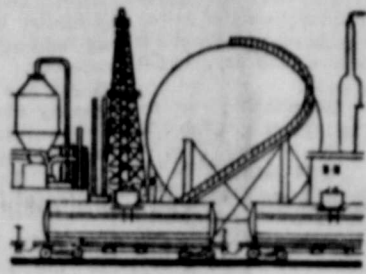

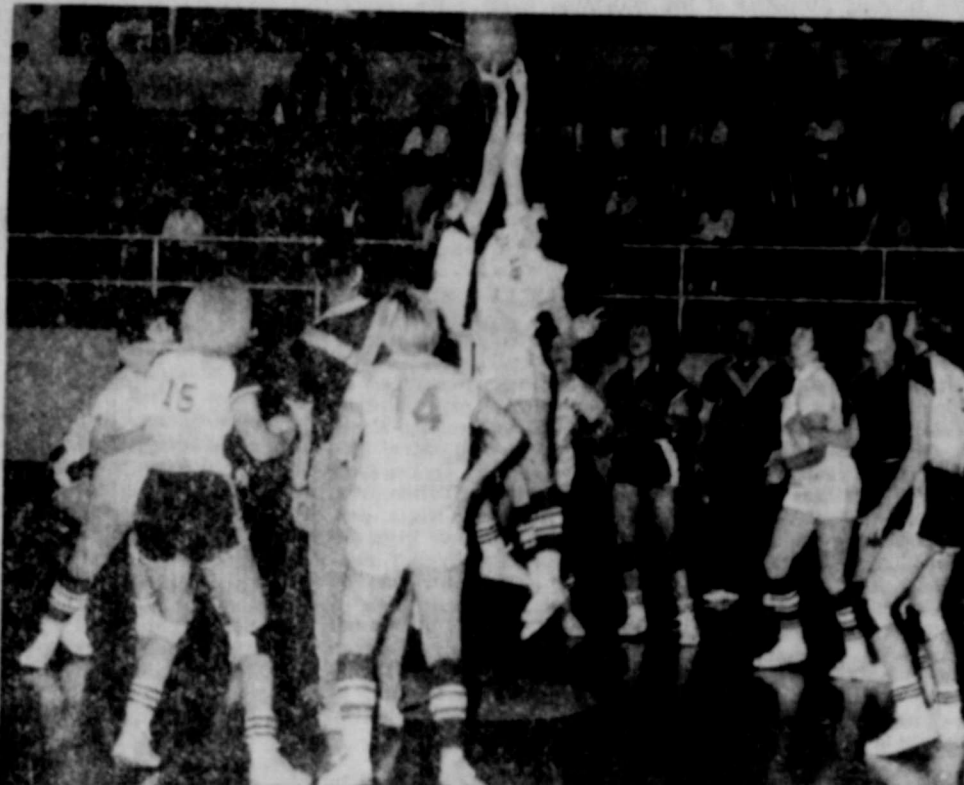

RJC Racks Up 23rd Win!

After winning a thriller over the Cisco Junior College Wranglers at Cisco Thursday night, Coach Ron Butler and his Ranger Junior College Rangers are setting their sights on their final conference competition next week.

They'll go to Temple where they'll play in the championship tournament of the Texas Junior College Athletic Federation.

The tournament, featuring the top junior college round-ballers of the state, will be held Thursday, Friday and Saturday.

Paced by the sensational shooting of Oscar McClendon, 6-foot 5-inch RJC sharp-shooter,

the RJC Rangers scored their 12th conference triumph and 23rd victory of the season Thursday night when they defeated their arch rivals, the CJC Wranglers, 82-60, in a breath-taker before a packed house in Cisco.

McClendon, whose per-game average has been 28.5, out-did himself against the Wranglers pouring a total of 39 points through the hoops. Last official statistical report on McClendon, rated No. 1 of individual scorers, showed the Ranger ace with a total of 417 points.

At that time also, Larry Robertson, another top RJC pointmaker, had amassed a

total of 387 for an average of 19 per game.

In Thursday night's thriller, Mike Smith was high scorer for Cisco with 20 points.

Housing Development Plans Are Announced

A \$500,000 new housing project for Ranger was announced Thursday night by the Ranger Jaycees.

The development was made public during a meeting of the Ranger City Commission late Thursday when a delegation of Jaycees, supported by representatives of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce requested that the city provide adequate water and sewage facilities to the project site.

The initial plans call for development of a 15-acre plot of land, with five additional acres available at future option, on Blundell Street east of Ranger and within the city limits.

Mayor Morris Newnam and members of the city commission assured the group that they endorsed the project, pledged cooperation of the city, and that adequate water and sewage facilities would be installed.

The Ranger mayor said an engineer would be called to Ranger Monday to survey the development site and make a determination of what size lines, etc. would be adequate to serve the new housing area.

The cooperative action was unanimously approved by the mayor and all members of the city governing body.

Frontage of the 15-acre development site, owned by Frank Penn, is on Blundell Street which will probably be one of the access thoroughfares off of Interstate 20 when the new transcontinental highway by-passes Ranger in the future.

J. B. Foosee of Abilene, the developer, is purchasing the 15 acre plot with an option for future acquisition of five more acres at an undisclosed price.

Foosee, highly recommended by Abilene bankers as a reliable builder, has constructed and sold over 1,200 homes in the Key City. Presently he is erecting 150 new residential units in Brownwood.

Foosee plans to build a total of 45 new homes — ranging in price from \$10,000 upward, with average units selling for from \$13,000 to \$15,000 — on the 15-acre site.

The new homes will be financed by long-term mortgages through the Federal Housing Administration and conventional loan sources, according to a spokesman who is a member of the Jaycees' community development committee of the organization which conceived the project weeks ago.

According to plans made public Thursday night, the development will have paved streets, curbs, and gutters. A park area will be included and a playground for children.

The lots will be approximately 55x130 feet. Restrictions require 75 percent brick on every side, and minimum home units will have 1,000 square feet of floor space.

Voters Will Elect Two Trustees In April 2 Balloting

The Board of Trustees of Ranger Independent School District has called the annual trustee election for Saturday, April 2, in the Ranger School Recreation Building with voting scheduled from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m. It has been announced by Ross Hodges, board president.

Two positions are open this year and candidates desiring to run must designate the position preferred.

Place No. 1 is held by Mrs. Frances Cox and this position is up in the election for a three-year term.

Place No. 2 is held by Dr. Luther Gohlke and this position is also for a three-year term.

Candidates desiring to place their name on the ballot are asked to get the proper forms from Mrs. Zora Lee Hughes in the School Tax Office.

A. E. Crawley has been appointed election judge and A. H. Powell will serve as clerk. Mrs. Hughes will be in charge of absentee voting.

Candidates for the offices must have their names placed upon the ballot not later than 30 days prior to date of April 2 election. Deadline for filing is Wednesday, March 2.

Absentee voting will begin 30 days before the election — or Sunday, March 13 — and shall continue through the fourth day preceding the election, Tuesday, March 29 is the last day for voting absentee.

The governor says he will ask for a voter registration act that would do two things:
1. Declare the approximately 2 million persons who paid poll taxes before the Jan. 31 deadline can vote along with others who will register free in a period to be specified before the May 7 primary.

2. Set up permanent voter registration procedures when and if the U. S. Supreme Court upholds the Austin court's ruling.

A Texas constitutional amendment that would have replaced the poll tax with a registration system was defeated by voters last year.

MARIJUANA PROVES PLENTY HOT POTATO

Convicted Bootlegger: Gus Orman, 40-year-old Cisco Negro, had a new hot potato dropped into his pocket this week, with the filing of possession of narcotics charges against him following a 35-mile chase through the county.

An attempted routine check-out by Liquor Control Board agents preceded the chase and charge Wednesday.

In Cisco to formally close a Lake Cisco club, Agents C. D. Crain and O. D. Wallace spotted Orman cruising around in his "known-to-be" speedy 1957 pink Chevrolet. Not altogether unacquainted with the man, the agents decided he might bear talking.

Apparently recognizing the LCB authorities, Orman declined to be stopped and headed north on Highway 390. The chase was on. His souped-up Chevy out-distanced the agents, and he turned off onto a Farm-to-Market road, intending apparently to double-back into town. Agents Crain and Wallace radioed back, asking that Cisco City Police, the Constable and the Sheriff Department assist, if and when the man came back into town.

"Cleaning his car" apparently was his undoing, Sheriff L. E. Sublett reports.

The agents report that while in chase, they saw Orman throw something from his car. The package was light, they said, and when he doubled back to get the package off the roadway and into a small tank near the road, the agents caught up to him.

The small parcel, wrapped in cellophane, floated on the water and the agents recovered it to find that it contained about a pound and a half of marijuana, in two forms — some loose in a bag, and a small (5x6x2 inch) bale. Officials estimate that the total is worth from \$4,000 to \$5,000 on the pucker market, and from \$1,000 to \$1,200 wholesale.

Orman was charged in Eastland Justice of the Peace Wells Dalton's court with possession of narcotics. He was locked up in the County Jail, made bond in the amount of \$5,000 later Wednesday afternoon, and was released.

Officials also discovered some 14 pints of whisky along the highway and 30 cans of beer in Orman's auto. He was also charged with possession of beer in a dry area, for which he posted another \$500 bond.

Case against the man apparently will be pegged to a small batch of marijuana, found loose in the floorboard of the auto. Penalty for conviction on the charge is from two years to life, Dalton said.

Sheriff Sublett reports that he has had repeated information about dope being present in the county, and that the marijuana cigarettes sell from 50 cents to \$1 each. (Such cigarettes are the traditional "hookers" for youngsters, he said.)

Officials also got a search warrant from Cisco Justice of the Peace W. L. Lewis and searched the Orman home where they reportedly found little more than "money," according to Sheriff Sublett.

Orman's court record is as follows:

Six convictions, on pleas of guilty, in county court for liquor and beer violations (possessions and sales), in May and December, 1956, and three in April, 1961. He drew \$100 fines in five of these cases and a 30-day jail sentence for one of the April, 1961, convictions.

In 91st District Court there are presently seven liquor violation cases pending (which were filed in Nov. '65) against Orman which have been transferred from County Court. He pleaded guilty in May, 1959, waiving jury, to a violation and was fined \$150. An earlier conviction was set aside in the district court.

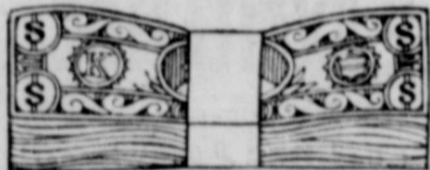

A Lubbock firm is apparent low bidder for the installation of the Olden Water Supply Corp. system, President Pat Moseley has announced, and the organization hopes to sign a contract with the Panhandle firm on Feb. 24.

Eight bids were opened Wednesday and the bid of Panhandle Construction Co., Lubbock, in the amount of \$71,786 was low. Next high was \$72,796 and high bid was \$93,000, Moseley said.

If the contract is signed on the Feb. 24 date, he said, construction will begin March 1, and the job calls for a completion date of within 150 calendar days.

The job includes installation of approximately 52,000 feet of pipe, some six-inch and some eight-inch, 25 fireplugs, and 132 customer meters as well as two master meters. (Individual costs of the master meters, Moseley said, is \$1,675.)

The contractor is to be 100 per cent bonded, he said, and is expected to move directly onto the Olden job. Jimmy Nash is representative for the firm.

The FHA-insured loan for the Olden system has been okayed and the locally-incorporated organization is using an Abilene engineering firm. In the future, storage facilities will probably be considered by the group, it is said.

In addition to Moseley, officers include Bill Hunter, treasurer; Gilbert Copland, secretary; L. J. Williamson, vice president; and Travis Reese Norman Moore and I. E. Talley, directors.

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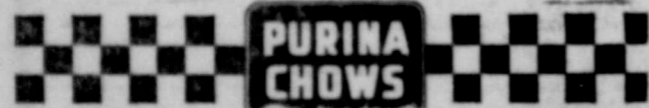

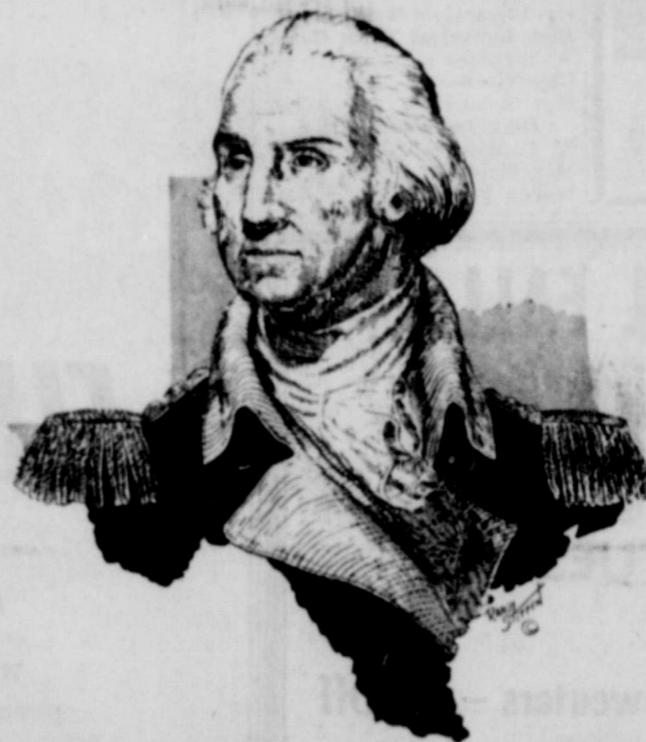
