awarded the Tindalls \$3,500 "for loss of use and enjoyment of their home by blasting and dirt from a rock crusher" and \$191 for personal property damage.

The rock crusher was located near the two homes on U. S. 80 between Ranger and Eastland.

The damages were said to have happened late in 1962.

Tuesday, Mar. 31, Final Deadline On License Tags

Final deadline for purchase of 1964 license tags for passenger, commercial and farm vehicles is next Tuesday, Mar. 31, James A. Smith of L&J Supply Co., Ranger sub-station, announced Saturday.

Smith urges motorists who haven't done so to visit L&J Supply early Monday. He said when the dwindling supply of plates allotted to the local sub-station has been exhausted, auto and truck owners will be forced to purchase tags at the court house in Eastland.

Smith also reminded:

(1) Law requires that payment for plates be made in cash.

(2) Law requires that vehicle owners must show their certificate of title and last year's license receipt.

Meter Check Is Delaying Water Bills

There will be a temporary delay in city water billings to customers for the current month, Mayor Morris Newnam said Saturday.

The Ranger city head explained that in recent weeks workers have been busy checking, repairing and switching water meters.

This important project, he said, is about half finished and will be continued with completion due at an early date.

Meters not cleaned and repaired at least every seven years usually fail to register the maximum volume of water passing from the city lines into local dwellings and business and industrial establishments.

Due to inaccuracy of meters, the percentage of water sold to customers of the city water system is increasingly lower compared to the total volume which the city purchases and receives into its lines from Eastland County Water Supply District.

Through the current check of water meters, the Mayor added, the efficiency of the city water system will be improved.

He also reminds citizens that it is unlawful for property owners or tenants to tamper with water meters which are property of the City of Ranger.

TRI-CITIES APPROVE PHONE RATE HIKES; RANGER GETS INCREASE EFFECTIVE MAY 17

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company's application for telephone rate increases in the three towns they serve in Eastland County was approved finally last Tuesday night as the Cisco city commission approved the rate ordinance on final reading.

City councils in Eastland and Ranger had previously passed the new rate ordinance. The increase, the first since 1956, will become effective with May 17 bills in Ranger, May 25 bills in Eastland and May 29 bills in Cisco.

Under the ordinance, business telephones will go up from \$9 to \$10.50 per month, and residential service will go up 50 cents to \$5.50 per month on one-party telephones and 25 cents to \$4.25 on two party telephones.

'PROPER' PAY PHONES DUE

The "backward, public pay telephones" are on their way out in Eastland and Ranger.

That is the word from Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. District Manager Bill Booth, who has announced that engineering designs for changing the pay telephones are now being made in the Dallas office.

The present instruments, which require that a person first dial "then" insert a dime, have been the subject of much complaint because of what is referred to as the "backward approach" of making a call, by customers.

These telephones, located in public buildings, will be replaced with "conventional" facilities, the operation of which is more widely understood.

Funeral Rites Elston Bradford Held Thursday

Potatoes are currently a bargain. So now's a good time to try your hand at freezing your own French fries. French fried potatoes are best when prepared in two stages. Here's how you can do it—

with the freezing operation between the two stages. Cover the bottom of a fry basket with raw potato strips and fry them until they are tender but not browned. This should take about 4 minutes in fat that is 300 degrees F. When the strips cool to room temperature, package them for freezing in meal-size por-

tions and store at 0 degrees F. They'll maintain their quality for 3 or 4 months. When ready to use the French fries, simply thaw and finish them in 375 degrees F. fat. Cook until golden brown. Or, you can cook them unthawed in a 500 degree F. oven. French fried potatoes finished in the oven are less oily, but they are also slightly less tender than those browned in fat.

Flower seeds, held from one year to the next, are generally no saving. Seeds of most kinds lose much of their vit-

ality when stored under household conditions. They tend to germinate slowly and to produce poor seedlings. Buy new seeds each year—and not too far in advance of planting time. For best results, allow no more than a 3-month holding period.

Chewing gum has a way of getting on clothing, upholstery and rugs. When this problem arises, first, harden the gum by rubbing it with a cube of ice. Then scrape the gum off with the back of a knife. If a stain remains on the fabric or rug, sponge it with a grease solvent. These can be purchased under various trade or chemical names. But be careful. Fumes from solvents are toxic. Some solvents are also flammable. Read the label carefully and observe all precautions listed by the manufacturer.

Students Study County Geology

A group of some 25 college students who are candidates for masters' and doctoral degrees from Hardin-Simmons University, Texas Christian University, University of Texas, and Baylor University were greeted in Cisco Friday morning by Tom Stevenson, Chamber of Commerce manager. The students were participating in an integrated series of studies being carried out by Baylor University and the State Bureau of Economic Geology of the stratigraphy of the Harpersville and Pueblo formations (upper Cisco-lower Wolfcamp).

The study has been in progress since 1960, and includes mapping of rocks and other specimens that occur on the surface here which are subsurface farther west.

Leader of the group, Joe McGowen, of the department of geology at Baylor, said they would be in and out of Cisco for some time while the study is underway.

Accent on Health

One isn't enough, really, when it comes to feet.

You might say it takes two to tango, climb stairs or perform the majority of a person's ordinary tasks. People who have lost their feet, or at least lost use of them, may learn to compensate, but their words to two footed friends would invariably be "take care of your feet while you have them."

Feet are composed of the same types of bones, blood vessels, nerves, muscles, ligaments and skin that compose the rest of the body. Feet as easily as other organs of the body, may become diseased. As a matter of fact, some diseases, such as gout, manifest themselves first in the feet.

Proper foot care is essential for general health. And it must be begun early.

A baby's foot grows and develops along with the rest of his body. Not until about age ten is the general structure of the foot completed. Certain details of the formation are not perfected until after the twentieth year of life.

Parents who would be horrified at the thought of mashing a child's finger with a hammer, may be contributing — by neglect — to foot disorders.

Common causes of foot defects are short, narrow shoes; improper style of shoes; shoes that are too stiff; run-over heels and broken down arches; and short stockings that crowd the toes.

Children's feet grow and change at a rapid pace. Shoes and socks may need to be replaced as often as from four to eight weeks with a larger size.

Both children and adults need to give good daily care to their feet. Keep feet clean. Wash them with mild water and soap and dry the skin carefully. Avoid rubbing them too hard with a coarse towel.

In case of athlete's foot, ingrown nails or corns consult your physician. The same goes for ulcers, sores or other infections on feet or legs. Women should avoid wearing tight garters or supporters.

And when you buy shoes, make sure they fit. Their purpose is to protect your feet and give you a balanced foundation on which to stand. For this reason, always select the style that's designed for your type of foot.

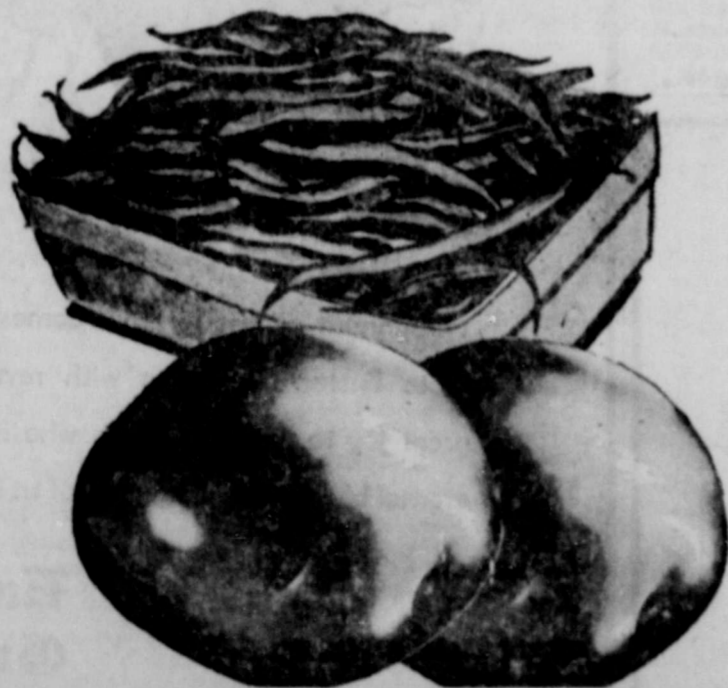

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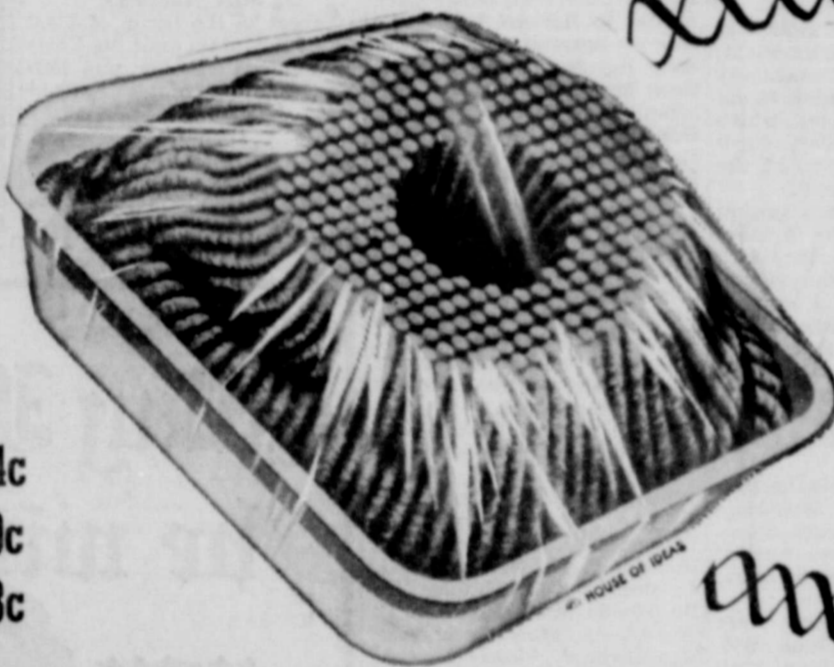
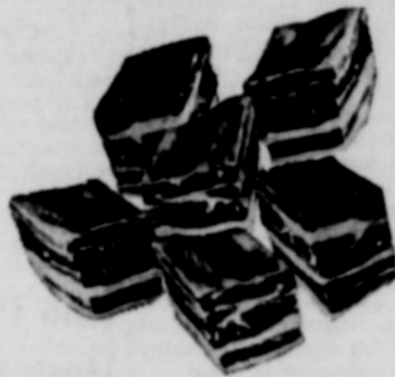

"HE IS RISEN"

Just an old Easter text familiar to the women in the 28th chapter of Matthew, "Fear not ye; for I know that he seek Jesus which was crucified. He is not here, he is risen."

II Peter 1:19, the latter part of the verse, speaks of "A light that shineth in a dark place, until the day star arise in your hearts." It was a dark day that Easter morning when the women came to the tomb. Not only was it dark spiritually, but naturally. John says they came "when it was still dark." Such a day of darkness had never known before. The one that had walked among them, healing their sick, raising their dead, opening blind eyes, casting out devils and working all manner of miracles among them, had been crucified and was gone forever, they thought.

But when it was darkest, the day star arose. "He is risen" the angel said. Joyous thought to his followers! Often, when the sun may be shining in its full strength, the flowers blooming and the birds singing; yet to our dark, dismal hour, how happy we would be. So we can imagine the joy and happiness those women felt that first Easter morning when the angel said "He is not here. He is risen."

Let's go back and look available at the Day Star. It takes a real bright star to outshine the brightness of the sun. But Jesus is that Day Star. Until we allow Him to "arise in our hearts", though the world cannot see the Day Star. We are living in a land of prosperity, a bright day as far as the material things

of life are concerned. We, as Holy-spirit filled Christians, must stay filled with the Spirit so that our lives will shine above the brightness of good jobs, high wages, big bonuses, fine cars, homes, clothes, etc. Our lives must be filled with such things as faithfulness, joy, love, peace, long suffering, gentleness, goodness, faith, meekness, temperance, and the like — things that will out shine the "brightness of the day". The brightness of God in a person's life out shines all Natural sunshine or brightness. Isa. 60:1-2: "Arise, shine, for thy light is come, and the glory of the Lord is risen upon thee. For behold, the darkness shall cover the earth, and gross darkness the people."

(Spiritual darkness) but the Lord shall arise upon thee, and His glory shall be seen upon thee. "It is glorious to think of the time Jesus arose, but let us think for the time we shall arise at that last trumpet, when God calls us all home to be with Him. We shall not only hear about our resurrection, but we will feel it, the great resurrecting power that will lift us out of this old sin cursed world and carry us away to joys eternal.

Our unsaved loved ones and friends may wonder about us for a little while, but they won't be long in concluding: "They are not here; for they are risen."

THE RUBY VERDICT

The Jack Ruby trial has been of nation-wide interest. Since the trial there has been much controversy as to whether Ruby should have received the death penalty.

Three members of the Ranger Junior College journalism class quizzed students and teachers this week as to what sentence they believed he should have been given.

Most of those polled think that he deserved the stiffest punishment, but they don't agree that the death penalty is the worst punishment. Some of the opinions expressed are as follows:

Coach Larry Parker: I believe he should have received death because he knew it was premeditated. The penalty of death should be followed out in this instance.

Jack Allen: I believe he should receive the maximum penalty given him. The crime merits the death penalty.

Mrs. Arthur Murrell: I believe Ruby to be guilty of the crime and that it was premeditated. Also believe there is more to the incident than has been revealed thus far.

Dorothy Linn: I believe he is guilty and don't think that insanity was ever the right plea. I do not believe in murderer's not receiving the death penalty.

Tonia Arnold of Strawn: I believe that if he were not given the death penalty, more revenge would be taken. It has to cease somewhere.

Sonny Lewis of Ranger: I think he should have received life imprisonment because the death penalty is easier on him than a life sentence would be.

Millard Herweck, Jr., of Ranger: I don't believe in the death penalty, but if anybody deserves it, Ruby does.

Jay Grimshaw of Desdemona: I think the sentence he received was the only one he could have been given. Premeditation was proved in the murder. This trial is no more important than any other murder trial.

Denny Ewing of Ranger: If he was sane, then he received the verdict he deserved. The jury heard all of the facts and they should know more about it than we do.

Sammy Bohannon of Benjamin: He should have gotten life because more might be uncovered later which might implicate him in the assassination of the president. If this happened, his testimony would be needed.

Doyle Weldon of Graham: Yes, I think he deserved death because he did not have the right to kill another man.

James Rouse of Abilene: No, he should not have received death, because he did not have a fair trial.

Bill Wilkinson of Newcastle: I think he deserved death because if he had been given a life term, he would have gotten out in three or four years.

Gerald Haile of Newcastle: Yes, he should have gotten the death penalty because he did not have the right to kill Lee Harvey Oswald. That should have been left up to the law.

Allen Swartz of San Antonio: No, life would have been good enough, because we do not have the right to kill a man.

Bill Wilkinson of Newcastle: I think he deserved death because if he had been given a life term, he would have gotten out in three or four years.

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WHAT'S IN A TITLE?

Titles are a vital ingredient of writing, for they often indicate the content and purpose of a literary selection. Too, a catchy title captivates a reader's interest, impels him to examine a book or selection, and often entices him to read it.

Ranger Junior College freshmen were urged to take note of this function of a title and give imaginative titles to their autobiographies.

Leon Tice of Holliday compiled by declaring "A Lot of Things Can Happen in Nineteen Years," but "Time Does Fly," argued Sherrill James of Brooksmith, while Imogene Jones of Brownwood wistfully reflected on "The Happy Years."

Some students coined clever titles which played upon

their names. For example, Donny Bell of High Island called his autobiography "Ding Dong;" John Hay of Fort Worth entitled his "Hay John;" and Jane Spears of Clyde called hers "Calamity Jane."

"Brown, But Not Done," said Tenny Brown of Hamlin, whereas Barry Martin of Houston wrote of "Little Martin's Little Life." Denny Ewing of Ranger tagged his autobiography "The Ewing Story."

William Averitt of Hebronville entitled his theme "Road Runner," for he said that Averitt is the scientific name for "road runner." "Sissy" by Vinita Blackwell of Ranger makes use of a nickname, as does "The Heart of a Weiner" by Edwena Edmonds of Ranger, the latter nickname having come about as a result of the sound of the long e in the name Edwena.

Other students based their titles of their life stories upon television or picture shows. Gary Barker of Electra called his "From Then Till Now;" Bobby Owen of Ranger, his "Periods of Adjustment;" and Tom Shaw of San Antonio, his "That Wonderful Year, 1945."

"As Years Go By" by Bill Clary of McCamey is reminiscent of a popular song. Some titles indicate influence of physical characteristics or personality traits.

"Cotton Davidson" was derived from the very blonde hair of Parke Davidson of Dallas; "The Talker" reflects the personality of Joan Cleary of Fort Worth; and "Little One" suggests size in the case of Sue Myers of Corpus Christi.

"Me, Myself, and I" of Jean Cleary might indicate interest in self to some people, though her twin sister Joan would no doubt deny it. "The Autobiography of I, the Individual," is a true reflection of the individualist John May of Salt Lake City, Utah.

The Wibbert brothers of Del Rio collaborated on their titles with Dale titling his life story "Mr. In-Between;" the middle one of a family of three brothers and Darryl, his "Last But Not Least."

Such titles as "A Historical Account of the Life of Van Jones" (Fort Worth) and "I Know Thyself" by Albert Salinas of Dallas exude an air of dignity, whereas others like "Me" by James Davis of Fort Worth denote a casual air.

Other enterprising and interesting titles include "Who Am I?" by Tom Napolitano of Syracuse, New York; "The Traveling Man" by John Rice of Del Rio, so named because, with his father in the air force, he has traveled and lived all over the world; "Wrong Way" by Robert Smith of Fort Worth; "Tall, Dark and Ugly" by Howard Starling of Houston (a misnomer because he is not ugly); "Alpha and Omega" by Ronald Austin of Fort Worth; "I Led Two Lives" by Bobby Kaufman of Rockwall; "A Wayward Texan" by Jerry Boyd of Fort Worth; "Where I Come In" by Eddie Fraser of Carbon; and "This Crazy Life" by Omata Lewis of Desdemona.

Carl Kolvig of Houston is of French descent, but his French name was lost generations ago when his ancestors spent some time in exile in Denmark, for Kolvig is the name of the town in which they sought refuge, a name they took when they returned to France. "The Story of the VIII" by J. T. Wisener of Stamford suggests the last of a large family.

What's in a title? Judging from these samples, one would say interest, originality, and imagination, lending a certain something to the manuscripts they read.

Burleson Asks Limitations On Importing Meat

Congressman Omar Burleson has introduced a bill to impose import limitations on meat imports, setting the limit at an average figure for the five years from 1959 through 1963.

Burleson stated, "We have got to protect our own interests first. Such action might even strengthen our international position by winning the respect of other nations. That seems to be the way they approach us and, as a matter of fact, a firmer position on all imports could be of help to us in the forthcoming Tariff and Trade negotiations at Geneva. If we took a self-interest attitude the same as other trading nations and the European Common Market, and stopped subsidizing their industry and agriculture, we might be able to negotiate from a position of strength."

Burleson went on to say that "we have in our hands the best possible bargaining tools with Australia, the principal importer of meats to the United States. Sugar, which is more important to Australia as an export than meat, could, in my opinion, be a key to our trade relations. She is fourth largest producer of sugar in the world and furnished this country with 217 million tons last year at World prices, which generally were considerably lower than that of our domestic price. We could give Australia a 200 million ton allotment as a bargaining proposition."

The cattle area Congressman does not believe that an import limit, driving beef prices back up, might encourage consumers and the large city representatives. He explained the housewife pays twice as much for beef now as she did in 1954 when imports were only 2 per cent of domestic production. Ranchers then got 65 cents of every beef dollar the consumer spent, while now they get only 54 cents.

Social Security Number Is Seen As Valuable Key

How many keys do you have? R. R. Tuley, Jr., Abilene district manager for the Social Security Administration suggests that you have one besides the car key, the house key, the office or store key, etc., that may have slipped your mind.

"The key I'm talking about may well be the most valuable key in your possession," says Tuley.

"Although it doesn't have the shape of most keys, that little card showing your name and nine numbers — your social security card — is really a key," he added, with the following basis for that remark.

Your social security card is the key that identifies your earnings record on which money will be due for retirement pay to you and your family, or for disability payments to you and your family, or for survivors payments of your family at your death.

Failure to show your card to each new employer you have, or writing it incorrectly on your self-employment tax return is taking a chance on reducing or even losing the income protection you are paying for.

Indifference as to what is being credited to your social security earnings record is also a danger to you or your family's collecting the right amount at the right time at some future date.

"If you've lost your card, ask your social security office for a replacement; if you haven't checked on your social security record in the last year or so, ask your social security office for the special post card for that purpose."

The New Testament tells us that Jesus died on a Roman cross just outside the city of Jerusalem. It also states that he was buried in Joseph's new tomb which was secured with the seal of the Roman empire and guarded by Roman soldiers. It tells us further that an angel of the Lord rolled the stone away and that Jesus came forth from the grave alive from the dead. Such is the Biblical account of the first glorious Easter morning.

Further proof of the Biblical claim is the continuance of the movement which he started two thousand years ago. A lie could not endure this long and be held by so many adherents as the truth. Final proof is the testimony of Christian experience. Every Christian can truthfully say that the Savior lives "because he lives in my heart".

Does it really matter that Jesus lives? It is a matter of gravest importance for everyone, especially the Christian. Christianity stands or falls with the resurrection of Jesus Christ. It matters greatly since the resurrection is the great distinguishing mark of the Christian religion. All other religions honor one who was mortal and is dead. Christianity worships one who

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POWER OF HIS RESURRECTION

Text: Philippians 3:10 — "That I may know Him and the power of His resurrection."

Paul was the kind of person that wanted to know things. (II Cor. 5:1, "For we know that if our earthly house of this tabernacle were dissolved, we have a building of God, an house not made with hands, eternal in the heavens.")

(II Tim. 1:12, "For I know whom I have believed and am persuaded that He is able to keep that which I have committed unto Him against that day.")

He was not one of the eleven apostles. He didn't have the privilege of sitting at the feet of Jesus. He wanted to know the power of His resurrection.

No one this side of Heaven knows the real power of His resurrection, but we, like Paul, must continue on until we know it in its fullness. We know it took a power mightier than the atomic bomb. This power was more explosive than any human force — more dynamic than machinery. It was the power of God. To know this power is to know Jesus, in His power to forgive, cleanse and save. In II Cor. 15:20, Paul makes a positive statement, "Now is Christ risen"

Jesus tells us in Rev. 1:18, "I am he that liveth and was dead; and, behold, I am alive for evermore, Amen; and have the keys of hell and death." The greatest exhibition of power was manifested in the resurrection of Jesus Christ.

Who is the greatest conqueror of all time? Jesus charged the citadel of Satan, made conquest of death, and robbed the grave of its victory forever. Oh! that we may know the power of His resurrection.

Each time a soul is saved the power of His resurrection is seen. (John 12:32, "And I, if I be lifted up from the earth, will draw all men unto me.") This is real power, saving power.

Each time death comes — When the body of the saint is placed beneath the sod, it testifies of His resurrection. (I Cor. 15:20, "But now is Christ risen from the dead and became the first fruits of them that slept.")

Each time the Bible is opened — (Rom. 1:16, "For I am not ashamed of the gospel of Christ, for it is the power of God unto salvation, to everyone that believeth, to the Jew first, and also to the Greek.")

To know the power of His resurrection, is to accept by Faith, the death, burial, and resurrection of Jesus Christ. Then, and only then, can we really know the power of His resurrection.

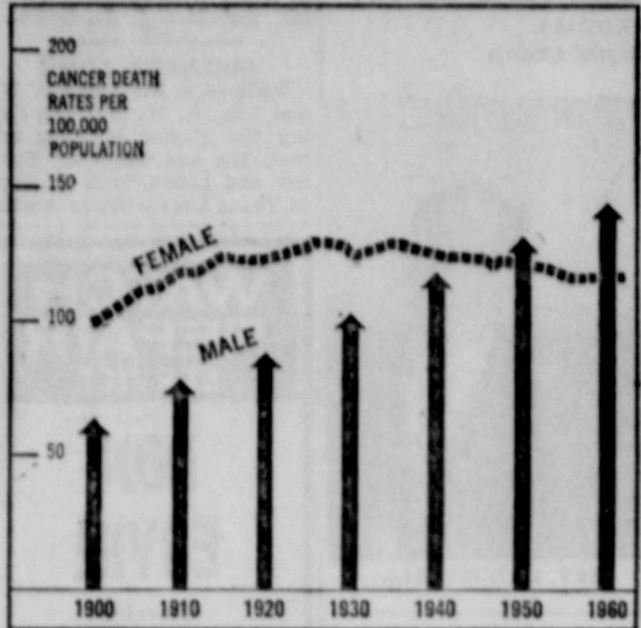

RESOLUTION
BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF EASTLAND COUNTY WATER SUPPLY DISTRICT, CALLING AN ELECTION FOR THE PURPOSE OF ELECTING FOUR (4) DIRECTORS OF SAID DISTRICT.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF EASTLAND COUNTY WATER SUPPLY DISTRICT:

- That an election be held on April 7, 1964, in Eastland County Water Supply District as created by House Bill No. 388, passed by the Fifty-First Legislature, and as amended by House Bill No. 845 by the Fifty-Third Legislature, for the purpose of electing (4) Directors of said District.
- For the purpose of said election, Eastland County Water Supply District is divided into two election precincts. All of the territory of the District contained in the City of Ranger shall be known as the "Ranger Precinct" and all of the territory of the District contained in the City of Eastland shall be known as the "Eastland Precinct."

shall be known as the "Eastland Precinct."

3. (A) The election in the Ranger Precinct shall be held at the City Hall in Ranger, Texas. W. W. Mitchell is hereby appointed as presiding Judge for said election, and he shall appoint as assistants an assistant Judge and two (2) Clerks to assist him in holding said election.

(B) The election in the Eastland Precinct shall be held at the Justice of the Peace No. 1, County Court House in the City of Eastland. J. H. Pittman is hereby appointed as presiding Judge for said election, and he shall appoint an assistant Judge and two (2) Clerks to assist him in holding said election.

4. Only qualified voters residing in Eastland County Water Supply District who own taxable property therein, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be entitled to vote at said election.

5. Mr. C. B. Pruet, W. F. Creager, D. T. Lowe and M. E. Owen of Ranger and T. M. Fullen and Charles R. Freyschlag of Eastland have made application to this board to have their names printed on the ballot and such applications are hereby granted. The ballot, however, shall be large enough to permit the writing of other names.

6. The ballots for said election shall have printed thereon the following:

"OFFICIAL BALLOT"
C. B. Pruet, W. F. Creager DIRECTOR FROM RANGER
D. T. Lowe, M. E. Owen DIRECTOR FROM RANGER
T. M. Fullen DIRECTOR FROM EASTLAND
Charles R. Freyschlag DIRECTOR FROM EASTLAND.

Each voter shall leave in the ballot the names of the four (4) candidates for whom he desires to vote. The four (4) candidates receiving the highest number of votes shall be elected.

7. No person shall be elected a Director unless he resides in and owns taxable property in the District. No member of the governing body of the City of Ranger or the City of Eastland and no employee of either

of said cities shall be elected as Director.

8. Notice of said election shall be given by publishing a copy of this order in the Ranger Times, and in the Eastland Telegram, newspapers of general circulation published within said District, one time, such publication to be at least ten (10) days before the date herein set for said election. Adopted and Approved this 2nd day of February, 1964.

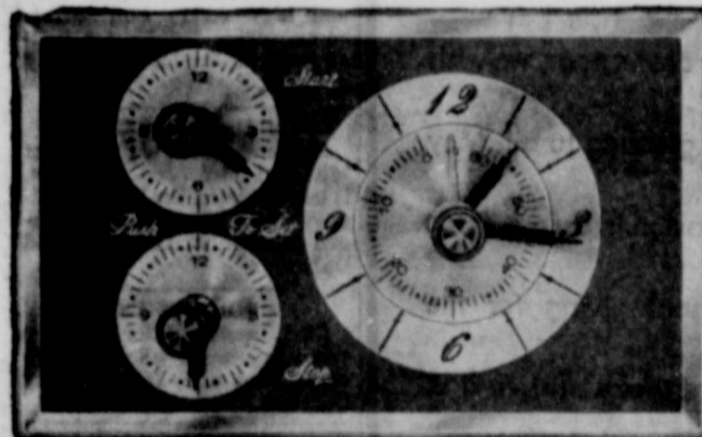

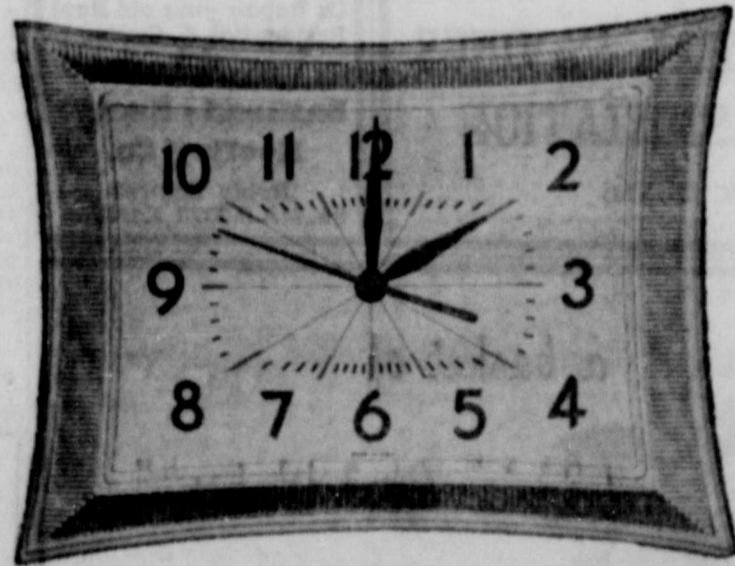

Importance Of Resurrection

One day is no more than another, but that which Easter commemorates means everything to us. Our Faith, hope, and experience all depend on the Resurrection.

I Corinthians 15: 12-14. "Now if Christ be preached that He rose from the dead, how say some among you that there no resurrection of the dead?"

"But if there be no resurrection of the dead then is Christ not risen: "And if Christ be not risen, then is our preaching vain and your Faith is also vain."

It was a glorious morning. The hope of the apostles and those with them had faded. He had died and was buried. The tomb was sealed, and his followers had all disappeared, no one was praising Him. But on that glorious morning when the tomb was found empty, the hope of His disciples was renewed. The two Marys came early to the tomb. They were bringing spices to anoint His body.

Mark 16:4-8. "And when they looked, they saw that the stone was rolled away; for it was very great. And entering into the sepulchre, they saw a young man sitting on the right side, clothed in a long white garment; and they were affrighted. And he saith unto them, 'be not affrighted: Ye seek Jesus of Nazareth, which was crucified! He is risen; He is not here: behold the place where they laid Him.'

"But go your way, tell His disciples and Peter that He goeth before you into Galilee: there shall ye see Him, as He said unto you."

"And they went out quickly, and fled from the sepulchre; for they trembled and were amazed: neither said they any thing to any man; for they were afraid."

Peter and John ran to the tomb. Mary Magdalene came rushing to Peter and John and told them that the body of the Lord had been taken away. The two apostles went immediately to see for themselves. They had never understood that He would rise again. Unlike the two women who left the tomb believing that His body had been stolen away, they went into the tomb and

They were convinced. They saw and believed that He had risen from the dead. The evidence of this to Peter and John was that the stone was rolled away and the tomb was empty. The testimony of an Angel!

Matthew 28:5-6. "And the angel answered and said unto the women, Fear not ye, for I know that ye seek Jesus, which was crucified. He is not here: for He is risen, as He said. Come see the place where the Lord lay."

"Today our redemption for sin is concrete evidence, and if Christ be not raised, your faith is vain."

"Ye are yet in your sins," I Corinthians 15:17. "We can know that we are saved which evidence is that He has risen, if He was not risen we could not be saved."

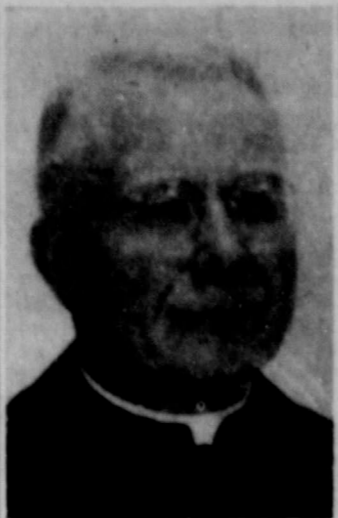

"Let not your heart be troubled." St. John 14:1
We must live a calm life in the calmness of God's unchangeableness. We are so changeable and so easily upset, because we expect immediate results of our efforts. We are irascible, because we cannot stand the strain of our difficulties. We are restless, because our imagination keeps on creating new anxieties. We exhaust ourselves, because in a world where everything is fleeting, we tend to forget about God, in whom alone we find the tranquility of perfect order, in Him alone is peace, He is our peace.

Of course, God can put us to test, but he does also console. The burden of our trials can be heavy indeed, but refreshing is the solace of his grace. The Lord can admonish us like a stern father, but his leniency always accompanies his fatherly reprimand.
