Dr. Cyrus Barcus and Rev. B. L. McCord officiated.

Mr. Harrell, who made his home at 604 W. Patterson in Eastland, died at 9:45 p. m. Saturday at his residence. Death was attributed to a heart attack.

Mr. Harrell moved to Eastland from Lampasas in 1922. He had been a car salesman for the past few years for the King Motor Co.

Born in Coryell County on May 22, 1891, he was a member of the Methodist Church. He married Sarah Hair on Feb. 18, 1912 at Pidoake, Texas. Survivors include his wife, three daughters, Mrs. Herman Foust of Turnerville, Mrs. Bill Walters of Eastland, Mrs. Dudley, Ranger; two sons, Orvel of Fort Worth and Travis of Eastland; four grandchildren, and one great grandchild.

## RANGER PLACES THIRD IN DISTRICT 10-A TRACK, FIELD MEET HELD HERE SATURDAY

Ranger High School's track squad placed third in the District 10-A track and field meet held here Saturday.

Albany won the championship with a total of 136 points. Clyde finished second with 110 1-3 points, Baird wound up fourth with 90 1/3, Eastland was fifth with 31 and Cross Plains was last with 22 1/3 points.

In addition Ranger won the freshman division with 50 points. Top honors in the junior high division were taken by Clyde with 57 points.

Kennedy won the 880-yard run, clocked at 2:03. He also placed third in the 220-yard dash.

Hinds placed second in the 180-yard low hurdles event and third in covering the high hurdles.

Ranger's Lanthrop placed first in the pole vault clearing at 10 feet 6 inches. Boone tied with two other vaulters for second place.

Mendoza tied for second place in the high jump and McBee, who covered 19 feet 10 1/2 inches sacked up first place in the broad jump.

## Ranger Cancer Drive Planning Is Near End; Solicit Funds April 21

Next Tuesday, April 21, will be "CC-Day" in Ranger.

It's the date of the city's "Cancer Crusade," a city-wide campaign to raise funds to fight one of mankind's most dreaded enemies — cancer.

"Because cancer touches all of us, either directly or indirectly," Rev. B. L. McCord, chairman of Ranger's crusade committee, said, "each of us

should do his share to combat the scourge which will eventually strike 48 million Americans now living — unless the trend is reversed.

"Here in Ranger, we can help save lives by serving as volunteer workers and by contributing money to the Crusade," Rev. McCord declared. "Next Tuesday, Crusade volunteers will not only ring doorbells to collect funds, but will leave at each home a life-saving leaflet which tells how to protect your family from cancer. This free educational material stresses the value of annual checkups and the importance of knowing cancer's seven danger signals."

Last year, Rev. McCord said, some 88,000 men, women and children died needlessly of cancer because the disease was discovered and treated too late.

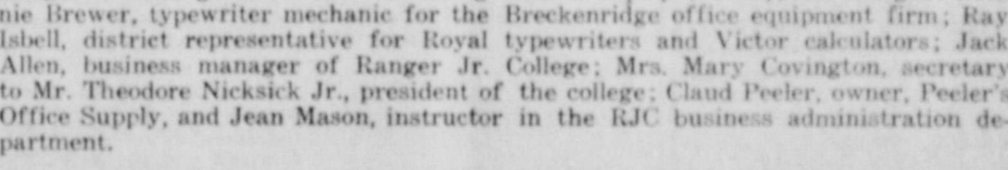

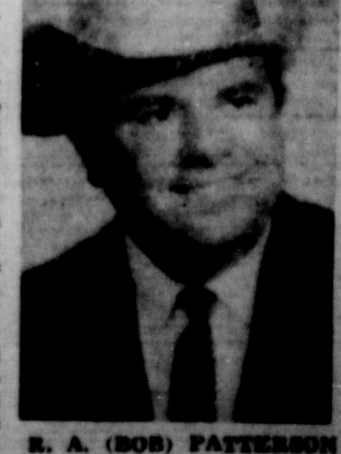

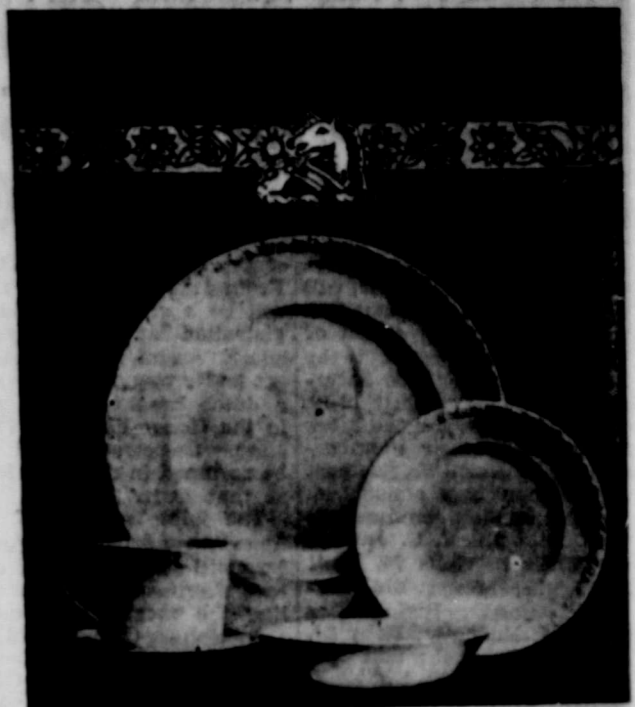

**CONTINUING RESEARCH IS  
 VITAL IN EFFORTS TO CURB,  
 CONTROL DREADED CANCER**

Some years ago the late, noted scientist George N. Papanicolaou, who discovered the "Pap" test for uterine cancer said, "It is a great satisfaction so make a discovery in the laboratory but we do not save people's lives in the laboratory. Lives are saved where people are."

According to Dr. Luther Gohlke, through his research program the American Cancer Society which helped develop the "Pap" test, "is continually working to put Dr. Pap's great words into life-saving action. We support research in the laboratory; we help bring the findings to practical use where people live."

An example of this, he said, is the Society's Clinical Fellowship program which in 16 years has contributed on a wide scale to improvement in diagnosis and treatment of cancer patients throughout the country.

"These fellowships, Dr. Gohlke said, "are part of a long-range effort to assure that more and more young graduates of medical and dental schools are given special training which will be useful in diagnosing and treating cancer when they return to practice or teach in their communities. The American Cancer Society is currently investing about \$1,000,000 a year to train these future practitioners in medicine and dentistry. The object of the program, as Dr. Pap has said, is to save lives where people are."

Most of these former Fellows, according to Dr. Gohlke, have pushed ahead against cancer in their communities as demonstrated by the initiation of cancer control programs, cancer registries, tumor boards, and clinical treatment facilities. Returns to this grass roots program are direct and immediate, said Dr. Gohlke.

More than 1,400 physicians have been trained in this program since its inception in 1948. This year, an additional 236 physicians and dentists have been awarded fellowships in 113 institutions in 33 states, Puerto Rico and the District of Columbia.

Clinical Fellows are given stipends of \$3,500 for one year, Advanced Clinical Fellows receive \$6,000 the first year; \$8,000 and \$10,000 in the second and third years.

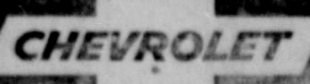

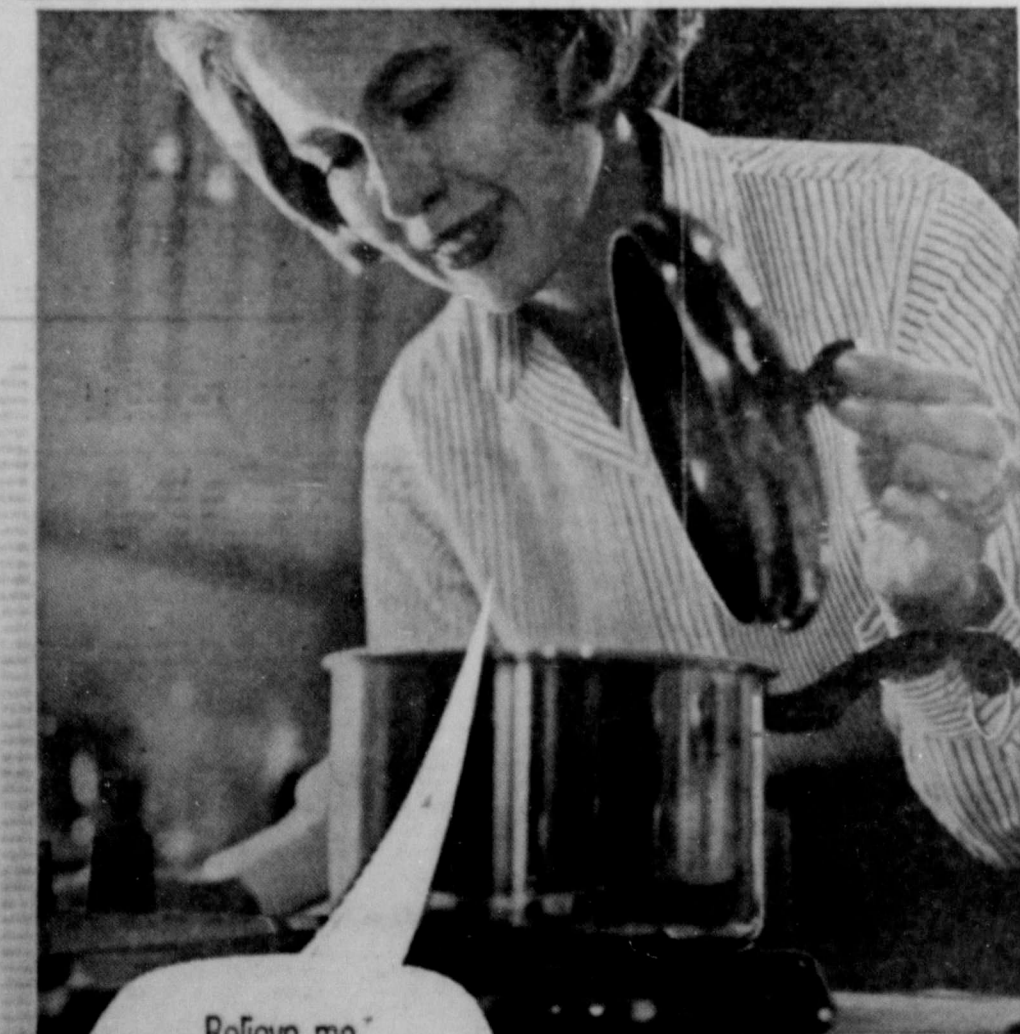

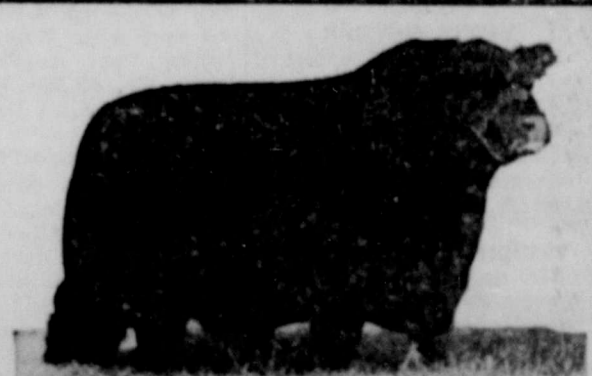
