

Bulldogs And Bearcats To Collide Here Friday Night In District 10-A Headliner

In a do-or-die effort to get back into the win column after their humiliating 18-0 loss at Eastland last weekend, Coach Gerald Cumpton's Ranger High School Bulldogs host the top-rated De Leon Bearcats in a 10-A conference clash at Bulldog Stadium here Friday night.

Opening kickoff is scheduled for 7:30 p.m. sharp, and a packed house is expected to be on hand to witness the contest.

The Bearcats have one of the strongest schoolboy grid aggregations in recent years. Although they don't outweigh the Bulldogs, they hold a big edge in experience. Seventeen members of the DeLeon squad are seniors.

The Bearcats rugged defense is noted in figures. In eight games they've scored 223 points — four touchdowns per game average. In contrast they've yielded a meager 41 points to their eight opponents.

The DeLeon powerhouse is No. 1 in District 10-A with a perfect record of four wins, no losses. Eastland's Mavericks are second with a three win, one loss record, and Ranger and Albany are tied for third place in the standings with two wins and one loss each.

With ace Quarterback Johnny McGee, experienced senior ball-handler, passer and runner, still out with injuries suffered in the Rising Star game two weeks ago, End Jerry Watson, McGee's understudy, will be starting for the Bulldogs.

In at Watson's end position will be Rudy Mendoza.

Watson's mates in the Maroon & White secondary will be Phil Brown and Mike Landtroop at the halves and Larry Blackwell at the fullback spot.

Randall Mahaffey will be going at right end, Bill Robinson and Jack Watson at the tackles, David Dunson and David Speed at guards, and David Mahaffey at center.

Coach Cumpton will taper off his RHS charges with a light drill Thursday following hard-hitting workouts Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday afternoons.

Yule Season Topic for C-C Group Meet

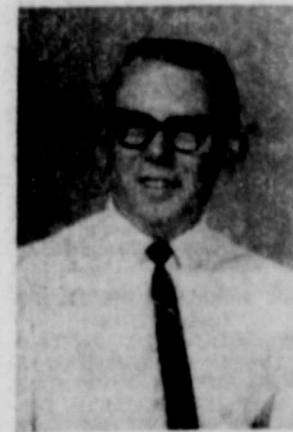

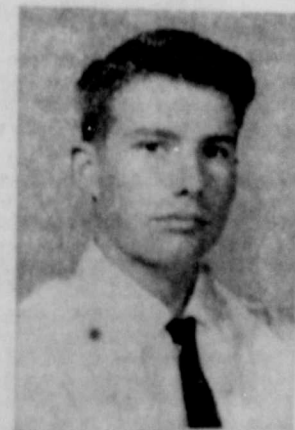

LEGAL NOTICE
ORDINANCE
AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR FIRE LIMITS, AND REGULATIONS GOVERNING THE CONSTRUCTION, ALTERATION, REMOVAL, DEMOLITION, EQUIPMENT, USE AND OCCUPANCY, LOCATION AND MAINTENANCE OF BUILDINGS AND STRUCTURES.
Be it ordained by the City of Ranger, Texas.
SECTION 1. ADOPTION OF BUILDING CODE
There is hereby adopted by the City of Ranger, Texas, for the purpose of establishing rules and regulations for the construction, alteration, removal, demolition, equipment, use and occupancy, location and maintenance of buildings and structures, including permits and penalties, that certain building code known as the Southern Standard Building Code, recommended by the Southern Building Code Congress, being particularly the 1965 edition thereof and the whole thereof, save, and except such portions as are hereinafter deleted, modified, or amended, of which not less than three (3) copies have been and now are filed in the office of the Clerk of the City of Ranger, Texas, and the same are hereby adopted and incorporated as fully as if set out at length herein, and from the date on which this ordinance shall take effect, the provisions thereof shall be controlling in the construction of all buildings and structures herein contained within the corporate limits of the City of Ranger, Texas.
SECTION 2. ESTABLISHMENT OF OFFICE OF BUILDING OFFICIAL
(a) The office of building official is hereby created and the executive official in charge shall be known as the building official.
(b) The building official shall be appointed by the Mayor. His appointment shall continue during good behavior and satisfactory service. He shall not be removed from office except for cause after full opportunity has been given him to be heard on specific charges.
(c) During temporary absence or disability of the building official the appointing authority shall designate an acting building official.
SECTION 3. QUALIFICATIONS OF BUILDING OFFICIAL
He shall be in good health, physically capable of making the necessary examination and inspections. He shall not have any interest whatever, directly or indirectly, in the sale or manufacture of any material, process or device entering into or used in or in connection with building construction, alterations, removal, and demolition.
SECTION 4. DUTIES OF BUILDING OFFICIAL
(a) He shall receive applications required by this code, issue permits and furnish the prescribed certificates. He shall examine the premises for which permits have been issued and shall make necessary inspections to see that the provisions of law are complied with and that construction is prosecuted safely. He shall enforce all provisions of the building code. He shall, when requested by proper authority, or when the public interest so requires, make investigations in connection with matters referred to in the building code and render written reports on the same. To enforce compliance with law, to remove illegal or unsafe conditions, to secure the necessary safeguards during construction, or to require adequate exit facilities in buildings and structures, he shall, issue such notices or orders as may be necessary.
(b) Inspections required under the provisions of the building code shall be made by the building official or his duly appointed assistant. Deer bow-hunters have but eight days (including today) to legally pursue their sport in Eastland County, according to a report from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department received late last week.

county until the report was received, is the fact that Eastland County is included this year in the list of counties having a legal bow season. Recent legislation has placed the county under the Parks and Wildlife Department for means and methods, and a proclamation-acceptance by the commission is being awaited on that point. At a recent public hearing

here, much interest was expressed by countians as to whether this county was to have a bow season during October. It apparently was not known at that time, although adjoining counties were slated for bow and arrow hunting.

The P&W report shows that bow hunting for buck deer is legal in this county from Oct. 1 through 31, inclusive, and the same time for turkey gobblers. (No bow season on bear or javelina).

Bow hunting excludes cross-bow equipment, and local Game Warden Maurice Dry explained legal bow equipment as follows:

"The bow must be capable of shooting a hunting arrow equipped with a broadhead hunting point for a distance of 130 yards; arrows must have broadhead hunting point at least seven-eighths inches in width and not over one and one-half inches in width; arrows must be marked with the name and address of the user in water-proof ink; and poisoned, drugged or exploded legal bow equipment are unlawful.

Deer must have three points or more, he said.

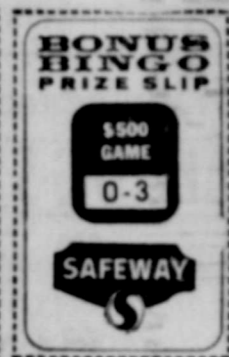
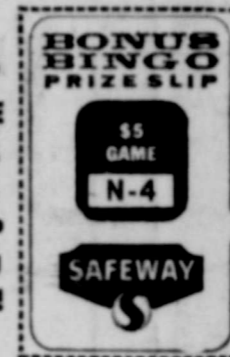

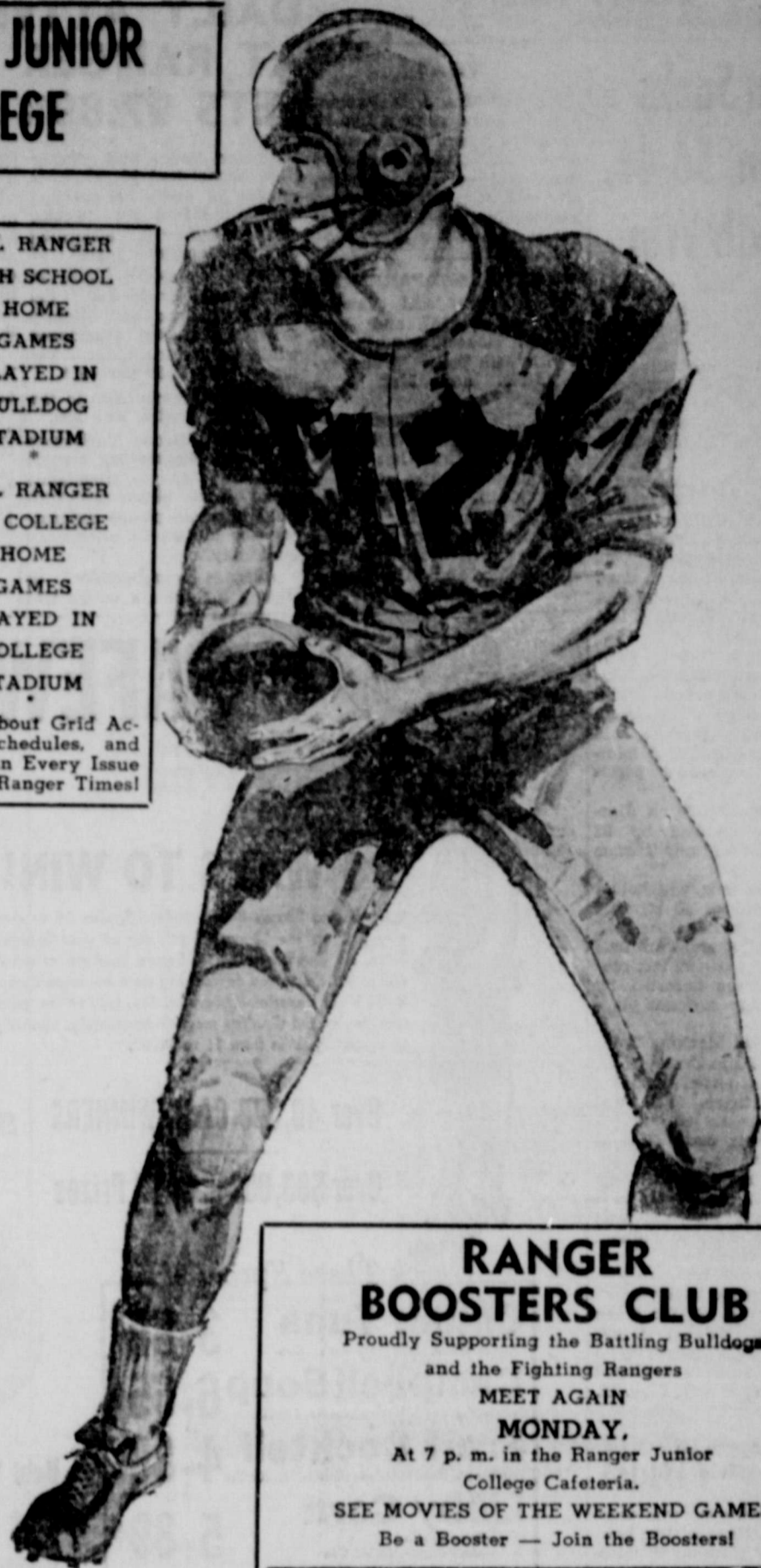

Current annual taxes paid to the various government agencies in Eastland County totaled \$28,549, it is announced by the Texas Railroad Association.

That amount was the county's share of the nearly \$10,000,000 the railroads paid in Texas on their own right of way and other property.

"With the future of our country and state depending to a great extent upon the education of our youth, I am delighted that nearly half of the taxes paid by the railroads go to support the schools," said Walter Caven, general counsel of the Texas Railroad Association. "Recognizing this need for education, many of the railroads operating in Texas also make scholarships available to a large number of students every year."
