MICHAEL HERRINGTON, son of Mrs. Doris Herrington of Ranger, recently enlisted in the Peace Corps. He inherits his love of adventure from his great-great-grandfather, Charles Culpepper Blair, Eastland County pioneer, reports Ranger's widely known historian, Mrs. Ethel Brookes Gilmore.

Blair was born in Ireland and came to America when he was 27 years old. He settled first in Georgia, but soon went to Alabama, and then to Tennessee. Finally he moved to Eastland County where he established a ranch and trading post. This was actually a fort and was known as Fort Blair. Built in 1860 and used for about four years, it was located close to a creek bank now included in the town of Desdemona.

Early historians placed the location of the fort seven miles from Mansker's Lake at a period of time in which Desdemona was not in existence, Mrs. Gilmore says.

But the description didn't fit his wife. The woman's "lost" husband was found later in Monahans but as far as is known the man with the "lost" wife still hasn't been reunited with her.

Pointing out, Sgt. Sosebee says, that people traveling across country together should decide on a pre-determined plan and route, so that each will be at a certain place at a certain time. It is near impossible, he says, for two vehicles, traveling in the same direction to stay together on modern highways. With changing traffic patterns, one is sure to lose sight of the other.

And traveling bumper-to-bumper is just as dangerous, he reports. In that case, you have collisions between the two — and these types of accidents are frequent. So if you're traveling in tandem, plan your trip and set up check-points.

Registration for the first semester of summer school at Ranger Junior College will begin at 6 p.m., Monday, June 8, in the Fine Arts Building. Classes will begin at 6 p.m., June 9, and will be held Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday evenings of each week from 6 until 11:05 p.m.

Courses to be offered on the RJC campus include American national government, freshman English (grammar and composition), sophomore English ("Masterpieces of World Literature"), elementary accounting, American history, beginning typewriting, and introduction to business.

Students may earn up to 14 hours credit during the summer. Credits are transferrable to senior college.

A summer session will also be maintained by the college in Breckenridge with members of the regular college faculty conducting the classes.

Plumley Resigns C-C Post; Directors Map New Future Projects

Roy R. Plumley, retired Army Colonel, has resigned as manager of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce. Plumley had held the position since Jan. 8, 1962.

His resignation was formally presented to the chamber's board of directors during a special called meeting Monday night.

Plumley's formal letter, dated May 26, was read to the board by W. T. Eaton, president of the Ranger organization.

"I herewith submit to you my resignation as manager of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce to become effective 31 May 1964," Plumley's statement said.

"The past two and a half years as the manager of the Chamber has been a wonderful thing for me and I am proud of our accomplishments."

"If in the future I am needed, you know where I'll be — and just call me. If you ever need a director for your board let me know. I'll serve the best way I can."

"I regret the time is so short that I have given you to replace me," the statement concluded, "but I cannot serve in this capacity any longer than the date I have set."

The board voted to send a letter to Plumley expressing its appreciation for his work during the past two and a half years.

Plumley Candidate School at Fort Benning, Georgia in 1942 as a second lieutenant. After graduation, he served at Camp Robinson and Camp Bowie. In December 1943, Plumley was sent to England and entered France at Omaha Beach, 10 days after D-Day, during World War II, as a member of an armored division.

He was commissioned as a first lieutenant in April, 1943 and achieved the rank of captain in September, 1944. On April 12, 1945, he was wounded in action while fighting with his unit near the Czechoslovakian border, and was returned to Brooks General Hospital at Fort Sam Houston, where he was hospitalized for nine months.

In 1946 he was stationed in the Philippine Islands for six months. From that assignment he was sent to Korea where he remained until the end of 1947.

In 1947 Plumley resigned his commission and re-enlisted as a master sergeant. He was commissioned as a captain in 1948 and sent to Palestine for six months as a representative of the United Nations in the diplomatic service. While there he visited many countries in the Holy Land.

Returning to Fort Hood in 1950, he was assigned to the 2nd Tank Battalion. He served with this unit during the Conflict in Korea from August 1950 until November, 1956. He was promoted to the rank of major while serving in Korea.

Upon returning to the states he was stationed in Washington, D.C. for three years. He attended a four-months course at the Advanced Officers School in 1955, and in 1956 he was assigned to a tank battalion in Mannheim, Germany for one year. Col. Plumley's wife and children accompanied him on this assignment.

He served as supply officer at Mannheim for another year and was assigned as commander of a tank battalion in Germany until December 1957, when he and his family returned to Fort Hood, Texas.

He assumed command of the 67th Tank Battalion at Fort Hood in 1958. In 1959 he was commissioned a lieutenant colonel and served as executive officer at Fort Hood until retirement on January 31, 1961.

Among the decorations received by Plumley while serving in the army are the Bronze Star with four clusters, Purple Heart with two clusters, French Croix de Guerre with two palms, and ten campaign stars for World War II and Korean combat.

Lake Bernie Dam Cutting Is Scheduled For Sunday

Everyone Invited To Watch Event

A contractor will complete the job of cutting the dam at Lake Bernie, three miles north of Cisco, this Sunday afternoon to drain the lake and make way for a cleanup operation, according to Mayor John H. Webb.

Plans to cut the dam last Sunday were abandoned after rain made the dam area too slippery for heavy machinery.

Fishermen from throughout the region — an estimated 500 — visited the lake last Sunday to be on hand for possible trapping big fish as the water receded. They were invited back this Sunday. With water starting to flow around noon, it will be mid-afternoon before it will be low enough for fish trapping, Mr. Webb said.

The lake will be allowed to dry out and then machinery will move in to clear it of cuttings and silt. A huge gate will be installed in the cut to permit periodic draining of the region — an estimated 500 — visited the lake last Sunday to be on hand for possible trapping big fish as the water receded.

When the cleaning operation is finished the lake will be stocked with bass, crappie and catfish. They will be flushed down a two-mile creek annually to Lake Cisco. Mayor Webb expected to see huge catfish and other varieties as the water goes down. The 75-acre lake has never been dry and it is over 50 years old. Huge bass have been frequently taken there.

A Modern Miracle . . .

Scranton Woman's Son Alive After Being Crushed By Car

In a day when the miracles of the space age continue to astound and the accomplishments of man appear unlimited, Mrs. Boyd James of Scranton tells of a miracle so intricate and delicate that no man would take credit for its performance.

On Saturday, May 23, in Imperial, Calif., Tex James, son of Mr. and Mrs. Boyd James, was working on his Oldsmobile in front of his home at 115 W. 5th St., Mrs. Boyd reported. The car fell off the jack and pinned his head on the tool box, against which he had rested his head as he worked.

His wife, Edythe, realizing that she could not help, started to the house to telephone for help, and as she glanced back she saw a clean but shabbily dressed man by the car. He wore a cap and his

hair was grey at the temples.

"Help me, please. My husband is dying," the woman implored, but the man disappeared without answering, she said later. She ran into the house and summoned the police and fire departments, and when she went outside again her husband was crawling on the lawn. Later, Mrs. James recounted, her son's wife told her she had seen a man by the car and it must have been a guardian angel who helped him.

Tex James, with skull crushed and jaw bones broken, told of seeing the same man, and "it was Jesus," he said, "standing in front of the car. He told me to place my hands with palms up against the car, and when I did, the car raised up, and I crawled out from under it."

Closing cuts on Tex's face with 28 stitches, the doctors gave his wife no hope that he would live.

It was a miracle, they said, that he had not already died. X-rays showed at least nine head fractures, and his jaw bones were broken in several pieces.

A specialist called in from New York decided to wire the jaw bones together, but to his astonishment he found that they had already begun to knit. Instead of the nine pieces shown in the X-ray, Mrs. James said, the specialist found his skull splintered in "a thousand pieces." However, it appeared that a surgeon had been there before him, as the pieces were in place and had also begun to knit back together.

On Wednesday after the accident, Tex James, who had been blind in one eye before the accident, lost the sight of his other eye. But in a letter received by his mother from his wife this week, following her return from California, she was told that he was beginning to see in his eye that had been blind originally.

Doctors express amazement about his recovery, Mrs. James said, and disclaim any credit for his rapid improvement. Mrs. James planned to leave for California this week to stay with her son while he recovers.

Jet planes soar, satellites orbit the earth, and man may reach the moon someday, but these performances hold no magic for the James family. They have witnessed a miracle that all the ingenuity of man could not produce.
