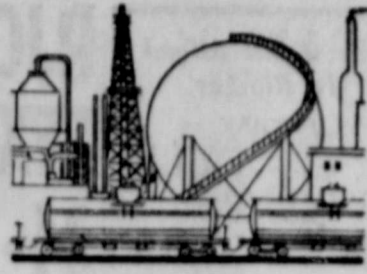

Stock Show Set To Open Next Thursday at Eastland

A total of 391 entries were reported Friday morning for the 1966 Eastland County Livestock Show which will be staged at Eastland next Thursday, Friday and Saturday, March 17, 18 and 19.

More entries are expected before the event opens Thursday at the new show grounds north of the haydite plant. Officials of the Eastland County Livestock Raisers Assn., sponsors of the annual event, reported that 35 fat steers have been entered, 29 head of junior breeding beef, six dairy cattle, 109 fat lambs, 63 breeding sheep, 25 breed-

ing hogs, 92 fat hogs and 31 junior goats.

**Rules And Regulations
For '66 Livestock Show**

1. All animals to be shown must be in their places by 10:00 P. M. Thursday, March 17, 1966.
2. No animals in breeding classes may be removed from the show until 4:00 P. M., Saturday, March 19. Animals in the fat classes that will be sold at auction may be removed any time after 2:00 P. M. Saturday, March 19.
3. Sick or injured animals must be removed as soon as possible upon discovery. Anyone taking animals out

of the show before release time will be barred from future shows and all prize money will be forfeited.
4. The Eastland County Livestock Raisers Association shall not be liable in any manner for loss, injury and/or accident to any person, animal or equipment at or during the show, either exhibitor or spectator.
5. All exhibitors are expected to keep their part of the aisles clean and neat at all times.
6. All animals in the breeding classes must be representative of their breed but do not need to be either purebred or registered.
7. The open show will include adults in Eastland and adjoining counties as well as junior exhibitors from adjoining counties.
8. The Junior Show will be open to 4-H and FFA members of Eastland County only. They must attend a public school in Eastland County. They must have fed, fittted and cared for the animal under the supervision of a vocational agriculture teacher or county agent or assistant county agent to be eligible to show.
9. Breeding animals entered by junior exhibitors must have been owned by Jan. 15, 1966.
10. Lambs that will not grade at least good; steers that will not grade at least good; and fat barrows that will not grade at least U. S. No. 3 will be sifted.
11. All entries in the Junior Classes must be turned in to the General Superintendent by Jan. 15, 1966.
12. The fat animal division is open to Juniors only.
13. In classes with less than three entries the judge will decide what place the animal will get.
14. The superintendent and assistant superintendent of each division is responsible only for his particular division.
15. Entries are limited to 2 animals per class in both the breeding and fat divisions except for Chapter of 4-H Club. A Chapter or 4-H Club may show 5 animals.
16. Fat animals may not be shown in a breeding class.
17. All breeding classes of livestock in the open show will compete for ribbons only. Only the FFA and 4-H Club boys and girls are eligible to show in the Junior Division to receive any cash premiums in any breeding class.
18. Entry fees of 50 cents each for sheep, lambs, goats and hogs and \$1 for each cow and calf will be charged each exhibitor, either Junior or open.
19. No exhibitor, adult or junior, will be allowed to spend the night at the show grounds. Curfew starts at 11:00 P. M. on Thursday and Friday nights. Grounds will be policed by members of the Eastland County Sheriff's posse.
20. FFA Chapters and 4-H Clubs will be eligible to sell only 3 barrows, 3 lambs, and 2 steers at premium prices.
21. Yearling classes of sheep may show and get prize money but these animals cannot sell at the special action sale.

FAT STOCK SHOW
1. All General rules and regulations regarding the livestock show also apply to the Fat Stock Show Division.
2. Entries in this division open only to qualified Junior exhibitors.
3. All fat hogs must weigh at least 150 pounds and not over 240 pounds.
4. Fat lambs must not weigh over 115 pounds.
5. Fat hogs and fat lambs may be either sex.
6. Fat calves must be steers only.
7. Fat hogs, fat lambs and fat steers may be any breed. The fat hogs and fat lambs will show only in their proper class with exceptions in rules no 8 and no. 9.
8. Classes for fat hogs are judged separately and when judged the Grand Champion and Reserve Champion are picked from the Champion and Reserve Champions of all classes.
9. Classes for fat steers are weighed and divided into light and heavy classes, according to weight. The Grand Champion and Reserve Champion both classes.
10. Fat animals are judged on a packer basis only.

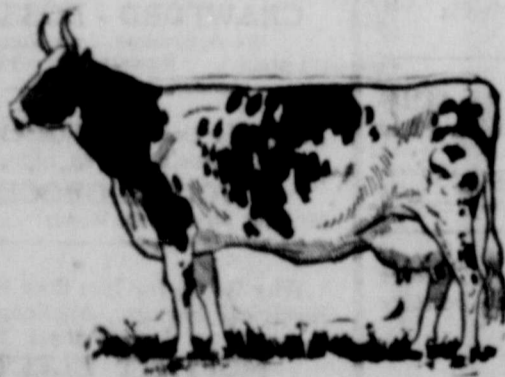

each class will be placed.

12. Fat lambs must be shown in their wool. Customary blocking and trimming will be allowed.

13. Steers must be dry lot only. They must have been taken off dam or nurse cow on or before Nov. 1, 1965.

14. Steers must still have

milk teeth at the time of classifying and sifting to be eligible to show.

15. Lambs must grade at least good. Steers must grade at least good and fat hogs must grade at least U. S. No. 3 or be sifted.

16. Each exhibitor is limited to 2 steers, 2 fat hogs and 2 fat lambs, except 4-H Clubs and FFA Chapters may show 5 lambs, 5 fat hogs, and 2 steers.

17. Eligible fat stock can be sold at a special auction sale on Saturday night, March 19 at the Eastland Sales Barn at 7:00 P. M. Exhibitors do not have to sell unless they wish to do so. Only 4-H and FFA Junior exhibitors are eligible to sell.

18. After the lambs in each class are graded, the judge will place the top ten and pick a champion and reserve champion. These Champions will not be shown against Champions of other classes.

19. A fat yearling sheep class is for those exhibitors whose lambs have broken the gum tooth. Must not have useable permanent teeth.

20. In conjunction with the steer show a rate of gain contest is held. Each steer entered in this contest must have been weighed at the official weigh in Oct. 30, 1965, and the weight recorded by the show Superintendent. After the second weigh in held Friday, March 18th the Beef Cattle Superintendents will determine the placings in this contest.

21. Checks for all animals sold at auction will be mailed to exhibitors Monday or Tuesday following the sale Saturday night.

SPECIAL AWARDS

Special awards will be awarded junior exhibitors who do the best job of fitting, grooming, showing and keeping animals, stalls and aisles neat and clean during the show. This applies to both the Fat animals and Breeding classes. The score card is as follows:
