RANGE ANNS LOSE OPENER IN AAU MEET

Coach Ron Butler's RJC Range Anns, one of three Texas femme cage squads and 20 hardwoods crews from over the nation, dropped their opening duel in the 1966 National AAU women's basketball tournament at Gallup, N. M., Tuesday afternoon.

A strong sextette from Broadview, Ill. outscored the Range Anns, 44-33.

In Tuesday morning action Silverton, Tex., topped Cleveland, Ohio, 48-40. In the afternoon rounds, Pasadena, Tex., dumped Westchester, Pa., 60-44.

The Range Anns jumped into an early lead in their clash with Broadview, but a 10-point second quarter average out of a possible 4.

Two Cisco 4-H Club girls "stole the show" from the boys in the grand champion beef steer class at the annual Eastland County Livestock Show last Saturday in Eastland. They were Lynne Phippen, 13-year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Irven Phippen, and Caddy Lee, 10-year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jimmie Lee.

Lynne's steer, named "Lal'ien," was named grand champion, and he weighed 850 pounds. The reserve champion steer was named "Rowdy." Both were Herefords.

Caddy also scored a victory with her crossbred lamb, which was named champion, a pair of top ribbons to show of the show. This gave her her 4-H Club brothers, Tommie and Bobby, who usually are among the top winners.

Eddie Kincaid of Morton Valley, a 4-H Club member and son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Kincaid, won first in the fine wool lamb show. Other winners with lambs included Bill Farnsworth, Cisco 4-H, son of Mr. and Mrs. Major Farnsworth, top animal in medium wool class; and Frank Claborn, 12, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Claborn and an Eastland 4-H Club member, top Southdown.

In the junior beef breeding show, as well as the open beef cattle show, the Hounsels of Rising Star 4-H took top honors in the Angus division.

Carter Hounsel, 14, son of Mr. and Mrs. L. C. Hounsel, showed a Carter - bred Angus to the bull championship and overall breed title.

Sister Cynthia, 12, had the top Angus female and Carter, the reserve Angus heifer. In the junior Hereford division, the Williamson brothers, sons of Mr. and Mrs. Jasper Williamson, Ranger, had the top females.

Larry, 13, showed a Winston breed heifer to the championship of the Hereford class and to the overall championship. Larry's younger brother, Jerry, had the reserve Hereford female champion, which was also the overall female reserve champion.

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PREMIUM PRICES PAID FOR SHOW CHAMPIONS

The top animals in the various classes at Friday's and Saturday's annual Eastland County Livestock Show were purchased by county firms and individuals at premium prices in an auction sale Saturday night at the Eastland Livestock Auction Co.

The five banks of Eastland County — First National of Cisco, First State of Rising Star, First National of Gorman, Eastland National of Eastland and Commercial State of Ranger — bought the grand champions and the reserve champions.

The grand champion steer, shown by Lynne Pippen of Cisco, brought 50 cents per pound, and the reserve champion, shown by Caddy Lee of Cisco, was bought by the banks for 40 cents per pound. The grand and reserve champion hogs, shown by James Ray Agnew and Pat Jenkins of Cisco, brought 50 cents and 40 cents, respectively. The four lamb winners, shown by Caddy Lee, Eddie Kincaid, Bill Farnsworth and Frank Chaborn, were bought for 60 cents per pound.

Premiums were paid on all other show stock that was sold, as follows: steers, 4 cents, 3 cents and 2 cents; lambs, 5 cents, 6 cents and 4 cents; and hogs, 6 cents, 4 cents and 2 cents.

In most cases, the business men of each town in the county bought the show stock offered by youngsters living in their area. More than 100 animals were sold at auction. The Cisco area had the largest number of winners — 45.

The county agent's office described the show as a good success from all standpoints.

Buyers of fat stock were the following: The five banks of Eastland County bought all four champion lambs, and reserve champions were bought by Western Auto of Eastland, Coats Furniture of Eastland, Texas Electric of Eastland and Clint McCain.

SSA Looking For 25 Countians For Medicare

When the deadline of March 31 was only two weeks away, all but 130 of the 4,050 persons over 65 in Eastland County had replied to social security's Medicare inquiries, according to R. R. Tuley, Jr., District Manager for Social Security in Abilene.

Tuley knows who 105 of the 130 are, from records of his office and the State Department of Public Welfare. They are being phoned or written again to see whether they have just overlooked replying or are failing to reply as the way of saying "No" to the voluntary doctor bill insurance offered at a \$3 per month premium rate. He doesn't know the identities of the remaining 25. He asks our readers to check with their friends and relatives and, if they have taken no action as yet on Medicare, urge them to write a card or a letter to "Social Security, Abilene, Texas 79604". They should say they do or do not want to sign up for Medicare.

"I'd like to suggest that every person over 65 who has not yet notified the Social Security Administration do so before March 31. Those who say "No" or who just don't reply, will get another chance in October of 1967. However, a person who signs up by March 31 can cancel his enrollment anytime before July 1; in effect, he is getting 90 more days to reach a final decision," Tuley added.

Any card or letter, asking to enroll for Medicare, postmarked March 31 or before, and signed by the over 65 person (or by a responsible person on his behalf) will be treated as a valid enrollment, he concluded.

Survivors include his wife; two daughters, Mrs. R. L. Young of Abilene and Mrs. A. J. Cornelius of San Marcos; four grandchildren; and nine great-grandchildren.

Funeral services for William Alexander Martin, 82, were held at 4 p.m. Monday in Arrington Hamner Chapel with Rev. J. Lester Davenport, pastor of First Methodist Church, officiating.

Interment was in Eastland Cemetery.

Born July 6, 1884, in Eastland, Mr. Martin passed away at 10:45 p.m. Saturday in a nursing home in Abilene.

Mr. Martin attended schools here and for many years he had been in the grocery business here.

He married Florine Simmons on May 17, 1905.

Mr. Martin served as vice president of the Texas State Bank, which was many years ago, the name of Eastland's bank; and he had served as state and federal inspector for the Department of Agriculture from 1936 until 1956. He was a member of the First Methodist Church.

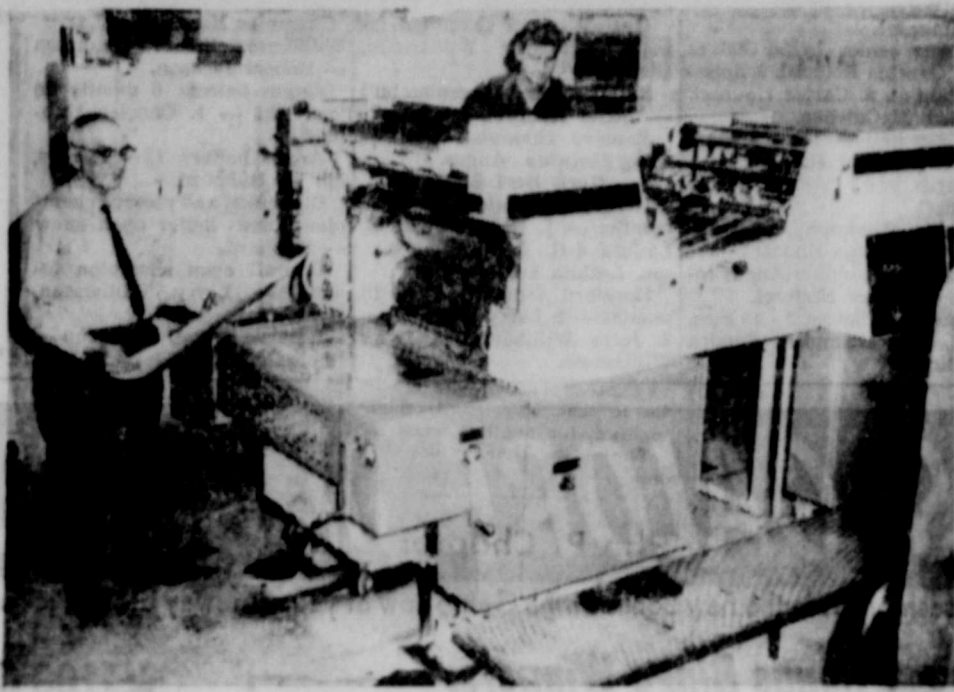

'Danger Spots' To Be Corrected In County In THDept. Program

Eastland County, in District 23, is included in the plans made by the Texas Highway Department to spend near \$311 million as part of a continuing four-year war on traffic accidents, according to Resident Engineer R. P. (Buddy) Haun.

Estimated cost for correcting danger spots on highways in all parts of Texas is \$10,924,199. Of this total, an estimated \$179.3 million will be state funds and \$131.6 million, federal funds, which are derived from special taxes on highway users.

Federal funds programmed for District 23 total \$3,431,500; and federal funds let to contract (July 1, 1965 through March 31, 1966), \$291,896 bringing the total of federal funds to \$3,723,396.

Job Vacancies To Be Filled By Safety Agency

AUSTIN — Career employment in the ranks of the Texas Department of Public Safety uniformed services is currently being offered young men between the ages of 21 and 35, it was announced today by Col. Homer Garrison Jr., DPS Director.

"More than 100 of these positions of trust and public service will soon be open for qualified men," Garrison said. "They include opportunities for advanced education, excellent physical conditioning and a permanent career of serving mankind."

There are four branches of service for which men are directly recruited — Highway

APRIL 1 IS DEADLINE FOR BLACK BASS STOCK REQUEST

AUSTIN — Persons interested in obtaining black bass for stocking private waters are reminded by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department that April 1 is the deadline for receiving applications for these fish with delivery to authorized places in the spring.

The deadline for catfish and other fish is August 1, with delivery in the fall.

Applications received after those dates are filed for consideration the next year.

The Department advised prospective recipients:

"Bass will not be delivered to ponds previously stocked unless the waters have dried up or have been chemically renovated and the out-of-balance fish population removed. Channel catfish may be requested, if needed, every three years because this species does not normally reproduce in small lakes. Recommendations for stocking by Texas Parks and Wildlife Department biologists will be honored."

Here is additional advisory data:

"A properly stocked farm tank, fish pond or small lake will provide fishing over a number of years. There is no need to restock with fish every year. Such a practice is not only wasteful of hatchery reared fish but results in an overcrowded condition and stunted, small fish. Overstocked waters produce poor quality fish just as over-

stocked land produces poor quality cattle.

"Small lakes and ponds should be stocked with a balanced ratio of forage fish and predators. The predators reared in State hatcheries are largemouth bass and channel catfish. The best forage fish produced in our hatcheries is the redear sunfish. This species also provides a good panfish in many parts of the State.

"In newly built or newly renovated waters, largemouth black bass, stocked at the rate of 300 fry or 100 fingerlings per surface acre, do extremely well and should produce a fishable population within a year.

"Crappie, or white perch, will not be stocked in ponds of less than ten (10) surface acres in size. This policy is part of an attempt to provide the best fishing possible to small pond and lake owners. Due to the inherent reproductive capacity of crappie, this species will quickly overpopulate and become stunted in small bodies of water. Such a condition normally results in poor fishing for all species of fish."

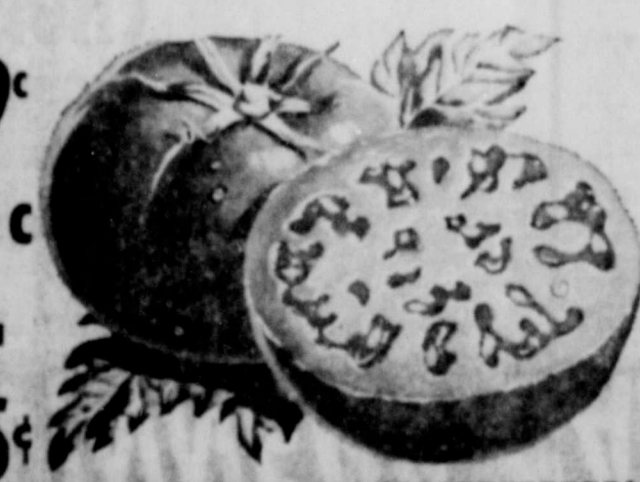
