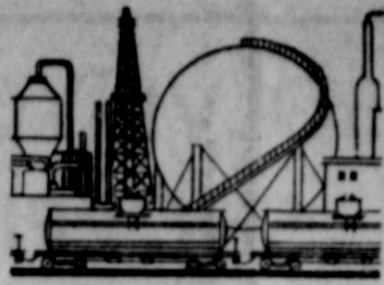

PeeWee Boxers To Battle at RJC On January 15-16

The first annual Pee Wee Boxing Tournament, sponsored by the Ranger Chamber of Commerce and Ranger Junior College, will be held Friday and Saturday, Jan. 15 and 16.

Announcement of the dates for the event was made by Dr. Theodore Nickick Jr., president of the college, following a meeting with directors of the chamber.

The divisions he said, will be separated in five pound brackets.

From 45-50 lbs. gnat; 51-55 lbs. mite; 56-60 lbs. chigger; 61-65 lbs. flea; 66-70 lbs. termite; 71-75 lbs. spider; 76-80 lbs. mosquito; 81-85 lbs. ant; 86-90 lbs. tick; 91-95 lbs. bee; 96-100 lbs. wasp, and 101-105 lbs. beetle.

There'll be a special weight division under 45 lbs. if required, Dr. Nickick said.

Boys entering the two day fistic event must be under their 15th birthday on the date of the tournament.

The Pee Wee leather-slugging event will preface the regional Golden Gloves Boxing Tournament to be held at the college on Thursday, Saturday and Monday nights, Jan. 23, Jan. 30 and Feb. 1.

The tournament is sanctioned by the AAU, officially approved by the Texas Inter-scholastic League, and is one of several similar elimination boxing events staged over the state under sponsorship of the Texas Golden Gloves Athletic Assn.

Research Expert Due To Speak At Industry Seminar

It will accommodate forty to fifty persons.

We can be proud of RJC's progress and growth. The building programs are very good signs of a growing junior college that will know more and more success each coming year.

On Dec. 9, 1961, came that year's toy sensation — the beatnik doll. Wind it up and

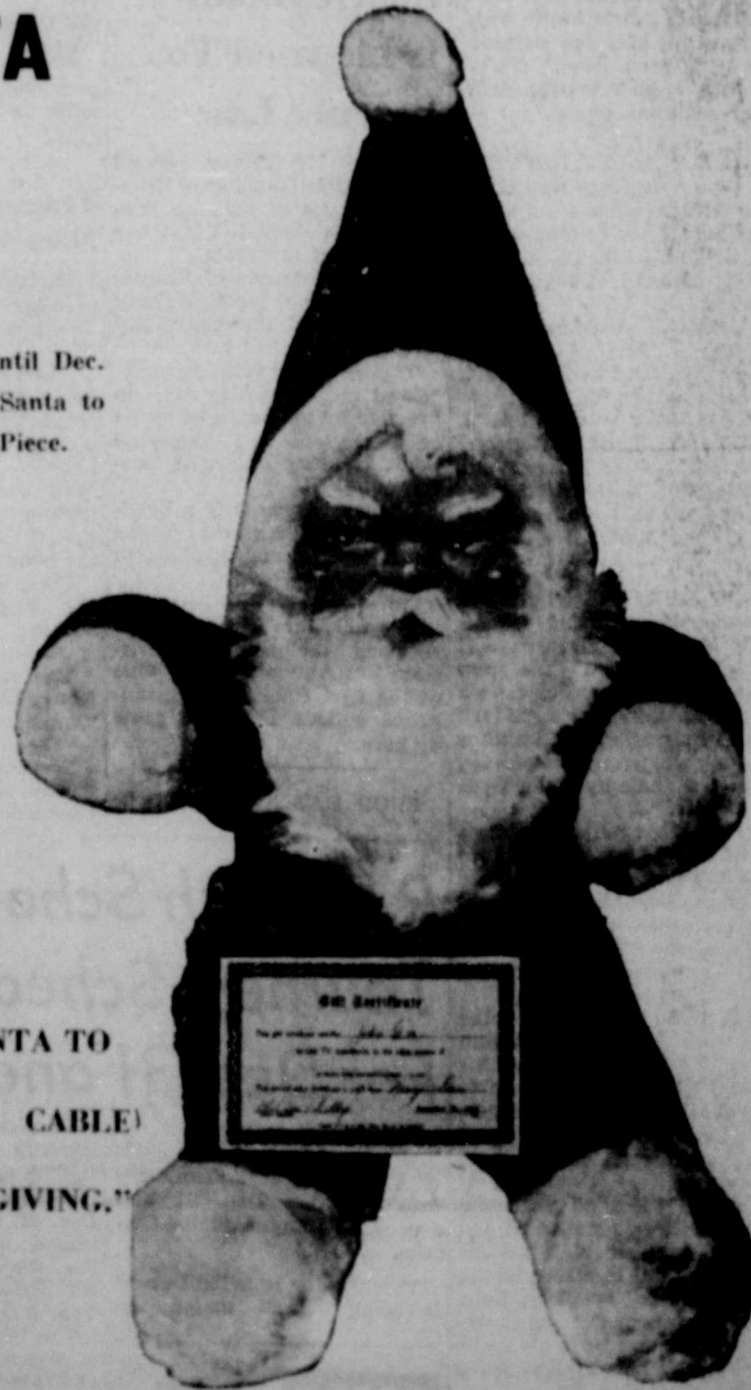
