

Ranger's United Fund Is \$1,263 Short of Quota; Ask More Contributions

Ranger's 1965 United Fund is still far short of its \$5,500 quota.

Tuesday at 1 p.m., opening a meeting of UF directors, President Glyn Gilliam said that contributions up to that hour totaled \$4,236.10 — \$1,263.90 short of the goal of the drive.

Five more eligibles for "100 Percent Awards" were announced at the Tuesday session.

These included Hodges - Oak Park School, the faculty of Young School, Swaney's Pharmacy, Southwestern Bell Telephone Co., and Texas Electric Service Co.

Dr. Luther Gohlke, chairman of the current fund-raising campaign, said that a final canvass was being organized and that an attempt would be made

to wind up the 1965 UF drive as soon as possible.

COMMERCIAL STATE BANK'S DEPOSITS UP FOR LAST QUARTER

Deposits of Commercial State Bank, Ranger, showed an appreciable gain during the last quarter, according to the institution's current statement of condition.

Deposits of the bank, at the close of business on October 13, totaled \$2,703,512.43 compared to the \$2,473,166.29 total reported in the institution's June 30 report in response to the customary quarterly call of the comptroller of the currency.

Loans and discounts—\$1,290,270.49 as of Oct. 13—were slightly under the \$1,346,402.68 total reported on June 30.

The bank's resources also

showed a notable gain in the total of its stock and bonds and cash and exchange—\$1,745,995.29 as of Oct. 13 compared to \$1,432,418.80 as of June 30.

Reserves were increased from \$45,045.06 to \$47,363.34 during the same quarter, the bank's statement shows, and undivided profits rose from \$61,586.03 to \$86,165.91.

Officers of the bank include Glyn Gilliam, president; John O. Adair, vice president; Helen Dawley, cashier, and Iris Hemmel, assistant cashier.

Eastland, Ranger Elevens in Annual Tilt Friday Night

Coach Gerald Cumpton's 1965 Ranger High Bulldogs collide with their traditional rivals—the Eastland Mavericks—Friday night at Maverick Stadium in Eastland in an all-important and crucial District 10-A conference game.

The Maroon & Whites go into the Friday night fray with an impressive season record of five wins against a lone loss.

But they'll be going in the always-torrid inter-city fracas without the services of one of the Bulldog's secondary standouts—Quarterback Johnny McGee, 190-pound senior quarterback who suffered a knee injury in the non-conference clash with the Rising Star Wildcats at Rising Star Friday night.

McGee was hurt late in the game which was won by the Ranger schoolboy grid machine by a 34-0 count.

Also injured in the Bulldog-Wildcat contest was Jerry Watson, stellar end who also plays in the quarterback slot when required. Watson, however, will probably be mended and able to see action in the Eastland game.

Coach Cumpton is lashing his RHS charges through rugged afternoon drills this week, seeking to improve his offense and to further strengthen the Maroon & White defense which has been impressive during the club's first six clashes. The squad will tuff off with a light limbering up session Thursday afternoon.

Word from the Maverick war camp indicates that Eastland's No. 1 quarterback—Jerry McCullough, 165-pound senior—is only a possible starter for the Friday night grudge-

fest. McCullough has a bad knee which kept him benched a portion of last season and which has also plagued him this fall. The ailing knee was (Continued on page 5)

The Ranger High Bulldogs hold a "paper edge" over the Eastland High Mavericks, but pre-game predictions and prognostications usually have little bearing on the outcome of the annual football battle between these rival District 10-A teams.

In season play, the Bulldogs have faced six opponents — won five, lost one. They've scored 188 offensive points while limiting their foes to 59 points. Their only setback was to Dublin of District 7-AA.

In conference play, the Bulldogs have played two 10-A duels against Baird and Clyde

and scored 82 points to the opponents' 26.

In district action, the Mavericks also have played two games against the same foes—Baird and Clyde — and scored 58 points to those two opponents' 12.

CONSTRUCTION NEW HOUSING UNITS MAY START IN FEBRUARY

Construction of six new units and conversion of 10 present units at Terry Place housing project is expected to begin sometime in February.

Roy Vandergriff, president of the local Housing Authority, and V. V. Cooper, executive director, made the announcement following a conference with Federal Housing Authority officials in Fort Worth Thursday.

The two Ranger men were summoned to Fort Worth to check over blueprints for the project before bids were asked. Vandergriff said only minor changes were made.

A few weeks ago in Washington the Public Housing Administration okayed two loans for the expansion project — a \$74,410 grant for construction of six new low rent structures and another allocation of \$99,486 for conversion of 10 pre-

sent three and four-bedroom units to 20 one-bedroom units. Vandergriff said that when construction gets underway the project would probably be completed within 150 working days.

He also stated that Federal housing officials had assured the local Housing Authority that they "would hire all Ranger labor as available."

thriller. But to freshman Sandy Stevens from Beaumont, Texas, the situation was very real. This past summer Sandy had the rare opportunity to visit the troubled Dominican Republic.

"Miss Stevens, a member of a hometown singing group, the 'Melody Maids,' entertained some of the American troops stationed in the capital city, Santo Domingo.

"Santo Domingo was a town divided, one half rebel forces—one half American troops. It was to these American soldiers that Sandy and 14 of the 'Melody Maids' brought a little touch of home with songs from Broadway and Texas.

"The girls were on their way to a vacation in the Bahamas when the Army contacted them and flew the group from Miami to the Dominican Republic. For three days and 12 shows they were guest of the United States.

"Sandy expected to stay in a Army tent but was accommodated at the El A-bassador Hotel. She found it very thrilling to be under army guard in one of the world's major hot spots.

"Sandy is a boarding student at Anderson College in S. C. and works in the library.

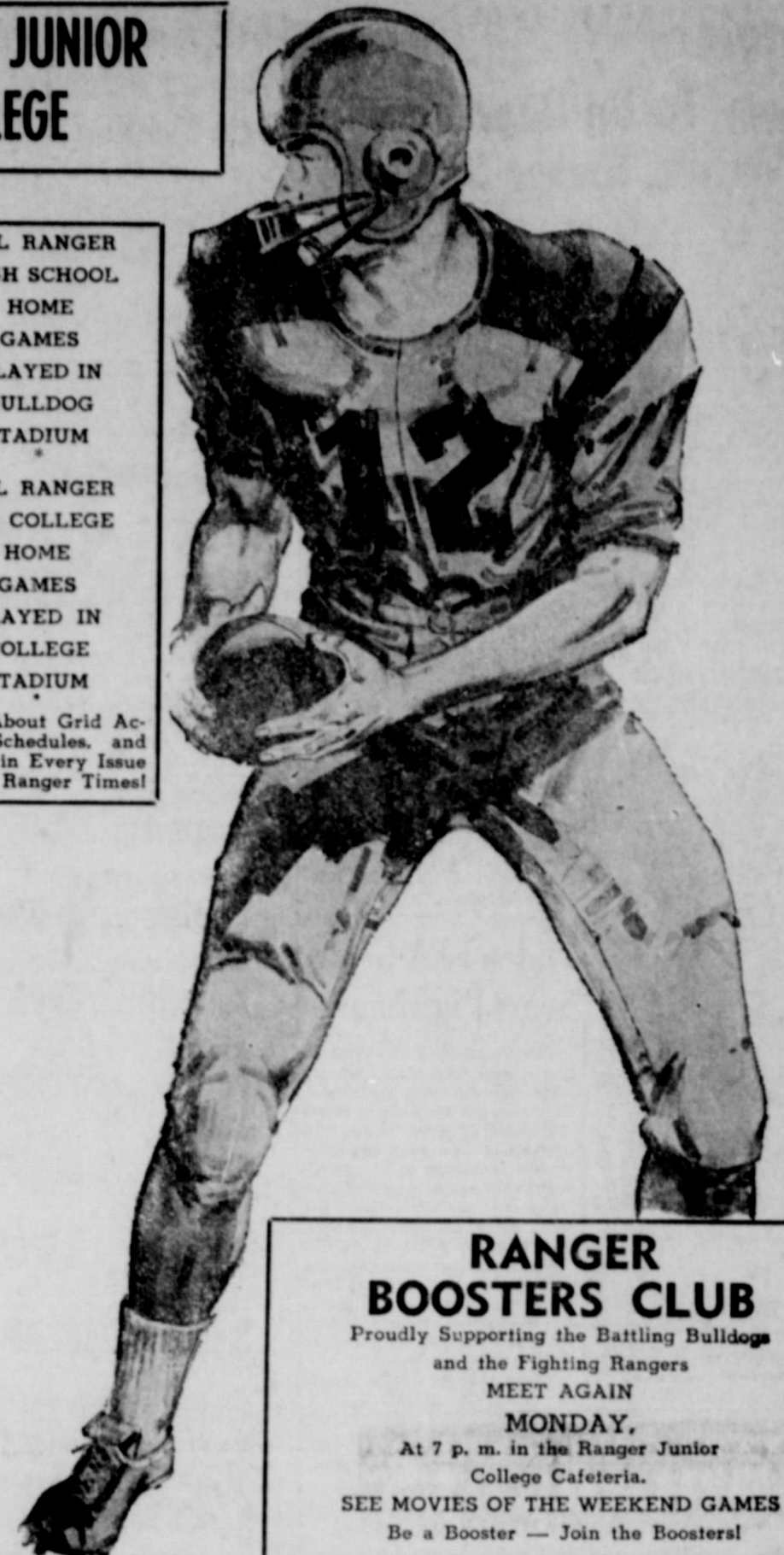

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

Wranglers Whip Rangers In Annual Peanut Bowl Tilt Saturday Night

The Wranglers of Cisco Junior College scored in the first and final periods to win a 12-to-0 victory over Ranger Junior College's Rangers in the annual Peanut Bowl football game at Eastland stadium last Saturday night. The game climaxed a day of activities dedicated to the peanut industry of Eastland County.

Quarterback Robert Pearce, 180-pound freshman from Hamlin, threw a 40-yard pass to End Volley Murphy of Marlin for the first Cisco score in the opening quarter. It was a bomb type pass that Sprinter Murphy gathered in on the dead run.

The other score was in the final period when Isaac Barnes, speedy halfback, ran 33 yards to score, climaxing a 75-yard march that took ten plays.

The first score took five plays with Cisco starting from their 42-yard line. Pearce passed to End Danny Potts for 20 yards, James Smith drove for nine yards, and Pearce swept right for four. After a 15-yard clipping penalty, Murphy raced down the right sideline and gathered in the perfect pass from Pearce.

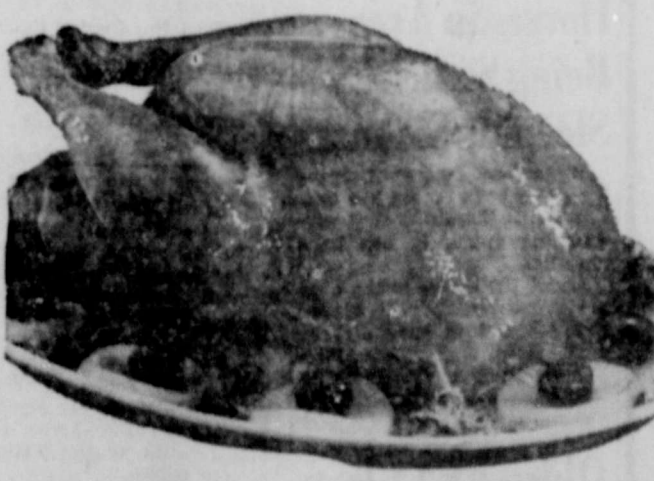
