Records Say Patrolmen Deserve Commendation

The Department of Public Safety — better known as Highway Patrolmen — were commended by the last 91st District Court grand jury, and a check of the county court docket gives a good indication of why they were cited.

Of the 34 cases tried in county court through late November, 27 were DPS cases, showing that the Highway Patrolmen are waging an active war on traffic violators of several kinds and killers.

For instance, there were 20 driving while intoxicated cases; five driving with licenses suspended cases; one negligent homicide case; and one aggravated assault case filed by Highway Patrolmen.

Unfortunately all the cases filed haven't been tried. Of the 72 cases filed in county court since last Jan. 1, 56 were filed by DPS personnel.

As stated, 34 cases have been tried, eight have been dismissed, 16 cases not tried, and 14 transferred to district court. Of the 14, one has been tried, one dismissed (and refiled) and 12 still untied.

Eastland County Pecan Show Will Be Staged In Ranger On Dec. 11-12

The 12th annual Eastland County Pecan Show will be held December 11-12 in the Joseph building in Ranger, according to W. T. Eaton, president of the Chamber of Commerce, and C. M. Smith, of Rising Star, president of the growers association, co-sponsors of the two-day affair.

Classes have been set up for 34 different papershell varieties of pecans, including the popular Choctaw, Wichita, and Comanche, which have been developed in recent years.

The event has been held for the past several years in Ranger. Members of the Association annually vote on the site for the show, and Ranger has consistently had the largest number of members.

Originated by Eastland County Agent J. M. Cooper in 1952 as a stimulus to the development of the pecan in-

Postmaster Ohr Offers Parcel Post Hints

"Please pack parcels solidly," was the plea of Postmaster Max Ohr.

The head of the Ranger Post Office also reminded his patrons that the use of free "local" and "out-of-town" separation bands will help move the mails faster. The bands are available at the post office or from most letter carriers.

December is the suggested deadline for mailing out-of-town packages. "Don't worry about the parcels being delivered too early, just mark 'Don't Open Until Christmas' on the front," Mr. Ohr said.

A tightly stuffed package, with nothing rattling around inside, will have less chance of being damaged in transit, he noted.

"When packing a gift, remember that the package you send may be shipped on the bottom of a mail sack and there may be heavier packages on top. Among the relatively few packages that are damaged in transit, improper packaging is the greatest factor," the postmaster cautioned.

Just to be on the safe side, the postmaster suggests that all packages be insured.

He noted that poor packaging and addresses which are either incorrect or not legible are responsible for the non-delivery of about half a million parcels each year. If the return address is incorrect or illegible and the package cannot be returned, it will be saved for 90 days. If unclaimed, the parcel is usually lost to the sender or intended recipient. Such parcels wind up in public auctions held at (Continued on Page 6)

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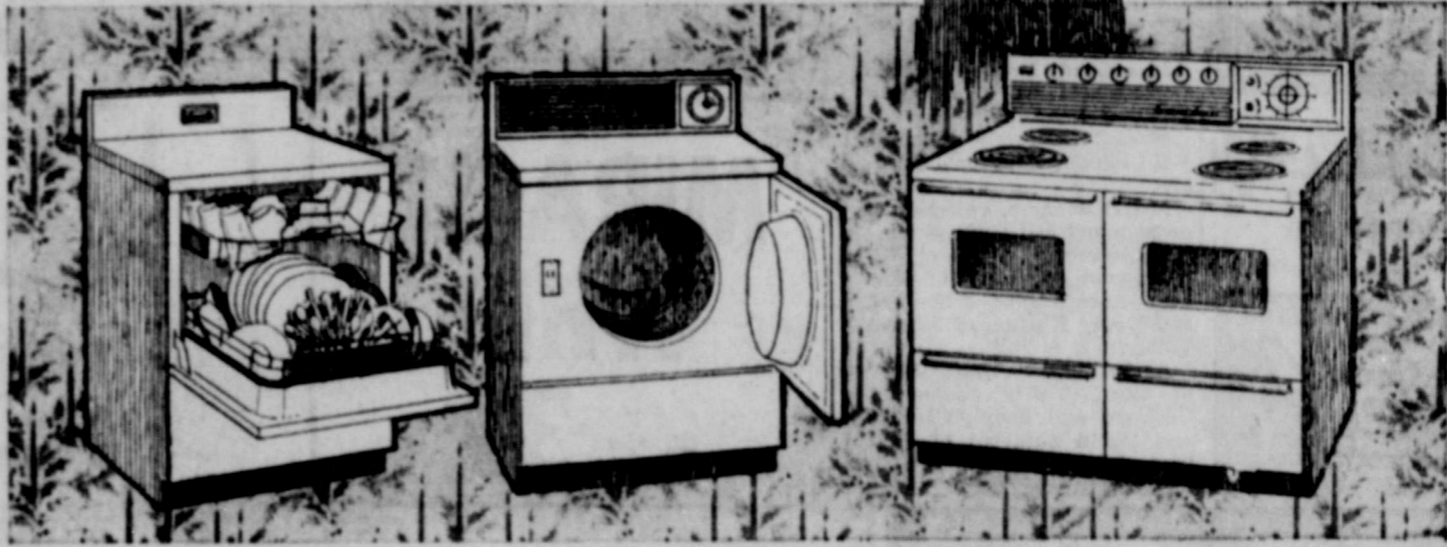

15 major post offices across the nation.

All parcels should be addressed on only one side and should also have the address written on the inside of the package in case the exterior wrapping should come off.

Mr. Oby emphasized that ZIP Coding the addresses on parcels and letters helps insure against loss due to improper addressing. Since each area of the country has an individual ZIP Code, there is little chance of a piece of mail destined for one city being directed to a city which may have a similar name.

For example, there are at least 26 possible areas around the country which would have Springfield in the address. Use of the proper ZIP Code would send the mail to the right post office.

"We are asking everyone to be especially cooperative this holiday season. During the peak of the 'rush' we expect that seven billion pieces of mail will flow through the system and it looks as if 12 billion pieces will be delivered during the entire month of December. That's quite a bit of mail," the postmaster said.

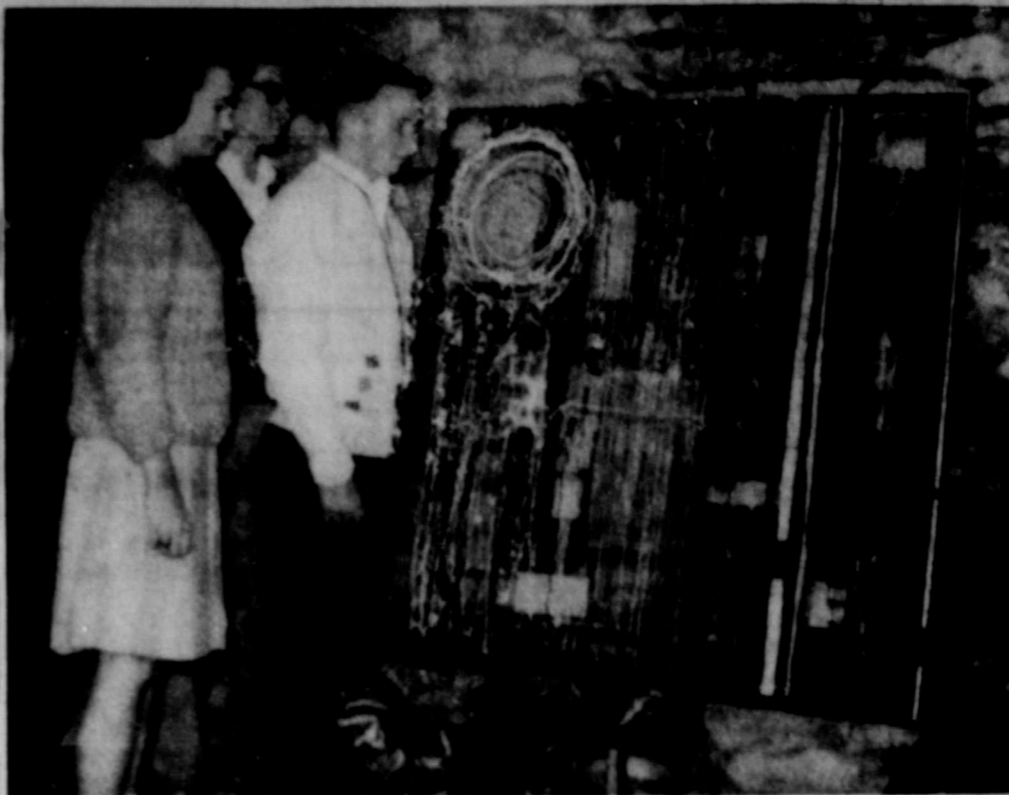

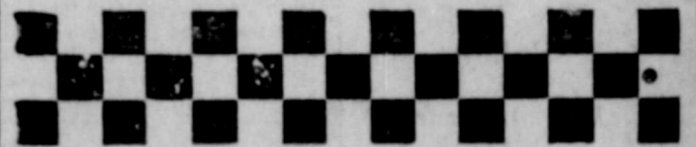
