Ground Broken For New Church During Ceremonies Staged At Baptist Building Site Sunday

Following an abbreviated worship service at First Baptist Church Sunday morning, members of the congregation left the church and gathered on the site where a new \$70,000 religious edifice will be erected.

W. A. (Tony) Lewis and Mrs. H. G. Adams Sr., oldest church members of the congregation, manned the shovel which turned the first earth in a formal ground-breaking ceremony.

Following the "Doxology," Rev. Avery Sullivan, pastor of the church, made a few remarks and expressed appreciation to the committees which have worked on the project which is due to be completed next fall.

Introduced were Dr. W. P. Watkins, chairman of the finance committee, L. L. Bruce, head of the survey committee,

and C. B. Pruet, chairman of the building committee. Facilities of the new building will include a sanctuary, educational class rooms, and nursery, all year-round heat and air-conditioned.

The present church edifice will be used as an educational building. The old and new structures will be joined by a covered walk-away.

The ground-breaking ritual was closed with the congregation singing the hymn, "Blest Be the Tie That Binds."

Final Rites For Joseph L. Dugan Held Monday

Funeral services for Joseph Leo Dugan of Clyde, 87-year-old father of Gerald Dugan of Ranger, were held Monday morning at 10 a.m. at St. Joachim Catholic Church in Clyde.

Mr. Dugan, a pioneer Callahan County rancher, died Saturday afternoon at 2:45 o'clock in St. Ann Hospital, Abilene. He had been in failing health for some time.

Following the Monday morning rites, he was interred in the Catholic Cemetery at Clyde. Rosary was recited for the deceased Sunday evening at 8 o'clock at the Bailey Funeral Home, Clyde, which was in charge of arrangements. He was born Nov. 10, 1877, in Norristown, Pa. and married Elizabeth Ready April 12, 1915, in Clyde. Mr. Dugan came to Clyde in 1887 at the age of 10 and had lived here all his life except for 10 years spent in Flagstaff, Ariz., where he worked at a lumber mill.

Added to District 17 are two counties from District 13 (Wichita Falls), Haskell and Throckmorton; two from District 19 (Howard and Mitchell); one from District 16 (El Paso), Glasscock; and seven from District 21 (San Angelo, Odessa-San Antonio), Sterling, Coke, Runnels, Coleman, Brown, Concho and Mills.

District 17 thus climbs from 287,889 to 376,200.

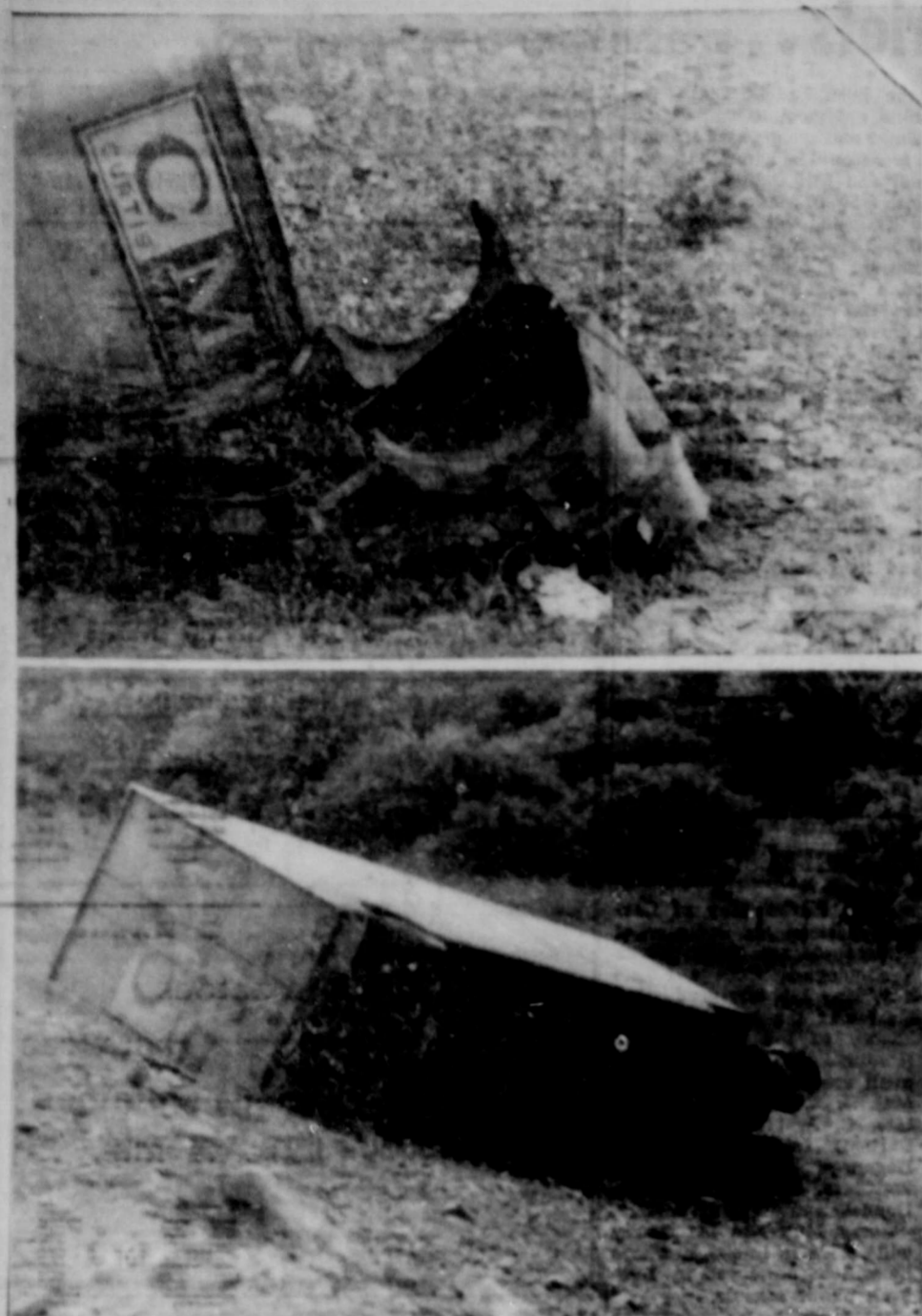
