Mrs. Helton, a native of De Leon, died Friday at noon in Ranger General Hospital following a lengthy illness.

Born Gwen A. Smith in De Leon Nov. 14, 1917, she was a seamstress with Miller's Sporting Goods Manufacturing Co. of Fort Worth until she became ill in July 1963. She came here this year.

Survivors include one daughter, Martha Jamie, and one son, David J., both of the home; one sister, Mrs. Lola V. Park of Ranger; two aunts and a number of cousins.

Mayor Newnham, Bennett Unopposed; 6 Candidates Seek 3 Commission Posts

Two candidates for the Ranger City Commission in the coming municipal election on Tuesday, April 6, are unopposed.

They are Mayor Morris Newnham, city head since 1961 who is a candidate for a third term, and Fred Bennett, incumbent street commissioner who is seeking a second elective term. Bennett was the first candidate to announce, filing his intent several weeks ago.

A short time following Bennett's formal declaration as a candidate, Grover C. McGown, incumbent water commissioner, announced for re-

election. And on the same day, C. J. Davis pitched his hat in the political ring, seeking the office of police commissioner.

George Falls, incumbent police commissioner, did not seek re-election.

Filing just prior to the deadline last weekend were Mayor Newnham; W. J. Van Bibber, incumbent finance commissioner seeking the office of police commissioner; Robert Allen, candidate for water commissioner, and Doyle Gentry and Dewey Cox Jr., candidates for finance commissioner.

Mayor Newnham, member of a pioneer Ranger family, served as finance commissioner prior to his election to the mayorship in 1961. He is a past president of (Continued on page 6)

Rattlesnake Roundup Underway At Strawn; To Wind Up Sunday

First annual Rattlesnake Roundup for this area, sponsored by the Strawn post of the American Legion, will wind up late Sunday afternoon.

Registration began Friday at 1 p.m. and continued through Sunday at 11 a.m.

Bill Ransberger, snake authority from Sweetwater, is engineering the demonstrations and safety precautions during the hunt. Shelly Downs of Florida milks the snakes for the public to watch. Demonstrations began Saturday at 9 a.m.

Cash prizes of \$150 are being awarded for hunters who present their catches to the judges.

Shalor Copeland and his cowhands built a pit to house the captured snakes. All cracks have been filled to omit danger to persons inside the American Legion Hall.

The American Legion Ladies Auxiliary will serve rattlesnake steaks (prepared at the hall) with pinto beans and cole slaw. All proceeds will go to the American Legion.

Prizes are being given for the following: Each day — \$25 for the most pounds in snakes; \$15 for the most snakes. End-of-run prizes: \$10 for the longest snake; \$10 for the greatest number of rattlers, a total of \$50 will be divided between the winners of the largest aggregate number of snakes and the most number of aggregate pounds of snakes. A total of \$50 will be awarded for the first Coral snake brought in. Copperheads will count the same as rattlesnakes on number and pounds.

Judge George Davenport To Be Buried Sunday at 2 p.m.

Funeral services for Judge George L. Davenport, 91, will be held Sunday at 2 p.m. in the Arrington Hamner Funeral Chapel in Eastland with Rev. J. Lester Davenport, his nephew, officiating.

Judge Davenport died Saturday morning at 2 a. m. in All Saints Hospital at Fort Worth, where he had been a patient for some time.

Survivors include one daughter, Mrs. John Brachen of Fort Worth; and several nieces and

nephews, including Rev. Davenport, W. F. Davenport and Miss Davenport, all of Eastland.

Born Aug. 27, 1873, in Coryell County (Eagle Springs, Tex.) he served as 91st District Court Judge in Eastland from 1921 until his retirement in 1952. His vacancy on the bench was filled by the late Judge T. M. Collie.

He came to Eastland with his parents at the age of 14 and read law in local law offices. He was admitted to the bar in this county and was county attorney for two years.

Ranger Woman's Murder Trial Opens Monday; D A Will Ask Death Penalty

Maurine Bratton, 45, of Ranger will go on trial for murder in 91st District Court Monday morning. She is under indictment for the Sept. 30, 1963, slaying of her former husband, R. L. Bratton. The couple had been divorced for some time. The shooting occurred at Mrs. Bratton's ranch home near Ranger.

She has been free on \$2,500 bond since. Her attorney, Bill Hart of Eastland, said that no continuance motion will be asked, and that he is ready to go to trial.

District - County Attorney Perry Brown states that he is also ready for trial.

A special venire of 100 persons has been called for possible service, and qualification will begin at 9 a.m. Monday. Mr. Brown indicated that he will attempt to qualify jurors on the death sentence.

District Judge Frank Sparks, who estimates that the trial will take about three days, expressed confidence that a jury can be picked from the venire, without calling additional.

The indictment against Mrs. Bratton charges murder with malice.

The case this week will mark the first murder trial in the 91st District Court to be presided over by Judge Sparks and prosecuted by Attorney Brown.

Attorney Hart successfully represented a Ranger Negro last fall and won an acquittal on a murder trial.

Mrs. Bratton, her 19-year-old daughter and two grandchildren, live at the ranch home near Ranger.

A Hampshire, shown by Bill Cozart, Cisco FFA boy, is the grand champion fat pig of the 1965 Eastland County Livestock Show which unreeled in Eastland this weekend.

Over 500 animals competed for prize money and ribbons in the annual show, and the quality of the stock prompted judges to exclaim "Tops," and "As good as you'll find," repeatedly. Some \$1,800 went as prize money.

Terry Geyer, Rising Star FFA member, showed the reserve champion fat pig, a Duroc, during the Friday afternoon competition.

All animals were to have been on the grounds by 10 p.m. Thursday and classifying and sifting began at 8 a.m. Friday. Judging of Angora Goats began at 10 a.m. and the breeding swine judging at 1 p.m. Fat barrow judging began at 2. Breeding sheep (fine wool, Shorthorn and others) got under way at 7 p.m. Friday, followed by a FFA-4-H judging contest.

Saturday's action began with

fat lamb judging at 8; fat steer judging at 11; and breeding beef cattle at 2 p.m. The annual auction at the Eastland Auction Co. closed the crowd-attracting event Saturday night.

Sam Kimmell of Cisco is president of the sponsoring Eastland County Livestock Raisers Association, and Robert Kincaid of Cisco was general show superintendent. Both called this year's show a great success.

attended the University of London for one month and spent considerable time in France, Italy, Spain, Switzerland, Holland, and other countries.

Mrs. Morris thinks the French people the most hostile towards Americans of all Europeans. They have a mannerism that suggests conceit and arrogance. People in most of the other countries, however, she found hospitable and friendly. While visiting these countries Mrs. Morris stayed away from the guided tours as much as possible in order to observe more of the customs and mannerisms of the people.

She visited libraries, newspaper offices, government buildings and schools, and thereby learned much about the people and their way of life that the average tourist never encounters.

Miss Nancy Coody has also traveled in Europe quite extensively. She prefers Spain over the other countries, mainly because she speaks the language fluently. She spent two years in Spain, studying and serving as an interpreter for a movie production company.

She visited many other European countries, and she, like Mrs. Morris, detected the hostile air of the people in France. She found that almost all other European people, especially the Spanish, are very friendly toward Americans.

Miss Dorothy Linn, Ranger Junior College's librarian, toured the European countries while residing in Germany, where she made many friends while serving as special services librarian.

She found all the people of Europe friendly toward foreign travelers except the French and thinks the Italians are probably the most friendly. Unlike Miss Coody, who was impressed with the horror of the German concentration camps, Miss Linn was impressed with a soccer game in Germany. She was fascinated by the huge throng of spectators attending.

All three of these travelers agree on the fact that a valuable education can be derived from European travel if the tourist adopts the proper attitude. One must not expect


convention will be held in the Rice Hotel at Houston on the 12 and 13 of March.

"The impressive museum, which will cost an estimated \$500,000, would be erected on a 25-acre site now owned by the Ranger Chamber of Commerce. The site would be deeded to Texas Oil Museum, Inc., an independent, non-profit corporation.

"The museum has been in the planning stage a number of years, but it appears now its sponsors are ready to go in providing the facility. It is a tremendous project, but one which would do credit to the fabulous, early-day oil boom in the Ranger area — one of the most highly publicized in the history of the petroleum industry.

"Five aluminum oil derricks protruding through the flat roof of the building would be an outstanding feature. Other derricks would be worked into the attractive design. Flood lights would be installed on the crowns of the five projecting derricks. Replica buildings of the oil boom era would be erected on each side of a mall at the rear of the main building.

"An old cable tool rig and other pieces of oil field equipment used during the early oil play in the area also would be displayed.

"All this recalls that studies have been underway for several years now by the Midland Chamber of Commerce, Permian Basin Petroleum Pioneers, and others for building and equipping a Permian Basin Petroleum Museum in Midland. Considerable work has been done on the proposal.

"Now perhaps is the time to revitalize the program, which certainly should not be delayed too much longer.

"The museum here would feature the rotary rig era in the Permian Basin Empire, which followed the cable tool days featured in the Ranger museum."
