Recent Hail Storms Miss Castro But Damage Others

Hail storms in this section the past week have missed Castro county, but much damage has been reported from south of this county.

During the storm of hail and rain Monday evening, local citizens reported considerable damage to wheat in the vicinity of Kress, in Swisher county.

A message to T. V. Weaver of Dimmitt Tuesday, reported that his father, E. L. Weaver, living 7 miles northeast of Levelland, was injured, tho not seriously, during the storm, while at work in the field. A man whose name was not learned, working with Mr. Weaver, was killed instantly during the hail storm.

Rains were reported in Dimmitt Wednesday morning, from the section north of here, and a report that Nazareth had a good rain Tuesday night was confirmed Wednesday evening.

A survey of grain in Castro shows need of rain, but crops are not suffering, generally, now.

Plainview May Have A. A. U. Tourney With Dimmitt As Sponsors

Plainview Committee Expected to Make Favorable Recommendation on Proposition to Entertain Girls' State Basket Ball Tournament Next Year, With Dimmitt as Sponsors for the Meet. Definite Answer to be Given This Week.

Thru the efforts of the Lions Club, and the Plainview Chamber of Commerce, it is very likely that the 1931 American Athletic Union Tournament will be held in the Hale County capital, with Dimmitt as sponsors.

Dimmitt has this privilege and honor due to the fact that they were runners-up at the 1930 meet, held in Celeste several weeks ago, and while this city has been approved by the secretary of the association, W. F. Jacoby of Dallas, it is not practical to hold the meet here due to lack of court facilities for the games to be played.

Plainview has had the proposition under consideration for the past two weeks, and a committee from the local Lions club composed of L. P. White, T. A. Singer and George C. Smith, met

with a Plainview committee in that city late Monday afternoon, at which time the visiting delegation received much encouragement from that body, and a definite reply will be given the latter part of this week.

If Plainview does not desire the tournament, which will be held next March, for five days, and during which time approximately 400 players, comprising 30 girls' teams from every section of the state will be guests, it is probable that Tulsa will ask for it.

In addition to the players, a large number of rooters will also visit the meet, and much favorable publicity will be gained by both the city where it is held, and Dimmitt, the sponsoring city.

PRELIMINARY COUNT GIVES DIMMITT 830 POPULATION

All Persons Who Were Not Counted Are Urged to Report to the News Office in Dimmitt In or Before Saturday, May 17th!

The official preliminary report of the fifteenth census for Dimmitt has been received by the News from Owen M. Unger, of Plainview, and supervisor of this district.

This report gives our population as 830, on April 1, 1930, and is subject to correction by the Department of Commerce at Washington, but this figure can be generally accepted, as very little change will likely be made.

The report states that this town was not shown separately in 1920, when the last count was taken by the government, and it also conveys the information that no farms were enumerated in the area this year.

Asks for Corrections

In a communication to the Chamber of Commerce, Mr. Unger says, on a form provided by the government for that purpose, the following:

"While these figures are preliminary and subject to correction, they are believed to be substantially correct. Please examine them carefully, and if you think that any residents have been omitted from the enumeration or if you have any other criticism to offer please advise me at once so that the matter may receive prompt attention."

In view of the above information, the News will withhold a report until Saturday of this week, May 17, in order that any and all persons who were missed, may report and be included in the official and final count.

If there is any one in the corporate limits of Dimmitt who was not counted, please report at once to the News office so that it will be reported Saturday.

HALE COUNTY TO START HIGHWAY AT EARLY DATE

Work on Plainview-Dimmitt Highway Should be Under Way at Early Date.

According to recent information received from Plainview, work will begin at an early date on that end of the Plainview-Dimmitt Highway, which will parallel the Denver Railroad between the two cities.

Road equipment has been purchased by the Commissioners' Court at Plainview, and as all the right of way has been procured, after much hard work on the part of committees, it is expected that work will start soon.

Information as to that portion of the road in Castro county, is that the right-of-way on this end is practically assured, and negotiations are now being made for the sale of the warrants.

It is understood that Commissioner Sam Allen, in whose precinct the road will run, will be ready to begin work in a short time after the warrants are disposed of.

This road will shorten the route to Plainview approximately 20 miles, making a direct road, thru Hart, of about 40 miles to Plainview.

Very Little Illiteracy in South Plains Area of Texas

According to statistics received recently from Washington, D. C., the Panhandle-South Plains of Texas, considered as a State, has a smaller percentage of illiteracy than any other state in the Union.

Thirty-four counties of the Panhandle-South Plains area, according to a survey made by the National Advisory Committee on Illiteracy, from the 1920 census, shows less than one per cent illiteracy. To be exact, the counties had a population of 153,426 and 1530 illiterates. The report shows Texas had 8.3 per cent illiterates. Castro County is shown as having 12, at the time this report was sent out, a few weeks ago.

Iowa leads the Nation with only 1.1 per cent illiteracy, but the Panhandle-South Plains ranks above Iowa with less than one per cent. Other States having less than two per cent are Minnesota, South Dakota, Nebraska, Kansas, Idaho, Utah,

Washington and Oregon. "Illiteracy is the cause of poverty," asserts R. Lyman Wilbur, secretary of the interior and chairman of the committee on illiteracy. "Poverty in turn perpetuates illiteracy. The eradication of poverty goes hand in hand with the eradication of illiteracy."

County Superintendent M. R. Avery, of Dimmitt, has been asked by the committee at Washington, to give them all the assistance possible in reducing the illiterates in this county, in an intensive National campaign to reduce the number in every State.

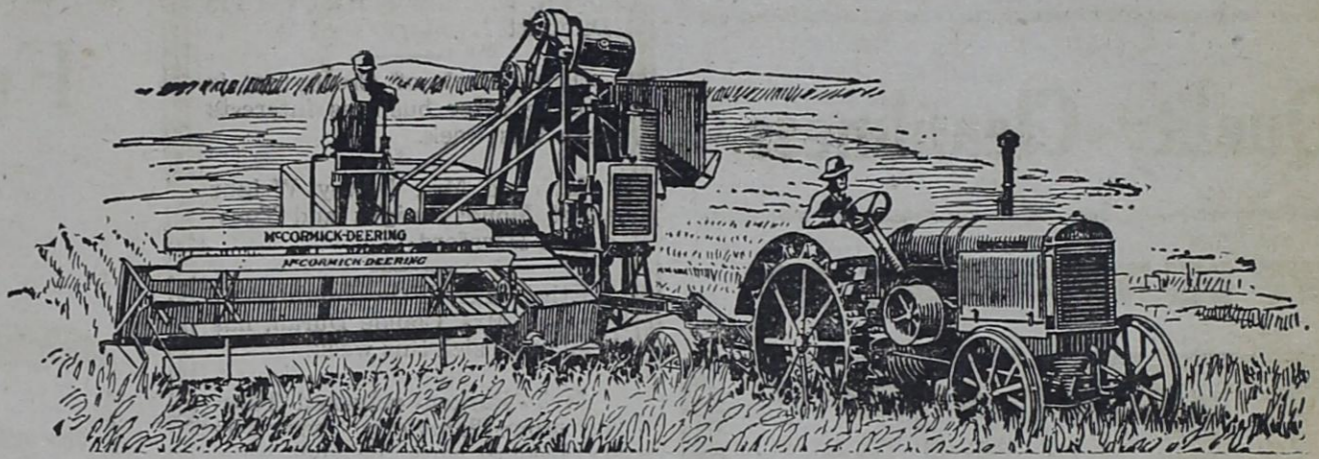

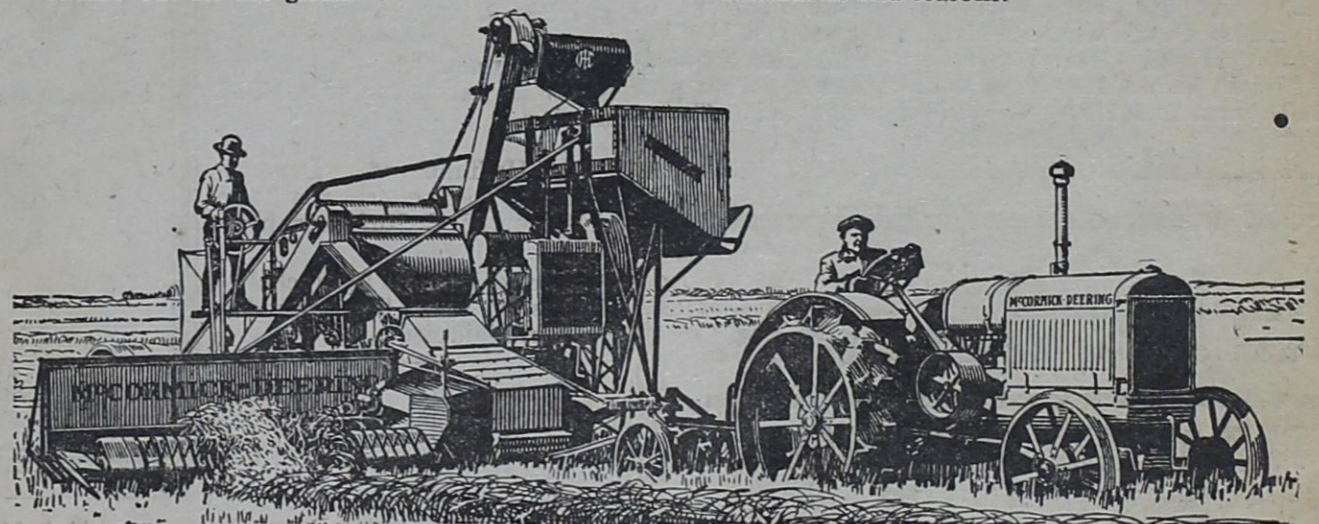

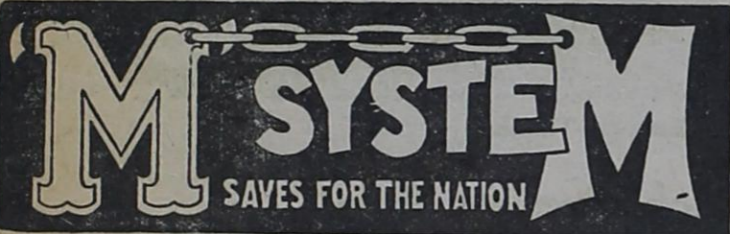
