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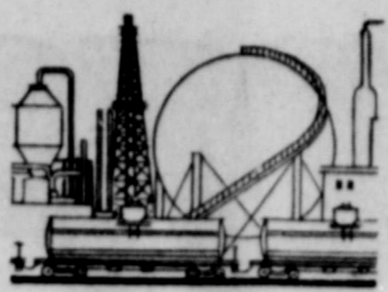

The first cash contribution to a special fund to aid in financing a proposed Texas Oil Museum in Ranger has been received by the Ranger Chamber of Commerce, W. T. Eaton, president and chairman of the oil museum committee, said Tuesday.

The contributor of a check for \$100.00 is Edward R. Maher, prominent Dallas Ford dealer and former owner of an automobile dealership in Ranger.

Mr. Maher was a partner in the Leveille-Maher Motor Co. and is a good friend of Charles A. Campbell, also formerly in the automobile business here and now retired.

Mr. Maher's check was accompanied by the following letter: "Mr. W. T. Eaton, President, Ranger Chamber of Commerce, Ranger, Texas. C-C President Eaton also says that correspondence from old-timers, drillers, rough-necks, operators, lease holders, royalty owners and others who were here during the oil boom days is invited.

Mrs. Ethel Brookes Gilmore, widely known Ranger resident and one of the state's outstanding historians, recalls the day when oil blew wild in Ranger.

Forty-six years ago on Oct. 11, 1917, Mrs. Gilmore writes, Ranger was very quiet and the streets were a sea of dust due to a prolonged drought. The people of the town were quite worried over conditions. Many had moved away, and

the farmers had sold their land for almost any price. A wagon train of Eastland County settlers, at that time were camped down on the Trinity river, in "Old Bachelor Cake Flats" of Fort Worth. They were resting their teams and some stock before traveling back to their former homes.

At this time the great disappointment, was the fact that in August, the test well "Nannie Walker" had blown in just a gasser. Some could not be marketed like oil. I was oil the town needed to bring it back to prosperity so the Nannie Walker was left to spew gas by day and night.

Soon another well was in the process of drilling, the never-to-be-forgotten McCleskey. The drillers on this job hit the same stratum as in the Nannie Walker. Frank Champio was driller on a "tower" "tower" and Jack Walter was on the morning "tower". The rush of gas was not great in this well so the moved the boiler back at went on drilling.

EDDIE SHINNS REPRESENT RANGER AT BIG NATIONAL JAYCEE MEET IN DALLAS

Ranger was represented at the National Jaycee Convention in Dallas by Mr. and Mrs. Eddie Shinn.

Delegates from every state including Hawaii and Alaska attended the gala, five-day affair.

Dallas was besieged by an estimated 13,000 minutemen, cowboys, Indians, and many other representatives. They stayed in different hotels — each state usually holding their caucus in the hotel their representatives stayed in while they were in Dallas.

Mr. and Mrs. Shinn were at the Travis Hotel where the Texas caucus was held. At the state caucuses each representative decided which man they would have their state

representative vote in for National president. There were from 6,000 to 8,000 people in the streets of Dallas at 3 a.m. pushing for one of the two candidates. The man who won, 2 to 1, was the one Texas voted for in its caucus.

There were many women who attended, many of them Jaycee-Ettes. Jaycee - Ettes has not become a national organization as yet, although many states have introduced it as a state organization.

The first day while the men attended meetings the ladies were entertained with a luncheon given by the state of Hawaii at the Merchandise Mart. They also attended a dinner held at the 72-lane Bowling Hall with dance floor and dining area in the center.

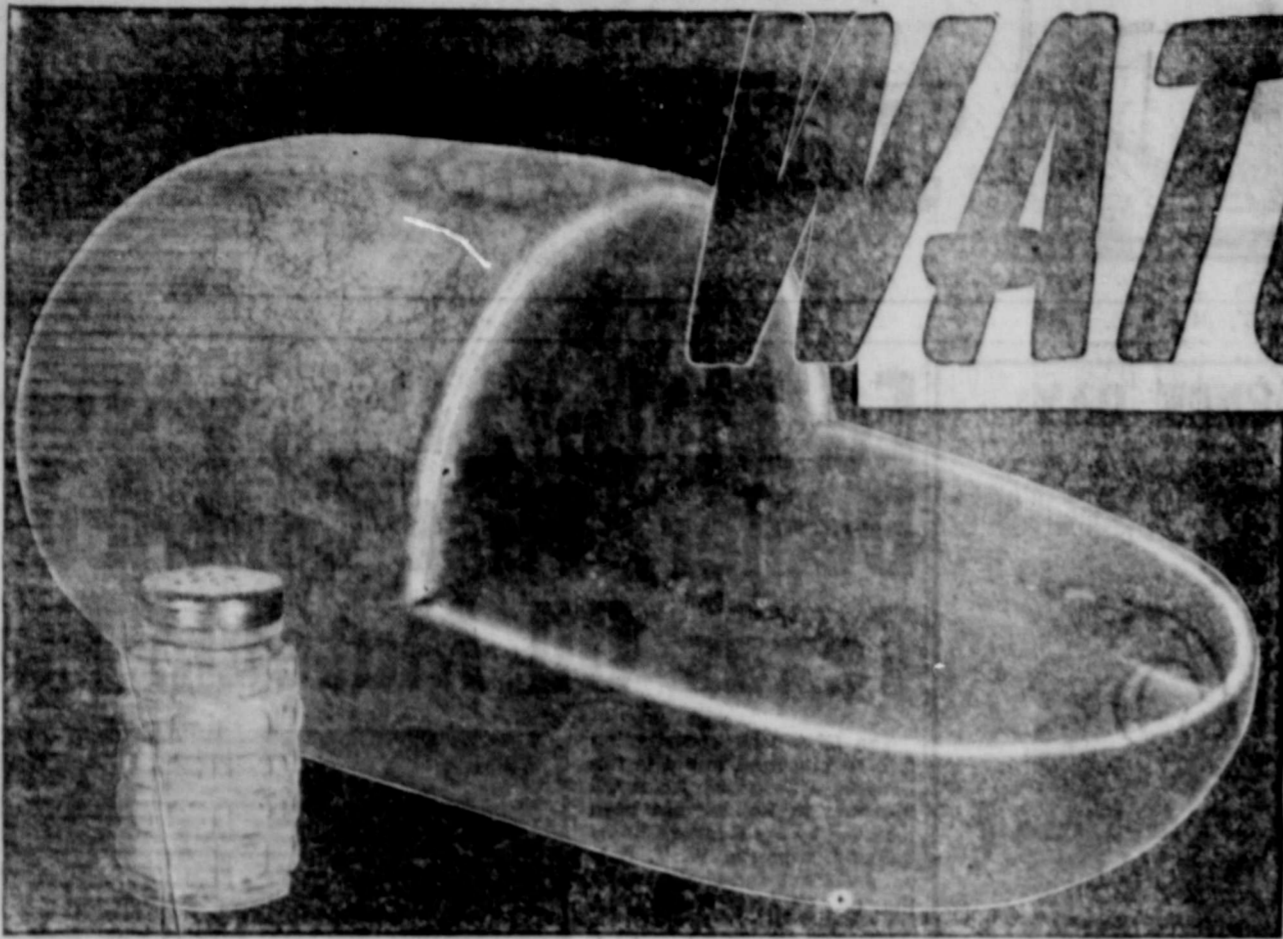

Marston wired, Col. Gordon, "Think we have made a mistake. Better quit. A rough was d. 'Still think we will strike oil," so Warren Wagner, drilling contractor was urged to continue drilling.

October 22 Frank Champion was on the afternoon "Tower"; he had been drilling about one hour and a half, when suddenly there was a faint rumbling deep in the earth, then dirt and rocks were thrown out of the well mouth, dropping back on the derrick floor, then came the spray of "Black Gold," that gained volume each minute, leaping up until, the spray was half way up the old fashioned, wooden, 84 foot derrick.

Walters had taken the morning crew back to town, so there was no automobile at the well. Undaunted Champion and Earl Root, pumper walked to Ranger. Harve

Wells, a tool dresser, was left in charge of the well.

Champion phoned to Wagner who was down at Strawn, that "McCleskey is an oiler." When he came out on the street he told the men the great news.

Harley Gibson's car was parked in front of his brother John Gibson's store. He gave that car the gas and drove up and down the Street, yelling, "There's oil in the McCleskey."

Soon after this the town was startled by a terrible roar, the Nannie Walker had blown itself in. It was a gusher flowing more oil than the McCleskey.

Oil fields have come and gone, and will come and go, but there will never be another Ranger oil field. A field that almost overnight claimed the attention of the world. It's luster call brought many famous men to Ranger.

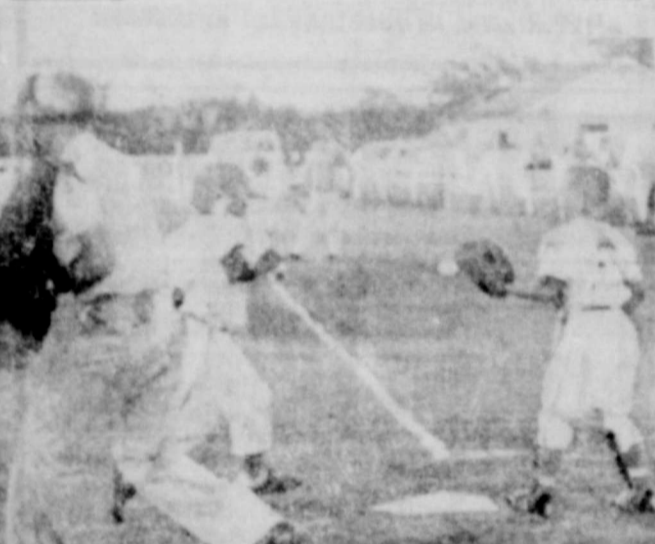

Eye Protection In Class Rooms Is Being Urged

HOUSTON—What may be the first step toward a Texas law to require safety eye protection in school laboratories was taken Friday at a meeting in Houston of the executive committee of the Texas Society for the Prevention of Blindness.

The group unanimously passed a resolution that the State Legislature should enact a law to require eye protection for teachers and students in all public school classes in laboratories and chemical-physical laboratories.

The Society has asked State Senator Criss Cole, general chairman of the Texas SPB, to introduce such a bill when the legislature convenes in January next year.

Rovnan Boerger, Dallas, president of the Texas SPB, said that mishaps in school labs and shops ruin many young eyes every year.

“Just as with a worker in an industrial laboratory,” Mr. Boerger said, “the difference between blindness and sight for a youth can simply mean the wearing of safety goggles or glasses made with safety lenses in the school lab or workshop.”

The proposed bill would be patterned after one recently passed by the state of Ohio, Sen. Cole said.

Support for the bill also will be enlisted from other groups such as the American Legion, Texas Safety Assn., and the Gulf Coast Chapter of American Safety Engineers, Mr. Boerger said.

Big Water Well Drilled on King Land at Sabanno
A water well, believed to be one of the strongest ever drilled in this region, was completed by Horace King at his 427-acre place, 12 miles south of Cisco recently.

Three days of checking revealed the well to have a potential of between 300 and 400 gallons per minute. It is bottomed at 39 feet.

Mr. King has two other wells near by, capable of yielding a total of 150 gallons per minute. Irrigation equipment was being installed Monday morning to water Coastal Bermuda, planted earlier this year.

Oscar Schaefer was completing Monday another well, just south of King's place, which promised to be exceptionally strong. It was said to be slightly deeper and will be utilized for irrigation.

C. W. Richter, whose land joins the Schaefer tract on the southeast, plans to test the water strata at his place with the thought of possibly putting in irrigation.

The recent water strikes are just north of the Cowan Hutson farm, much of which has been under irrigation several years.

King land is that which was purchased from Mr. and Mrs. W. T. (Dub) McClure about 12 years ago. The Kings are presently making their home at the old Jess Moore place west of Cross Plains, however, they plan to move to the acreage a mile and one-half east of Sabanno, later this year.
