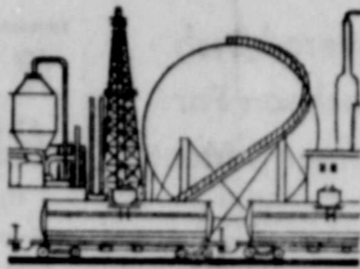

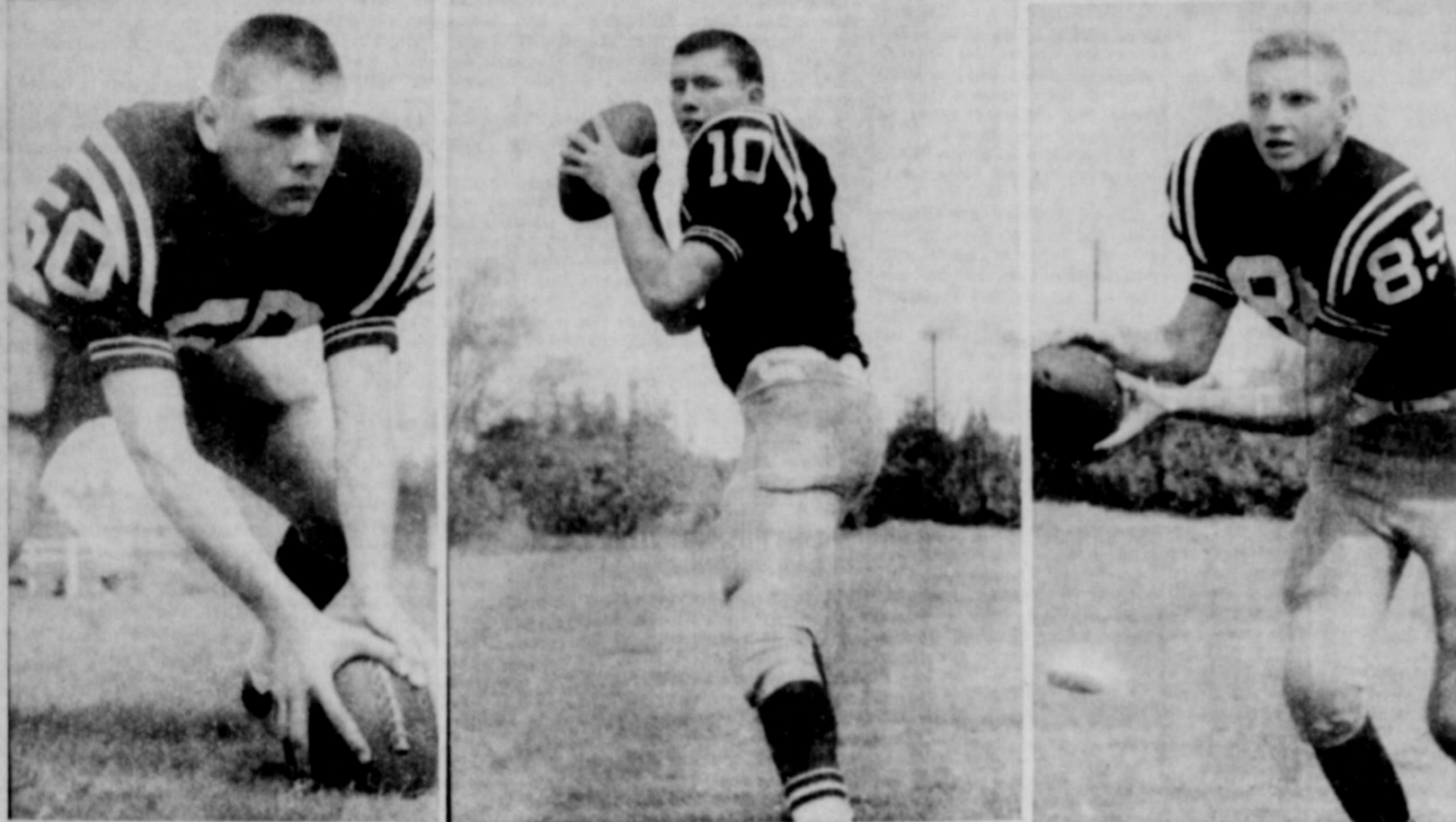

Texas United Fund Organization Coordinates, Assists Local UF Units With Planning, Services

The amount is small, but the purpose is important. In Ranger's coming United Fund campaign, only \$50 will go to the Texas United Fund organization. But it certainly will be \$50 very well spent.



"Give a day's pay — the United way!" is the slogan of the local drive headed by Dr. Luther Gohlke and Dr. John Foster. The Texas United Fund is an organization of the citizens of Texas and the local United Funds in the State of Texas. As presently constituted, Texas United Fund is a membership organization whose sole purpose is to promote the united way of giving on a statewide basis and to provide a rallying point to individual United Funds for joint action on common problems of federation. Immediately following World War II, the support of voluntary health and welfare agencies was in jeopardy. Communities were faced with an ever increasing number of campaigns. Community Chests were failing and all services were finding it difficult to raise necessary operating funds.

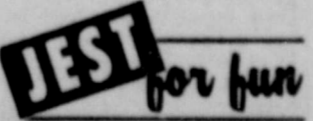

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NEW EDITION OF BOY SCOUT HANDBOOK PRINTED SEPT. 15

Scout Executive John H. ... of the Comanche Trail Council, Boy Scouts of America, has received an advance copy of the new seventh edition of the Boy Scout Handbook which the movement published on September 15.

"A new colorful cover for the Boy Scout Handbook," said Mr. Pound, "gives the color of Scouting and shows the intent of the movement to serve all boys whatever their race or religion."

The Boy Scout Handbook, he added, is undoubtedly the single book with the largest circulation of any book produced for young people anywhere in the world.

The initial print order of the new edition is 750,000 copies, one of the largest book orders in printing history. With this new edition the Boy Scout Handbook attains a total printing since 1910 of 21,175,000 copies.

The Boy Scout Handbook has introduced millions of boys to their first knowledge of nature lore, first aid, proper respect for the flag of the United States, and a wide range of know-how supplementing school courses.

It provides information which helps a boy prepare himself for advancement through the basic Boy Scout ranks. It helps a boy develop from a good hiker to a good camper. It also serves as a guidebook for the adult volunteer leaders in the Boy Scout program.

The role of the Boy Scout Handbook in helping boys "become good Scouts and good American citizens" is seen in the foreword by Joseph A. Brunton, Jr., the chief Scout Executive of the Boy Scouts of America, himself an Eagle Scout.

"The Boy Scout Handbook has always kept in step with the changing times and with new developments," Mr. Brunton writes. "The book you hold in your hand this moment is the very latest, updated version of it designed specifically for the American boy of today."

The Chief Scout Executive voiced the hope to the reader that "for years to come this book will be your companion as you follow the rugged of Scouting."

The price of the new handbook is \$1.00. It contains 448 pages and is available at the Comanche Trail Council Service Center, 409 E. Lee, Brownwood.

"The 4-H program stresses the four-fold development of youth: their head, heart, hands and health. Members of 4-H Clubs learn by conducting projects and participating in 4-H activities. By putting into action what they learn, club members improve their homes and communities."

"Since the 4-H program was inaugurated by the United States government in 1914, the 4-H movement has spread across our nation and to 76 foreign countries.

"More than 18,000 voluntary adult leaders work with club members in Texas and contribute to the success of 4-H.

Parents and friends of 4-H give support and encouragement to club members. The 4-H Club program is directed by the staff of the Agricultural Extension Service of Texas A&M University.

"The opportunities offered to 4-H Club members to grow in citizenship, leadership and practical skills are especially valuable to them, the State of Texas and the nation. The 4-H clubs are a providing ground for future leaders."

"THEREFORE, I, as Governor of Texas, do hereby designate the period of September 25-October 2, 1965, as 4-H CLUB WEEK in Texas."

MODERN RETREADING IS SCIENTIFIC PROCESS

Since World War II, the tire shopper has seen the results of a growing skill in the production of retreaded tires due to improved methods, materials and modern equipment. Today, retreaded tires provide economy, safety and long mileage; and good tire casings are such that they can be retreaded several times thanks to the advanced technology of tire cord and body construction. The scientific retreading process is a relatively simple one involving five major steps.

INSPECTION
First a worn tire is carefully inspected for damage, both inside and out. Essentially, if the cord body of the tire is completely intact and undamaged, the casing is suitable for retreading. Every casing being processed for retreading must be in perfect condition. Any casing showing signs of over-aging, an impact break, or sidewall fatigue, is immediately rejected.

BUFFING
The casing is then buffed to remove all the old tread. Buff-

ing is accomplished with a high speed rasp which rotates against the casing to shape it to exactly the proper contour and texture.

BUILDING
After the old tread has been completely removed, the building of a retreaded tire begins. Lighter sections of the buffed casing are built up to achieve perfect balance before it begins to take on its final shape. The buffed surface of the casing is then sprayed with cement and a perfectly proportioned strip of tread rubber is pressed around it.

CURING
With its new layer of tread rubber applied to it, the casing is next placed in a mold where it is cured with heat and pressure. The molds must be at just

the right temperature and just the right pressure for just the right amount of time to properly cure the tire. This thermal process completely fuses the new layer of tread rubber to the tire body and imparts a fresh new tread design.

FINAL INSPECTION
The last step in the retreading process is a final inspection. A finished retread receives a final inspection to insure against any possible defects that may have occurred in the final quality control step, preceding four steps. During the retread is also trimmed and painted. The retreader performs these final processing functions to make certain that his product meets the highest standards of safety, strength and endurance that scientific retreading provides.

Proper tire care results in longer and safer tire mileage. It can provide improved tire performance and more efficient operation of an automobile, and thus, save money.

Maintaining proper tire pressures is extremely essential. If this is not done, a tire will experience excessive tread wear because of the unavoidable heat build-up and distortion at higher speeds. Therefore, tire experts recommend a frequent check of tire pressures and periodic rotation of tires.

An over-inflated tire will cause excessive wear at the center of the tread, and an under-inflated tire will cause excessive wear at the outer-most parts of the tread. Correct tire inflation causes the entire tread surface to be in even contact with the road surface, and therefore, to wear evenly.

Quality Retreading Conforms To High National Standards

The retreading industry has a rigid set of national processing standards and a code of ethics. Retreaders who adhere to the national standards produce a high quality product. National standards supply the modern retreader with a set of guide lines "drawn up in the interests of motoring safety."

Established at a meeting of industry representatives in 1955, *The National Standards for Retreading Automobile and Truck Tires* is comprised of nine sections. The first two sections define the purpose and scope of the specifications and retreading standards.

The standards provide nationally recognized specifications for retreading tires, act as a basis for better understanding between processors and users, protect purchasers against inferior materials and workmanship, promote fair competition among retreaders, provide a basis for confidence in properly retreaded tires and for a declaration of quality workmanship and warranty.

The remaining sections cover definition of terms used in the retreading industry, material requirements, preliminary inspection of worn tires, processing, control instructions, issuance of warranty and labeling.

Members of the Tire Retreading Institute are required to affix an authorized medalion to each tire processed in compliance with the standards.

At least one state has adopted the national retreading standards as a basis for bidding on its retreading requirements. The standards have also been adopted in several cities, including Los Angeles, also to serve as a basis for bids on retreading.
