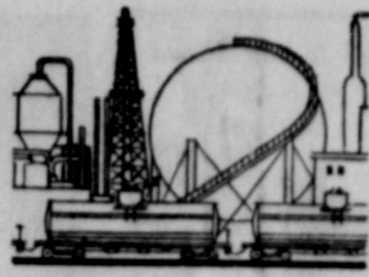

Instructed Court Verdict Clears Battles on One Liquor Charge

A 91st District Court jury rendered an instructed verdict of not guilty against Ranger Negro James Battles Tuesday afternoon when he was tried for illegal sale of whiskey, upon the instruction of District Judge J. Frank Sparks who presided.

The instructed verdict followed a lengthy debate between Battles' attorney L. R. Pearson of Ranger, with District Attorney Perry T. Brown

County Public Work Policy Is Asked Of Commissioners Court

Two county commissioners were singled out for verbal attack and the entire court challenged for a statement of policy regarding the use of county material, men and equipment on private property, by a group of citizens at the Monday meeting of the court in Eastland.

The spirited meeting came in two parts. The first consisted of a group of county truckers whose spokesman was Cisco Attorney W. B. Wright. The second stanza was in the form of an airing of complaints by a former employe of the county in Precinct Two (Carbon-Gorman). Mr. Wright, who told the

court he spoke as an interested citizen, introduced the truckers: W. H. McCullough of Cisco, Bryan Johnson and Prentiss Jones, both of Eastland. Mr. Wright asked the court if it has a policy on doing work on private property. Mr. McCullough reported that the county had done work on property belonging to Lee Starr, Alvis Taylor and Grover Taylor, all of Eastland County.

Mr. Starr recently completed a new home some eight miles northwest of Cisco and Mr. McCullough said that crews from Commissioner C. B. Dill's precinct hauled some 200 yards of materials about

4.2 miles in county trucks to build a circular drive of from 100 to 200 yards at the residence.

Mr. Wright asked if such work was done and Mr. Dill replied "Yes," and introduced charge-ticket books, which he said had been used for 25 years by the county for charging for such work. It was not brought out whether the work at the Starr residence was billed or not.

Mr. Starr asked: "Do you legally have the right to work on private property?" Mr. Dill: "Yes, I think so, but let me assure you all that I don't solicit that kind of (Continued on page 4)

Survey Under Way To Extend Water, Sewage

Engineers are in Ranger this week making a survey to determine plans for installation of adequate water and sewage lines to a 15-acre plot on which J. B. Foshee, Abilene contractor, plans to erect new home construction totaling around \$500,000.

The initial plans call for development of the initial 15 acres with five more acres to be made available in the future. The site is located on Blundell Street east of Ranger and within the city limits.

Following a request by a delegation representing the Ranger Jaycees and the Ranger Chamber of Commerce the city commission at its last meeting agreed to provide adequate water and sewage for the housing development.

Foshee plans to build a total of 45 new homes — ranging in price from \$10,000 upward, with average units selling for from \$13,000 to \$15,000 (Continued on Page 2)

Civil Service Exam Is Set For Postmaster Position

An examination for postmaster at Ranger is open for acceptance of applications until Tuesday, March 22, according to an announcement from the U. S. Civil Service Commission in Washington.

Presently serving as acting postmaster is Ross Hodges. He was appointed to the office following the resignation of Max Ohr on Dec. 31. Ohr retired from the position after a long period of service.

According to the U. S. Civil Service Commission, the salary for the Ranger postmaster is \$7,449 per year.

Competitors for the postmaster vacancy in this city must have at least 3 years of experience (education above high school level may be substituted for 1 1/2 years of ex-

perience) showing that they have the ability to conduct and manage the community's postal business efficiently and to supervise employees so that customers are satisfied with the service.

Competitors must also show that they are of good reputation and that they can deal with the public agreeably and effectively.

Applicants must take a written test. Those who pass will be assigned final ratings on the basis of this test and on their experience and fitness for the position. They must have resided within the delivery of the office for one year immediately preceding the closing date of the examination. In addition, they

must have reached their 18th birthday on the closing date for acceptance of applications. Persons over 70 years of age cannot be appointed.

All qualified applicants will receive consideration for employment without regard to race, creed, color, or national origin.

Complete information about the examination requirements and instructions for filing applications may be obtained at the post office for which this examination is being announced. Application forms must be filed with the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C. 20415, and must be received or postmarked not later than the closing date.

Voter Registration Begins This Thursday

The temporary voter registration period will begin at the County Tax Assessor-Collector's Office at the Courthouse in Eastland Thursday, March 3, and will continue through Thursday, March 17. Edgar Altom has announced.

Only those persons who were subject to payment of the poll tax levied for the year 1965 (that is, those persons who were between 21 and 60 years of age on Jan. 1, 1965 and were legal residents of the State of Texas on that date) may register during this period, he said.

A person subject to the tax who has been issued either a paid poll tax receipt or a "Poll Tax Not Paid" (the federal-free receipt) during the

regular registration period which ended on Jan. 31, 1966, need not and should not register, Mr. Altom pointed out.

Those persons 60 years of age and over who do not reside in a city of 10,000 or more, (and no one in) Eastland County does not register in this period, he said, but they will vote as usual.

The county is not being paid by the state for this special registration, he said, but the new legislation does provide that the county will be re-imursed 25 cents per receipt issued next year.

Sub-stations are not being established for the special registration.

Olden Gets Split-Diamond

A split-diamond interchange, requested a few months ago at a public hearing by citizens of Olden, has recently been granted, according to R. P. (Buddy) Hahn, resident engineer of the State Highway Department, Eastland.

This interchange will encompass the east and west entrances to the town to Olden instead of a single interchange at the west entrance to Olden as originally planned.

It will allow west bound traffic to exit on the east side of Olden and will allow east bound traffic to exit on the west side, Mr. Hahn stated.

Midland Tragedy Involves Former Local Residents

A two car collision at a street intersection in Midland on Tuesday, Feb. 22 resulted in the death of Mrs. J. C. Smith. According to hospital attendants, her injuries did not appear serious when she was admitted, but she died of shock four hours after the accident. Mr. Smith is reported in fair condition in a Midland Hospital. He suffered a fractured arm, clavical and ribs and multiple lacerations.

Funeral services for Mrs. Smith were held on Thursday, Feb. 24 with burial in Resthaven Memorial Park.

The Smiths lived in Ranger from 1917 to 1936. They operated a department store on Main St. and were active in all phases of community life. They have many friends who will regret to learn of the tragedy.

Newnham Fails To Get on Ballot

The Texas Supreme Court overruled without comment Wednesday a request from Ranger Mayor Morris L. Newnham that his name be placed on the Democratic primary ballot as a candidate for state representative, according to a report received here.

The court refused to hear arguments in the case, automatically denying the plea.

The appeal came after A. E. Crawley, County Democratic Chairman, refused to put Newnham's name on the ballot because he was holding "a lucrative public office."

Newnham claimed the mayorship is not a "lucrative public office" because since 1957

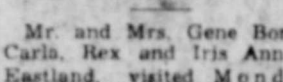

Highway Maps Being Printing By State Agency

AUSTIN — The largest single order for the Official State Highway Map of the Texas Highway Department is now rolling off the presses.

The initial order for 600,000 of the full-color maps is up 200,000 over the first order for 1965 maps. In past years, substantial reprints have been required to fill the ever-increasing demand from both Texas motorists and out-of-state visitors.

The maps are produced for free distribution by the Travel and Information Division of the Texas Highway Department. They provide tourists and Texans with up-to-date information on highways, mileage, lakes accessible to the public, Safety Rest Areas, city route maps, and to distinguish Interstate, U.S., State and farm-and-ranch-to-market roads in the state.

The growth of the Interstate Highway network is graphically shown, as the 1966 map shows 521 more miles of divided highways than appeared on the 1965 map. The majority of it's increase is the Interstate System.

Over 22,000 miles of farm-to-market roads are shown some 7,500 more miles of this type road than appeared on the 1965 map.

Fort Worth Angler's Club Plans Annual Tourney At Lake Leon

However, there will be only one set of trophies per team. 3 - Parks and Wild Life Commission Laws will prevail at all times. 4 - Contest is open to all Fort Worth Anglers Club members. 5 - Entry fee is \$2.50 per angler (\$5.00 per team).

ASCS OFFICE SENDS OUT IMPORTANT REMINDER

The following important reminders and announcements have been made by J. G. Meredith, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service office manager:

Final date to release or ask for reapportioned peanut acreage is Friday, April 4. Producers who do not intend to plant their allotment this year are encouraged to release it to the County Committee for reapportionment to other producers in the county for one year.

Deadline to sign an intention to participate in either or all of the programs, cotton, wheat and feed grain, is April 1. Cotton producers who do not plan to plant cotton acreage may sign up to divert 12.5 percent of their allotment and release the balance. Producers electing to do this will receive full history protection for future cotton allotment determinations.

Workers at the ASCS office are in the process of completing applications for contracts under the Cropland Adjustment Program. The Program is for allotment crops, bases, and in some cases non-allotment cropland will be taken. Designated acreage must be devoted to a permanent type grass and can not be grazed during the full term of the contract period. Cost-share assistance will be paid to assist in the establishment of this cover where one does not exist at the present time. Annual payments will be made the latter part of each year.

Funds are available to carry out any approved conservation practice for 1966, Mr. Meredith says. These practices include establishing permanent grasses, control of brush and mesquite, con-

work. He later said that he averages a request a day for such work, and recommends others for the work. Mr. Dill cited recent legislation which indicated that the county might have the right to do such work. All agreed to do the matter up with the county attorney and meet back on March 14, next meeting date, to determine a final decision.

A simple resolution of policy would help clear the air, and make for a better understanding, Mr. Wright said. Commissioner Glenn Justice of Precinct Two came under similar fire in 1964 when a group of citizens from Gorman asked and was granted an injunction in 91st District Court, prohibiting the county from doing work on private property. (However it was reported that the injunction never became effective because bond was not posted to secure it.)

P. C. (Cass) Frazier of Gorman joined the commissioners at their table after the truckers retired, to air a series of complaints and lodge a number of accusations against Commissioner Justice, his former employer. Mr. Frazier introduced a little book in which he reportedly had recorded all the information on which he was basing his complaints against the commissioner.

He accused Mr. Justice of using county materials for his own use; doing work for friends to "gain votes"; driving his own vehicle "only four days" to earn the \$75 expense allowance; and a multitude of other things — closing his tirade by saying:

"You aren't going to get by with this politician."
