

> The students of Ranger Junior College vary somewhat in their choice of major fields, but the most popular area of study is business administration with fifty-six business majors. Physical education is second with thirty-nine, and education third in line with sixteen. History is next with twelve majors, followed by music and engineering with eight each.

History is first, however, in the minor field with twentythree. Physical education claims nineteen students; mathematics, ten; and business administration, nine. Only seven students are electing biology and English as minors.


