





Every casing being processed for retreading must be in perfect condition. Any casing showing signs of overage, an impact break, or sidewall fatigue, is immediately removed, the building of a retreaded tire begins. Lighter sections of the buffed casing are built up to achieve perfect balance before it begins to take on its final shape. The buffed surface of the casing is then sprayed with cement and a perfectly proportioned strip of tread rubber is pressed around it.



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
