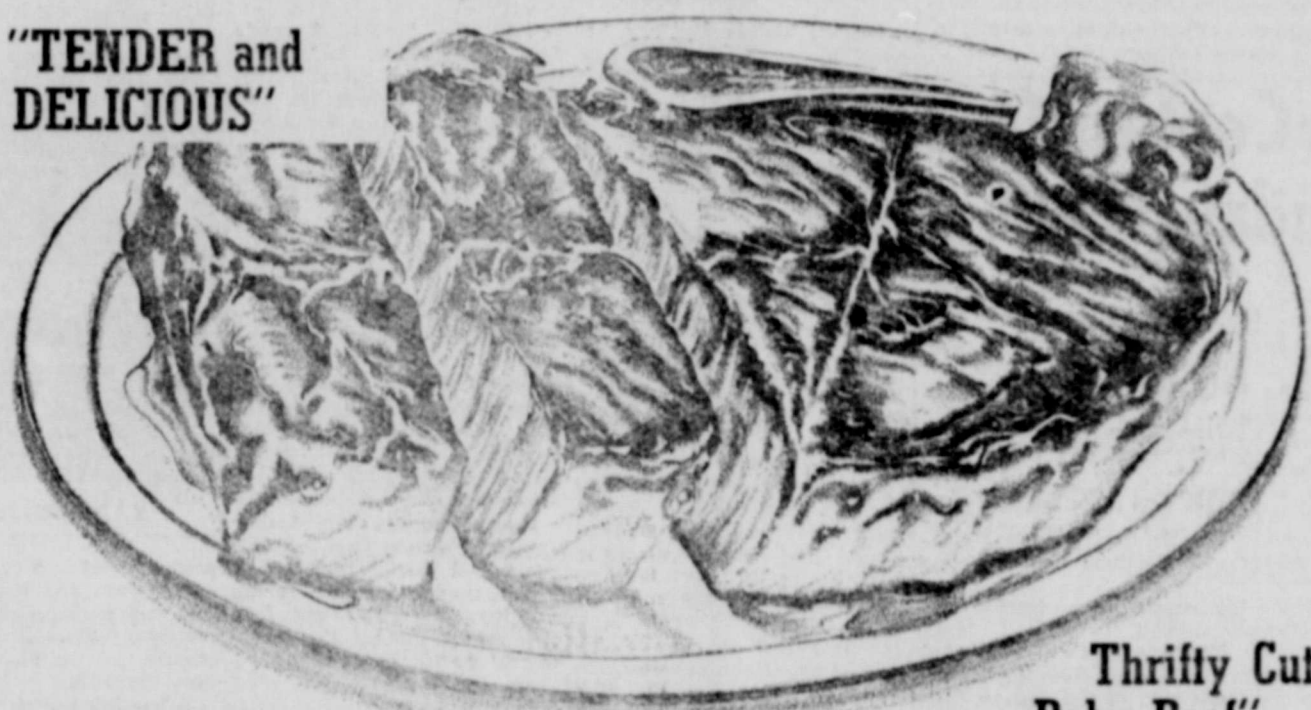

C. M. (Clint) McCain Is Elected PCA Director

C. M. McCain of Eastland, a director of the Production Credit Associations of Texas, has been re-elected for a three-year term on the board of directors in a highlight of the 30th annual stockholders meeting of the Stephenville PCA, held Sept. 26 in Stephenville.

General Manager W. M. Irwin gave the association's financial report and said the association had loans totalling nearly \$10,000,000 in its 10-county area during the fiscal year ending June 30.

A regional group conference of directors and general managers of the agricultural financing institutions will be held in Fort Worth Thursday and Friday, Oct. 8-9. Attending this conference from the Stephenville PCA will be McCain.

Representatives of six associations, serving a 41-county area of North and Central Texas, will attend the meeting, sponsored by the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank of Houston, discount and supervisory agency for the 36 Texas associations.

A feature of the meeting will be a discussion on the roles of directors in PCAs by W. B. Mansfield of Texas A&M University.

Other associations expected to attend the conference include Coleman, McKinney, Mexia, Stephenville and Wichita Falls. The six associations provide more than \$40,000,000 annually in loans to their farmer and rancher stockholder-borrowers.

County Asked to Accept Leon Area Roads for Maintenance

Stalled apparently is a request by the Eastland County Water Board for Eastland County to accept certain roads north of Lake Leon for maintenance and upkeep.

Request was repeated during a special session of the county commissioners court Monday when water board members attended, asking that the county accept a conveyance of certain roads to and through the Utley Cabin Sites, west of Lone Cedar Country Club.

The board asking earlier that the roads be maintained by the county, apparently had been told that the county could not maintain private roads because of an alleged indictment from 91st District Court. The board arranged to have the roads "conveyed" to the county so they could be maintained.

During the meeting Commissioner Glenn Justice, in whose precinct most of the roads are, said that he could

accept the "graveled roads for maintenance, but could not accept the paved, hard-topped road because he had no way to maintain them."

"There are some ten tax-paying permanent residents in the area," Water Board secretary-treasurer Lester Crosey told the court.

The instrument of conveyance which apparently has not been filed, was examined during the meeting and a discussion followed about certain parts of the road which are owned by the County Country Club, and therefore "unconveyable." Commissioner C. B. Dill of Cisco reminded the visitors of the indictment.

Commissioners Tip Arther (whose Precinct One includes the paved road from the FM 570 to the cattleguard on the country club road) and Justice agreed during the meeting to go to the site and inspect the roads to see what can be done.

'County Interstate 20 Span To Be Completed in 4 Years'

"Interstate 20 through Eastland County will be completed in about four years," Phillip L. Wilson, supervising design engineer, Design Division, Texas Highway Department, told the Eastland Lions Club Tuesday.

Special guest speaker at a part of Highway Week, Mr. Wilson pointed out that some 3,029 miles of the national interstate program will be built in Texas — at a cost of \$2.2 billion which is less than is costing in other states.

Robby Martin, design engineer from the Brownwood District office, introduced Mr. Wilson, who explained that the state had 1,013 miles of the proposed interstate system built to date, has 504 miles presently under contract and 316 miles already up to adequate standards.

In emphasizing the theme of Highway Week which is "Mobility — Your Fifth Freedom,"

Wilson said the state has 26,000 miles of primary roadways and 37,000 miles of secondary or farm-to-market-type highways.

In the Eastland area, there are 357 miles of highway now under construction, he said, at a cost of \$18 million. Another 262 miles are set for seal coating and 251 more programmed for construction, to cost \$17 million.

"We're building interstate roads in Texas for some \$600,000 per mile and it's costing a million plus a mile in other states," he said. In answer to a question from County Judge Scott Bailey, Wilson described the differences between expressways (not fully controlled accesses) and freeways (fully controlled accesses).

Some \$400 million is spent yearly in Texas in the design, construction and maintenance of highways, he said. And

the 66,000 miles of roadway in the state represents a \$4 billion investment.

James Smith was program chairman and arranged for the special Highway Week presentation. The week has been proclaimed by proclamation of Mayor Frank Deaton and by Gov. John Connally.

"We were not a wealthy nation when we began improving our highways," Wilson said. "But the roads themselves helped us create new wealth, in business and industry and land values. So it was not our highways that made our highways possible. It was our wealth that made our roads possible."

And in Texas, he said, we have a "pay as you ride" economy. Highway Week is sponsored by the Texas Good Roads Association, a non-profit organization dedicated to bettering highway travel.

AUSTIN — A top finance authority on state government is hopeful that the tax bill written by the 1965 Legislature will be smaller than many advance predictions have indicated.

Jim McGrew, research director for the Texas Research League, said \$35,000,000 a year in new revenue ought to cover the bulk of Gov. John Connally's higher education program, teacher pay raises about 40 per cent of the budget increases sought by state agencies.

McGrew, who addressed Austin's chapter of Sigma Delta Chi, professional journalism fraternity, made these "guess-timates":

— About \$625,000,000 will be available for general revenue spending next biennium, including an \$83,000,000 surplus at the end of the present fiscal period. That's \$35,000,000 above the present level.

— With no new taxes at all, the Legislature could provide up to \$120,000,000 in additional general revenue spending for higher education and maybe \$45,000,000 more for state departments and agencies.

— An added \$60,000,000 plus in revenue (per biennium) would finance the state's \$74,000,000 share of a \$45-a-month pay raise for public school teachers as well.

— Texas Commissioner on Higher Education recommended \$89,000,000 more for higher education from general revenue. Governor's Committee on Education Beyond the High School recommended an increase of \$165,000,000. But it suggested doubling tuitions which would reduce the general revenue hike to \$120,000,000.

State Hospitals and Special Schools, the judiciary and other state agencies have put in for \$112,000,000 more than the current budget.

Asked where additional money likely would come from, both McGrew and his boss, League Director Alvin A. Burger, noted that restoration of the \$2.75 corporation franchise tax rate, removal of exemptions in the present sales tax or raising of the rate would be big revenue producers. They made no recommendation.

Larry Temple, 28, formerly of Plainview, was named by Governor Connally as his executive assistant to succeed Howard Rose, who returned to law practice in Midland.

Connally appointed Edward H. Harte, publisher of the Corpus Christi Caller-Times, to succeed Vann Kennedy, Corpus Christi radio executive, who resigned from the Texas State Historical Survey Committee.

A State Department of Public Safety investigation of Billie Sol Estes will continue "until all ramifications" are cleared, Connally told a press conference.

Sen. Ralph Yarborough has challenged authority of the DPS to look into allegations that he received \$50,000 from Estes, who now faces prison sentences for swindling.

Connally said of the DPS: "It has a clear duty and responsibility with respect to law enforcement. It is not a political organization. It has

not been used as such, and will not be used as such if I have anything to do with it."

A Yarborough campaign aide, Fagan Dickson of Austin, issued a release in which he said he has information that Estes has made a statement bearing out an FBI investigation report that there was no \$50,000 gift to Yarborough.

Texas Highway Commission authorized \$363,000 in farm-to-market road development in Davy Crockett (Houston County) and Angelina National Forests. Two projects included are linked to development of Sam Rayburn Reservoir. A third would connect two scenic roads south of Kennard.

Commissioners also authorized preliminary engineering studies for development of sections of U. S. Highway 59 in Victoria and Jackson counties into multi-lane expressway. Eventually the multi-lane facility will extend from Houston to Brownsville.

AUSTIN — It's almost time to vote again. General election ballots already are in the hands of local officials, for printing.

Secretary of State Crawford C. Martin has mailed out the sample ballot to the clerks. Along with it went 44-page certified list of all state and district candidates. Many clerks had been pressing for the material so they could order necessary printing well in advance of the November 3 election date.

Absentee voting begins 20 days before the general election, and clerks must post ballots 10 days earlier than that. This ballot will list Democratic nominees in column 1, Republicans in column 2 and Constitution Party candidates in column 3.

Three constitutional amendments also will appear on the ballot:

One would remove authorization for transfer of up to one per cent a year from the permanent school fund to the available school fund for current spending.

Another would set tougher requirements for creation of special conservation and reclamation districts; and

The third would permit the Legislature to authorize medical care payments (on a matching basis with the federal government) to needy persons over 65 who are not receiving old age assistance.

Martin held up his final certification of candidates pending a Supreme Court ruling on a Scurry and Borden Counties suit. Court declined to hear Snyder attorney J. Ray Martin's request for listing as an independent candidate for 132nd district attorney. Martin also sought, unsuccessfully, to keep Democratic nominee for district attorney, Wayland G. Holt, off the November ballot.

State Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler says Texans ought to vote again on whether to continue the veterans land program.

It just now is starting to make money for the state, he advises in his annual General

Land Office report. Profitroad Commissioner; Dallas were reported as nearly \$3,000,000 last year and eventually should run to \$80,000,000 — maybe \$100,000,000.

Voters last year turned down a proposal to issue an additional \$150,000,000 in bonds to continue the purchase of land for resale to qualified veterans at low interest rates.

State Republican Headquarters here announces that a gold-colored bus — called the "Goldwater Special" — carrying Republican candidates for statewide office will arrive in Austin on October 3, following a three-day tour through East Texas, down the Gulf Coast to Corpus Christi, and up South Texas through Alice.

Passengers will include candidates Jack Crichton for Governor; Horace Houston, Lieutenant Governor; John E. Attorney General; T. E. Kennerly, State Supreme Court; Don Flanagan, Rail-

This week's tour will be the first of three. On October 12, the "Goldwater Special" will tour four days from El Paso through West Texas and North Texas and wind up in Houston. On October 27, the candidates will make a plane tour of major cities not touched by the bus.

Non-farm employment in July rose to 3,316,300, compared to 3,314,200 in June and 3,253,500 in July, 1963, according to the Texas Employment Commission.

Percentage of job-seekers in the period dropped from 4.4 per cent of the state's potential working force to 4.2 per cent — a healthy change from the 4.8 per cent of jobless in July a year ago.
