Little League Minors Need 30-40 Boys

Operation of the minor league unit of Ranger's Little League baseball organization during the coming season may be suspended due to lack of players. W. T. Eaton, Little League president, said Tuesday.

"We need 30 or 40 more boys if we are to continue the minor league teams competition," he said and urged boys and interested parents to answer this important call to avert suspension of minor play. He also reminded parents and prospective players of the following eligibility requirements:

Any boy who reaches 9 years of age before Aug. 1 and who will not be 13 years old prior to Aug. 1 of the current — 1964 — year is eligible for Little League participation.

Any boy who reaches the age of 8 before Aug. 1 and who will not attain the age of 13 by Aug. 1 of the current year is eligible for the minor league.

Creager, Pruet Win Posts On ECWSD Board

W. F. Creager and C. B. Pruet of Ranger and Charles Freyschlag and Milton Fullen of Eastland were re-elected to the board of Eastland County Water Supply District during an election Tuesday.

Ranger voters cast ballots at City Hall and Eastland citizens voted at the courthouse. Freyschlag and Fullen, incumbents, were unopposed for re-election. Vote was light at Eastland with only 73 ballots cast. Freyschlag received 75, Fullen 74 votes.

In Ranger four candidates sought the city's two places on the board — incumbent Pruet, Creager, D. T. Lowe and M. E. Owen.

The vote tabulations: Creager and Pruet, 183 votes each, Lowe, 110 and Owen, 106.

Holdover members are M. H. Perry, president for the past year, and Tom Wilson of Eastland and James A. Smith and E. F. Arterburn of Ranger. David D. Pickrell of Ranger is secretary of the board.

The presidency of the ECWSD district is alternated annually between Ranger and Eastland.

Eastland Editor Wins \$250 Cash Prize For Series Court Articles

A series of three articles that H. V. O'Brien wrote in January, 1963, about the backlog of cases in county and district courts won for the young editor of The Eastland Telegram a \$250 first prize award from the Texas Law Enforcement Foundation this week.

The check and certificate of award were presented to O'Brien at the attorney general's office in Austin Monday afternoon.

The series of articles appeared in The Telegram, The Ranger Times and The Cisco Press. The first described the backlog of cases in the county court, the second listed cases on file in the 91st District Court; and, the third pointed out the number of personal or civil cases filed by all lawyers of the county.

The Texas Law Enforcement Foundation, an association of public officials and others interested in upholding the law, offers annual awards for significant contributions to its program. Second place went to Bruce Romig of the Amarillo Globe-Times, and third was won by Jake Trussell of the Kingsville Record.

Judges were Dewitt C. Reddick, director of the School of Journalism at the University of Texas; Frank Ahlgren, editor of the Memphis Commercial Appeal; and Col. Homer Garrison, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

O'Brien, editor of The Telegram for two and a half years,

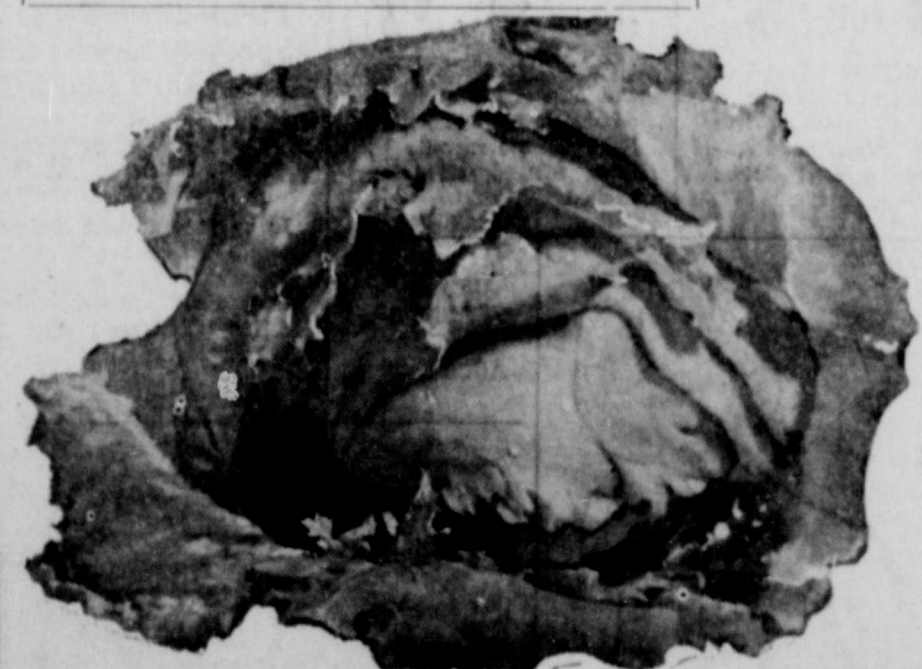

Both men as well as women are welcome to attend the annual Eastland County Pecan Budding and Grafting School to be held April 15th with 11 a. m. morning session scheduled to start at the C. J. Junior College Cafeteria promptly at 9 a. m., according to Tom Stevenson, Chamber of Commerce Manager and County Farm Agent J. M. Cooper, joint sponsors.

A large crowd is expected to attend the annual affair.

Mr. Stevenson stressed that out of county people will be welcome as local folks.

Mr. Cooper who has taught the annual school for many years said that the morning session will be devoted to lectures and demonstrations on budding and grafting. After lunch in the school cafeteria the group will practice at the Kent Word pecan grove, 3 miles south of Cisco, in the Leon River bottoms.

C. E. Smith, Rising Star, president of the County Pecan Growers Association, will put on a grafting demonstration during the afternoon portion showing the latest techniques in propagation by this method.

Freeman, prominent pecan grower in the Chaney Community, to have a supply of dormant pecan budwood of the new hybrid varieties such as Choctaw, Apache, Wichita and Comanche as well as some of the plastic budding tape on hand for those who want it. RANGER PHYSICIAN WARNS AGAINST BREAST CANCER; URGES SELF-EXAMINATION

This year, according to American Cancer Society estimates, some 64,000 American women will discover a lump in their breast that will be diagnosed as cancer.

Nearly half of these women will die - many because their cancer will have been detected too late. "And yet," Dr. W. P. Watkins, Ranger physician said Monday, "a few minutes once a month for breast self-examination could save thousands of lives."

Noting that breast cancer is today the leading cause of fatal cancer among American women - an estimated 26,000 will die from it in 1964. Dr. Watkins said that when breast cancer is found early before it has spread, better than 8 out of 10 women can be saved. "When diagnosis is made later, the chance for survival drop to less than half," he added.

Cancer of the breast can occur at any age," the Ranger physician said, "though it becomes increasingly more common with increasing years. When it strikes, breast cancer can often be felt by the patient herself in the form of a lump about the size of a coffee bean. It is at this point that the disease is usually highly curable. Not all breast tumors mean cancer.

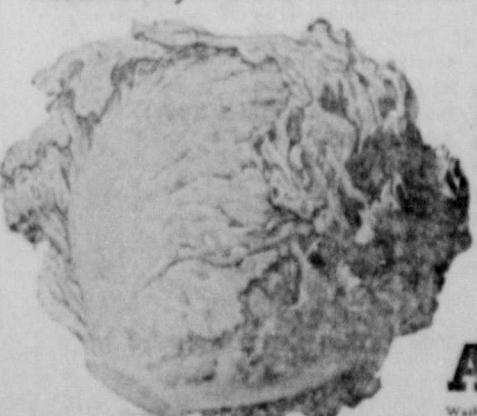

and private foodhandlers — whether housewife or canner. Discussions during the three sessions of two hours each deal with the causative agents of communicable diseases: virus, bacteria, proto worms. The source of these organisms (sick people, people who are carriers, and sick animals); the mode of transmission from the source to susceptible persons; and the ports of entry.

Emphasis is placed on the fact that if people are properly vaccinated, and thereafter practice sanitation, personal hygiene and food refrigeration, the majority of these diseases could be greatly reduced or stamped out.

Do you plan to eat one of the estimated 105 million meals to be served in the nation or 2.5 million meals to be served in Texas today?

If you do, look for the restaurant's placard and personnel certificates showing their interest in a high standard of health by participating in the available training.

AUSTIN— Eating out and grabbing a cup of coffee are part of the American tradition. Twenty-two million meals—roughly speaking—will be served in 16 thousand Texas restaurants this week. And enough coffee is drunk each year in the nation to float about 450 mammoth battleships.

The fact that you can go into the majority of the restaurants and eat a wholesome meal is an accomplishment. This is especially so when you consider the 75 different communicable diseases existing in the United States — about 28 or more which can be transmitted through insanitary food production, processing, distribution, preparation and service.

One of the main reasons — among many — for this are the three-day short courses conducted by the Division of Public Health Education of the Texas State Department of Health for persons engaged in food preparation and service.

For more information about these food schools, contact your local or state health department.

National Issues Being Discussed By Mr. McLendon

AUSTIN—Gordon McLendon gave special attention to civil rights and other domestic issues this week in his fast-moving campaign for the Democratic U. S. Senatorial nomination in the May 2 Primary.

The Dallas radio executive emphasized his support of equal voting and educational rights for all, but elaborated on his opposition to provisions of the pending civil rights bill which he contends would deprive members of all ethnic groups of the rights of trial by jury, private property and civil liberties.

In its present form the so-called civil rights bill poses the greatest threat to our constitutional liberties since the Supreme Court overthrew an almost identical act in 1953," McLendon declared.

He asserted that increased job opportunities, a problem which figures in both the civil rights debate and the administration's "war on poverty," can be assured only by freeing business from bureaucratic restraints to promote business expansion.

McLendon said Texas has found a satisfactory solution to the problem of medical

care for the aged by implementing the Kerr-Mills law and the Texas-65 program, both based on the principle of voluntary health insurance.

Reiterating his opposition to federal aid to and control over schools, McLendon advocated encouragement of a "realistic tax exemption for families supporting students in higher education." McLendon pointed out that his opponent, incumbent Senator Ralph Yarborough helped defeat an amendment which would have written a \$1200 college exemption into the new tax bill.

February Bond Sales Total \$19,700 In County

Rules Revised For State Parks

AUSTIN, — Two key regulations for state parks have been revised according to J. Weldon Watson, executive director of the Parks and Wildlife Department.

The new regulations, effective April 1, will permit camping and shelter occupancy for a 14-day limit during the regular park season between May 1 and September 15.

Radios, recorded music and musical instruments will be subject to a 10 p.m. curfew in picnic, camping, shelter and other overnight facility areas of the parks; however, they may be permitted in the concession buildings and immediate concession areas until 11 p.m.

Our new regulations which conform generally with those in national parks, have been well received by the public," said Watson.
