Rev. Emil Slovacek, Native Texan, Is New Catholic Pastor for Tri-Cities Area

The Rev. Emil Slovacek recently assumed his duties as the new pastor of St. Rita's Catholic Church, Ranger, and the Missions of St. Francis, Eastland, and Holy Rosary, Cisco. Rev. Slovacek had been assigned in Fort Worth prior to take over the Eastland County parishes. He was born in Dallas where he attended St. Joseph's Academy in grammar and high school. After graduating from high school, he entered the Army and served in World War II as a gunner

in a tank battalion in Europe, and earned four battle stars. Following his discharge from the armed forces in 1945 he entered St. John's Seminary, Little Rock, Ark., where he received his philosophical and theological studies for the priesthood being ordained on April 19, 1964. His first assignment as an assistant pastor was at St. Patrick's Cathedral in Fort Worth. Other assignments as an assistant pastor include St. Andrews, Fort Worth, St. John's, Ennis, Texas and St. Paul's, Fort Worth.

County Bank Deposits Total Over \$17 Million

Bank deposits of the five banks in Eastland County totaled \$17,757,177 at the end of the first quarter, and loans amounted to \$9,263,259. Only the loan figure is up from immediate past reportings, but individual banks in the county have shown increases in certain areas. The present deposits total is below the \$18,273,538 recorded at the end of 1964, and slightly lower than the five-bank total of \$17,842,764 reported at the end of the first quarter of 1964. Only the First National of Cisco and the Eastland National reported higher first quarter deposits than three months ago. The first quarter totals are traditionally lowest of the year, accounting for the lower figures, it is reported. The First State Bank of Rising Star recorded a substantial increase from its year-ago figure, but was down from the last 1964 report. Money on loan in the county is up slightly from the December report and considerably from the April, year ago figure. The accompanying chart details individual totals.

David Allsup Will Be 'Roughing It' Again In Summer Months

David B. Allsup of Ranger Junior College will be a participant in the Summer Field and Earth Science Institute at Colorado State University, Fort Collins, Colorado, from June 12 to August 9. The Institute, sponsored by the National Science Foundation, will be conducted at Pingree Park at an altitude of 9,000 feet to study the physical and historical geology of the terrain up to 11,500 feet, as well as the ecology of the plants and animals of the area. The first week will be spent in camp, and the next three weeks hiking with bed roll and camping equipment. Some of the other items. Allsup will take are a pocket knife, flashlight, binoculars, and rain coat, for the group will be living out for three weeks. While in camp at Pingree Park, the Institute members will share dining facilities with the foresters located there. The members of the Institute will be required to purchase \$25 worth of books and other plant mounting materials. Dr. Edward B. Reed, director of the Institute, states that the primary aim of the staff is to challenge them in areas other than book reading. Allsup has also been selected as an alternate for the University of Michigan Radiation Biology Institute at Ann Arbor, Michigan, from June 28 to August 6. Instructor in biology at Ranger Junior College, Allsup, who has had a life Texas Teacher's certificate for elementary and high school work as well as for administrative work as superintendent or principal since 1961, has 24 hours credit in education and 26 hours credit in biological sciences beyond the master's degree. This is the third summer that he has had a National Science Foundation grant for further study, having previously attended University of Oklahoma and New Mexico Highlands. Mrs. B. S. Lester Davenport officiating, assisted by Rev. Cyrus Barcus of Hillsboro, former pastor. Burial was in Eastland Cemetery with Arrington Hamner Funeral Home in charge.

Mr. Horton died at 2:30 a.m. Monday in Eastland Memorial Hospital after suffering a heart attack. He had entered the hospital shortly before midnight.

A wholesale tire dealer, Mr. Horton represented Seiberling Tire Company and was one of the oldest Seiberling dealers in the nation.

Born July 2, 1891, in Lincoln, Neb., he moved to Eastland with his family in 1919 from Topeka, Kan.

Mr. Horton was a past president of the Rotary Club and vice president at the time of his death. For years he had been editor of the Rotary Gusher, printed weekly for the membership. He was a member of the 9-49 Men's Bible Class of the Methodist Church, a longtime active member of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce, and was a supporter of Boy Scout activities.

An avid sportsman and gun collector, Mr. Horton was Texas champion state trap shooter in 1925. His collection of antique and contemporary models was mounted on the wall of his downtown office. The collection includes some of the guns used in the famous Santa Claus bank robbery in Cisco.

Mr. and Mrs. Horton would have celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary at the end of this month.

Survivors include his wife; one son, Horace Horton, of Longview; one brother, Horace Horton, of Chicago, Ill.; one sister, Mrs. Edwin Montgomery, of Lake City, Fla.; and three grandchildren.

Pct. 4 Hospital District Election Called May 25

Residents of Precinct Four (the Cisco area) of Eastland County will go to the polls on Tuesday, May 25, and ballot on the proposition of creating a hospital district and levying a tax not to exceed 75 cents per \$100 valuation to support it.

The election was called Monday at a regular meeting of the Eastland County Commissioners Court at the courthouse in Eastland. The court took the action after being presented a petition signed by 59 voters of the precinct.

The election order specified that ballots be cast at the City Hall in Cisco with J. V. Heyser as presiding judge and at the Community Center in Scranton with F. S. Boland as presiding judge. Mrs. Harold Ading of the city hall staff was named clerk for absentee voting.

The official ballot will be

printed as follows:
FOR or AGAINST the creation of the Cisco Hospital District, and providing for the levy of annual taxes not to exceed 75 cents on the \$100 valuation of all taxable property within such district."

Only resident, qualified taxpayers will be eligible to cast ballots in the election, the notice said.

The Chamber of Commerce public health committee, in working on the project for the past several years, reported last week that a community survey shows that the Cisco area needs a 25 to 30 bed hospital.

Issuance of bonds in the amount of \$400,000 or more to build the hospital has been proposed. Authority to vote on the district proposition was provided in a recent bill passed by the Legislature and signed into law by Governor John Connally.

Recreation Center Gets Tentative FHA Okay

Green light for the development of the \$112,000 Lakewood Recreation Center along Highway 36 midway between Rising Star and Cross Plains in Eastland County has been tentatively given by the Farmers Home Administration, Eastland County FHA Manager Homer Cole announced Monday.

Next step toward the realization of the recreation area will be the preparation of specifications for bids, Cole said, and the engineering firm of Yeates and Decker of Abilene will begin this immediately. The recreation complex will include a \$30,000 club house, a nine-hole golf course, an 18-hole miniature golf course, an Olympic-regulation swimming pool, picnic and camping facilities as well as a 38-acre lake with boat docks. A \$6,000 tenant home will also be built.

State and national FHA approval has been granted, Cole said, pending the availability of funds, which are to be available by the time bids are let, he said.
