The annual one-day "Cancer Crusade" of the Ranger chapter of the American Cancer Society was held Tuesday.

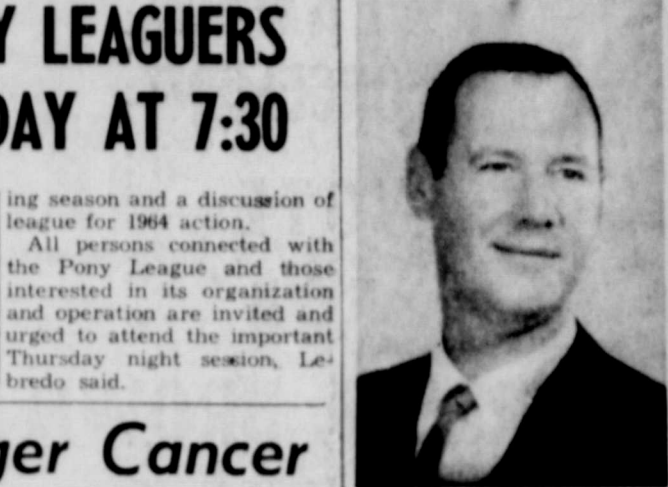
A complete report on the drive, including total of funds collected and educational materials distributed, will probably be available Friday.

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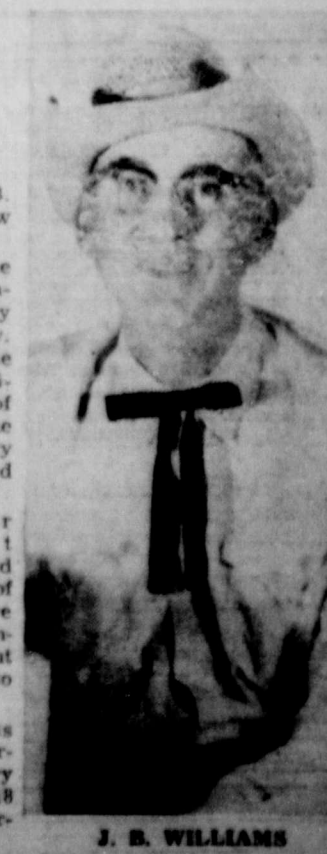

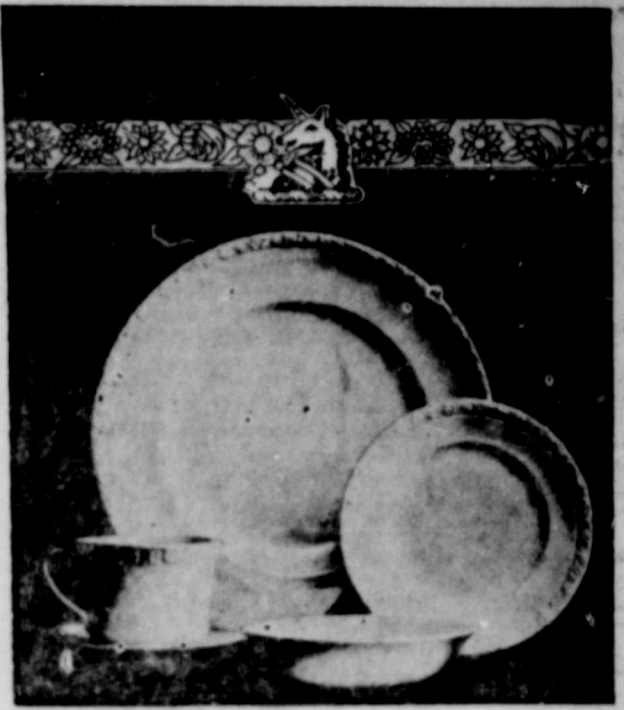

...of duties and conduct in office is a matter of public record, we feel that we are dedicated and qualified to render the type service which our citizens deserve and have a right to expect.

"I am not a politician. I am a law enforcement officer. My background includes three and a half years' experience as a constable, four months as a deputy under the late and esteemed John Hart, and 10 years as sheriff. During my three years' service in the U. S. Navy during World War II I was engaged in military police and law enforcement activity. I also spent 18 months as a security officer in the employ of Humble Oil & Refineries Co.

"Over these years we have had the opportunity to handle every type case from minor infractions of the law to major thefts, homicides, etc., and we thoroughly trained in all phases of law enforcement — book and procedures, including use of the polygraph, modern fingerprint identification and the latest scientific methods now employed in detecting and controlling crime.

I am in excellent health and top physical condition and my only hospitalization in recent years was for a hernia operation to correct an injury received while working at my ranch. Earlier this year a cataract was removed from my right eye and my vision is good.

His last assignment was on the Inspection Staff of the Ninth Air Force at Shaw Air Force Base, S. C.

He was a veteran of 15 years of active duty with the Army Air Corps and U.S. Army Air Force.

He is survived by his wife and two sons of Sumter, S. C.; his mother, Mrs. Willa Brock of Eastland; and two brothers, Howard M. Brock of Lake Jackson, Texas; and C. G. Brock of Arlington.

Air Force officers were trying to determine why the two C119 Flying Boxcars crashed. A spokesman at Clinton Air Force Base said it appeared the two planes "may have collided while on their approach to the airfield."

Others on the plane were crew members attached to the 907th Troop Carrier Group, 302nd Troop Carrier Wing at Clinton. Nine were Air Force Reservists, while one man was in the Air Force, assigned to the 9th Air Force and based at Shaw AFB in South Carolina.

McLendon Plans Much Travel In Drive For Votes

Gordon McLendon concentrated his fire on the pending civil rights bill in the waning days of his campaign for the Democratic nomination for U. S. Senator.

He followed a schedule designed to reach, through personal contact and communications media, the greatest possible number of voters before the May 2 primary. His itinerary calls for thousands of miles of travel into all sections of the State by plane and helicopter.

"My opposition to the bill being debated in the Senate actually is a crusade for civil rights," he declared. "I'm not in favor of denying any of our citizens the rights granted them by the Constitution, but I am against the passage of

this bill because certain sections of it threaten the civil rights of all citizens. Those provisions would deny everyone, regardless of race or national origin, the right of trial by jury and deprive us all of control over our property — including our very homes.

"Some of the people who are demanding the passage of this bill, without changing a word or a punctuation mark, evidently are misled. But I am convinced that the leaders who are mapping the strategy of this high-power campaign know exactly what they are doing. They see in this bill, with its disregard of fundamental civil liberties, another instrument of power over the lives of the American people."

McLendon emphasized that the only way of registering majority opinion on the principles involved in the campaign is to vote in the Democratic primary.

of Texas. Tentative time in most areas is 8:30 p.m. on CBS stations.

It is the first major appearance by the Governor of his re-election campaign. He has made a few non-political appearances over Texas, but mostly concentrated on ending to duties of the governorship at Austin.

In the half-hour program, to originate from the State Capitol, Governor Connally is expected to stress several high-

lights of his administration on which he has placed emphasis since taking office. Foremost is likely to be the field of education, which has been a frequent theme of his statements. At the governor's recommendation, the 58th Legislature authorized creation of the Committee on Education Beyond The High School, which currently is evaluating the state's educational resources and laying out a blueprint for the future.

The Governor also is expected to dwell on increased industry for Texas and point out that 317 new plants were built in the state last year — second only to New York. He also likely will point out that the state's new Texas 65 Health Plan provides low cost medical care for aged as a result of legislation passed last year. More than 50,000 elderly Texans enrolled in the plan the first thirty days.

Yarborough Asks Re-Election On Basis Of Record

"I seek re-election to the United States Senate on a record of accomplishment," Senator Ralph Yarborough said this week.

"I have been your Democratic United States Senator for seven years. In those seven years—working with and for the people of Texas—we have made major steps forward in education, agriculture, conservation, and many other areas."

Listed as major accomplishments by Sen. Yarborough are:

AGRICULTURE: Sen. Yarborough is a leading supporter of soil and water conservation programs, rural electrification and agricultural research. He co-authored the bill to cut foreign meat imports, and is now investigating depressed cattle prices.

VETERANS: 15 laws bearing Sen. Yarborough's name have been passed on behalf of veterans.

WATER CONSERVATION: Sen. Yarborough vigorously supports water conservation programs, such as the Saline Water Conversion Act of 1961, and of the dams rising across Texas—McGee Bend Dam (now the Sam Rayburn Dam), Sanford Dam of the Canadian

River, and Amistad Dam on the Rio Grande, and of numerous other water conservation projects.

NATIONAL DEFENSE: Sen. Yarborough advocates national defense by well-trained, well-equipped Army, Navy, Air Force and Marines. He supported the Military Pay Raise Acts of 1958 and 1963. He endorses our NATO Alliance and our defense pacts with free nations.

INTERNATIONAL AFFAIRS: Sen. Yarborough co-sponsored the Peace Corps Act, and supported the Nuclear Test Ban Treaty halting atmospheric testing. He was instrumental in getting Senate ratification of the Chamizal Treaty. He strongly supports the Alliance for Progress to combat communism in Latin America.

ECONOMIC ADVANCEMENT: Sen. Yarborough co-authored the Area Redevelopment Act of 1961, called "The Magna Carta of East Texas Economic Redevelopment." He worked for the Federal Airport Act of 1959 and the 1958 National Housing Act. He strongly supported the 1961 Housing Act—the most comprehensive program ever passed by the Congress. He battled for more help for elder citizens, old age pension increases and Social Security improvements.

FEDERAL EMPLOYEES: Sen. Yarborough has fought to maintain the efficiency of Federal service, and to provide pay scales comparable to those paid in private industry.

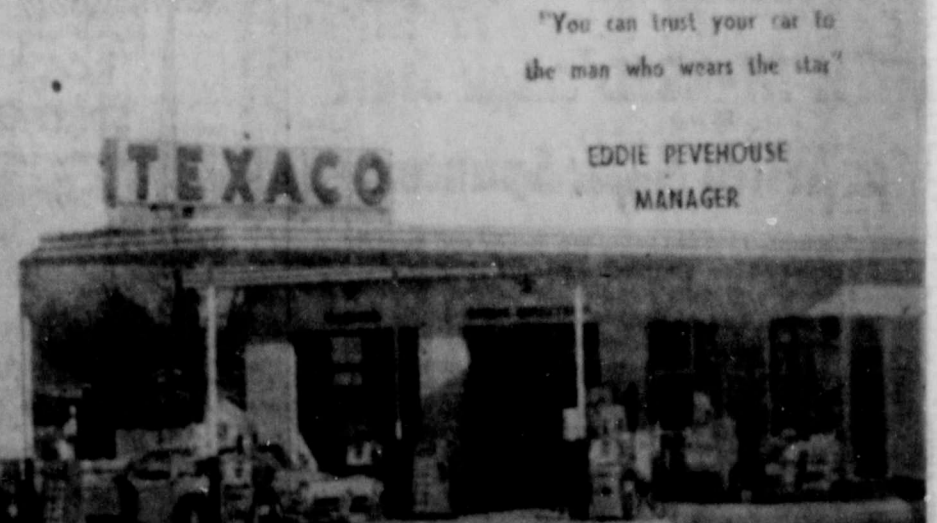

OMAR BURLESON

INCOME TAX REDUCTION
The income tax reduction bill that became effective in April of 1964 had the vote and support of OMAR BURLESON who has long felt that tax relief for the public was one of the most important issues before Congress.
