son said.
"For several years, the local cable systems have been in operation. Curtailment of its services would affect not only TV viewers, but the loc-

al economy as a whole.
"Surprisingly, the FCC has previously stated that it has no control over the CATV. In fact, the regulatory agency was twice turned down by Congress in bids for such authority.

"However, on April 23, 1965, the FCC suddenly stated that it needed no Congressional approval, claiming that it already has authority to con-trol cable TV. As a practical matter the FCC gave an ulti-matum to Congress; either pass CATV legislation by the end of the 1965 Congressional Session or the FCC rules will be put into effect.

'Embroiled in the busiest ession in recent years, Congress has been unable to act on this question. Thus, t h e FCC has indicated it will now adopt its new rules on or sout Feb. 7."






