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ESSENTIAL DIFFERENCES

BETWEEN REPUBLICAN & DEMOCRATIC PARTY PHILOSOPHY

Within the two major political parties, sharp differences exist on the specifics of various national and local issues. This occasionally causes people to wonder what holds Republicans and Democrats together - what prevents fragmentation into innumerable splinter parties.

The answer is that the two party system relies on adherence to fundamental beliefs. As an American voter, you should examine these philosophical principles carefully.

INDIVIDUAL LIBERTY

Republicans believe in the worth, the ability and dignity of the individual citizen. They believe that whatever can be done, should be done by private, local or state government, and that a job should be done in Washington only when it is determined that only the federal government can do that job. They encourage the individual to speak up and are opposed to an increasing, centrally controlled bureaucracy, which is manifestly the way of the Democrats.

They are guided by principle and do not believe that principles have to give way to expediency as the problems become more complex.

The Republicans think and act in terms of the individual American citizen and believe in a form of government which enables the most people to do most for themselves. They trust

The Democrats think and act in terms of masses, classes, and blocs and aim to serve people directly from Washington. They tell you.

The Republicans believe in providing us with the greatest possible incentives to do things for ourselves and the Democrats say in effect, "Sit down and we will bring it to you."

LIMITED FEDERAL AUTHORITY

Republicans recognize that government represents power in the hands of some men to control and regulate the lives of other men and that throughout history Government has proved to be the chief instrument of thwarting man's liberty. They know that all human knowledge is built on experience, whether this experience is personal or the experience known as "history".

Republicans believe, therefore, in strict adherence to the Constitution with all its checks and balances and a closer control of federal authority rather than gradually larger doses of it. The Democrats have demonstrated and are demonstrating an increasing drift away from this principle and cynical disregard of the past and refer to continued distrust of increasingly big government as "old fogevism." Actually "Republican conservatism" stands for a fighting revitalization of the only basis on which a democratic form of government can expect to survive.

RESPECT FOR THE CONSTITUTION

Republicans uphold the time-tested system of check and balances built into the federal government by the Constitution

Yes, the system can indeed produce a measure of delay, waste and inefficlency. But these drawbacks are much the lesser of two evils. And so far as that goes, bureaucratic abuse flourishes best under a dictatorship.

Impatient of restrictions imposed by the Constitution and enabling the judicial or legislative branches to frustrate the will of the President, Democratic leaders downgrade the Constitution as a document written for another age. They would "pack" the Courts and Committees not subservient to the executive. They call for a free hand for the President in the conduct of foreign policy.

But Republicans have profited by the lessons of history and realize that without the Constitution's checks and balances this nation cannot maintain true representative government, responsive to the will of the people.

FISCAL INTEGRITY

The Republicans believe that there should be as much sense of fiscal responsibility and integrity in running a government as in running a business or a home.

They believe in a balanced budget and a reduction in the national debt, and are prepared to demonstrate that this can be done with a reduction in taxes and with a sound, prosperous and growing economy.

They seek to preserve the purchasing power of the dollar at home and respect for it abroad.

They believe that a government big enough to give you everything you want is big enough to take away everything you've got.

The Democrats, on the other hand have been openly dedicated to operating on an experimental policy of huge deficit spending and make no pretense of expecting to balance the budget for another two years.

A STRONG FOREIGN POLICY

The Republicans, although of course dedicated to peace in the world, take a much firmer, more realistic and consistent attitude than the Democrats in dealing with international Communism.

They call for a much better defined foreign policy, and feel a much deeper sense of responsibility in the efficient use of taxpayers' dollars in foreign aid.

Through such policies and more consistent adherence to them they feel that American prestige must be restored and that we cannot rely primarily on buying it.

CONTROL OF UNEMPLOYMENT

The Republicans call for a much more accurate and pin-pointed analysis of the labor force than now exists so that practical solutions can be applied.

The Republicans also propose a 5point program to equip teenagers with skills needed to get good jobs rather than inventing new versions of makework projects which proved unsound in the Thirties.

Highlights include expansion of vocational training in public schools and revision of the Manpower Training Act to place more stress on training young

The Democrats refuse to meet the problem at its core, and on the other hand fall back on the politically alluring but economically wasteful concepts of the handout and the public works boondoggle, in the meantime branding the Republicans as "the party of unemployment", etc.

EQUITABLE TREATMENT OF LABOR AND MANAGEMENT

The Republicans believe in a very minimum of government intervention in labor disputes and in protecting the rights of collective bargaining, but when the public interest is importantly involved, they believe in meeting the issues head-on, with restrictive legis-

In other words they believe in exactly what Democrats promise but conveniently forget until crisis demands a policy of expediency, delay and last minute intervention.

INDEPENDENCE FOR THE FARMER

The Democrats, from the very beginning of the New Deal, have persisted in tinkering with the American farm economy, imposing quotas, setting prices, buying up surpluses and constantly adding to the bureaucratic burden of the taxpayer while at the same time worsening the market position of the farmer and the buying position of

Republicans believe that this is probably the sickest part of our economy today and one which can be improved only through a gradual return to the basic laws of supply and demand under which our producers of food and fiber can operate on a basis of selfdetermination, rather than as wards of the federal government.

INDIVIDUAL RIGHTS

Historically, ever since the Emancipation Proclamation, the Republicans have indicated by deeds their basic and inherent dedication to Civil Rights.

Under the Eisenhower Administration in 1957 and 1960 the first Civil Rights legislation since Reconstruction was enacted.

Over the years the Democrats have not only watered down the original Civil Rights laws, but have consistently resisted new ones. Only because it was forced upon them politically have they now seen fit to do anything about their repeatedly-broken campaign

Additionally, Republicans uphold the voting rights of persons not necessarily associated with the so-called minority groups. We have consistently pointed out that an individual whose vote is stolen by dishonest election procedures is deprived of his rights just as much as one who is not permitted to vote at all.
