Brownwood Contractor Is Low Bidder on Terry Place Project; Work Starts Apr. 1

The Herman Bennett Construction Co., Brownwood, submitted the low bid on building of six new low rent housing units and conversion of 29 existing units to 60, V. V. Cooper, executive director of Terry Place Housing Project, said Wednesday.

The bids were opened Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock at the offices of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce.

The contract to the Brownwood construction firm is subject to final approval by the Public Housing Administration, Cooper said.

Four contractors submitted bids and Bennett's — at \$137,190 — was the lowest.

Present at the Tuesday morning meeting were Olin Boase,

project architect, of Fort Worth, A. W. Warford, James H. Boggus, Jess Weaver, and Cooper of the Ranger Housing Authority.

Other firms bidding on the project included Home Lumber & Supply Co., Quanah, \$194,800; B-F-W Construction Co., Temple, \$167,000, and W. C. Null Construction Co., Fort Worth, \$165,000.

Further details relative to the housing project construction will be worked out during a conference with the contractor, Cooper said.

Work is expected to get underway by April 1.

Federal funds to finance the project were approved last fall. The Public Housing Administration loans included a

\$78,410 grant for new construction and another allocation of \$99,488 to convert 10 three and four-bedroom units to twenty one-bedroom units.

Expansion of the Terry Place housing project has been under study for several years, and efforts to secure approval of federal agencies were initiated by the local housing authority and the

City of Ranger nearly two years ago.
Cooper said that the new and remodeling construction is expected to be completed within 180 days. The new six units and conversion of 10 existing units is expected to be finished next fall.
When completed, Terry Place will be expanded from the present 50 units to 66 units.
The Brownwood firm which will handle the construction of the Terry Place units has been in business for 30 years. Some of their current projects include a new \$60,000 A&P food store, a \$145,000 library, both in Brownwood.
The Bennett organization has built two large apartment buildings in Brownwood in recent months — the \$300,000 Wayside Plaza and the \$150,000 Driskwood apartments. Survival means during radiation and fallout from nuclear blasts was explained for approximately 45 members and guests of the District Licensed Vocational Nurses Association in Eastland Monday evening at a meeting at Eastland Memorial Hospital.

Thomas Neuman with the Extension Service of Texas A&M University was guest speaker and explained methods of functioning following contamination.

SEMI-WILDCAT TEST IS SLATED NEAR CISCO

Reynolds Drilling Company of Cisco was moving in equipment and rigging up Saturday to drill the Jarrell & Reynolds No. 1 I. N. Hart as a semi-wildcat oil and gas project six miles northeast of Cisco. The location is near Highway 183 on the Gus Hart land.

Plans call for a 3,600-foot hole to test the Strawn and Lake sands for oil or gas. The operators have a 320-acre lease. The drill site — 1,790 feet from the north and 2,500 feet from the west lines of Section 37, Block 4, H&TC Survey — is between production on the Gordon Woods place and the British American property.

Elsewhere, Wilmar Oil Inc., of Mattoon, Ill., recently announced plans to drill their No. 1 Homer E. White as a wildcat test eight and a half miles northeast of Cisco. Location was given as 467 feet from the north and 1,320 feet from the west lines of the southwest quarter of Section 45R, SP Survey, on a 160-acre lease. Permit calls for 4,100 feet to test the Ellenberger lime.

The drill site is approximately half a mile from plugged Lake Sand producers, it was reported.
