New Ranger Theft Spurs Police Investigation Of Unsolved Burglary Cases

Another case was added to Ranger's list of unsolved burglaries and break-ins over the weekend, but Wednesday morning Police Chief Ogden said "much progress" was being made in an extensive investigation of the thefts.

He made no further comment except to state that he believes the burglaries are "locally planned and executed." Sheriff Lee Horn and Deputy Sheriff Lefty Sublett of Eastland, he said, are assisting in the investigation.

Saturday morning at 8:30 a. m. Mayor Morris Newnam, owner of Ranger Frozen Food Center, called police and reported that between \$300 and \$400 in cash had been taken from the cash register in the office of the meat processing plant.

The cash register drawer was open, Mayor Newnam said, and all the bills were missing. The silver however remained in the drawer. There was no evidence of a break-in or forced entry, Chief Ogden said Sunday.

Officers declined comment Tuesday, but they said they had two "prime suspects."

At the State Democratic Convention held in Houston last week Eastland County worked for, and obtained more recognition than has ever been received by the county, or any other county of its size in the state.

Under the leadership of Grady Hogue of Cisco, and with only 9 votes on the convention floor, Eastland County was successful in electing Richard Moore of Cisco as Presidential Elector; Vonnell Hopper of Ranger as alternate delegate to the National Convention and she also served as convention secretary June 17 at the Congressional District Caucus. And Dr. G. A. Dunn Jr. of Rising Star was a member of the committee to elect Presidential electors.

The Eastland County delegation voted in favor of the resolutions presented by the State executive committee, a roll-call vote by counties, and a tribute to Governor John Connally.

A spokesman for the Ranger delegates stated that the entire Eastland County group worked hard and long, with lots of sleep, loss of tempers, and loss of everything but loud voices, to be recognized.

It was the pleasure of various members of the delegation to visit with Governor Connally, Senator Ralph Yarborough, Congressman Omar Burleson, State Senator Tom Creighton, and State Representative Wayne Gibbins.

Well Gauged Near Ranger

A re-entry project has been completed as a producer three miles south of Ranger in Eastland County Regular Field.

It is W. V. Edwards Associates of Wichita Falls No. 1 Lena Jones, located in S. Matthias Survey.

Daily potential was 35.67 barrels of 42.6 gravity oil. The well is pumping from 80 perforations at 3,353-73 feet after being treated with 15,000 gallons of acid frac. The 4 1/2 inch casing is set at 3,472 feet.

Total depth was 3,478 feet, plugged back to 3,460 feet.

Suit Is Filed Over Farm Land Near Gorman

A California woman has sued her ex-husband and her former father-in-law, both residents of Eastland County, for \$24,858 and one-fourth interest in 144 acres of farm land.

Mrs. Faye L. Westmoreland Kravagna, El Segundo, Calif., named Aubrey E. Westmoreland and his father, Wiley G. Westmoreland, in a suit filed in U.S. District Court in Abilene.

Mrs. Kravagna asks \$13,500 for 13 1/2 years' rental on the land in question, plus the return to her of that land. She also sued for \$11,358 in child support for her three daughters.

Abilene lawyer Jack Yates, who filed the suit for Mrs. Kravagna, said the 144 acres is located near Gorman. California records show that Mrs. Kravagna was divorced from Aubrey Westmoreland in 1953. A former Eastland County resident, Mrs. Kravagna claims her ex-husband deeded the 144 acres to his father in December, 1950.

Ranger business firms were closed during the rites in final tribute to the popular businessman who died Monday morning at 9:30 o'clock in Ranger General Hospital.

Mr. Adams suffered a heart attack a short time earlier at his food store, H. G. Adams Grocery & Market, owned and operated by he and his son, H. G. Adams Jr.

He had been in the grocery business in Ranger for 45 years.

foot of Main Street to recall how it started.

Snidleton had blown the Twentieth Century in — on oil. The others — Sour Lake to Electra and Oklahoma — gave the engine time to catch up. There is a Model-T assembly line. For rowdy, unregulated Oil, time new for the big one! World War I needs it.

Ranger is a one - street, board-fronted town under the bare hills. There are Saturday band concerts and traveling shows for entertainment. Ranger is lucky to be neighbor to big, coal-mining Thurber.

Lucky indeed! Texas and Pacific Coal is ready to try oil on 25-cent-an-acre Ranger leases. On a brisk October Saturday of 1917, atop a mesquite hogback on the McClellan farm, Ranger Pool's No. 1 blows wild-thick, gree-black top crude. The marker is back from the road west of town.

"I was out here then," Hall Walker said. "Oil shot up and ran over the hill. We tried to dig it, but it just poured down that draw, all across the road."

In bare months, a thousand population mushrooms to 40,000 — give or take, according to what time of a frenzied 24-hour day. From Pennsylvania, they come — roustabouts and carpenters, financiers and promoters, lawyers and landmen, drillers and drovers, mule-skinner and chauffeurs, gamblers and women.

Rainbow's End is a shack, tent and wagon-top city. A hotel out in the hall costs \$10; a lobby chair, \$5. You buy a drink of water and sleep in shifts. If you sleep. Bedlam in who-cranking, drill-thudding, steam-hissing, shouting, sulfur-smelling, gas-flaring, flaring! The walks jam with landmen, cards in hats and sandwich — boarded. Dirt streets jam, too — questmire to the axes, tugged by Percheron or Kentucky Jack. You can walk across wagon to wagon or sled Main Street's mud for a dollar.

Cabaret Row, down from the Gohlson, has the Grizzly Bear, Blue Mouse and Oklahoma, and five killings in one day. A judge fines a shooting \$75. Evangelist Billy Sunday is down, exhorting the likes of Slippery Sal.

Everybody's pot-o-gold! Even Cowboy Evans hit after 40 unbroken dusters. So everybody buys — Heavyweight Champ Jess Willard to John Ringling to Harry Sinclair to a new outfit called Humble Oil. Ex-President Taft can walk unnoticed.

Who has time to notice? You listen to the cardboard walls and whisky talk and

Shoot the wells and the works! Shooter Jack Rann feels his well going under 20 quarts of nitro he is lowering. He catches the bomb riding on the rubber and can walk away. A driller in a \$25 silk shirt celebrates his well, lights a cigar and blows his rig. An auto backfire levels a tent camp. One oil-rich farmer moves three times to get away from oil; it follows each time. Another, watching his well blow in, stands numbly, trying to sweep the black oil from his doorstep.

Now, three years, night and day, \$1 billion spent; over 80,000 barrels a day rush at each. Out to 35 counties, now this field... plumb gloomed over, oil!

Then, the one that came in, producing 2,000 barrels a day. And the celebratory wildcatter sober next morning, felt panic. His well was dry.

They capped the wells, or pumped it. Rainbow's end, right enough.

Unchecked, Ranger had simply blown her top.

Going on 40 years now, Ranger has fought back the ghosts. Weeds have the dikes where the tank farms stood.

You have some empty buildings, the manpower and the desire. For not too much money you could put something in Ranger we'd all buy gasoline to come see. And one day, I believe, a wise industry will really memorialize itself this way.

And where better to show the old days than where they were?

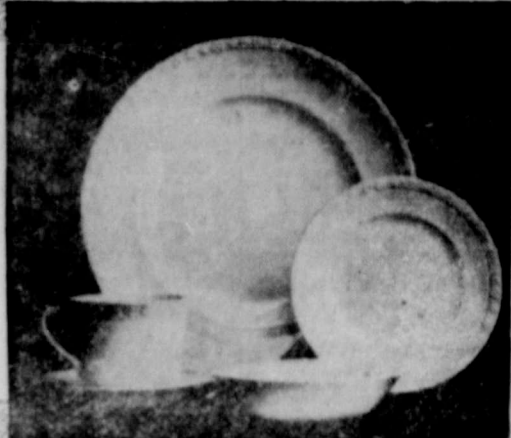

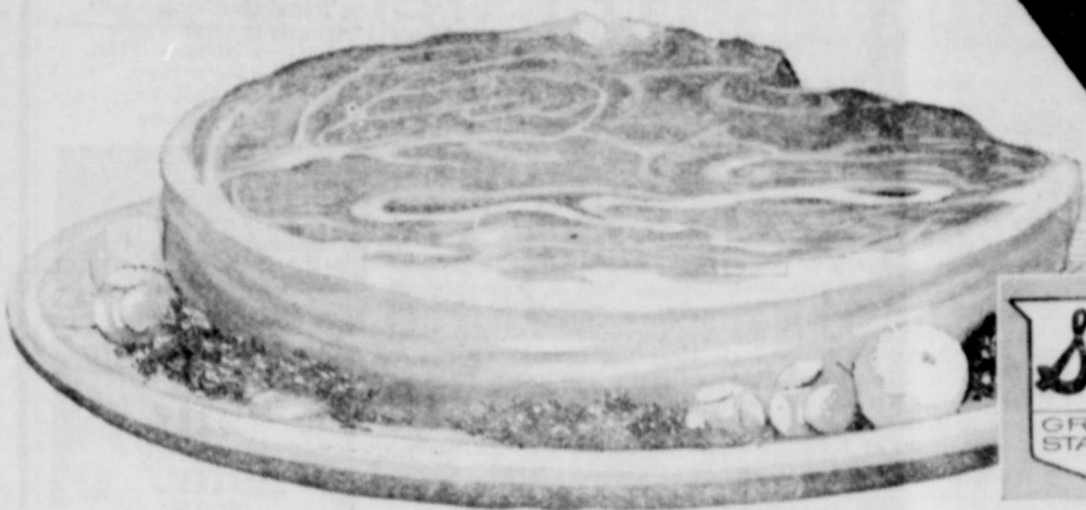
