Revenue Collected By Texas LCB In 11 Years Totals Over \$332,000,000

AUSTIN — Revenue collected by the Texas Liquor Control Board over and above its operating expenses for the last 11-year period has netted a \$332,483,997.45 profit to the State of Texas. The good news of this average annual \$30,225,817.95 profit to Texas taxpayers was disclosed today in release of official figures by the Texas Liquor Control Board. These summarized the Board's operations for the 11-years, 1953 to 1963, inclusive. During the 11 years the Board spent a total of \$18,292,589.19 for operating expenses while collecting \$350,686,586.64. The \$332,483,997.45 profit to the state, has been apportioned annually by Legislative formula to support numerous state services. These include the Available School Fund, the Old Age Assistance Fund, the General Revenue Fund, the Hospital Fund, the Employees Retirement System, aid to needy blind, child assistance,

Good Rain Brings Relief For Most Eastland County Areas

Rainfall that measured from two to four inches brought needed moisture to parched land and water for stock tanks and lakes in Eastland County over the past weekend. Relief from a prolonged heat wave was an extra bonus of the period of rainy weather. The Eastland area reported the most rain when a 2.70 deluge Monday morning pushed their weekend total to about four inches. Cisco had a total of 2.8 inches for the period, and Ranger reported 2.8 inches. Rising Star had 1.75 inches and Moran got 1.8 inches. Stock tanks of the county benefited most, according to Assistant County Agent Bill McCutchen. He toured the county Monday afternoon and found livestock water in good supply. Before the rain, many tanks were dry and stockmen were hauling water. Late peanuts also were expected to benefit considerably, Mr. McCutchen said. Only about 15 per cent of the county's peanut allotment acreage has been planted and most of this is in the late variety, he added. The rain was due to result in widespread planting of late hay crops and preparation of land for fall seeding to cover crops. Area lakes also registered water gains. Lake Cisco reported a 14-inch rise. Lake Leon's gain showed only two inches when Supt. Jess White turned in his weekly report Monday — the level standing 72.2 feet at the dam. The runoff, however, was expected to continue for several days it was believed that all foot would flow into the Several minor accidents reported in Ranger Monday to slippery streets; the rain storm. A minor accident was reported on way 80 seven miles west of Cisco. The weekend rain was more than the county had received in the past three months. Temperatures that had 100 degrees or more for several weeks were in the 90's Monday and Tuesday.

Another Derrick Is 'Possible,' Says Chamber Of Commerce Leader

"It is entirely possible that Ranger can again have an old oil derrick as a landmark identifying Ranger with the fabulous oil boom," W. T. Eaton, president of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce, said Wednesday. "A year or so ago," the Chamber leader told The Times, "an oil company offered to donate us a derrick near Ranger. The problem was then and is now: 'First, how to get it moved. This probably would require dismantling, hauling it into Ranger in sections, then putting it back together. This would require the services of some civic-spirited resident who had experience as a rig builder, 'And, second,' he added, 'Where would we erect the derrick. Would some civic-spirited citizen donate a site for this derrick?' Eaton's comments came as the result of recent stories in The Times pertaining to the derrick which was located at the intersection of Main and Commerce streets in downtown Ranger a few yards from the main line of Texas & Pacific Railway until 1951 when it collapsed in a violent windstorm. Further increasing interest in the proposal that another old derrick be erected in the city were several paragraphs in The Times' "Town Talk" column Sunday in which Mrs. Ethel Brookes Gilmor, quoted several well known citizens as favoring such a project. Eaton said he and other interested citizens would welcome comments and suggestions relative to this proposal.

HERE'S ANOTHER quote which we believe will be of interest to many of our readers:

Some startling figures have been revealed lately as to the history of American agriculture during the last 10 years. Even more startling, in a sense, are some of the forecasts for its future. Our present problem is largely one of over-production of foods and feedstuff.

Some of the applicable figures are interesting. Last year, for example, some three billion hours of labor were used on the nation's farms and ranches. In 1914 the figure was roughly 12 billion hours. Today our farm acreage is worked by far fewer farmers and ranchers.

Yet it is estimated that on the basis of present requirements there still are twice as many farmers as are needed. Of the nation's 3.5 million farms, 1.4 million of the largest ones now produce 90 per cent of the nation's output. The men running the remaining 2.1 million farms now produce only 10 per cent.

This, observes Walter Lippman, is "a brutal fact... brutal because farming is not only the production of food and fiber. It (also) is a way of life which Americans have always believed nourishes the spirit."

The situation will change. By the year 2041, it is anticipated, our population will have doubled and Congress, instead of curbing farm output, may be offering incentives for increase in production. Even so, the mellow independence and freedom of the old days of the small family farms is something we are not likely ever to see again. On the other hand we have many in our midst who will remember the days of the small farm operator in Erath County. Many of them suffered the aches of poverty. If those were the "good old days" some of us would like to forget them — once and forever. — Stephenville Empire-Tribune.

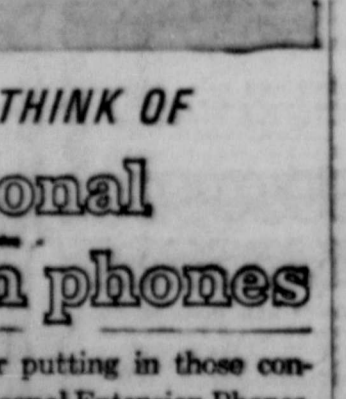

PUBLIC NOTICE
Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1964.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8 proposing an amendment to Section 59 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 59 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Subsection which reads as follows:

"(d) No law creating a conservation and reclamation district shall be passed unless notice of the intention to introduce such a bill setting forth the general substance of the contemplated law shall have been published at least thirty (30) days and not more than ninety (90) days prior to the introduction thereof in a newspaper or newspapers having general circulation in the county or counties in which said district or any part thereof is or will be located and by delivering a copy of such notice and such bill to the Governor who shall submit such notice and bill to the Texas Water Commission, or its successor, which shall file its recommendation as to such bill with the Governor, Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House of Representatives within thirty (30) days from date notice was received by the Texas Water Commission. Such notice and copy of bill shall also be given of the introduction of any bill amending a law creating or governing a particular conservation and reclamation district if such bill (1) adds additional land to the district, (2) alters the taxing authority of the district, (3) alters the authority of the district with respect to the issuance of bonds, or (4) alters the qualifications or terms of office of the members of the governing body of the district."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1964, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts."

Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election on this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

RJC Grad To Dedicate Life Serving Blind

Glen Carrigan, a 1964 graduate of Ranger Junior College, was visiting in Ranger this week and reported that he has been accepted at the University of Texas where he will be working toward a degree in Speech for the Deaf. Carrigan, who several years ago decided that he would be a teacher of the deaf, learned the sign language and has since high school days, studied toward that goal. He will be employed in Austin at the Texas School for the Deaf where he will serve as a dormitory parent. After completing his work at the University, Carrigan will complete the five year college course at Gallaudet College in Washington, D. C. This is the only federal training college for the deaf in the United States, and the only college awarding this specific degree. Carrigan will be remembered in this area for the talks on his work, given to service clubs. His ambition toward preparing himself for his life's work in this field came as the aftermath of a summer spent in Colorado, working with two deaf boys. It was from them that he learned the sign language, which is the only universal language. It was also from these boys that he learned of the lack of trained personnel in this field. While living in Fort Worth with his family, Glen attended a local church which provided an interpreter for the deaf. In this way he was able to perfect his own sign language help those without normal hearing. Glen himself has perfect hearing and this fact, plus his youth, makes his determination to help others all the more unusual.
