SUNDAY NIGHT'S rains brought more welcome moisture to Ranger and surrounding area. A check of the Times' rain gauge Monday morning showed that the nocturnal downpour totaled one and one half inches. Two Injured In Collision Near Ranger

Talmadge Lambert, 34-year-old Federal employee of Bedford who was seriously injured in a highway collision on Interstate 20 seven miles east of Ranger Tuesday morning about 9:45 a.m., was in "poor" condition Tuesday night in St. Joseph's Hospital in Fort Worth.

Lambert was first rushed to Ranger General Hospital in a Strawn ambulance and received emergency treatment in Ranger prior to being moved to Fort Worth.

The Bedford man was driving a Valiant and rammed into a trailer being pulled by a Texas Highway Dept. truck "at a walking pace," according to Texas Highway patrolmen who were summoned to the scene.

Also injured in the mishap was Willard Liles, 54-year-old Eastland man who is employed by the State Highway Dept. At the time of the crash, Liles was spraying grass near the trailer. He was slammed into a ditch. Last reports indicated he was "resting comfortably" in Eastland Memorial Hospital.

Harlin E. Benny of Route 1, Eastland, driver of the truck, was uninjured.

The driver of the light compact car suffered serious head injuries, bruises and lacerations. He underwent surgery in Fort Worth Tuesday night.

Blinn Wins First Place in TJCAC Track Meet RJC

Blinn Jr. College's track squad capped top honors in the Texas Junior College meet unreeled at Ranger Jr. College Monday and Tuesday. The event wound up Tuesday morning and the entries from Brenham scored twin relay victories along with speed performances by Gilbert Smith to amass 69 1/2 points. The Purple & White Rangers, hosting the meet, wound up third with 28 1/2 points and Cisco Jr. College was fifth with 23 1/2 points.

San Antonio was second to Blinn with 43 points and Schriener Institute, Kerrville, was second with 41 points. Smith led in individual scoring with 12 1/2 points, tied one record and established another. He blazed to a terrific 9.5 in the 100-yard dash to tie the standard set by Bruce Lang of Cisco in 1958. He then came back for a 21.2 clocking in the 220 around the curve for a new mark and ran the anchor leg on the winning sprint relay team.

Primaries Saturday May Attract 6,000 Voters

The voting places in Eastland County open at 8 a.m. Saturday and election workers are expected to be busy most of the day as area residents march in to cast ballots in the first primaries of this, a general election year. Calculated guesses are that from 5,700 to 6,000 people will vote Saturday in the dozen voting precincts in the county. There were 4,257 poll taxes sold in the county, plus 597 exemptions (which includes the "free" poll tax) and nine military permits.

Two off-setting factors are being considered in guesses on the total vote — one, that this is a general election year (in which a president will be voted on) which generally increases the turn-out, and secondly, that politics in Eastland County have been considered "generally quiet" this year in spite of several, contested races. So what will the total vote be? Well, no one wants to be pinned down — but somewhere near 6,000.

Past performance is always a usable yardstick in Eastland County where accurate reckoning is impossible because, with its population, all the exempt persons ("free 21s, and 65) are not required to vote can usually be depended on. In 1960 (also a general election year), 6,018 people voted. In 1962, 5,547 Democrats and 43 Republicans voted in the county. Town by town, Cisco will undoubtedly lead again. City Tax Equalization Boards Checking Rolls

The city's newly-appointed tax equalization board is making substantial progress in checking over the municipal tax rolls. Mayor Morris Newsham reported Wednesday morning. The board, he said, has about half-completed a perusal of the rolls to determine properties on which revaluations — upward or downward — will be made. Renditions, he said, should be based on 20 to 25 per cent of the actual value of the property. A spokesman for the tax equalization board said that "any citizen is welcome at any time to look over the city's tax roll." "Equalization means just what it says," he added. 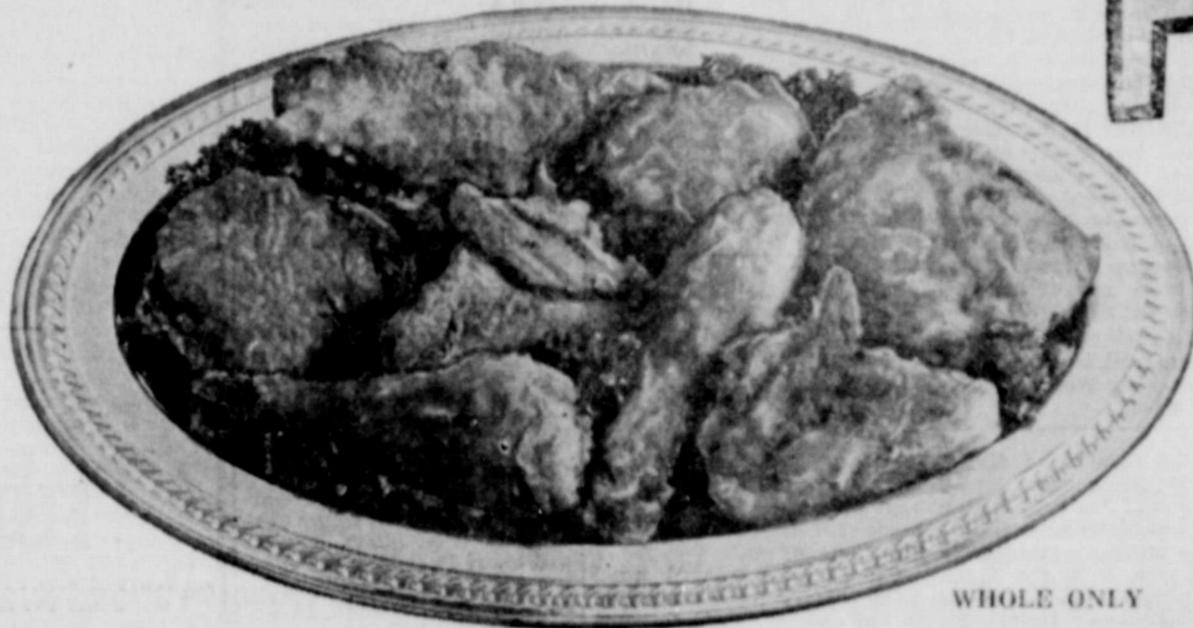

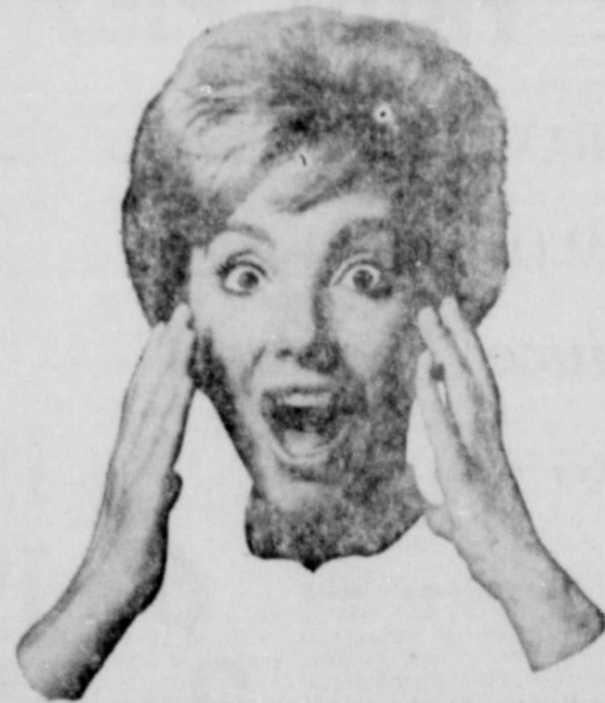

"Drink to Me Only With Thine Eyes" was presented in excellent taste, and the phrasing of this well-known little song was done with great finesse. "Dido's Song from the opera 'Dido and Aeneas,'" had much drama, as Dido is singing her lament for her husband's death. "Under the Greenwood Tree," a delightful madrigal-type song, was vivacious. The last songs in the group, sung in Italian, represents some of the best literature from this Italian song composer. Mrs. Frost's fine musicianship and beautiful stage presence were enhanced only by the warmth and quality of her voice.

Mrs. Frost was accompanied by the Eastland County String Group composed of Mrs. David Pickrell, violinist from Ranger, S. E. Hittson, violist from Cisco, and Tom Wilson, violoncellist from Eastland, with Ben K. Arnes from Breckenridge at the piano. The accompaniment by the strings was always in good taste and equal balance, and the color of the strings and piano greatly amplified the effect of the pieces, all composed in a time when an instrumental ensemble more often than keyboard accompanied the singer.

Two of the outstanding qualities of the choir are the blending of the voices into a balanced choral sound and the diction of the singers. The choir is composed of students with no choral experience before this year. They perform from memory and do not use music. The audience was highly pleased with the choir's performance, particularly with its rendition of "Dry Bones."

A special guest of the evening was Mr. Paul Englested, choral conductor in Fine Arts Department, McMurry College.

Attorney by the laws and constitution of the State of Texas.

"These specifically provide that no person shall be harassed by being tried unless the evidence tends to show his guilt beyond a reasonable doubt. There have been some difficult cases during the past two years, the prosecution of which has caused those provocative in their opposition to me.

"Statistics show that if convictions are obtained in 50 per cent of all cases filed, that is a good record. As your County and District Attorney, convictions have been obtained in 60 per cent of all cases filed in County and District Courts. Of the cases tried, before the Courts and juries, convictions have been obtained in 90 per cent of the cases submitted.

"Of the cases remaining on the dockets (with the excep-

tions of approximately 14 cases filed recently and stated for trial this summer), they are subject to dismissal for lack of sufficient evidence upon which to obtain a conviction.

"Last year, the Grand Jury, at my request, made an investigation of the court dockets, regarding the same, commended my record. Naturally I am very grateful for the vote of confidence given my office by such substantial citizens of Eastland County.

"If re-elected as County and District Attorney, I promise you a continued fair and impartial enforcement of the law, with the thought in mind that no person is above the law, and no person is below the law, and I shall ask permission of no one to enforce it.

"I will appreciate your vote on May 2nd.

EARL CONNER'S RECORD SPEAKS FOR ITSELF

Official Grand Jury Report

MARCH 28, 1964

TO THE HONORABLE T. M. COLLIE, JUDGE OF THE 91ST DISTRICT COURT OF EASTLAND COUNTY, TEXAS:

We, the Grand Jurors for the February Term, A. D. 1963, desire to submit our final report and upon acceptance of the same, we respectfully request that we be discharged for this term.

... When this Grand Jury was convened in early February, we had reason to feel concerned by reason of an article which appeared in the local newspapers on January 17, 1963. We have had occasion to investigate this matter and find that the newspaper article did not give a true picture of the situation, and we feel that the people of this county are entitled to a fair representation of the facts. Not having been advised of the number of cases filed, but only as to those remaining on the docket, we have checked into the matter very thoroughly and beg to report that from January 1, 1958 until today, the following is the record of the docket referred to in said article:

During the period of time from January 1, 1958 until March 28, 1963, 362 cases were placed upon the County Court docket, and they were disposed of as follows: 224 convictions; 57 cases transferred to District Court; 8 dismissals; 11 cases adopted by the Grand Jury, and 2 cases docketed in error, leaving 70 cases pending. In reviewing the cases still undisposed of, in our opinion, a very few of those cases would result in a conviction, if tried. There are a number of reasons why the great majority of the cases remaining on docket cannot be tried. Many involve invalid complaints, some of which are not even signed; many of the cases involve family fights, which were settled between the parties; many involve searches and seizures without a search warrant; in many of the cases no arrests have ever been made for the reason that the defendants have not been located, and many of the cases cannot be tried because of insufficient evidence.

During the period of time covered by our investigation, there has been turned in to the County Treasurer by the District Attorney's Department as fees of office the sum of \$105,845.70, and his report for March, 1963, will bring the total to \$106,937.20. We deem this a very fine record, and commend the District Attorney for his efforts.

The above report has been unanimously adopted by the Grand Jurors of the February Term of the 91st District Court of Eastland County, Texas.

Having completed our deliberations, we respectfully request that we be discharged.

If you can make bond in Eastland County you've "got it made."

Such would seem to be the case from a check of criminal cases on file in the county clerk's office. The ledgers reveal that there are 76 cases, some of which are five years old, which have not been brought to trial. All but 15 of the defendants are under bond.

Under the current setup, a person who is charged in county court has the option of pleading "guilty," and facing punishment, or pleading "not guilty" and having his case transferred to district court.

Apparently the list of 76 have not been brought for a pleading.

A delegation from Cisco, headed by Police Commissioner Roy M. Benton and Rev. G. W. French Jr., chairman of the ministers' Association, called on County Attorney Earl Conner and County Judge Scott Bailey last week.

Mr. Benton said they discussed the matter of city and county authorities working closer together in efforts to expedite the handling to completion those cases involving violations of liquor statutes.

Of the 76 cases are for possession of assorted intoxicants and 12 are for the actual sale of intoxicants. One other is for transporting.

The list of crimes runs the gamut from driving while intoxicated (9 counts) to procuring (1 count).

Bonds for the offenses vary from \$100 to \$1,500.

Eighteen of the cases date from 1958; five from 1959; eight from 1960; 26 from 1961; and 19 from 1962.

Asked this week about the backlog of cases, Conner called the list "typical" and said that satisfactory arrangements have been made on many of the cases, and that these should be removed from the files.

Some representative cases include:

A Ranger man was charged on Jan. 2, 1958 with possession of liquor for sale. He made a \$500 bond on the same day and hasn't been tried yet.

Another Ranger man was charged on the last day of January, 1958, with sale of whiskey. He made a \$500 bond four days later. On August 17, 1960, he was charged with possession of intoxicating beverages, and made a \$1,000 bond. He hasn't been tried on either account.

A Cisco woman was booked and charged with aggravated assault on March 3, 1958. The incident allegedly happened in the Cisco post office. She made bond for a \$1,000. No trial yet.

A Stephens County man was charged on March 13, 1961 with attempt to kidnap an Eastland man at gunpoint. The defendant made a \$1,000 bond on the same day.

By types of crime, the 76 cases since 1958, run like this:

Possession of liquor for sale, 6; driving with license suspended, 2; sale of whiskey, 3; driving while intoxicated, 9; worthless checks, 1; theft under \$50, 1; aggravated assault, 7; swindling, 7; shooting game illegally, 2; malicious prosecution, 1; swindling with worthless checks, 2; failure to surrender driver registration and auto plants, 1; possession of beer for sale, 3; possession of intoxicating beverages, 2; possession of whiskey for sale, 1; defacing a public building, 1; attempt to kidnap at gunpoint, 2 (same person, sale of liquor, 7; sale of alcoholic beverages, 3; possession of wine for sale, 1; transportation of beer in dry area, 1; assault on a woman, 2; displaying a pistol, 1; carrying a pistol, 2; misuse of dealer's metal plates, 1; child desertion, 1; and procuring for immoral purposes, 1.

Total amount of bonds in the untried cases exceeds 36,000. None were cash bonds.

The year-old assault-to-murder case scheduled to be tried Monday in 91st District Court will be watched with a great deal of interest.

Not for the case itself, but for an indication of the movement of the wheels of justice in the county.

Only 22 criminal cases were tried last year.

The case set for Monday, which was postponed twice in 1962, is one 114 untried criminal cases pending in the court.

Cases set next week are among the 114 untried criminal cases pending in the court.

Seven of the 22 were jury tried and 15 were non-jury cases.

Five criminal cases were dismissed last year, as well as 94 civil cases.

Juries heard four civil cases, and 55 were non-jury cases.

A total of 83 of the 114 untried cases stem from grand jury indictments and the remainder come to the court as transfers from justice, county and out-of-county courts, including three from Duvall County, filed in 1955 for misappropriation of public money.

(The Duval cases are still on the local books because prosecuting attorneys from that county and/or the state attorney general's office didn't appear.)

Of the 114 cases, one dates from 1952; one from 1953; one from 1954; three from 1955; 13 from 1956; 14 from 1957; 8 from 1958; 20 from 1959; 20 from 1960; 18 from 1961; and 14 from 1962.

Name a crime and the chances are it will be listed among the 114 cases . . . from wife desertion to operating a semi-trailer without a license.

Burglary is the most prevalent offense among those on file — 22 cases.

Divorces appear to be easy to get in this county — 75 were granted in 1962 and not a single one tried was denied.

Three annulments were also granted.

However, after working all year, the court was still three divorce cases further behind at the end of the year, than at the beginning.

On Jan. 1, 1962, 56 divorce cases were pending; 87 new cases were filed during the year; 75 were granted; and nine were dismissed — yeaving a back-log on Dec. 31 of 59 cases.

The court started last year with 70 tax cases pending; tried none and had none added; ending '62 with the same 70.

There were 148 civil cases pending on Jan. 1 last year. During the year, 124 new ones were filed. Even with the 59 that were tried and the 94 that were dismissed, the court still ended up with 119 pending at year's end.

The court had 141 criminal cases on file during 1962 — 110 carried over from the preceding year and 31 new ones filed or transferred in.

Five dismissals and the 22 trials totaled 27 disposals, leaving the 114 still to go.

Statistically, 100 of the criminal cases have been on the books for over a year without trial; 82 for more than two years; and 34 for more than 5.

By offense, here is the way the pending cases tally out.

Habitual corpus, 2; swindling with worthless check, 6; driving while intoxicated, 8; theft, 11; misappropriation of public money, 3 (Duval); removing mortgaged property, 1; wife desertion, 3; false swearing, 1; worthless checks, 1; altering a prescription, 1; exposing private parts to a minor, 1; felony swindling, 1; forgery and passing, 2;

Speeding (first and second offense), 8; theft by false pretense, 1; burglary, 22; operating a semi-trailer illegally, 1; theft over \$50, 3; concealing stolen property, 1; forgery, 6; selling alcoholic beverages, 2; carrying gun, 1; negligent homicide, 1; disturbing peace, 1; disposing of mortgaged property, 1; swindling, 2;

Removing mortgaged property from county, 3; aggravated assault, 1; possession of alcoholic beverages for sale, 5; passing forged instrument, 1; obtaining money by false pretense, 1;

Cutting-in after passing, 1; assault with intent to rape, 2; parking on roadway, 1; no Texas registration, 1; threat to kill, 1; drunk in public place, 2; enticing child for immoral purposes, 1; assault with intent to murder, 1; and child desertion, 1.

Two sale-of-whiskey cases were transferred to 91st District Court from County Court, Jan. 15, and nine (including four DWI's, 2 possessions and four sales cases) were transferred on Jan. 3.

A recent check of records in County Court showed 76 untried cases pending there.

One of the cases, an assault with intent to rape, filed in 1960, was brought to trial once and ended in a mistrial because of sepearation of the jury — and now awaits trial.

There aren't many attorneys in Eastland County — but the records show that for the most part each one is a mighty busy professional.

A check of civil suits filed in the 91st District Court during the past three years reveals that attorneys in this county have filed 490 "brand new cases" since Jan. 1, 1960.

Number per year has dropped but very little. In 1960, 169 new civil suits were filed; 159 in 1961; and 155 in 1962.

These represent cases in which the attorneys have been engaged as lawyers for plaintiffs only and not cases where they accept cases for defense.

Dewey Cox of Ranger and Frank Sparks of Eastland were almost tied for most cases filed, and lead their associates in the county. Cox filed the larger number for the three-year period — 96, followed closely by Sparks with 92.

Cisco Attorney W. B. (Bill) Wright wasn't far behind in third place with 72 cases.

County Attorney Earl Conner, Jr. ranked fourth in the county for the three-year period with 66 civil cases on file.

Veteran Eastland Attorney Allen Dabney had 51 cases; and R. E. Grantham of Cisco, 44. Virgil T. Seaberry, filing under the firm name of Turner and Seaberry of Eastland, had 19. Perry Brown of Rising Star had 14 cases for the past two years, because the records show no cases filed by him in 1960. The Eastland firm of Frost & Frost had 13 cases.

The husband and wife law firm of Mangum and Mangum of Rising Star has 8 cases on file in this court.

L. R. Pearson and Beverly Dudley, both of Ranger, and J. M. Parker, 92 year-old Gorman attorney, each have five cases on file during the past three years.

Oil Production Increase Is Aim Of Jim Langdon

AUSTIN — Land owners were assured this week by Railroad Commissioner Jim C. Langdon that he favors greater oil production in Texas.

Although the Railroad Commission cannot consider prices (only physical waste), he said, it was logical to assume that the greater the production the bigger the royalty checks for several hundred thousand land owners in the state.

However, if production exceeds demand, then the price of oil decreases. Any excessive over-production, such as occurred in the 30's in East Texas when oil sold for 10 cents a barrel, will cut deeply into the checks received by owners of mineral rights in land from which Texas' oil and gas are produced, Langdon said.

"A market demand law prevents the production of more oil than can be sold," Langdon said. "This guards against economic waste by instituting a system of sound conservation."

Langdon repeated this week that he is opposed to excessive foreign imports, but unfortunately imports are controlled by the Federal government, and not by the Texas Railroad Commission. He said he was against federal control of petroleum.

"The platform that my opponent in this race is advocating amounts to a program of deliberate waste. It is a program of anti-conservation that would depress oil prices and certainly have an economic effect in all parts of the state," Langdon said.

As for lower crude prices making gasoline cheaper to consumers, Langdon said the opposite effect would result. "Many independent operators are having a hard time staying in business at present prices," Langdon said. "We would have fewer and fewer companies controlling more and more of our oil, thereby creating a monopoly-type situation."

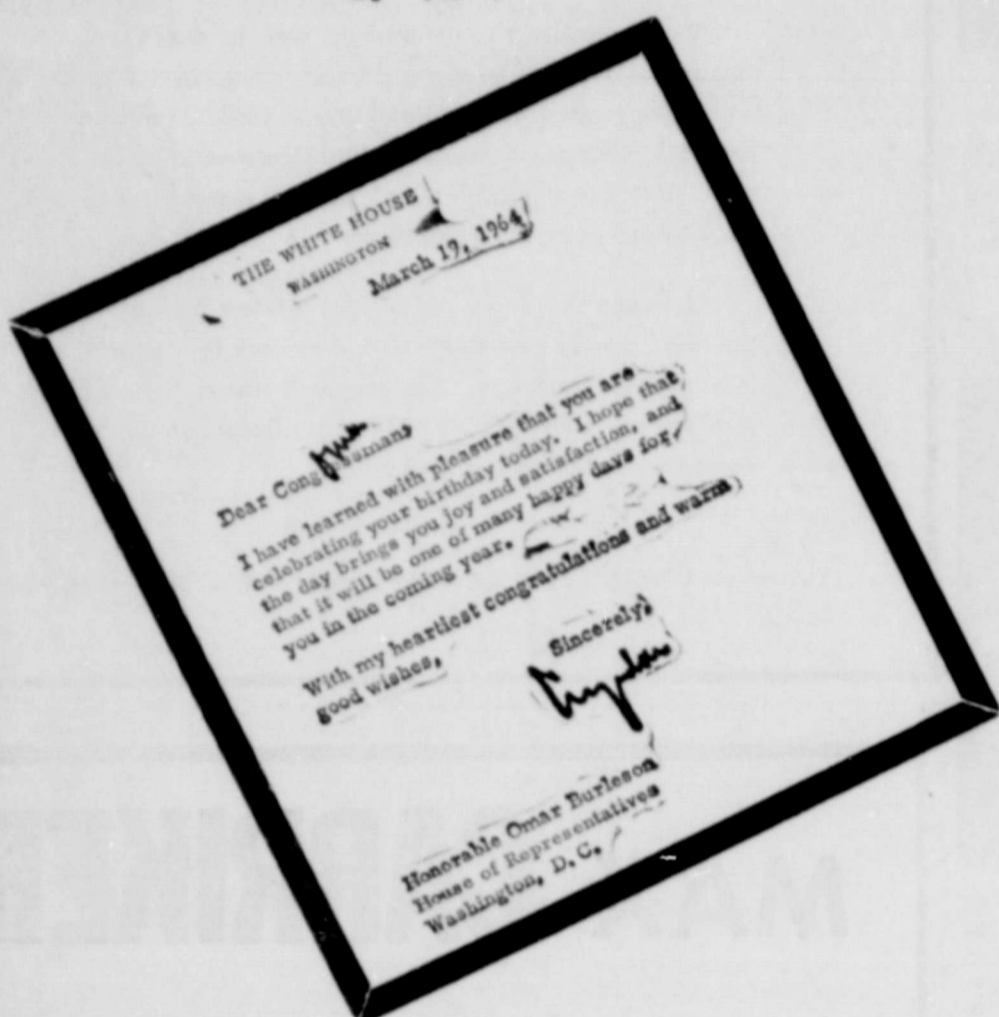

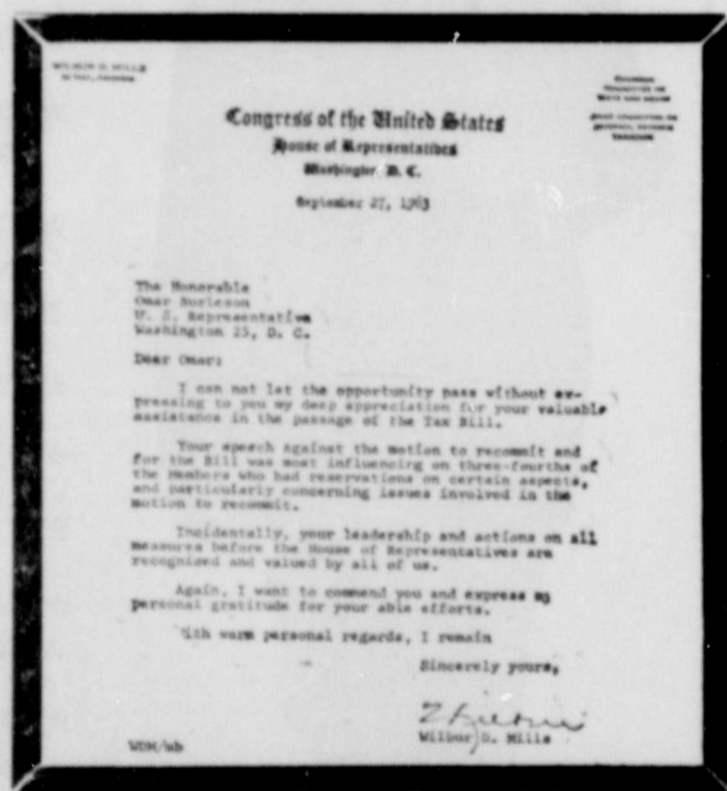

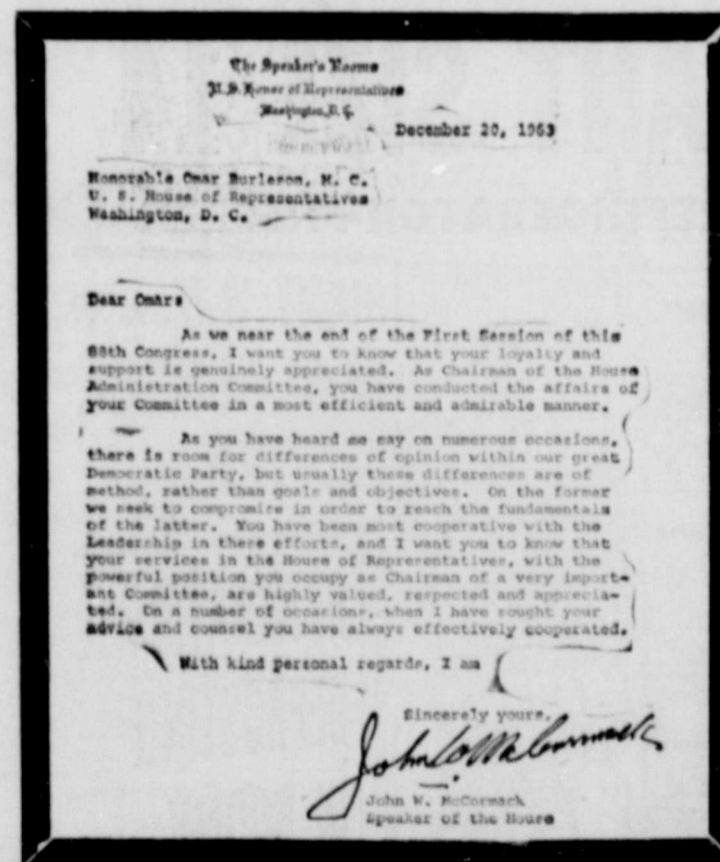
