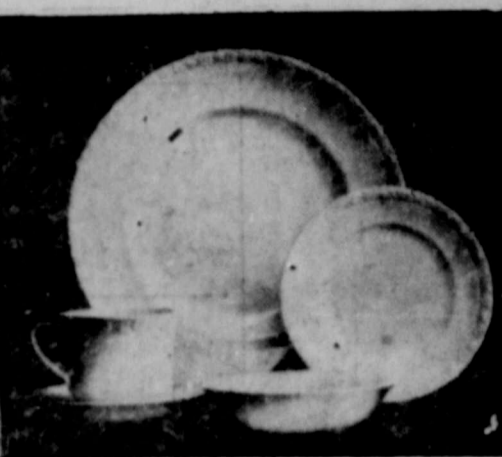

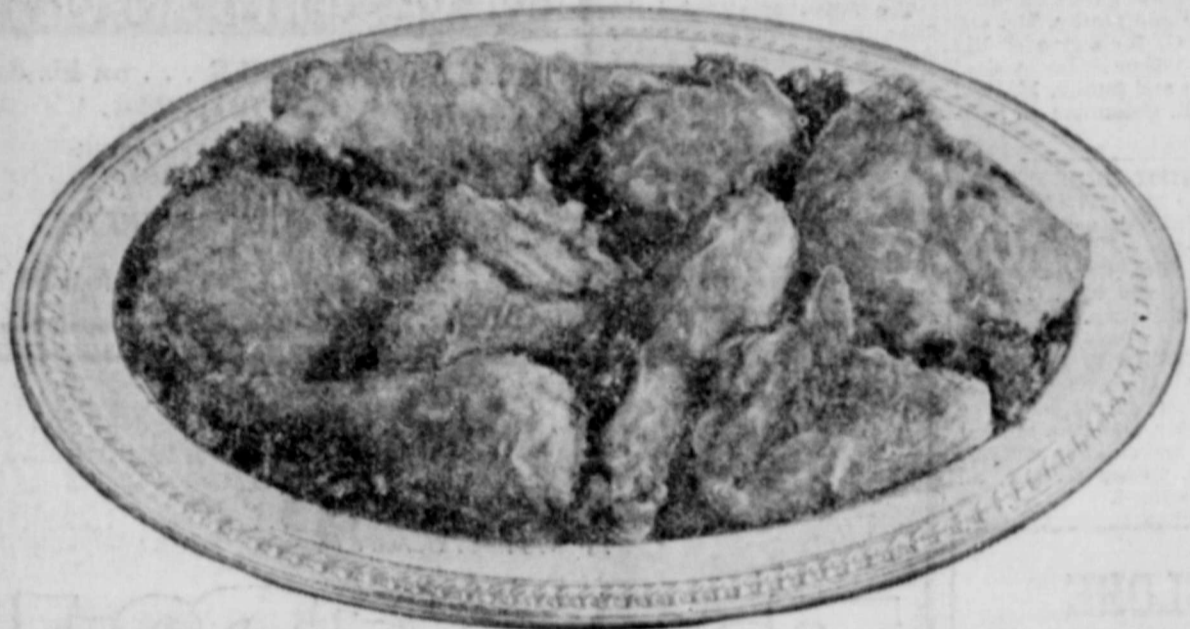

neatly remove a portion of the rear of Brownie's Liquor Store they remained at the scene of the burglary.

The cases all have nearly identical patterns, including the fact that there have been no fingerprints and the person or persons unknown either had earlier safely fled or successfully eluded pursuing officers and disappeared into the night. In none of the above cited cases had there ever been any hint or report of any possible identification.

There are several logical theories among concerned Ranger citizens:

1—Someone familiar with local police procedure has been craftily conniving to cast a reflection of the department through a series of premeditated incidents which would receive publicity in the local press. (This was evident in the Ervin Jewelry burglary where a few rings—valued at

\$1200-\$1500 — were taken when abundant other easy-to-dispose-of loot was readily available. Also, the deliberate leaving of print-free tools at the scene.)

2—Some member of the police department, in league with local person or persons unknown, is aiding and abetting the person or persons unknown actually committing the crimes.

3—Some person or persons unknown, a resident or residents of Ranger, who are thoroughly familiar with every possible means of entry into local business establishments down to the nth degree (including how to take out a portion of the rear of a liquor store and coolly, calmly, leisurely remove \$6,500 worth of bottled spirits.)

The latter theory is probably most substantially supported by the amazing and

even fantastic burglary of Brownie King's Liquor Store, Highway 80 east, somewhere between the hour of closing time 10 p.m., Friday, May 1, and dawn on Saturday, May 2 (election day) when the store remained closed until 8 p.m. in compliance with law.

Not only did the brazen thieves clean out the liquor-laden (in case cartons) storeroom, but they had the brass and effrontery to go up into the front of the store—located on a highly-traveled major coast-to-coast highway — and brave the risk of the probing spotlight of a patrolling officer.

This was the jackpot take. They hauled away about 100 cases of liquor. And it takes more than a pickup to move that size load. Probably a 1½-ton truck, and that's mighty impossible to hide.

The Eastland County sher-

iff's department, augmenting investigative work by Chief Ogden and associates, investigated and probed. And so did officers of the Texas Liquor Control Board. But—not a clue.
