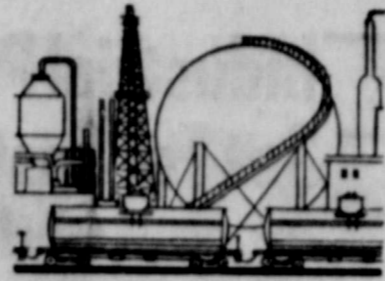

## FHA Projects Extend, and Improve Resources, County Tour Reveals

With "permanent agriculture" as a goal and increased farm and ranch output as incentives, a group of area, county and state Farm Home Administration officials and others toured several county farms Wednesday morning to view the results of FHA fund usage.

Two FHA financed homes and several acreages were toured by the group of approximately 20. E. E. McAlister, local manager of the Soil Conservation Service, addressed the officials briefly, presenting the theme of the tour, "Permanent Agriculture," and stating that at the present rate of progress, Eastland County farmers will continue to improve and modernize farming and ranching methods.

He stated that the only factor not adequately controlled in farming methods recently was rainfall. Inadequate moisture has stunted progress to a certain extent. On the other hand, he pointed out, FHA finances have enabled area agricultural workers to extend and improve

means and resources to such an extent that farming is considered the occupation which has advanced the most in recent years.

Pointed examples included tour stops. A new home, constructed by Newton F. Bennett, after having obtained a Rural Housing Loan from the Farmers Home Administration in February, 1962, was toured. The dwelling is on Mr. Bennett's 43 acre farm tract.

The old Bennett house has been moved several hundred feet off the road to make room for the new home. Mr. Bennett is retired at the present.

Second stop was the James V. Fields farm. Mr. Fields obtained his first operating loan from the Farmers Home Administration Office at Eastland in 1949. He was renting 300 acres at the time, 170 acres of which was in cultivation.

was purchased through the Texas Veterans Land Board in September, 1959.

The FHA made Mr. Fields an additional Farm Ownership loan in 1963 to improve the farm purchased in 1959. Improvements to be made, included (1) the construction of a new brick home; (2)

Action will be hot and heavy Tuesday and Wednesday afternoons under a searing mid-afternoon sun.

Then Thursday, Duvall and his assistants, Jerry Trize and Leroy Duke, will whip the 1964 Maroon and Whitters through a light drill in final preparation for their opener against the Cisco Lobes of District 7-AA Friday night in the foes' last 20 miles west.

The backfield quartet averages 168 pounds, and the beefy forward wall hefts at 183 pounds-per-man.

springing 173 acres to Coastal Bermuda; (3) shaping and sodding eight acres of waterways to control the water flowing across the farm; (4) the construction of two earthen tanks for livestock water; (5) brush control on eight acres; (6) seeding 121 acres to native grasses; and (7) constructing three miles of net wire fencing.

The land development is being carried out as a cooperative effort by Mr. Fields, the Soil Conservation Service and the FHA. The development work was planned according to recommendations of the SCS and is carried out with the cost-share assistance of the Great Plains Conservation Program. The development work is scheduled for completion in 1966. Total cost of improvements is \$15,000. The Great Plains cost-share is \$4,341.

He sprigged 181 acres of Coastal Bermuda in 1963-64, putting down 210 sprigs per acre. This planting has been fertilized with 100 pounds of 16-20-0 per acre applied April 30, 1964. It has received less than one inch of rain since it was sprigged, until recent rains.

Third stop of the tour was the farm of J. C. Caraway, Jr., who was operating a dairy in 1951 when he received his first Housing loan from the Farmers Home Administration. He owned 95 acres and was leasing approximately 100 acres at that time. He currently owns 389 acres, of which 275 acres are in cultivation, and leases an additional 280 acres of pasture land.

Mr. Caraway was a diversified farming operation at present, receiving income from peanuts, calves, hogs and mohair. Last year Mr. Caraway's operations were reorganized to make the most economical use of land, labor and capital. The 1963 operating loan was larger than usual in order to make the necessary reorganization. As a result of this reorganization, Mr. Caraway entered into a contract with the Great Plains Conservation Program that is administered by the Soil Conservation Service office at Eastland.

The total cost of the improvements to be made on the farm under this cost-share contract is \$7,000. The GPCP will provide \$3,654, and the FHA loaned Mr. Caraway the balance in pay for his cost-share of the contract.

Land improvements to be made include: (1) springing 173 acres to Coastal Bermuda grass; (2) controlling brush on 55 acres and reseeding to native grasses; (3) seeding 179 acres to Weeping Lovegrass; (4) controlling oak

brush on 28 acres; (5) installing 85 feet of one inch plastic pipe for livestock water; (6) and constructing 3000 feet of net wire fencing. All improvements are to be completed in 1966.

The Coastal Bermuda sprigged on May 4-8, 1964, was put down at the rate of 178 sprigs per acre and fertilized with 100 16-20-0 per acre prior to sprigging.

In the early summer months only one inch of rain was received in a three month period following sprigging.

The three particular farms and acreages chosen for the tour were selected on the basis of the representative value of the work of FHA funds in this area, it was reported.

The Farmers Home Administration strives to best use each penny of allocated funds to the best advantage of the farmer, who in turn helps the county prosperity when he is thriving, and the purpose of the tours was to show how FHA funds are being used for the progress and prosperity of permanent agriculture, Homer Cole, local FHA supervisor pointed out.

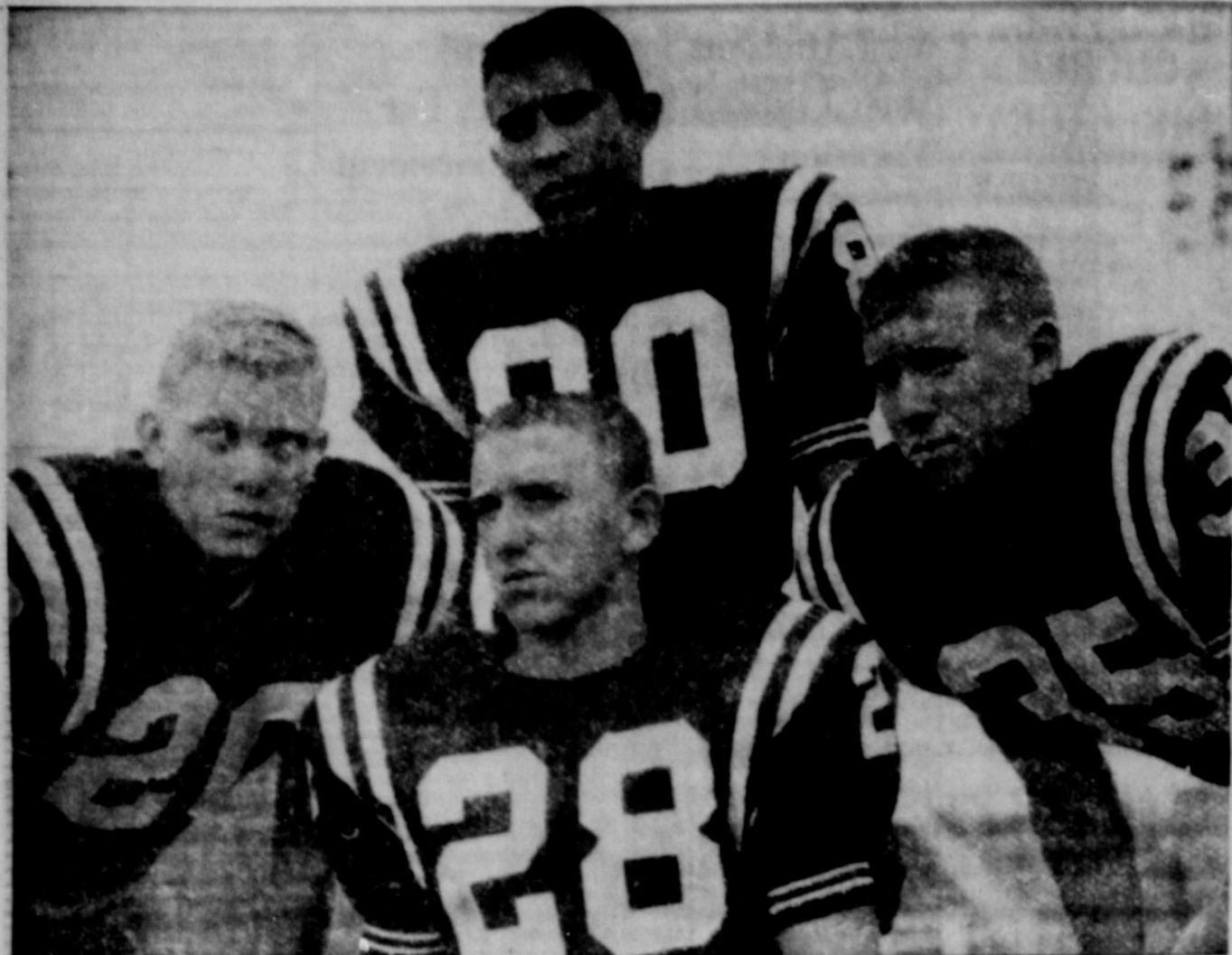

## Bulldogs Rated No. 2 In 10-A Grid Race

Ranger High Bulldogs are notched for second place in District 10-A's upcoming pigskin scramble, according to pre-season forecasts published in the widely-circulated and authoritative "Texas Football" annual, 1964 edition, on sale at newsstands over Lone Star land.

Couch Harold Barrett's Albany Lions, of course, are the odds-on favorites to repeat as champs of the schoolboy grid circuit.

After a brief recap of Albany's muscle material, the grid publication, winding up its comment on the Lions, said — briefly and to the point: "The forecast: another banner year."

In order, "Texas Football" ranked the 10-A district thus: Albany, Ranger, Clyde, Baird, Eastland, DeLeon and Cross Plains.

In its summary of the 10-A circuit, the publication said: "The law of averages insists: that one of these, days Albany will not come up with a blue-ribbon band. But that day is not in sight. One of the ranking teams of Class A last year, Albany merely returns 13 lettermen, 8 offensive and 7 defensive regulars, size in the line, running strength, great tradition, and two terrific players. The players are

guard Dick Shelton (6-0, 190), an excellent blocker who made all-state as a junior, and booming fullback Charles Brewster (5-10, 210), who was all-district and all-area. As if that weren't enough, the Lions also have all-district tackle Jim Sullivan (245), all-star guard Joe Tucker (185), all-district tackle Bob Oliver (225), all-star end Larry Barne, fine center Bill White and nifty halfback Garry Batee. The forecast: another banner year.

"In a normal year, Ranger could muster quite a challenge with its 11 lettermen, its 8 offensive and 9 defensive veterans. It has a fine fullback of its own in Ray Newnham, and quality elsewhere in QB Johnny McGee (6-0, 185), halfback L. H. Pounds, and linemen Jesse Renteria, Terry Sutton and Bill Robinson.

"If Clyde can keep up with tailback Rick Dennis, everyone will have to watch out. Dennis, ready to bid for statewide recognition, is a 160-pounder with 9.9 speed. There are 18 other lettermen available, including big 100-pound QB Buddy Howe, fullback Ed Ramos and guard Otis Carter.

"Baird, 6-4 last year, may better that in '64. The team returns 16 lettermen and a

flock of regulars, chief among them being all-district Richard Windham, a 6-0, 205-pound back. Also conspicuous are linemen Pat McKennon, Bruce Bell and Kelton Jones, and backs Wally Harris, Steve Stoney and Eddie Childers.

Eastland (12 lettermen) will put its best foot forward with these players in the vanguard: QB Jerry McCollough, halfbacks Mickey Sargent and John Moylan, and linemen Wayne Waldon, Stan Underwood, Mike Miller and Gary Rollins.

"If the leaders falter, De Leon, armed with 6 returning regulars, could move up. Such a surge would be geared to the efforts of backs Bill Lamb, Mike Smith and Johnny Terrill, center Wes Tucker, and ends Johnny Stuard and Bo Shifflett.

"Without last year, Cross Plains gets back 15 lettermen, including 8 defensive regulars, and should be much stronger. Backs Sammy Strickland, Joe Pierce, Reggie Stover, and Jim Brown, and linemen Ronnie Rhodes, Jerry Watson, Donnie Rhodes and Jim Switzer trigger the big plays."
