STATE REP. Wayne Gibbens had a busy span of toil during the recent session of the Texas Legislature.

Here, in brief, from an Austin newsmen is comment relating to Rep. Gibbons' accomplishments:

"As was the case with chairmen of other demanding committees, Rep. Wayne Gibbens of Breckenridge had little time to his own bills.

"But some significant legislation carries Gibbens' name, including the Oil and Gas Pooling bill which he co-authored; one to create a Water Resources Board; one authorizing five days' paid sick leave annually for teachers; and one requiring credit insurance companies to pay \$500 annual fees to the State Insurance Board.

"Gibbens' bill, which failed to pass included those authorizing joint stockmutual insurance companies; one relating to re-insurance provisions in health insurance policies; a proposal to create a Water Resources Research Institute; and one to create a Juvenile Board in Eastland County."

Approximately 150 to 200 people crowded Willows Park swimming pool in Ranger Sunday afternoon between 2 and 6 o'clock to mark the official opening of the pool for the sweltering summer season.

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Applications Being Taken for Some 70 DPS Vacancies

Sgt. Roger Sosebee, in charge of the Eastland County Office, Department of Public Safety, announced today there are 70 vacancies in the uniformed patrol services with increased salaries going into effect September 1 with an additional raise one year later.

The vacancies exist in all parts of the State, and will be filled by competitive examination. Salaries will range from \$453 up to \$484 per month, depending on the length of service," Sosebee stated.

This is an opportunity for qualified young men to be dedicated career officers in a proud organization whose purpose is to serve and protect the people of Texas," stated. "It is also an opportunity for men to further their education while in training."

Student patrolmen receive some 800 hours of study in 95 subjects, such as highway law, accident investigation, first aid, professional driving, care and use of firearms and many other courses. While in training at the DPS Law Enforcement Academy in Austin, trainees receive \$375 per month and after 16 weeks they become commissioned officers.

Applications and other information can be obtained by contacting any DPS Patrolman or the Eastland County Courthouse DPS office. July 6 is the deadline for filing applications for the next examination on July 14 and 15 for the training school beginning August 31.

COST OF MEDICARE? HERE IT IS FOR INDIVIDUALS, FIRMS

Too much has been said in the moral and emotional aspects, and too little on the cost, in the drive to enact the Medicare program.

Already it has passed the House. It now awaits action in the Senate, and admittedly it appears pretty likely to argue for its change, much less its defeat, at this hour in the light of the preponderant political power wielded behind it.

Yet let it be understood that the price tag will be high for salaried individuals, and their employers if Medicare becomes law in its present form.

Medicare, it will be remembered, would be attached to Social Security for financing. Social Security now takes \$4 per year from the employee, and the same amount from the employer, from the \$4,800 in annual salary. It is based on the present 3.625 per cent. Even under existing law, it will be stepped up to \$198 per year in 1966, and to \$222 per year in 1968.

The Medicare bill would raise the total Social Security withholding in eight stages over the next 21 years.

In 1966, the salary base would be increased from \$4,800 to \$5,600; the Social Security tax would go up to 4 per cent, and a new hospital insurance tax rate of .35 per cent would be added.

This would cost the employee and employer each \$243.60 per year, as compared to the present \$174.

The salary base, the Social Security tax rate and the hospital insurance tax rate would be stepped up by stages in the coming years, making the cost to the individual and the employer higher each time.

The salary base would go up to \$10,000, to \$6,600 in 1971. The Social Security tax would go up to 4.4 per cent in 1969 and 4.8 per cent in 1973. The hospital insurance tax rate would go up to .50 of a per cent in 1967, .55 per cent in 1973, .60 per cent in 1979, .70 per cent in 1980 and .80 per cent in 1987.

The total cost to the employee and employer, each, by 1987, would be \$396.60 a year.

If subsequent congresses don't pile more tax on top of that, and who will bet they won't?

The \$369.60 a year means, for the employee, \$33.30 a month.

For employers, that can be multiplied by the number of covered employees, and for even some medium sized Abilene firms, that can run into a lot of money, a tremendous boost in cost of doing business.

This is taxation, exactly as direct as income taxes.

Somewhere there is the point beyond which individuals and corporations, the national economy, cannot carry further tax burden.

Eddie Smith, TCU Senior, Whips Medalist 5-4 For Lone Cedar Championship

Eddie Smith, of Fort Worth narrowly averted disaster in Sunday morning's third round, then waited home in the finale with a surprisingly easy 5-4 victory over Jacksboro's Steve Wheelis for the championship of the fifth annual Lone Cedar golf tourney.

Smith, a 22-year-old senior at Texas Christian, had to come from a two-hole deficit to dispose of Houston Satterwhite in the morning round to gain the finals against Wheelis, a TCU sophomore.

Wheelis, the tourney medalist, bought a finals berth with a 2-1 triumph over veteran J. D. Phillips in the third round.

An expected tight battle between the Horned Frog team-mates never developed, and the gallery deserted the match after the first nine holes to follow the championship flight consolation clash between youngster Roy Pearson of Ranger and veteran Bill Sikes of Brownwood.

Sikes finally won the match on the 20th hole after both had fought back from one-down deficits over the first 18.

Smith, who picked up his second tournament championship in as many weeks (he won last weekend's Breckenridge tourney), jumped off to a four-up advantage through the first four holes, then cat-and-moused it until Wheelis took himself out of the match by slamming his tee shot out of bounds on the par five 14th.

Another battle that caught the fancy of the gallery was the nip-and-tuck struggle between Abilene's Bob Justice and Cleburne's Mike Hopkins for the First Flight crown.

Justice lost a two-up edge by three-putting the 15th and 16th, took the lead again at the 17th with a par, then let by whacking his tee shot out of bounds on the 18th.

They halved the first extra hole with bogeys, although Justice probably could have won it had he not scuffed his second shot, and then Hopkins won it on the 20th when the Key City linkster went off into the rough.

Jim Harlow, another Abilenean, had probably the easiest time of any champ in winning the crown in the Third Flight, his first victory in more than 80 tournaments.

He only went nine holes in winning his second match against Hire Kinoshige, then after a 1-up triumph over Charles Freyschlag of Eastland in the third round, he went only nine holes in besting Jerry Atwell, who called it a day after losing seven of the first nine.

The second Flight title went to Fort Worth's Joe Keeton with a 1 up victory over Ben-

ny Skinner, and Art Shanafelt of Jacksboro nudged Cleburne's Tom Wiggington, 2-1, for the Fourth Flight crown.

Young Joe Hay, a 15-year-old Dallas schoolboy, claimed the title in the Fifth Flight with a 5-3 win over George Landrum.

17 STUDENT NURSES CAPPED IN IMPRESSIVE CEREMONIES

The importance of the nursing team in caring for patients was stressed by Dr. W. P. Watkins of Ranger as he addressed the Cisco Junior College Vocational Nursing Class last Tuesday evening in capping ceremonies.

The doctors depend on the nursing team to see that treatment ordered for patients is received, Dr. Watkins said. Students were encouraged to learn all they can in the classroom and then look forward to more learning situations after graduation as they work directly with people. Feelings of inadequacy will be experienced at times, he noted, but these feelings will pass with time and training.

Mrs. Veneta Mitchell, class instructor, in her brief talk on the significance of the cap, emphasized that the cap signifies humility and service to mankind. She stressed that self-control, the power of wise decisions, the power of observation, and reliability are important traits of a good nurse but can not be put on with a cap — they must be patiently acquired. The students were challenged to strive diligently to acquire those traits and to wear the school cap with pride and dignity.

The impressive candlelit ceremony was performed with each student nurse picking up a lamp and lighting the candle in it, after which her director of nurses placed the cap on her head. When all students were capped and had lamps burning, the stage lights were turned off and the song "My Task" was sung by Yvonna Glover.

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

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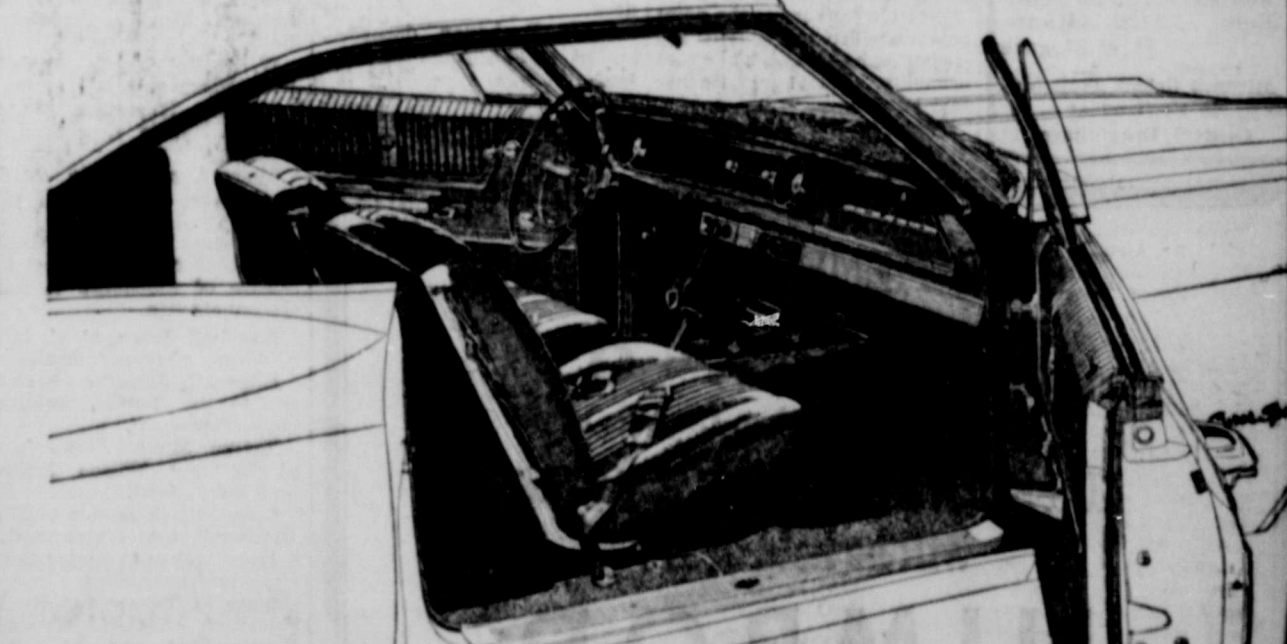
