All County Due To Send Workers

The first of five all-day seminars relative to the industrial development pilot program for Eastland County will be held in Ranger all day Tuesday, Dec. 8, at the college academic building, according to an announcement.

The program will feature several speakers who will use a "Community Betterment" theme. The complete program accompanies this article.

The EC-65 program, which was planned last month at a series of county meetings, will be launched at the Tuesday meeting, which will be the initial seminar in a series that will develop different subjects.

County Judge Scott Bailey reported that the other meetings were expected to be held as follows: Gorman in January on the subject of research; Rising Star in February on sites, Cisco in March on financing, and in Eastland in April on developing industry prospects.

The five main topics cover what officials of the Texas Industrial Commission consider vital to luring industry. Each and every meeting, including the Tuesday seminar in Ranger, will be open to the general public. Individuals who signed up for the EC-65 program and indicated preference of work assignments are being urged to attend the seminar on their field.

Larry Milner, West Texas representative of the Texas Industrial Commission, has been active in helping plan the initial seminar and has been assigned by the commission to work closely in the Eastland County program. He pointed out that a well-informed, ready-to-work organization such as the five seminars will seek to develop and produce the best result.

O'BRIEN BOMBS HOUNDS, 72-33

Coach Don Hafley and his Strawn High Greyhounds were stunned, 72-33, by a slashing O'Brien High Bulldog six-man powerhouse Friday night at Knox City.

The battle, waged in sub-freezing temperatures before a scant audience of less than 300 shivering fans, marked the end of the season for both schoolboy grid crews. It was the regional playoff — the last mile for six-man grid action each fall.

Two terrific backs — the Bulldogs' James Duncan, 168 pounds of "cleated fury," and LaCarlton Rhodes, 157-pound whirling dervish — starred in the regional triumph.

Duncan and Rhodes accounted for practically every one of the victors' 397 yards crunched out on the chilled turf. Duncan scored 40 of the

72 winning points, and averaged 11.2 yards on his leather-toting. His mate, Rhodes, scored three TDs and stacked up a 10.9 yards-per-carry average in the ground-gaining department.

Adding punch to the Bulldogs' stamina and power was a double-tough defense which limited the Greyhounds to only 88 yards rushing. And 67 of those strides were gained.

Postmaster Ohr Outlines Ranger Mail Schedules

Considerable misunderstanding exists among patrons of the Ranger postoffice related to arrival and dispatch of mail. Postmaster Max Ohr said Friday.

"We have effected some changes since discontinuance of the Texas & Pacific mid-day passenger trains — eastbound and westbound," Ohr said, "but we wish — again — to assure the public that our local mail service now is even more efficient than previously."

He cites the following:

Mail leaves Ranger on this schedule: Via T&P train No. 26 eastbound daily at 11:01 a. m.; east and west by truck at 5 p.m.; westbound via T&P

Train No. 27 at 12:40 a.m., and east and west by truck at 6:45 p.m. On Saturdays, Sundays and holidays at 5 p.m., out-bound mail is picked up by truck from the box outside

the postoffice. Letters mailed after 12 noon in that box move in transit on the 5 p.m. truck.

Mail arrives in Ranger on this schedule: Via T&P train No. 27 at 6 a.m.; east and west by truck at 6:50 a.m.; from eastern points via truck at 10 a.m., except Sunday, and at 11:01 from west by T&P train No. 26.

Postmaster Ohr also emphasized that out-going mail should be in the postoffice or in the box outside the postoffice not later than 30 minutes prior to the time schedules listed above.

The Ranger postmaster also said that mail is put in post office boxes on Sundays and holidays.

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BROWSING with BEV.....

On wash day, do you play a "guess the fabric" game — because you've lost the tag that came with the garment, the one that tells what material it's made of and how to care for it? Here are some suggestions to end such confusion and avoid costly laundering errors.

Whenever you buy a garment, immediately remove the tag and label it — Mother's green shift, Barbara's blue blouse, etc. Then be sure to save the tag. If you have a bulletin board near the washing machine, hang it there. Or, you might use a card file for garment tags. Put in dividers with the name of each member of the family. Slip the tag from Barbara's blue blouse behind the card with her name. And you'll have no trouble finding it quickly on wash day.

If you know the fabric of a garment and how to wash it, you'll get better wear and satisfaction from it.

Thinking of adding a snack bar to your kitchen? Be sure you match the height of the counter with the height of the chairs or stools. A counter 30 inches high can be used with the average 18-inch chair. Allow 20 inches for leg space under the counter.

If you prefer to use counters 36 inches high, you'll have to use a 24-inch high stool. And remember, that the stool will need a footrest 6 or 8 inches from the floor. Figure 14 inches of knee space under the counter.

For easy eating — and no bumping of arms — allow 21 inches for each person to be seated at the counter.

Mildew spots should be removed as soon as they are discovered. Don't give the mold a chance to weaken or rot the material. Brush off any surface growth outdoors to prevent scattering the mildew spores in the house. Sun and air fabrics thoroughly — and if any mildew spots remain, wash articles that are washable in soap and water at once.

If any stain remains, bleach with lemon juice, salt and sunshine, sodium perborate bleach, or a diluted solution of chlorine bleach. Do not use the chlorine bleaches on wool, silk or some fabrics

treated with special finishes. For upholstered articles, mattresses and rugs, remove mold from the articles by brushing with a broom or stiff brush. If possible, do this out-of-doors. Run a vacuum cleaner attachment over the surface of the article to draw out all the mold possible. Then clean out the vacuum cleaner immediately. If the vacuum bag is disposable, destroy it at once. Sun and air the article to stop the mold growth — and if the mildew still remains, sponge with soap suds and wipe clean with a damp cloth or sponge. Dry again thoroughly.

Rugs and carpets may be sponged with thick suds or a shampoo. It's best to apply the shampoo and remove it with rug shampoo equipment. If this equipment isn't available, remove the suds with a cloth dampened in clear water. Dry in the sun if possible. Freeze honey if you intend to keep it a long time. That

is the latest word from researchers at the Wisconsin Agricultural Experiment Station. None of this happens to honey kept in a freezer. So, store it there. Remove only a small amount at a time — enough to last a week or two.

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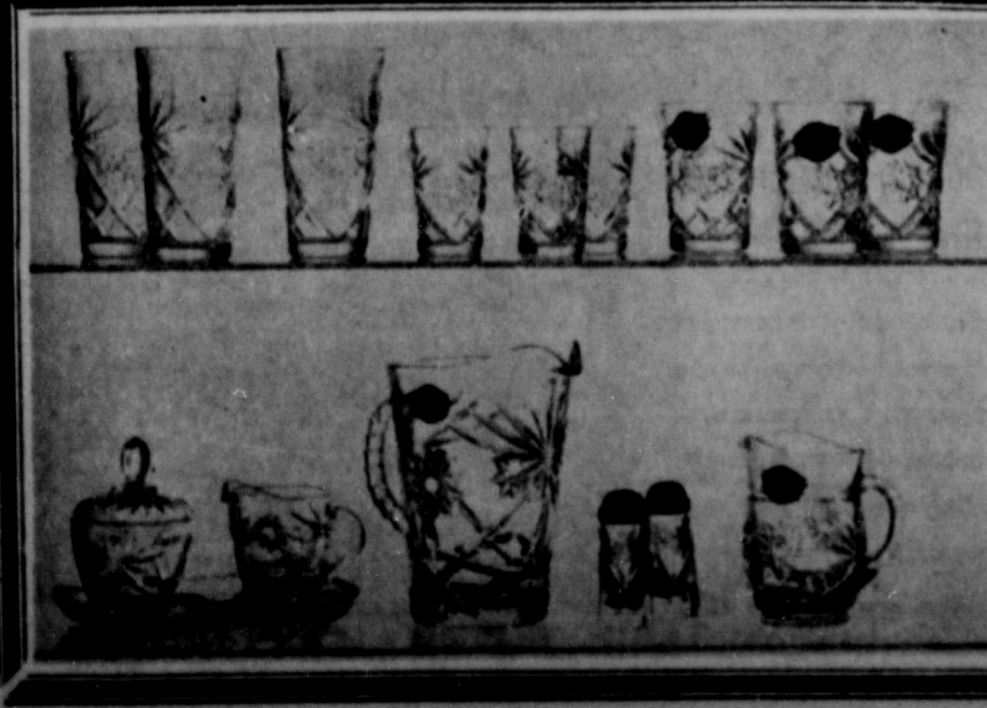

Post Offices In Area May Close

Postmaster General John Gronouski has announced that several hundred fourth class post offices will be closed within the next few years, which could affect several small post offices in this area.

Also on the list are the offices at Bonham, Elbert, Scranton, Old Glory, Sylvester, Lohn McCaulley, Norton, Vera, Rockwood, Valera, Voss, Parkett, Goldsboro, Hatchel, Nolan, Knott, View, Damm, Peacock, and Longworth.

Gronouski estimated that \$2,500 to \$3,000 would be saved on every fourth class post office which might be shut down. He added, that the government's aim in closing these would be to provide money in the affected areas with equal and in some cases better service.

A post office becomes fourth class if gross receipts are less than \$1,500 yearly for two years in succession, or below \$1,400 in a calendar year.

First class offices are those with \$40,000 or more in gross receipts; second class, \$8,000-\$40,000; and third class \$1,500 to \$8,000.

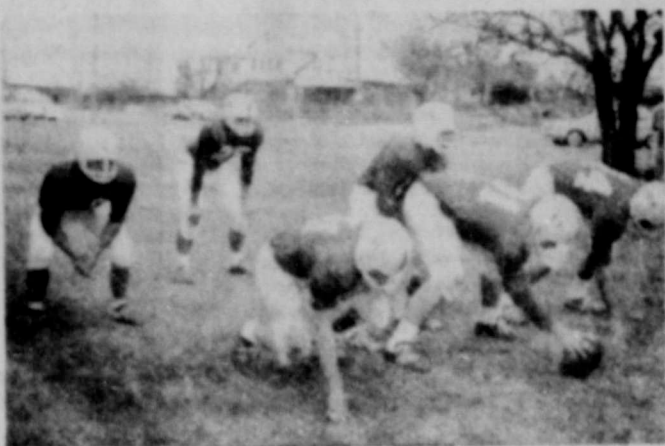

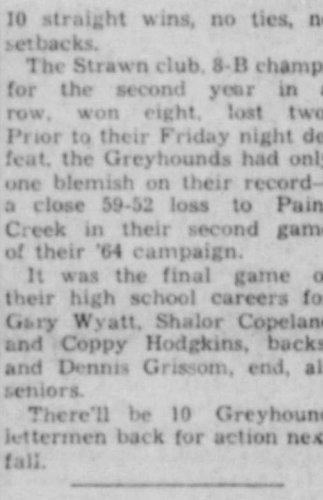
The final gun of the Friday night regional playoff gave Coach Charles Thorn and his Bulldogs a perfect season.

Ranger Constable Warns Against Holiday Swindlers

Be alert for swindlers during the busy holiday shopping season.

That's the warning of Constable Ralph Veal to Ranger merchants and businessmen. Especially, he said, be cautious in cashing checks.

The formal notice provision of the new Texas hot check law is aiding swindlers, the officer declared. After cashing a bad check, the writer can't be filed on for a period of time to really get lost, spurious check has been notified by registered letter or telegram.

"This gives swindlers plenty of time to really get lost," the Ranger Constable reminded.

He re-emphasized a prior warning urging businessmen to be extremely wary in cashing checks for strangers without complete and proper identification.

Since having issued a similar warning several weeks ago, Constable Veal said that Ranger merchants and businessmen are continuing to be bilked out of a substantial total of cash each week.

Veal also suggested that businessmen note the license numbers of vehicles driven by strangers who cash checks.
