We can be assured of this and do our part in understanding and helping our Ranger system to fulfill its great obligation to our times by being a participant in


annual Ranger Public Schools Week — next Monday, March 7, through Friday, March 11.



U of T Exes Hear ...

Junior College Growth Expected To Continue

Texas junior colleges — including Cisco Junior College and Ranger Junior College — will continue to see fantastic growth in the future as the result of Gov. John Connally and the 59th Legislature's emphasis on enriching higher education, Sen. Tom Creighton told about 100 persons attending the Oil Belt Chapter of the University of Texas Ex-Students Association meeting Wednesday evening.

The local meeting, held at Lone Cedar Country Club, was one of some 85 held around the world to commemorate Texas Independence Day — March 2 — and pay homage to the state university.

Speaking informally, Sen. Creighton pointed out that the purpose of such get-togethers was to enjoy the fellowship, "exchange Aggie jokes," and pay tribute to the school and the association.

The Association, which now has some 21,500 members, recently dedicated its new \$375,000 Alumni Center on the campus, and has two purposes — serving the university and the ex-students, he said.

Scott Bailey, Cisco, president; Bruce Golemon, Cisco, secretary; James Clark, Ranger vice president; Marvin Sockel, Breckenridge V-P; David Cleveland, Mineral Wells V-P; Charles Jacobs, Albany V-P; James Paul Shanks, Baird V-P; John Kimble, Gorman V-P; and James Rutherford, Rising Star V-P. Judge Cecil Collins of Eastland gave the invocation and Wendell Siebert of Eastland led the group in the singing of "The Eyes of Texas," amid the "U-T" arranged tables. Mrs. Virgil T. Seaberry Jr.

was in charge of decorations. Mr. Seaberry was master of ceremonies in the absence of retiring President Lawrence Maloney, who presently lives in Fort Worth.

The Oil Belt Association is now in its 40th year it was announced.

For years, the legislature and the State have not been able to meet the challenge of providing the standard of excellence in higher education, Sen. Creighton said, but with the governor's vision in conceiving the 17-member board of top leaders, much has already been accomplished and more is in the future.

Some of the recommendations of that board at its February meeting, he said, have not been met with universal agreement, but the end result will be improved education facilities. Sen. Creighton outlined the removal of the doctorate programs from all but limited schools, and other measures which will, he said, add strength to the total education program across the state, and result in the top education level sought.

The University's growth was cited by the speaker in showing that 26,322 students are presently enrolled; the LBJ Library will be built soon; improvement in the law school physical plant; and other steps.

In introducing Sen. Creighton, Mr. Seaberry said that he had originally "planned" to say that the Mineral Wells senator will be tenth in seniority (and possibly sixth, depending on how the forthcoming elections come out) but that he couldn't say that now, because Mr. Creighton has an opponent.

Nonetheless, Seaberry called Sen. Creighton a real friend to all in this district, and "We're lucky to have him."

Capias Still Out In Indictments

Capias still had not been returned Friday to 91st District Court in the indictments returned recently by grand juries.

Capias in two burglary indictments, both handed down Nov. 18, have not been returned.
