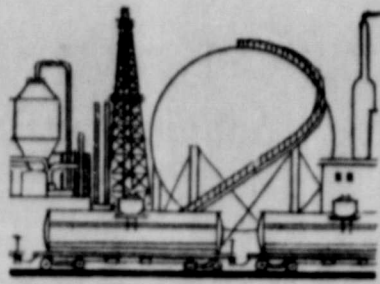

We think our readers will be interested in the statistical data contained therein and we continue:
The auto is far and away America's favored mode of travel, and visiting friends or relatives is the main reason a good portion of all trips are taken, according to Harry C. Meyers, Director of the U. S. Department of Commerce Field Office in Dallas.
Results of a travel survey covering the first half of 1963 just published by the Department's Bureau of the Census show that during those six months the American public made 122 million trips, 100 million of them by auto. (A trip is travel by one or more members of a household going either out of town overnight or longer, or to a place at least 100 miles away.)
Of the 122 million trips: 47 million were to visit friends or relatives; 30 million for business purposes; 21 million for sightseeing or recreation; and 24 million for attending college, being hospitalized, changing residence, and the like.
Approximately 8 out of 10 trips were to destinations within the same geographic region. Since residents of the Western States can travel farther and still be in their own region than can residents of the Nation's other three regions, it is to be expected that the West lead in the proportion (89 percent) of all trips

Light Vote Due Runoff Primary Next Saturday

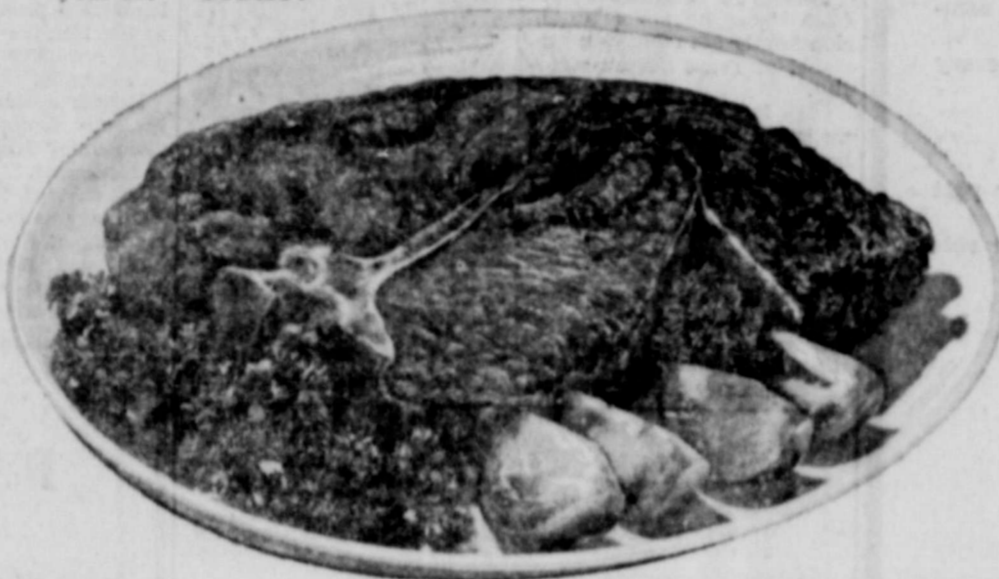

Suicide Is 10th Leading Cause Of Death In Texas

COLLEGE STATION — The tenth leading cause of death in Texas last year was suicide.

This grim reminder comes from Patsy Reynolds, Extension family life education specialist at Texas A&M University.

"It's ironic in a time when we spend so much money and have made so much progress against dread diseases such as tuberculosis that suicides should outrank deaths from many of these diseases," the specialist said.

Records of the Texas State Department of Health show that men took their lives three times as frequently as women. Ninety-six per cent of the sui-

cides were of the white race, and the period from 45 to 55 years of age produced the most deaths.

These facts support national research on the subject, Miss Reynolds explains. The

typical suicide appears to be a white male between 45 and 55 and the time of suicide appears to be between seven and 11 o'clock on a bright sunny Monday morning. He probably has a family, but few close friends. He may belong to a club, but the chances are he doesn't attend regularly.

Most people are not prepared to counsel with a mentally disturbed person who may be contemplating suicide. "Yet we can take anyone seriously who mentions suicide, and try to see that they talk to a physician, social worker, or minister. We can take time to talk to the person who doesn't seem to have a great many friends, and we can listen to their problems," the specialist said.
