Funeral services for Mrs. Harriette C. Arterburn, 90, mother of E. F. Arterburn of Ranger, were held at 2 p. m. Saturday in Oklahoma in the Stuart Baptist Church with the Rev. W. T. Martin officiating. Burial was in the family plot at Pryor Cemetery.

Mrs. Arterburn died Tuesday, February 23, from injuries received in a fall last October. She suffered a broken hip in the mishap.

She was born Sept. 12, 1874, at Spring Place, Ga., and married Elzy Watkins Arterburn at Ardmore in 1893. He died in 1945. The Arterburns moved to Stuart in 1917, and to three miles north of Kiowa in 1933, the current home site. She was a member of the Stuart First Baptist Church.

Survivors include three sons, E. F. of Ranger, Elbert of Commerce, and Jim of McAlister, three daughters, Mrs. Ethel Sterling of Frink, Mrs. Pauline Hugo of the home, and Mrs. Purina Faris, Lakewood, Calif.; 18 grandchildren; 46 great grandchildren and 10 great, great grandchildren.

## 2 Dead, Patrolman In Poor Condition, Charges Pend Following Highway Crash

Two men are dead, a highway patrolman in critical condition and a college student faces possible criminal charges as result of a series of incidents which happened in Eastland County last week end.

Two men were killed in a two truck auto crash just east of Ranger and the patrolman received serious injuries when struck by a car while directing traffic following the grinding crash.

Dead are William Wallace Cherry, a Cisco native and Eastland High School graduate, and M.Sgt. Robert A. Criswell, Oklahoma native. Injured is Eastland County Patrolman E. M. Rogers. Facing aggravated assault with a motor vehicle charges is a 20 year old Ira man.

Funeral services for William Wallace Cherry, 25, who was fatally injured in a car-truck collision late Saturday were held at 2 p. m. Tuesday at Rust Funeral Home Chapel with the Rev. Lee Fields of Carbon officiating. Burial was in Gunsight Cemetery with Rust Funeral Home in charge of arrangement.

Pfc. Cherry, a clerk-typist at the Army Recruiting Main Station in Abilene, was another soldier, M-Sgt. Robert A. Criswell of Sapulpa, Okla., were both killed when their car was in collision with two trucks about two miles east of Ranger Saturday night. Cherry was dead on arrival at Ranger General Hospital, and Criswell died a few minutes later.

## Patrolman Rogers 'Fair'; Is Reportedly Not Resting Well

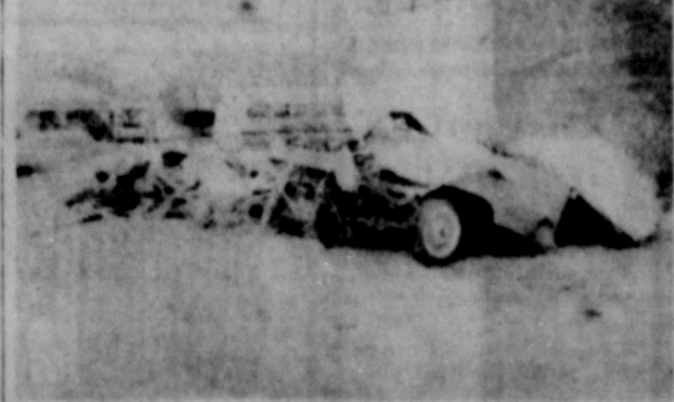
Highway Patrolman E. M. Rogers of Eastland was reported in fair condition, but not resting too well, at Hendrick Memorial Hospital in Abilene Wednesday where he is being treated for severe injuries received when he was struck by an auto while directing traffic.

He was being kept under heavy sedation, but was reported conscious except for the sedation. He has both legs in casts. His left leg is in a full cast and his right leg is shrouded low around the ankle. A cast has also been put on his left arm around the wrist area. He has severe lacerations around the head and is being checked for internal injuries. He

has undergone surgery and more is anticipated in about 10 days, it is reported.

Rogers was directing traffic Saturday night at the scene of a double-fatality accident some two miles east of the city limits of Ranger, about two hours after the accident. Ranger Volunteer Fireman Gene Gourley yelled to Rogers to watch an oncoming vehicle, but Rogers, who was at the time instructing a bus in going around the crash vehicles, apparently didn't hear the warning and was struck head on by the auto, which was reported to be going about 65 miles an hour in the 45 MPH construction zone. Rogers was knocked about 80 feet, and the rear of the auto

## TESCO Seeks Commission Okay On Rate Reduction And For New Franchise

Texas Electric Service Company will propose to the City Commissioners Thursday approval of a voluntary reduction in electric service rates in the City of Ranger and approval of a new franchise which incorporates an increase in street and alley rental payments to the City. The Company now pays to the City 2 per cent of the Company's revenues from the sale of electricity within the City of Ranger. The new franchise would increase these payments to 3 per cent of the revenues.

The principal changes to be proposed in rates are a reduction in the rate applicable to residential customers, additional promotional features to encourage increased residential use in the winter months, and the addition of a new rate for all - electric homes.

All residential customers using more than 65 kilowatt-hours in a month will be benefited. These proposed changes in residential rates will result in a reduction in excess of 5 per cent in the annual revenues from customers of the Company on residential rates.

No electric service bills will be increased by the revised Schedule of Rates.

The rate adjustment made by the Company in 1963 was proportionally larger for the below average residential user. The benefits under the new rates are proportionally larger to the above average residential customers, such as those with summer air conditioning in their homes.

Other proposed changes in rates will reduce bills for some public schools and the minimum bills under the large general service rate.

The proposed rate reduction is a continuation of the long-established policy of Texas Electric Service Company to voluntarily reduce electric rates from time to time as conditions permit.

The Company is presently operating in the City of Ranger under a franchise granted in 1919. This franchise will expire March 1, 1969. Other cities served by the Company in this area, Eastland, Breckenridge, Graham, Gorman, De Leon, and Carbon, have granted a similar franchises in recent years.

The new franchise is not

an exclusive franchise. It will increase the Company's street and alley rental payments to the City from 2 per cent to 3 per cent. The additional payment for 1965 would amount to approximately \$1,990, bringing the total 1965 street and alley rental payment to approximately \$5,970.

The franchise must be read at two regular meetings of the Commission and published in full in the newspaper. The revised Schedule of Rates would become effective on bills prepared from meter readings made on and after 30 days following approval by the City Commissioners.

## Three Men File For City Election

Two more candidates filed for places on the ballot in the coming city election on Tuesday, April 6.

Mrs. Avis Jones, Ranger city secretary, reported Tuesday afternoon that the two men — C. J. Davis and Grover C. McGown — formally filed at City Hall Monday. Final deadline for filing is Saturday, Mar. 6.

McGown, who has served as Ranger water commissioner for the past two years, filed for re-election to that post. He was the second incumbent member of the City Commission to seek another two-year term of office. First to announce was Fred Bennett street commissioner, who also was first elected two years ago.

McGown, a resident of Ranger since 1919, formerly was associated with Illinois Pipeline and Premier Oil & Refining Co.

He is a member of the First Baptist Church, a Mason and formerly was active in the Ranger Rotary Club.

Mr. and Mrs. McGown have six children — four sons and two daughters.

One of their sons is Ludwig McGown, who owns and operates the Porky Pig drive-in in Ranger. Ivan McGown resides at McGraw Harvey McGown lives in Dallas and James McGown is employed at Perrin Air Force Base, Denison.

One of the McGowns' daughters is Mrs. Ray Kennedy of Austin and the other, Mrs. Bill Hood, resides at McGregor.

The candidate for police commissioner, a resident of Ranger for the past 18 years, was employed by the Texas & Pacific Railway Co. for 10 years. He presently is asso-

ciated with T. C. Fisher, local used car dealer.

Davis, a native of Coleman, came to Ranger following his discharge from the U. S. Army after World War II. His wife, Carrie, is employed by Ranger Dry Cleaners.

The Davises are Methodists. He is a member of the Elks Club and the Ranger post of the American Legion.

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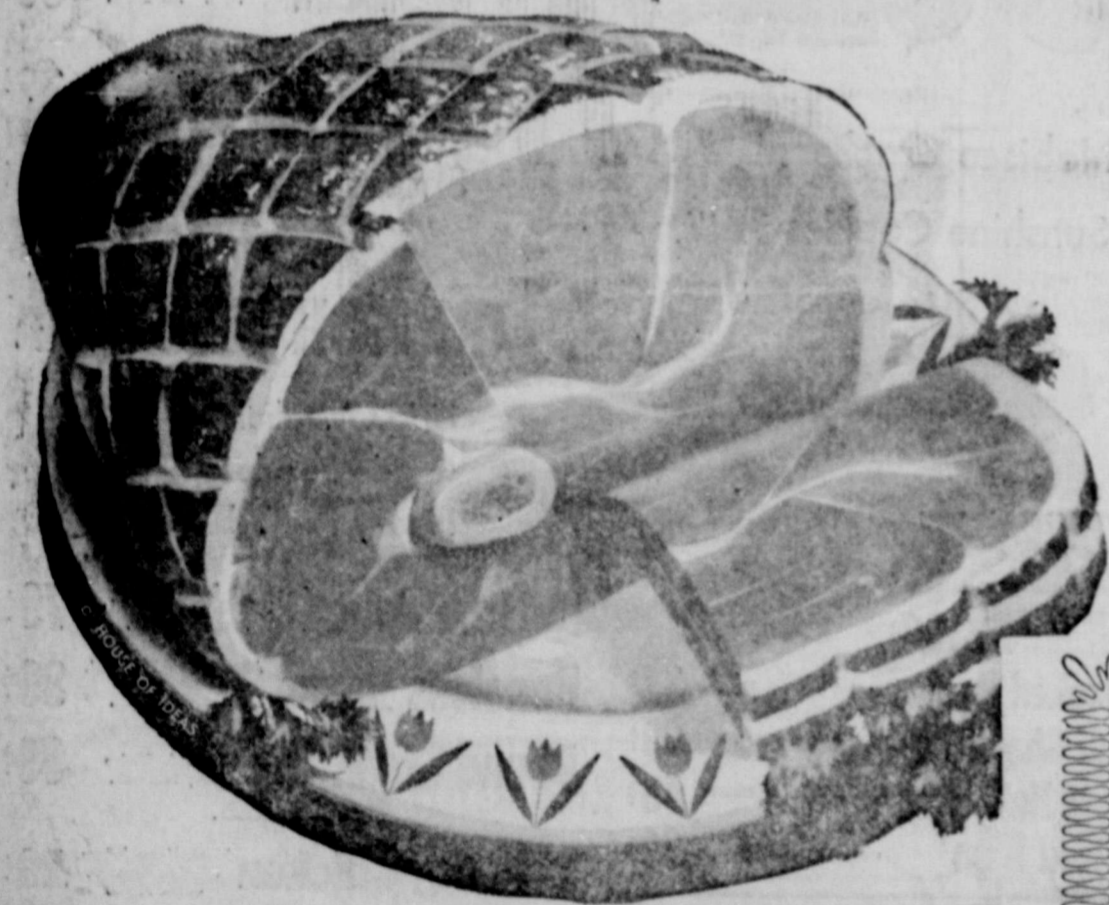
