

## RJC Rangers Open State Title Play Thursday Night

With a sensational 23 won-3 lost record under their belts, the chips will be down for Coach Ron Butler and his Ranger Junior College Rangers Thursday night in the Temple Junior College gymnasium when the opening tip-off whistle blows.

That'll be the challenging moment when the Purple & Whites put their future on the line against San Jacinto Junior College of Pasadena in the first go-around to determine the championship of the Texas Junior College Athletic Conference.

The Rangers, with a perfect conference record of 12 triumphs, are undisputed titlists of the North Zone of the conference. But the other three roundball crews in the two-day tournament — San Jacinto, Wharton and Hill Junior Colleges — will be gunning to knock off the Butlermen for the state title, a crack at the Region V championship and a possible entry into the National Junior College Athletic Association tournament to be unveiled up in Hutchinson, Kansas in mid-March.

The Ranger - San Jacinto duel opens tournament action in Temple at 7 p.m. Thursday. Two hours later the Wharton and Hill Junior Colleges will be gunning to knock off the Butlermen for the state title, a crack at the Region V championship and a possible entry into the National Junior College Athletic Association tournament to be unveiled up in Hutchinson, Kansas in mid-March.

Then Friday night at 7 p.m., the losers of the opening

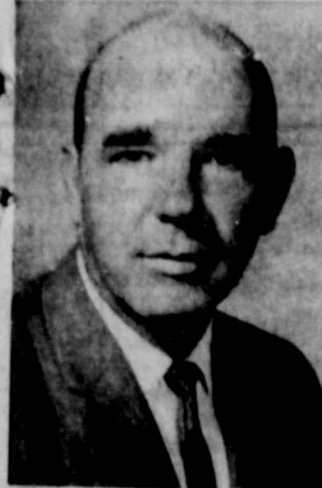
## Ranger FFA Chapter Is Outstanding Unit

# Ranger Schools Approved for \$42,897 Federal Grant

Ranger Independent School District's proposed project to spend \$42,897 this semester seeking to improve instruction in the system has been approved and is now partially underway according to Supt. James R. Clark.

Ranger's allocation is a part of the Eastland County Cooperative Program, Project No. 686, which was approved for a total of \$122,962.72 Other participating schools approved included Gorman, Eastland, Cisco, Olden, Rising Star, Des-

demona and Carbon. All bookkeeping will be done in County School Supt. O. L. Stamey's office in Eastland, Supt. Clark said.

Already at work as teacher aides are Mrs. Larry Hunt in the high school, Mrs. Marjorie Earl Weekes at Young and Mrs. Rod Carter at Hodges. All are working on an hourly basis. Their jobs are to do any work that will relieve the teachers' work load such as mimeographing tests, posting grades, grading some papers,

keeping lunch records keeping attendance records or any other assignment made by the principal to help the teacher.

Employed to do remedial work in language arts in the high school building is Mrs. Sandra Holliday of Eastland. Mrs. Gary Beauchamp will teach pre-school children and Mrs. Robbie Hobbs will do remedial work in language arts at Young School. Mrs. Josephine Cleveland has been employed as librarian for both grades, and Young full time.

Yet to be employed is a full-time music teacher and a remedial teacher at Hodges.

MRS. CLEVELAND who resides in Cisco, graduated from Bethany Nazarene College, Bethany, Oklahoma in 1942 with the bachelor of arts degree. She has done 18 college hours in library science at East Texas State University, six hours at Hardin-Simmons University in psychology, and 12 hours at Cisco Junior College in modern math,

typing, and government. Mrs. Cleveland has taught three years at Beatrice, Nebraska and Rockford, Nebraska.

Mrs. Holliday is a 1959 graduate of Eastland High School and attended Ranger Junior College and East Texas State University where she received her bachelor of science degree in 1964 with a teaching field of journalism and English. Last year she taught journalism at North Side High School in Fort Worth. Her parents are Mr. and Mrs.

Andy Taylor of Eastland. Mrs. Hobbs is the wife of Rev. R. L. Hobbs, Ranger. She is a graduate of Graham High School, 1949. She received her bachelor of arts degree from Hardin-Simmons University in 1953, majoring in psychology and English. She has done an additional year's work at the New Orleans Seminary in religious education.

Her teaching experience includes elementary work for two years at Buckner Academy in Dallas and one year at Straughn High School in Andalusia, Alabama. Mrs. Beauchamp is the wife of Gary Beauchamp, minister of the Church of Christ, Mesquite and Rusk Streets, in Ranger. She is a graduate of high school in Topeka, Kansas, 1960. She received her bachelor of education degree from Abilene Christian College in 1965. She taught one semester in Alta Vista Elementary School, student

teaching, and has done substitute work in the Ranger schools also.

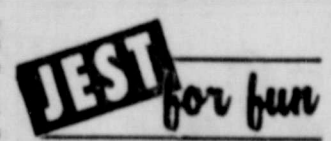

## Job Vacancies To Be Filled By Safety Agency

AUSTIN — Career employment in the ranks of the Texas Department of Public Safety uniformed services is currently being offered young men between the ages of 21 and 35, it was announced today by Col. Homer Garrison Jr., DPS Director.

"More than 100 of these positions of trust and public service will soon be open for qualified men," Garrison said. "They include opportunities for advanced education, excellent physical conditioning and a permanent career of serving mankind."

There are four branches of service for which men are directly recruited — Highway Patrol, License and Weight, Motor Vehicle Inspection, and Driver Licensing. Trainees are assigned to the service for which they are best suited.

Upon graduation from the 16-week training program at the modern DPS Law Enforcement Academy in Austin, the trainee is commissioned into one of these services. At the academy, he will receive a salary while in training. He will be taught such subjects as Texas Highway Law, accident investigation, first aid, professional driving, care and use of firearms, and many others.

Benefits afforded patrolmen include: two weeks annual vacation; 12 or more holidays each year; 12 days sick leave each year; \$10 per month longevity for each five years of service; modern liberal retirement privileges based on age and years of service; travel expense. DPS patrolmen are furnished all uniforms and equipment necessary for performance of their duties.

Garrison urged interested men to get their applications in early. June 6 is the deadline for receipt of applications for the June 11 examination for the next training school opening August 9.

### ANNIHILATION OF SCREWORM AIM OF U. S. MEXICO PROJECT

The United States and Mexico have begun a joint research project aimed at control and eventual annihilation of the screwworm, according to John C. White, commissioner of the Texas Department of Agriculture.

White said the costly parasite occurs widely throughout Mexico. This is substantiated by the submittal of 1,500 larvae by Mexican livestock producers as an initial sampling for the study.

The study is designed to determine the nature of the screwworm problem in Mexico with hopes that a new technique of controlling the cattle menace in Mexico as well as in the southwestern part of the United States.

Extensive programs aimed at eradications have had widespread success, White said, but sporadic outbreaks still arise.

Past projects have been aimed at destroying the insects ability to reproduce. Eradication was accomplished by raising billions of screwworm flies, sexually sterilizing them, and releasing the insects throughout most of the southern United States.

White explained that the sterile flies would mate with native flies, but no offspring would be produced, thus destroying the insect's ability to multiply and spread.

The commissioner said to prevent screwworms from migrating into the United States from Mexico, eradication workers have been releasing sterile flies along the international border since 1962 to form a buffer zone.

Current studies will seek to determine if the program might be shortened and moved south across a narrower section of Mexico, while obtaining better results.

### Peanuts Placed On State List Of Plentiful Foods

COLLEGE STATION — March is blowing in a wave of plentiful foods, says Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Spotlighting the March plentiful list are peanuts and such products as peanut butter. This huge supply of peanuts is a result of the 1965 record production of 2,400 million pounds.

Other plentiful reported by the U. S. Department of Agriculture include potatoes, prunes and prune juice, fresh oranges, rice and eggs.

Irish potato stocks on Jan. 1 hovered near a record. These huge stocks, coupled with a big winter crop, are creating especially large supplies. Bake some in foil for your first spring cookout.

Prunes and prune juice also are available in large quantities a result of an above average California prune crop and a sizable carryover. Both prunes and prune juice can give that added spark to breakfast.

A very good quality orange crop is sending large supplies of these tasty fruits to markets, in spite of some freeze damage in Florida. Shipments are seasonally heavy.

The third week in March is National Rice Week — and 1966 has been declared International Rice year. Rice production has continued to set records, so look for big supplies this month.

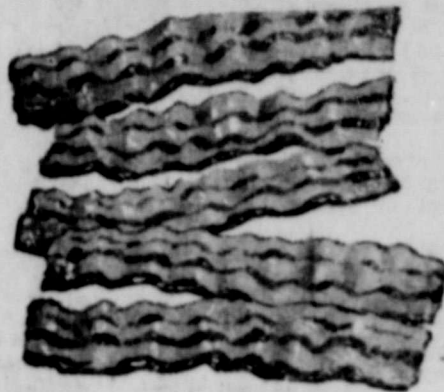

## GI LOANS FOR WWII VETS WILL TERMINATE IN 1967

WACO — World War II veterans have just a year and a half left to obtain GI guaranteed or insured loans, Jack Coker, manager of the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Waco, pointed out. Deadline for World War II eligibility is July 25, 1967, he said.  
Eligibility has been expiring for World War II veterans according to a formula that adds ten years to the date of their last discharge from active wartime service plus one year for each 90 days of that service. The date reached by this formula is the individual deadline date for each veteran.  
Thus eligibility has already expired for many World War II veterans but the July 25, 1967, deadline terminates the program for all of them, even though the formula would give a longer period of eligibility.

Veterans who were discharged for a service-connected disability will be eligible until the final termination date of July 25, 1967; this also applies to widows of veterans who died of service-connected disabilities.

Those eligible may obtain a guaranteed loan to purchase a home, a farm or to buy or start a business.

The formula for determining the length of time Korean Conflict veterans will be eligible for GI loans is the same as for World War II veterans. However, Korean Conflict entitlement did not begin to expire until Jan. 31, 1965, and the final deadline date is Jan. 31, 1973, Coker said.

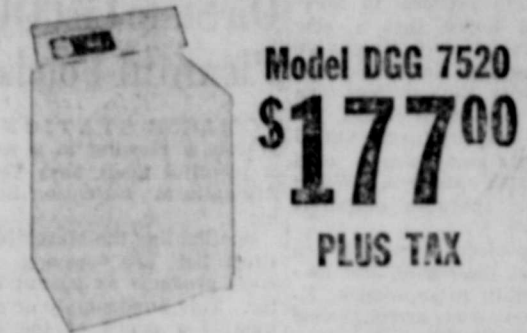
Korean Conflict veterans discharged for service-connected disabilities and widows of Korean Conflict veterans who died from such disabilities may take advantage of the final 175 deadline, the VA manager added.

He pointed out that a veteran's loan cannot be guaranteed unless the loan application is received by the VA before the veteran's eligibility expires.

Loan applications are ordinarily sent to the VA by lenders. The veteran, therefore, should see that his loan application reaches the VA before his entitlement expires.

An application for a Certificate of Eligibility is not a loan application, Coker warned.

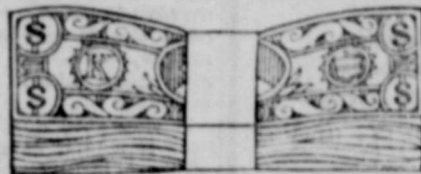

THE BUDGET can be amended as necessary Clark said and will be as soon as all personnel are employed. There will be several thousand dollars allotted for supplies that will be spent for supplies he said.

"We will be able to buy things that we never could have bought in the way of equipment and supplies. We probably never could have employed the teacher aides or remedial teachers."

The entire program is not costing the district anything except additional time consumed in the superintendent's office.

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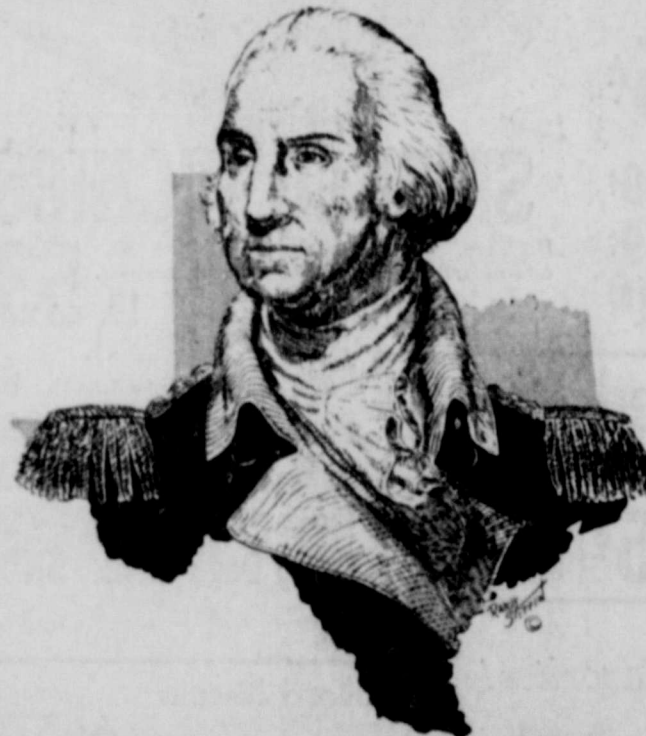
