

Taylor's Key Base-Cleaning Double Ices Rangers' Triumph in Soonerland

COACH JACK ALLEN's Rangers returned home from Sooner territory this week bringing with them the "Murray Invitational" trophy which they won in the six-team baseball tournament at Murray College in Tishomingo, Oklahoma.

Ranger was the sole representative from the Lone Star State. The Oklahoma entrants were Murray State College, Eastern Oklahoma, Poteau and Connors.

In the first game Ranger came up with two decisive inning to destroy the host club's chances of winning their tournament. Butch Dawson, Fort Worth, was the winning pitcher, while Jim Skeins, Dallas, slapped a first

inning home run.

The next day, Eastern Oklahoma felt the sting of Ranger bats, as they went down 7-2. Ranger got 13 hits. Van Jennings, Fort Worth, got the win, as he went the distance, giving up five hits and two earned runs. Jim Skeins was again the hitting star as he has a perfect day at the plate, going 4-4, which included another circuit smash.

The final game matched Ranger against Poteau. Poteau struck for an early run in the top half of the first frame, but Ranger jumped on Poteau's prized right-hand for four runs in the bottom half of the first. Ranger added two more in the 6th on Mcbee's 2-run single which made the score 6-1.

Bad luck struck and Poteau came back to lead it 7-6 with one inning to play. In the top of the last inning, Don Daniels led off with a single, Leah followed with a double, and Joe Bob Taylor played a hero role by smacking a double down the left field foul line to bring in the tying and winning runs.

In the gaze of major league scouting, in the tournament, Jim Skeins got 8 hits at 12 times at bat, including 3 doubles and 2 home runs. Joe Rayson pounded out 5 hits at

11 trips to the plate. Ranger's prized southpaw, Butch Dawson, hurled 10 innings, gave up 4 hits and one earned run, and won 2 of the 3 games. Van Jennings pitched 7 innings, gave up 5 hits and 2 earned runs, and won the second ball game.

Saturday Is Deadline For Deferment Testing

Midnight, Saturday, April 23, is deadline for filing college qualification tests for military deferments, Eastland-Stephens County Selective Service Board Secretary Jewell Reaves has announced.

New directives are also being announced pertaining to school deferments as follows:

At the close of the present school year (late May or early June), all full-term college freshmen must be in the upper one-half of the male class or make 70 on the College Qualification Tests; sophomores must be in the upper two-thirds or make 70; juniors must be in the upper three-fourths or make 70; and seniors must be in the upper one-fourth or make 80 to qualify for graduate work deferment.

The local board is sending three young men, Gary Graham of Eastland, Larry Johnson and Jimmy Jeffcoat both of Cisco, for induction Wednesday April 20. In May, eight will be sent for induction, and 15 for Army physicals on the third, the secretary said. There were no pre-induction physicals called in April, she said.

The 1966 high school graduates will be able to enter college in the fall, she said, provided they get something into their files immediately indicating their plans to go to col-

Mike Herrington Home Following Tour Of Duty With Peace Corps

Michael Herrington is at home, 19 Terry Place, Ranger, after spending almost two years service with the Peace Corps.

Herrington is a native of Ranger, a graduate of Ranger High School and Baylor University. Prior to graduation, he accepted an invitation to join the program of Peace Corps.

After ten weeks intensive training in UCLA and three weeks in Puerto Rico, October 1, 1964 found a group of 41 secondary education and university teachers in Quito, Ecuador, S.A. for a week's briefing and specific assignments. Mike's assignment was to Gualaco, a village of 3,000 population near the capital city. His duties were in the field of secondary education and agricultural supervision.

Teaching assignments included a class of boys in a technical and trade school supported by the state; and a class of girls in a purely academic Catholic school.

An agricultural supervisor, he worked with a man whose duties are similar to our County Agent, under whose supervision Herrington secured and distributed technical advice and aided in projects of gardens and care of small animals. Ultimate aim of this work is a modified 4-H program.

Adopting the language and living customs of the people, Herrington presented an example of what an American really is; he being the first "gringo" (Spaniard) for foreigners that many of the natives had ever seen in this country whose overall population is 40 per cent pure Indian and 60 per cent part Indian or European descent.

The school term extends from November to July. At the completion of the first term, it was privileged to visit South American countries during vacation.

Shortly after the beginning of the second term (November 1965) he became ill and was transferred to Cuenca, Ecuador, where medical facilities were available. Early in January he was sent to the Canal Zone for further diagnosis and treatment; and from thence to Public Health Service, Baltimore, Md. where he remained until March 23. He will be at home until health permits return to routine activities.

Asked how he feels about the Peace Corps, he said: "It is one of the greatest experiences a person could have, an unusual opportunity to acquaint oneself with another and greatly different mode of living." He is high in praise of Peace Corps "person to person" approach to human problems, and adds: "I leave Ecuador with a better understanding of what an Ecuadorian is like, and I hope my South American friends have a better understanding of a true American."
