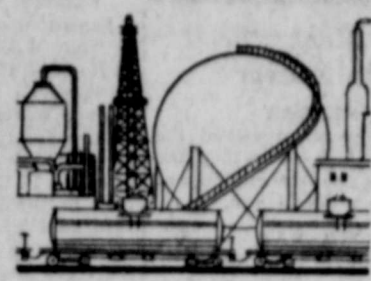

### Ranger Drops Duel To Clyde, 5-to-4, Friday

The Ranger Bulldogs dropped a close one to Clyde Friday night in diamond action. The score was 5 to 4. Wayne Boone led the Ranger hitters with three safeties, while Melton Kennedy and Larry Hrrington each slammed out a double. Hurling for the Ranger nine was L. H. Pounds who was touched for nine hits. He fanned eight Clyde batters. The Friday night set-back put the Bulldogs' season record at five wins, five losses. They will wind up the summer campaign next week in homestand duels here on Tuesday and Friday nights.

Hawk hurler Jerry Watson racked up 19 strike outs. Jimmy Cole on the Bluesock hill sent away 11. Both chunkers pitched the entire 7-inning game. Bill Watkins offered the Bluesocks' hope with runs in the third and fifth innings. In the fourth round, Pat Miller scooted across the plate to give the 'Socks another mark on the board. Hawks' tallies came from Rudy Mendoza, who scored in the second and fourth frames; Jerry Watson and Ronny Ainsworth counted in the 5th and 4th respectively. The final Hawk run was shoved across in the 6th inning to make the final score Hawks 5, 'Socks 3.

## Ranger Rodeo Draws Big Crowds Thursday' Friday

With the final performance yet to be unveiled, Ranger Jaycees enthusiastically reviewed the first two days of rodeo action Saturday morning and optimistically predicted that the '65 show would exceed the records of their first and second presentations in 1963 and 1964. Thursday night's opening performance was witnessed by a crowd estimated at about 4,000 and Friday night's gate was around the 2,500 mark. A capacity crowd was anticipated to be on hand to see the final performance Saturday night.

### Ranger Minister Is Speaker For Lions Luncheon

"Our Obligations" was the subject of a talk by the Rev. Ray Elliott, pastor of the First Methodist Church in Ranger, as the program feature Wednesday at the weekly luncheon of the Cisco Lions Club at the Victor Hotel. Rev. Elliott, who was introduced by Lion Jack Anderson, pointed out that "we have obligations to God, our country, and our fellow man as well as to ourselves and our families." He noted that "we are a nation under God" by the constitution and that our coins proclaim "In God We Trust."

The obligation to God and the church, he pointed out, includes keeping the pulpits free of state influence, leaving the ministers with liberty to preach the gospel. The recent riots among young people during July 4th outings might reflect a lack of a proper home environment — laxity in the obligation to the home and family, Rev. Elliott suggested. "We must teach by voice and example," he concluded. The minister quoted the second commandment — Thou shalt love thy neighbor — in discussing the obligations to the fellow man.

"We can discharge our obligation to the state and nation by defending the principles of Democracy and by being a full-time good citizen," Rev. Elliott said. "We can live a full life, aware of God's blessings, in fulfilling our obligation to ourselves," he said.

## Judging Contest Set For Sheep, Goat Field Day

An Angora goat judging contest will be a feature of the annual Sheep and Goat Field Day in Ranger on July 30, according to Dr. John Foster, chairman of the planning group. Several classes of goats will also be shown. B. S. Dudley, Jr., Ranger Vocational Agricultural Teacher, will be in charge of this event, Foster said. All attending may participate in the judging contest he said. The Ranger Chamber of Commerce and the Eastland County Agricultural Agents are co-sponsors of the affair. Three have been held previously. The field day will be held at the old Tiffen Gas Plant, three miles northeast of Ranger on the Hagemann ranch road. Other items on this program include status of the screw-worm program; toxic weeds and shrubs of central and west Texas to sheep and goats; future price outlook for wool, mohair and mutton; price supports on mohair and wool; and the activities of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association. To discuss or demonstrate the items on the agenda will be Dr. J. B. Henderson, Coleman, area veterinarian, Texas Animal Health Commission; Al Garrett, Mason, County Agricultural Agent; John G. McHoney, A&M University, College Station; Dr. W. T. Hardy, Sonora, superintendent of the Ranch Experiment Station; J. G. Meredith, Eastland ASC office manager; and Gaylord Hankins, Rock-Springs, president of the Texas Sheep.

### FIRST SUMMER TERM AT RJC ENDS JULY 15

Ranger Junior College will round out the first semester of its 1965 summer session July 15 with final examinations set for Tuesday, July 13, and Thursday, July 15. Registration for the second semester of the summer session will be held at 8 p.m. Monday, July 12, in the academic Building of the college. Courses to be offered are freshman and sophomore English, Texas state government, and the second semester of American History. Credit in the first semester of American history is not required as a prerequisite of History 102 (the second half of American history) nor does government 202 carry any prerequisite except sophomore standing. # Eastland County Goes Under P-W Commission Jurisdiction Aug. 30

Hunters, fishermen, land-owners, and other citizens of Eastland County have been assured an opportunity to participate in a modern, scientific program of fish and wildlife management by recent Acts of the 59th Legislature. The last legislature included Eastland County in the Regulatory Responsibility Program of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission, the laws becoming effective on August 30, 1965. The bill received Governor Connally's approval by signature on June 17th, 1965.

The new law specifically changes the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission with the responsibility of conducting scientific research on game and fish problems, setting of open seasons, bag limits, and methods of taking wildlife resources in the county. Heretofore, Eastland County has been under the Texas General Laws on wildlife. This is the first change for Eastland County in Game Laws since the first laws passed in Texas regulating wildlife.

of the people of this State." (Art. 817a, P.C. 1925).

Eastland County game warden, Maurice S. Dry, stated that the new program will follow the pattern of the Wildlife Program presently followed by Stephens, Erath, Palo Pinto, Shackelford, and other counties under the Possum Kingdom Game and Wildlife Commission.

County residents who wanted to obtain doe permits until now went to the County Clerk's office. The new law will give each rancher or landowner the number of deer allowed to be bagged on his land and the rancher will issue the permits given him by the Commission.

A principal objective of the regulatory responsibility program is the management of wildlife resources based upon scientific research findings. The program incorporates adaptability and flexibility to meet emergencies such as drought, flood, fire or other causes which may endanger one or more species of wildlife by waste or depletion.

The Commission can act in the interest of ranchmen, owners, and the hunting and fishing public to conserve the threatened wildlife species without waiting for normal Legislative procedure.

The Commission can act also to provide a more lenient cropping of the wildlife resources when research findings indicate an increased harvest is justified in the interest of proper management. Eastland County joins a rapidly growing number of counties in seeking the most efficient way possible to deal with local game regulations.

Residents of Eastland County will be informed of the findings from research conducted by game and fish technicians, game wardens and other resource specialists of the Commission. Before the Parks and Wildlife Commission issues the required proclamations containing information about open seasons, bag limits, and other rules and regulations for harvesting the counties wildlife resources, announced public hearings will be held. These hearings will be advertised at least 10 days prior to the hearing date.

At the public hearing the proposed regulations will be read and explained to those present. Pertinent questions the public may have will be answered. The full proceedings will be recorded and presented to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission when that body meets to prepare regulations for taking game and fish in the affected county.

Although the Legislature granted the Commission at least 90 days after the acts become effective to . . . conclude its investigations, hold its hearings, and promulgate its proclamations, rules, regulations, and orders." Eastland County citizens can be assured that Commission technicians are already at work on the program for their areas.

The benefits of participation in the regulatory responsibility program, in addition to the assurance that scientific research is set as the basis for management, are many. Under the program, the numbers of the various species can be adjusted to the carrying capacity of the range, thereby contributing to the health and well being of the individual animals and insuring against range damage or destruction.

Sex ratios of some species, such as deer, can through scientific harvesting be adjusted to the desired buck to doe ratio dictated by good herd management.

The over-all and lasting benefit is that the people of Eastland County have made a progressive step which will help insure the perpetuation and wise use of their wildlife resources for themselves and for future generations.

The law affecting the County becomes effective August 30, 1965. However, general and special laws now in effect will remain so until the issuance of the Commission's rules and regulations in accordance with the terms of the Acts.

Jurisdiction of the enforcement of these rules after they are passed by the Commission will not be changed.

The game warden will have full authority to enforce the Commission's rules and regulations. According to County Judge Scott Bailey all lesser misdemeanors that carry fines with no jail sentences or license forfeiture and which do not exceed \$200 will be taken to the Justice of the Peace Court.

All other misdemeanors with jail sentences and license forfeitures, since the Justice of the Peace does not have the right to revoke licenses, will fall under the jurisdiction of the County Court.

Judge Bailey said that the seriousness of the offense will determine where jurisdiction lies.

In less than ten months Eastland County citizens will be going to their prospective polls to vote in the county primary election. There are some nine offices which will be up for election.

Offices which will be up for election this coming year will be the county clerks position, district clerks position, the county judges position, the county treasurers position, commissioners from precincts 2 and 4, the five county justice of the peace position, the county school superintendents position, and a two year unexpired term for the district judges position.

## 49th Division Ready For Annual Summer Training

Thirty-six members of the Eastland County unit of the 49th Armored Division of the National Guard will leave Sunday, July 18, for North Fort Hood where they will receive their annual summer training.

The local unit will be accompanied by Captain W. H. Hogan of Clyde and Lt. Bill McCutchen of Eastland. Training will continue through August 1.

Among the high points of the division's field training

## 13 ASCS Reporters "Chaining" Acreage In Eastland County

A team of 13 reporters under the direction of Supervisor Everett Martin of the ASCS Office in Eastland are in the process of measuring and charting the some 38,000 acres of peanuts in Eastland County.

Beginning full-time Monday, the visitation and measurement of crops at some 1,300 farms in the county is expected to take about six weeks, ASCS Office Manager Gilbert Meredith reports.

He called Reporter Supervisor Martin one of the best in the business, and cited the 13 reporters as being well qualified men who know the farms and farmers in the county. The 13 are from all over the county, and in every case possible, they are individually sent to the areas each knows best, Meredith said.

In addition to the 38,000 acres of peanut crops, the reporters will also be checking some 10,000 acres of diverted acreage, about the same amount of feed grain acreage, about 1,800 acres of cotton land and about 40 soil-banked farms in the county, he said.

The reporters chain off the crop acreage and record their findings on aerial photographs which are in turn processed in the courthouse office by a staff of highly-trained personnel, to determine the total number of acres, as part of the Agricultural Stabilization Conservation Committee program.

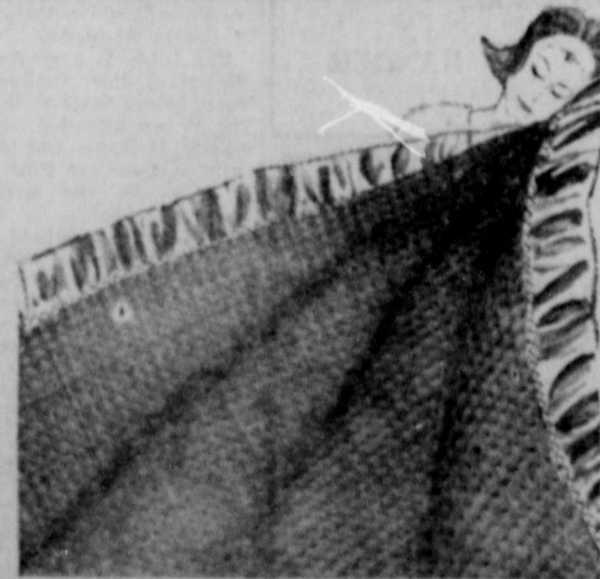

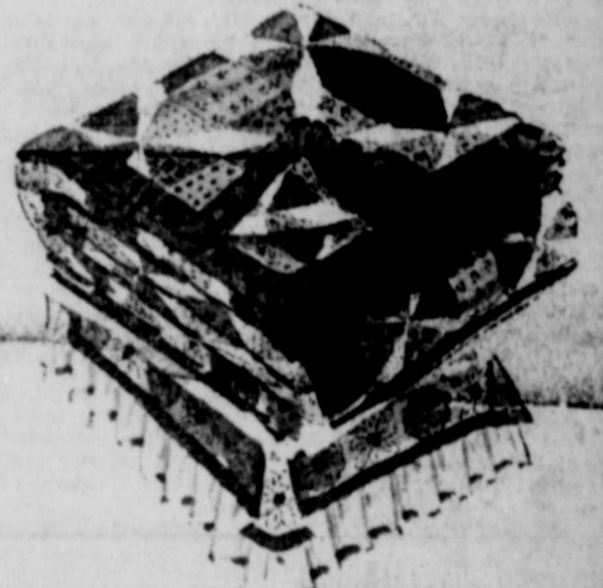

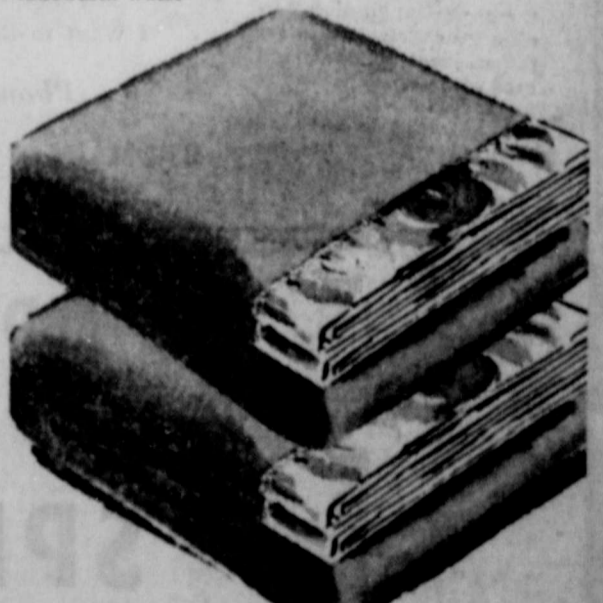
