There is no charge for attending the event which will be held at the old pump house of the Sinclair Oil Company at Tiffin. The building is now under lease by the Ranger Junior College.

The day's program opens promptly at 10 a. m. The Ranger chamber will be hosts for a ranch style lunch at noon. The meeting will last until 3:30 or 4 p. m., and Dr. John W. Foster, D. V. M., chairman of the chamber agricultural committee will preside during the all-day event.

New State Promotional Program Could Benefit Eastland, Ranger, Cisco

Of special interest to the triculties — Eastland, Ranger and Cisco — is the new dynamic five-year program of historical recordation, appreciation, marking, preservation and surveys put into action by the Texas State Survey Committee in its summer quarterly meeting.

"RAMPS," as the plan is called according to an announcement Wednesday in Austin, is designed to bring about an awareness of the unique history of Texas by visitors and by Texans themselves through state and local efforts.

"The 21-point program has grown out of the tremendous county approval of and response to the new Historical Preservation Laws passed by the last Legislature and Governor John Connally's plans to make tourism one of the great Committee President John Ben Shepperd of Odessa.

Workshops in 31 Texas centers will be set for members of County Historical Survey Committees, Commissioners Courts, City Councils and Chambers of Commerce, and tourist officials to put the RAMPS program into action.

A few weeks ago, Shepperd wrote a letter to W. T. Eaton, Chamber of Commerce, ex-

Dunn, Harper High School, east; J. R. Dillard, Sterling City High School, west.

The all-star athletes from every section of Texas will arrive in Ranger on Sunday, July 26, and then will be pushed through rugged daily drills shaping them up for the all-star tilts which are due to draw big crowds.

The Ranger Chamber of Commerce will host the coaches and visiting coaching school lecturers at a banquet to be held Wednesday evening, July 29, in the Fine Arts Bldg.

County Farm Bureau To Note Farm Safety Week July 19-25

County Judge Scott Bailey has officially proclaimed July 19-25 as Farm Safety Week in Eastland County, according to Jack Cozart, president of the local county Farm Bureau. The farm organization is coordinating activities for the special farm safety campaign.

President Johnson and Governor Connally have previously designated this week on a national and state level as a period to call attention to worthwhile safety practices that can reduce disabling injuries and deaths.

The county farm leader said that farm accidents have been reduced in the past several years; however, farmers cannot afford to let down their guard against accidents. He emphasized that farming remains one of the most hazardous occupations in America today.

In his official proclamation, County Judge Bailey said, "All citizens of Eastland County are concerned about the safety and wellbeing of farm families from whom we receive our abundance of food and other essential agricultural commodities."

"Farm accidents result in over 150 deaths and thousands of disabling injuries in Texas each year.

"Farm accidents are responsible for needless suffering and incapacity, and greatly effect the economic wellbeing and progress of our agricultural population in our county, state and nation."

"Throughout this special week, a statewide farm accident prevention and educational program will be undertaken by the Texas Farm Bureau, the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas Safety Association and the Eastland County Farm Bureau with the theme, "Safer American Families Everywhere".

County Farm Bureau President Cozart said that a different phase of safety would be emphasized each day during the week with the following scheduled to be followed: Sunday—reverence for life; Monday—safety begins at home; Tuesday—agricultural chemicals; Wednesday—prevent fall; Thursday—rural highway safety; Friday—farm machinery; Saturday—recreation safety.

WHEREAS the President of the United States and the Governor of Texas have designated the period of July 19-25, week; and

WHEREAS throughout this special week, a statewide farm accident prevention and educational program will be undertaken by the Texas Farm Bureau, the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas Safety Association, and the Eastland County Farm Bureau with the theme "Safer American Families Everywhere"; and

WHEREAS records show a notable and steady decline in the number and rate of accidents among farm people as a direct result of such worthwhile safety education program;

NOW THEREFORE, I, Scott Bailey, County Judge of Eastland County, do hereby designate the week of July 19-25, 1964, as FARM SAFETY WEEK and urge all farm families, persons, and organizations allied with agriculture to engage in a purposeful concerted effort to reduce further the number of farm, home, and highway accidents.

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Woman Writer Looks Back Over Experiences Of Family During Boom

(Editor's Note — The following nostalgic and reminiscent jottings dating back to the fabulous Ranger field oil boom era was written for The Times by Mrs. Estelle C. Work, a Texas authoress who spent a portion of her girlhood at Desdemona.)

Though I was very young when they struck oil in Desdemona, I am old enough now to know that I am an old timer from your area. I was seven years old in 1917, but I remember:

That we were living in El Reno, Okla., and my father, Pierce Carruth, was working for the railroad company; that it was during World War I and there was not enough money, that a can of corn or a cake made with part flour and part cornmeal was a treat; that there were three children younger than I, and out of forty dollars a month daddy made, six went for house rent.

No, I don't remember all of this. I am sure that some of it must have been told to me later. I do remember coming home from school one day and spy happy, loving, broke mother and father, and the three children younger than I, were in a state of utter confusion. A telegram had come from grandpa W. R. Carruth — always called Uncle Dick — who lived in Desdemona. Now in those days a telegram meant death, or at best, that a loved one was dying; but, this telegram said something like, "Come home they struck oil on Joe Duke's place" and further more we learned it had some amount of money in it.

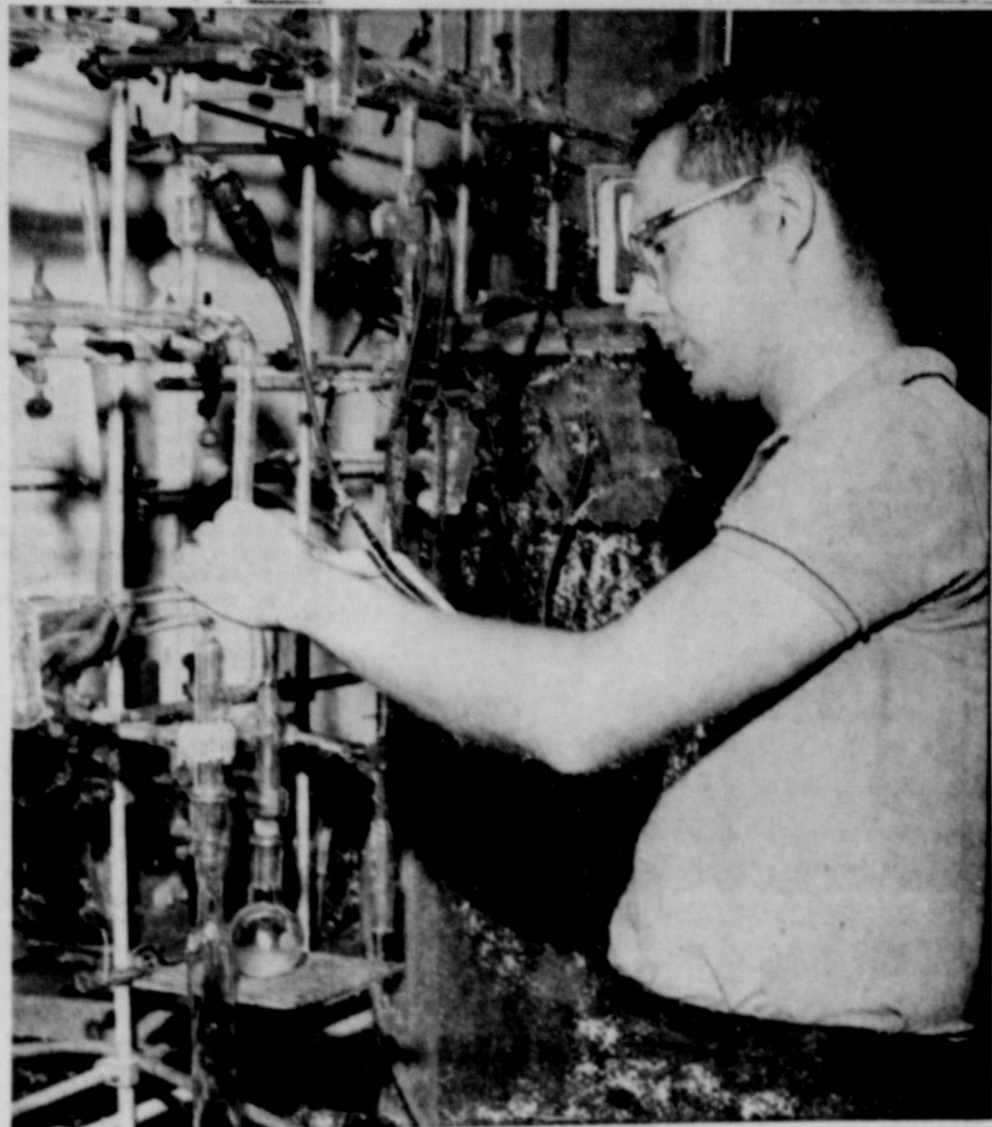
It must have been a fortune, because we had money left when we got to Desdemona. We got to Eastland in a Cadillac, which, even then, was considered a prestige car. We

had also later a Jordan and a Nash. This time we had a new house — although unpainted and an oil field shack — all ours, and we did not have to pay rent. We had a piano. I got to take music lessons, and this was the height of luxury in my life at that time. I do not know what the sudden possession of a great deal of money would do to one who had never had enough; it didn't happen to me.

At some time my father reminded me, "No, Pet, you must always remember that Desdemona was named for your mother's aunt, Desdemona Wynn, whose father was ole' Squire Wynn; she taught the first school in these parts; Come here to keep Molly and Tom Henry company, mostly In'ians back then."

My next memories are of hearing my father say to my mother, "No, Lizzie, you keep the kids away from the matches; don't let 'em strike a match. The Cosden is runnin' wild and with all that gas, we'd all explode! Aunt Kizzie — Kizzie Shuler — won't let 'em drill up by the graveyard, and I guess I don't blame her, but there might be big oil there." Aunt Kizzie was grandpa Carruth's sister, and she said she just didn't need money bad enough to let 'em drill near where her husband, son-in-law, my great-grandfather and grandmother, and my great-great grandfather and grandmother were buried.

My father went into the drug business which I remember because I ate all the ice cream cones I wanted. I can see the street, the side-walks made of boards, the streets of mud, O'Rear's General Store stocked with crackers, pickles, and salt in barrels, and smelling of saddle leather soap, and tin.

I remember the Rip Andersons, Dr. Kuykendalls, Dan Powers, Griffins, and others who lived on our street in Desdemona. Both the Baptist and Methodist Churches were on the street and I got religion every time they had a revival until I am not sure of the times I was converted — three times, I think.

The young men in my father's group were all ardent Masons — Norvel Gallagher, another Gallagher, a Mr. Brothers, and other names I can't recall. I am not saying they were not all ardent Masons. They may have been. I do remember that the meetings to which they went were in Fort Worth, and they didn't take their wives. At any rate, my father didn't.

I remember that, on one of these meetings, the women — my mother among them — became flagrantly brave and Add woman writer — times — had their hair "bobbed"; and, that when the men returned, they had their heads shaved on top, leaving a rim around the base; and, that the effect was startling; my father had a big nose.

My mother became very indignant the time some single women living near us put their flesh-colored underwear on the clothesline. This, I think, especially funny now, since her daughters, who are no longer young hang very-very-briefs on her line and she doesn't say a word!

I recall living in a big house called the "Green House", because it was painted a putrid, pea-green color, and that not so many years ago I went back to Desdemona; and, I wish I hadn't. There was the big silver-leaf maple standing in a forlorn vacant-lot where we had had our home, and where my mother planted the small sapling.

My grandmother, Mattie Carruth, cried when they dug up part of her peach orchard to drill an oil well; an uncle my age, Richard Carruth, and I climbed to the top of the old, cable tool derrick in the orchard and were amazed to see the small, insignificant things below who we were our parents — urging us to climb down; and, I was scared to death I would get a whipping. It was many years later before I understood why my father didn't whip me, why he shook and cried and crushed me to him and told me how much he loved me.

I remember the new school house and that for some reason involving the school, we all moved to Lubbock along with many other families. I remember Dan and Della Powers, who came with us; and, though he has long since died, Dan Powers is still one of my favorite educators.

When we came to the end of the plains we made the cap-rock at Post in high; and I can still see and hear and know my father's glee when his high-powered automobile was able to perform this miraculous feat.

I can, forever, hear the old cable tool rigs going full blast all night long, with the steady up-and-down pounding of a hole in the ground — up and down, slowly, pounding.

I remember going swim-

Final Chapter Written In Life Of Jesse Torres

The final chapter in the life of a young Latin American named Jesse Torres was written Saturday as his widow appeared at the Eastland County sheriff's office to claim his skeleton for formal funeral and burial at Quanah.

The young man, about 25 years old, had been ill when he wandered away from the Gordon Woods Ranch one night two years ago, dressed only in his shoes and khaki trousers. A posse of officers and neighbors hunted him for days before finally giving up.

On July 6th, a skeleton was found in a pasture in the Yellow Mound community, not far from the Woods Ranch.

An investigation began. Deputy Sheriff L. E. Sublett reported Saturday the skeleton

was formally identified as the remains of Jesse Torres. A dentist at Weatherford, for whom he had worked, identified extensive bridge work still on the teeth in the skull. Former employers and friends added weight to the identification.

Justice of the Peace L. W. Dalton of Eastland prepared the death certificate in the name of Jesse Torres.

The young man's widow signed a release at the sheriff's office and took the skeleton back to Quanah where she lives for burial. She was accompanied by a priest, Mr. Sublett said.
