An earlier article, No. 4.01, sets out that the governor shall order election by procamation "of all elections for state and district officers, electors for president, and vice president of the United States, members of congress, mempers of the legislature, and all offices who are elective every two (2) years. Such notices shall be by proclamation by the governor ordering the election not less than thirtyfive (35) days before the election, issued and mailed to the several counties.

In as much as the article spells out the reference to 'session" of congress, it appears that this would not be appliable in this case. However, it is assumed if a special ession were to be called, such an election could be called with the added provision that the "35-day" notice stipulated altered to "20" days.






